reetings members. We need everyone to turn in any type of discipline that you may receive ASAP. If it is mailed to you, you should contact us by way of the steward booth or call the Union Hall. It is very important that you notify your steward as soon as possible because you only have 14 days after you receive the discipline to file a grievance. After 14 days that discipline will stay in your file for two years. Filing a grievance allows management and the union to negotiate for a lesser term, which by no means do they have to.

Make sure that you get and keep confirmation numbers for call ins. Make sure your 3971 reflects the type of leave you requested. Sometimes management will go in the system and change your status. If this occurs, contact your steward.

WHAT IS A MAMMOGRÁM?

A mammogram is an X-ray picture of the breast. Doctors use a mammogram to look for early signs of breast cancer. Regular mammograms are the best tests doctors have to find breast cancer early, sometimes up to three years before it can be felt.

Tips for Getting a Mammogram:

- If you are due for a mammogram and have been recently vaccinated for COVID-19, ask your doctor how long you should wait after vaccination to get your mammogram.
- Try not to have your mammogram the week before you get your period or during your period. Your

breasts may be tender or swollen then.

- On the day of your mammogram, don't wear deodorant, perfume, or powder. These products can show up as white spots on the X-ray.
- Some women prefer to wear a top with a skirt or pants, instead of a dress. You will need to undress from your waist up for the mammogram.

WHAT HAPPENS IF MY MAMMOGRAM IS NORMAL?

Continue to get mammograms according to recommended time intervals. Mammograms work best when they can be compared with previous ones. This allows the radiologist to compare them to look for changes in your breasts.

WHAT HAPPENS IF MY MAMMOGRAM IS ABNORMAL?

An abnormal mammogram does not always mean that there is cancer. But you will need to have additional mammograms, tests, or exams before the doctor can tell for sure. You may also be referred to a breast specialist or a surgeon. It does not necessarily mean you have cancer or need surgery. These doctors are experts in diagnosing breast problems. Doctors will do follow-up tests to diagnose breast cancer or to find that there is no cancer.

HOW CAN THE APWU HEALTH PLAN HELP?

What you need to know about flu shots



Influenza (flu) is a contagious respiratory infection that circulates around the world each year and usually hits the United States between October and May. The viruses that cause the flu are most often spread by coughing, sneezing, or close contact.

Anyone can get the flu. According to the CDC, it tends to strike suddenly and can last for several days. Although it has some of the same symptoms as the common cold — a runny or stuffy nose, cough, sore throat, and fatigue — the flu can lead to pneumonia, blood infections, or even death. Other symptoms of the flu include fever, body aches, headache, and chills.

Flu is more dangerous for some people

Each year, thousands of people in the U.S. die from the flu. It can cause serious complications, particularly in infants and young children, adults age 65 and older, and pregnant women. If you have a medical condition, such as heart disease, the flu can make it worse. Influenza infection can also trigger asthma attacks in people with asthma.

Flu vaccines are the best way to prevent flu and its complications. Although not 100% effective, a flu shot can keep you from getting infected, make the flu less severe if you get it, and keep you from spreading it to your family and others.

Who needs an annual flu shot?

The CDC recommends that everyone six months of age and older should get a flu vaccine every year. The vaccine is given as a shot, usually in the arm, or as a nasal spray.

Who should not get a flu shot?

Children younger than six months of age are too young to get a flu shot. If you have a severe allergy to the vaccine or to eggs, gelatin, antibiotics, or other ingredients in the vaccine, ask your doctor or pharmacist if the vaccine is right for you. Also, you may not be able to get a flu shot if you have a history of Guillain-Barré syndrome (GBS). Finally, if you're under the weather, it's often best to wait to get a flu shot until you're feeling better.

Why do you need a flu shot every year?

Flu viruses evolve quickly. Manufacturers release new flu vaccines every year to protect against the three or four influenza viruses that researchers expect to be in circulation during the upcoming season. It's impossible to predict influenza viruses with 100% certainty, so the effectiveness of the flu vaccine varies from year to year.

In recent years, when the flu vaccine matches the viruses that are circulating, vaccination reduces the risk of illness by about 40-60%. Sometimes it's less effective, sometimes more. In past years, the vaccine has been up to 90% effective at preventing the flu.

A flu shot can't give you the flu

Contrary to what you may have heard, you can't get the flu from a flu shot. Some flu vaccines contain no flu viruses at all, while others are made with inactivated viruses that can't spread infections. However, there are a number of reasons why you might not feel well after getting a flu shot:

- Side effects of a flu shot can include soreness, redness, or swelling at the injection site. Also, as your body produces protective antibodies, you may experience a low-grade fever, headache, or muscle aches.
- 2. Two weeks is about the time it takes for the flu shot to become fully effective. If you were exposed to a flu virus right before you got vaccinated or during the time it takes your body to develop full protection you could catch the flu before the vaccine starts to work.
- 3. Different flu viruses circulate each year. You could get sick if you're exposed to a virus that's not included in the seasonal flu vaccine.
- 4. Health factors and age can affect how well a flu shot works. Some people can catch the flu despite being vaccinated. Flu vaccine is most effective for older children and adults under the age of 65. Some older people and those with certain chronic illnesses may develop less immunity after getting a flu shot. But if you catch the flu, the vaccine offers some protection. Your illness is likely to be milder, and you're less likely to be hospitalized.
- 5. Other illnesses, like the common cold, can produce flu-like symptoms.

Lower your risk of getting the flu

While a flu shot isn't perfect, it's your best defense against the flu. Of course, there are other steps you can take to help protect yourself from all kinds of viruses:

- 1. Wash your hands often with soap and water. (If soap and water aren't available, use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer.)
- 2. Don't touch your eyes, nose, or mouth.
- 3. Avoid crowds during the height of the flu season.
- 4. Stay home from work or school if you get sick.
- Living a healthy lifestyle can also help keep you at the top of your game. Eat a healthy diet. Stay physically active. Get plenty of sleep. And manage your stress.
