When the group realized where they were headed after over 22 million collective steps and almost four years on this "virtual" journey, the smiles of satisfaction and pride said it all! We had been travelling straight south for all these years, and finally reached the

Amundsen-Scott South Pole Station in Antarctica this week! Yes, we had collectively walked to the South Pole!

We passed groups of penguins that only populate the shorelines because the inland parts of this barren continent consist of ice pack, which reaches a thickness of 2,835 metres at the South Pole! As we neared the Station, which is located on a snowy plain, we were aware that we were following in the footsteps of Roald Amundsen who had reached the South Pole only 110 years ago!

Antarctica only receives about three inches of precipitation in the form of snow every year, but it accumulates and is blown about by the prevailing winds.



An earlier structure consisted of a dome covering the research buildings, but it became covered by the snow drifts and was removed 10 years ago.

The new buildings are mounted on adjustable legs with the lower portions slanted to force the wind gusts to accelerate underneath and clear out the snow. We reached the "Ceremonial South Pole" which is located in front of the main research buildings for our group shot, but some of us stood by the small, actual geographic South Pole which is moved every New Year's morning to the corrected spot!






