The church today faces significant criticism from various sources, both within and outside its communities. A major challenge is the erosion of biblical authority, as secular ideologies and cultural trends increasingly undermine the role of Scripture in faith and practice, leading to doctrinal confusion and moral compromise. This is compounded by a broader cultural shift toward moral relativism and scepticism toward absolute truth, which weakens the church's prophetic voice and spiritual vitality.

Criticism often arises from internal issues such as poor governance, unclear values, internal politics, and theological inconsistencies, which can create a toxic environment that exhausts leaders and confuses members. Additionally, scandals involving abuse of power and institutional corruption have damaged trust, particularly amongst the younger generations.

The church also grapples with the challenge of moral and changing cultural issues leaving congregations and some liberal minded bishops struggling to hold to biblical truths and the unchangeable faith of our forefathers.

At Christmas though it is important to maintain a balance of the human and the divine, ensuring that secular traditions like decorating trees, watching films, or exchanging gifts—should not overshadow the spiritual focus. Christians then, should celebrate Christmas by focusing on the birth of Jesus Christ and the significance of His Incarnation which are recorded in Matthew 1:18–2:21 or Luke 2:1–40. Keeping the true story of Christmas at the forefront of the season by observing Advent, the four-week period leading up to Christmas, can help us prepare spiritually for Christ's arrival.

So, at this time when so many criticisms are aimed at the church and her servants, I implore you to remember and reflect Christ's love, emphasizing generosity and thoughtfulness over materialism, perhaps by displaying acts of service, such as donating to charity or volunteering, and by doing so will be

aligning ourselves with Christ's teachings to love and serve others.

So may you be filled with the wonder of Our Lady, the obedience of Saint Joseph, the joy of the Angels, the eagerness of the Shepherds the determination of the Magi, and the peace of the Christ Child be with you and throughout the ages of ages. So may Almighty God, +Father, +Son and +Holy Spirit bless you. Amen.

COOKS CORNER

Broccoli and bacon salad with creamy dressing



Ingredients:

150g streaky bacon rashers | 800g broccoli, cut into small florets | 125g (1/2 cup) whole-egg mayonnaise

| 1 tsp fresh lemon juice | 2 tsp

wholegrain mustard | 1 tsp Dijon mustard | 200g red grapes, halved | 2 green shallots, thinly sliced | 2 tsp slivered almonds, toasted

Method:

Step 1 Place the bacon in a large frying pan. Heat over medium-high heat. Cook, turning once, for 4-5 minutes or until golden and crisp. Remove from pan. Coarsely chop.

Step 2 Meanwhile, bring a saucepan of water to the boil over high heat. Add the broccoli. Cook for 3 minutes or until bright green and tender-crisp. Drain. Refresh under cold water. Drain.

Step 3 Combine the mayonnaise, lemon juice and mustards in a small bowl.

Step 4 Arrange the broccoli on a serving platter. Season. Scatter with bacon, grapes, shallot and almonds. Drizzle with dressing. Gently toss to coat.



LONELINESS AT CHRISTMAS

To help lonely people at Christmas, we could offer companionship through simple gestures, volunteer our time with a charity, or invite someone to join our festivities. Small acts of kindness can make such a significant difference.

Individual Actions

A simple phone call, a text, or a handwritten card to a lonely person can mean a great deal. A short, genuine conversation asking how they are doing goes a long way in acknowledging their existence and showing you care.

Check on Neighbours: Pop in for a cup of tea, watch some Christmas TV together, or ask if they need help with errands like grocery shopping, posting letters, or picking up prescriptions. This is especially important for elderly individuals or those with mobility issues.

Extend an Invitation: If we have a spare chair at our Christmas dinner or are hosting a get-together, consider inviting a lonely neighbour, friend, or acquaintance to join.

The most important thing we can do is to not pass people by; simply acknowledging them and making time for human connection can have a profound impact.

Help in a Crisis:

For those who are severely struggling, provide information for support services such as the Samaritans (116 123) or The Silver Line (0800 4 70 80 90 for older people), which operate 24/7 during the holidays.

'While Shepherds Watched Their Flocks', and what's the story?

The Christmas carol describing the Annunciation to the Shepherds is a favourite for many. But how well do you

know it?

The nativity hymn, 'While Shepherds Watched Their Flocks', was first published in A Supplement to the New Version of Psalms in 1700, the lyrics a collaborative effort



from Irish poets Nahum Tate and Nicholas Brady. It claims to be the first Christmas hymn authorised to be sung by the Anglican Church and today, it's one of only 16 works in the 1700 supplement to still be sung. As for the melody, the popular carol is sung to a variety of tunes, but two seem to have stuck.

For festive singers in the UK, the hymn is generally sung to the tune of 'Winchester Old'. But across the pond, carollers opt for a variation on an aria by Handel, taken from his opera *Siroe*, arranged by Lowell Mason.
