New mosque opens with food festival

TOOWOOMBA'S first mosque will open its doors to the public on Sunday with an international food festival.

The Islamic Society of Toowoomba has applied the finishing touches to the mosque ahead of the open day, including a new Islamic crescent moon and star attached to the roof of the former church.

Spokesman Professor Shahjahan Khan said delicacies from Australia, the Middle East, Europe and Asia would all be represented at the celebration.

The day is being advertised as the "First Toowoomba International Food Festival" and is expected to become an annual fixture.
