And they called the blind man, saying to him, "Take heart; get up, he is calling you." ⁵⁰So throwing off his cloak, he sprang up and came to Jesus. ⁵¹Then Jesus said to him, "What do you want me to do for you?" The blind man said to him, "My teacher, let me see again." ⁵²Jesus said to him, "Go; your faith has made you well." Immediately he regained his sight and followed him on the way. Sermon II

Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ, amen. Quite a few years ago, back when I was in early elementary school, we had a guest speaker who was blind that came to talk to our class. He was an extremely intelligent and successful person, if memory serves me correct, I think he held several different degrees and did a bunch of legal work for different charities and social services. Yet, in spite of what a great upstanding citizen this man was, he was also sometimes mistreated because of his disability. For instance, he described how when he voted in elections that unfortunately there weren't always Braille ballots available at the polling place for him use. So when that happened he'd have to go into a room with an employee at the polling station who was supposed to read the ballot out loud to him and he'd tell them his choices they were supposed to fill in those choices for him. As if the thought of having to tell a total stranger your voting selections and not even know if they're filling them in the way you want wasn't daunting enough, he also voiced how on a few occasions of having to go through this process that some of the employees even gave him push back for his voting choices and that one even told him that they refused to mark down a particular vote of his. In addition to that there's also lots of difficulties that being blind poses to everyday living that he and others go through. At VBS last summer we had the kids do some activities that simulated what it's like for people with different disabilities, and one of them was we gave the kids sunglasses that had Chapstick smeared all over the lenses which blurred their vision entirely and then we had them try to run through the playground with those glasses on. And the whole thing was quite literally eye-opening to just how a lack of sight makes doing even simple thing so much harder.

As many difficulties as this man and others who are blind may face today, people who were blind during the time of Jesus's earthly ministry faced even greater challenges and were truly some of the most vulnerable people in the world. There was no social services or public safety programs in place back then and there also weren't any of the technological advances that we have today to assist the blind. This basically created a situation where the blind couldn't earn a living or support themselves at all, so most of them had to resort to begging for money and food. That was the situation that Bartimaeus lived under in our gospel story. In fact, in this story Bartimaeus isn't even referred to by his actual name and instead is simply called "the blind man", showing that many didn't even believe that he had enough dignity to be named. Yet, when Jesus walks by, Bartimaeus cries out to him addressing him. Many others in the crowd tried to silence him though, telling him to be quiet and get back in his place, just as some tried to silence that blind man who visited our school or how others historically who've spoken out against injustice have been told to get back in their place. Yet, Bartimaeus won't stay silent in the face of the injustices that he others were facing and cries out once more "Jesus Son of David, have mercy on me" and Jesus hears him and actually takes the time to go over and ask him "What do you want me to do for you?" I'm sure that almost no one had ever asked Bartimaeus that question before or even noticed him as Jesus did. At his request, Jesus restores Bartimaeus's sight, this miracle would have provided him with healing in many ways. Obviously, having his vision would make everyday living so much easier. However, he also would have had so many of the social opportunities he hadn't had before and would no longer be known as just this worthless blind beggar by so many of those around him. But I think that perhaps the greatest healing Bartimaeus received in this story was the fact that after years of being overlooked and ignored, Jesus actually listened to him and treated him with the dignity and respect he deserved. And at the very end of this story out this whole crowd of people that was there. Bartimaeus ends up being the one to become a follower of Jesus.

Friends in Christ, God creates a place for the most vulnerable and oppressed, just like Jesus did for Bartimaeus. I got a glimpse of that last week when our confirmation class went down to help at the Benevolent Society. The director of operations down there shared with us some stories of some of the people they've helped over the years, one of them was a family that had two young girls who were living in food insecurity. She said that when she gave this family their bags of food, that the girls were just so excited to find cereal in there because they hadn't ever gotten cereal before. It almost sounded like the excitement and joy children have on Christmas morning when they open up their presents and find something they've always wanted but haven't had before, only in this instance that item was cereal. She also said that she's been amazed over the years by how much power there is just in the act of listening to people's struggles. As I listened to her stories it reminded me of Jesus listening to Bartimaeus and asking him, 'What do you want me to do for you?' Because God is always moving toward care and justice for the blind, the beggars, and anyone else suffering from afflictions. That's God's work among us. So now may the peace of God which surpasses all understanding keep our hearts and minds in Christ Jesus our Lord, amen.
