Garden City Mosque Toowoomba Open Day Welcomes Thousands

29 June 2024

The Garden City Mosque in Toowoomba recently hosted a highly successful Open Day, drawing an estimated 2,000 attendees from diverse backgrounds, representing over 20 countries including Australia, Afghanistan, Bangladesh, Bosnia, Egypt, Eritrea, Iraq, Malaysia, Singapore, Sri Lanka, and Sudan.

A special highlight of the day was the rare viewing of the century-old (AH 1329-1330/1911 CE) Hasan Riza Hatti Mushaf-i-Serif Qur'an. This handwritten copy, on permanent exhibition at the mosque, is only opened on special occasions, adding a unique and historical element to the event.

The event featured an impressive lineup of dignitaries and special guests. Notable speakers included Cr Geoff McDonald, Mayor of Toowoomba; Cr Kerry Shine; Hon Trevor Watts MP; Hon Senator Paul Scarr, Shadow Assistant Minister for Multicultural Engagement; Hon Jennifer Howard MP, Assistant Minister for Treasury, Trade and Investment; the Most Reverend Ken Howell DD SSL, Bishop of the Catholic Diocese of Toowoomba; Right Reverend Cameron Venables, Anglican Bishop of the Western Region; Ms Tanja Miljevic from Multicultural Australia; and Senior Constable Catherine English from the Queensland Police Service.

The Open Day not only showcased the cultural diversity and unity within the community but also provided an opportunity for attendees to learn more about Islamic traditions and the vibrant multicultural fabric of Toowoomba. The overwhelming attendance and positive response underscored the event's success in fostering understanding and goodwill among different communities.





Eid-ul-Adha Community Gathering Strengthens Bonds 23 *June* 2024


