#### FROM PROBUS CANADA

Do you have a child or grandchild graduating from high school in 2025 and is enrolled in a full-time undergraduate program for 2025-2026? If so, they might qualify for a \$1,000 scholarship from belairdirect. Students must also fall into at least one of the following categories:

- Be a member/employee of a belairdirect recognized group\* (policy not required); OR
- Have a parent/guardian or grandparent who is a member/employee of a belairdirect recognized group\* (policy not required). **PROBUS Canada is a recognized group.**

Belairdirect scholarship program is open now for applications until **July 15<sup>th</sup>**, **2025**.

The eligibility criteria to apply for the program remains the same as last year whereby the applicant or applicant's Parent/Guardian/Grandparent, must be a member of one of our recognized groups 'Affinity groups' and is not required to have a policy with us. This year, we will award 50 scholarships each valued at \$1,000, to students completing high school in 2025 and will attend a post-secondary educational institution in Canada in the fall of 2025.

# Jokers Venue $2 - 1^{st}$ Friday of the Month @ 1 pm


Nancy and David hosted the May Joker games with munchies galore.

This month featured another Canadian author, another one of her books, and another Historical Fiction novel.


Many thanks to both Brenda and Shelley for hosting.

The Grape Expectations wine group missed an opportunity to celebrate earlier this year. After an organization meeting hosted by Tom Carey, their first tasting session was on March 24<sup>th</sup>, 10 years ago.

At 6 bottles per session, that means that the wine sippers have sampled over 600 wines since the group began!

Each meeting has a theme. A particular country, or winery, or wine type were the early go-to selections but it didn't take long for creativity and fun to take over.

How about 'wines with unusual names', 'celebrity wines', 'wines from the 1960s', or 'wines from Starbucks' (yes, Starbucks had a short-lived 'evenings' program with wine and food in 2016-7).


