There is a time for everything, and a season for every activity under the Heavens.

– Ecclesiastes 3:1

It's Autumn: a new season of the year and perhaps, a new season in life. For some, the change of season is simply wonderful, and the fall weather is most welcomed. With it's cooler climate and colorful landscape; fall is the best time of the year for those who find the summer heat hard to endure. For others who have agonized through a long season of suffering - sickness, grief, natural disasters, loss of income, or trauma, a change of seasons is not just necessary, its mandatory.

Solomon wrote in the Old Testa-

ment book of Ecclesiastes about seasons. The first 8 verses of chapter 3 is devoted to this topic. He pointed out that in the seasons of life we experience good and bad; happiness and sadness; laughing and weeping; war and peace. And just as it is with nature's seasons, the times in our lives also have a beginning and end; a reason and purpose; and will always change in one way or the other. This is a natural fact as well as a spiritual one.

The realization that all seasons have a time is key in understanding Solomon's point in Ecclesiastes 3: 1 -8. The changing of the seasons is about timing, and timing is everything. Every experience in life has a

💙 isters, you either believe you can, or you believe 🗩 you can't. Both statements are true. You are what you believe you are.

I'm part of an Old School generation who was inspired to believe that we could do anything we wanted to do, and be anything we wanted to be. But, it could only be achieved through faith and hard work ... and the right attitude.

We were bolstered by riveting affirmations. Dr. Martin Luther King assured that no matter what our calling, our success was determined by our effort. He used as an example, a street cleaner. Dr. King said if you are called to sweep the streets, sweep them so well that all the hosts of heaven and earth will talk of your success. In other words, do the best, and be best at whatever it is you do.

Then, Maya Angelou pointed out *if you don't like something*, change it. If you can't change it. change your attitude. She affirmed that as humans, we have a lot of agency over our lives, attitudes, feelings, and beliefs. She encouraged us to find multiple ways of achieving our goals, even if it is not in the way you ideally want to do things. She said to think about what you can do – what achievable goals you can consider – and then go do them. It might take a while, it might be a hard road, but if you believe in your dreams, passions, and desires, mentally there's nothing you cannot do. You can gain victory, achieve your goals, and live your dreams, but only if you win on the battlefield of the mind.

Back in the day as my generation matured, we came to understand that in the ongoing fight for respect, equality, justice, and equal opportunities, weapons like our resolve, our education, and our determination could only achieve partial victory. Until we gained victory in the battlefield of the mind, we would repeatedly be defeated by our thoughts, beliefs, and attitudes.

Sisters, what's facing us is not nearly as important as our attitude towards what we face. Our attitude can determine our success or failure. The way you think about an obstacle may defeat you even before you ever face it. Winning comes when the thoughts, the attitude, the perspective, and the vision are all aligned for success. Victory is not always simple, quick, or painless, but it starts with believing you can win.

The real key to winning is not just believing however. We must use all that we have in conjunction with our faith. What we believe will keep us from perishing and give us everlasting life. What we believe gives us the ability to move mountains. What we believe makes all things work together for good to them that love God, to them who are called according to God's purpose. And, when we believe, "we can do all things through Christ which strengthens us." Believe in vour power to succeed through Christ my Sisters!

GOD HAD OTHER PLANS FOR ME

Rev. Jennifer Kimball is an Episcopal priest who has always had a plan; it was just different than the one God had for her. God called her to do ministry, and it landed her right in the middle of environments that were, at times, visibly misogynistic, racist, sexist, hopeless, disrespectful, faithless, and even godless. Yet, she endured, and is honoring her call by doing children's ministry, " ... for such a time as this." Reverend Jennifer Kimball is neither your typical minister, nor does she have a typical back story. She says "growing up in a sexist church and family, and not being content at all with that, I thought I would never take a job that was "women's work." I have stood up to gender stereotypes when playing sports (just as well as the boys), achieving grades, speaking in public, and becoming a priest. My mother would have been happy for me to have remained a quiet, shy woman who stays out of the limelight." But Rev. Jen acknowledges that "God had other plans for me."

The "other plans" that God had for Rev. Jen included family ministry, in particular, children's ministry. Long considered one of the more challenging assignments in ministry, those who focus on children and youth often find difficulty in coupling sound biblical doctrine with relevant, fun, engaging styles of teaching. Rev. Dale Hudson, a 30 year veteran in children's ministry, and the founder of the Building Children's Ministry organization, writes in Church Leaders magazine, "both what we teach and how we teach it are vital. Boring teaching of great Bible doctrine will not get through to kids. And fun, relevant teaching without solid Bible doctrine will leave kids without a strong faith foundation. It takes both working together, and it's easy to be discouraged when facing these challenges." For Rev. Jen, God's challenging plans for her life definitely posed a detour.

"Imagine my surprise and humility when I realized God called me to work with children, youth, and college students as a minister! My inner tough girl wanted to rebel. Why would I take on work that fit the harmful gender stereotype? Wasn't that going backwards, and reinforcing assumptions that kept women from being all they could become?" But Rev. Jen made an important discovery about her call. "This is the ministry that brings me the most joy, brings out the best I have to offer, feeds my soul, generates energy, inspires my creativity, and propagates tons of patience at a level that can only be due to the Holy Spirit doing Her thing."

Rev. Jen's approach to children's ministry is bold and courageous, because she sees children in ways that perhaps other don't. She understands that children learn from adults, but adults can also learn from children, because God speaks to them and through them. "In my reading and research on children's spirituality, I have come to one great conclusion: children know God before they are taught. This changed how I work with children, youth, and even adults. If we believe that we are one with God before we are born, and that all of life is an attempt to remember and reconnect with God, it leads us to treat each person with respect. It means we can learn from very young children – from their open trust, their blatant honesty, their wrestling with the right words to convey a thought or feeling."

Rev. Jen offers simple, but powerful advice: "open the ears of your heart when you are with them [children], and you will be enriched. Be with them in their joy of life, and you will find energy. Respect them, and they will repay you with trust. Pray with them, and you will find love. God be with each of us as we answer our calls to join hands with Christ and minister to the world." Amen!

THE BUTTERFLY

O ne day a man discovered the cocoon of a butterfly. Every day he watched, fascinated by the development of the cocoon.

This was how the butterfly prepared itself for flying once it was out of the cocoon.

BATTLEFIELD OF THE MIND By Joyce Meyer

According to the author "a war is raging. Your mind is the battlefield." **Battlefield of the Mind** is an oldie but goodie. Although the book was written in 1995, it's advice is just as relevant today as it was 26 years ago.

The book not only provides an up close and personal discussion of the problems and issues people face, but it also offers legitimate solutions to combating and conquering these issues.

This is a written testimony to a belief that Joyce Meyer maintains about how lives are changed. She says our lives start to change when we start to change our minds. Further, she suggests being proactive about making the change. She doesn't advocate taking a "pray and wait" approach." Instead, she provides reasonable, practical, and effective tips and action steps to focus the mind on overcoming the negative and limiting thoughts we experience that keep us from becoming all that God has created us to be.

What will winning on the "*Battlefield of the Mind*" accomplish? Meyer says you can:

- "Gain control over your mind and find freedom and peace."
- "Recognize damaging thoughts and stop them from influencing your life."
- "Be patient with yourself even when you make mistakes."
- "Arm yourself with the Word of God, praise, prayer, and other powerful spiritual weapons."
- "Overcome your mental 'wilderness' the bad attitudes and excuses people use that keep them from God – and find undreamed-of happiness and fulfillment."

If you do suffer from conditions of the mind such as worry, doubt, confusion, depression, anger, and feelings of condemnation - these are all addressed, as well as the consequences of judgmental, critical, suspicious, wandering, and passive minds. She points out that "we must be motivated from within, not from without. We must live our lives before God, knowing that He sees all and that our reward will come from Him if we persist in doing what He has asked us to do."

time, which lines up with God's perfect timing.

God has a plan for all people. God provides cycles of life, or seasons. Although each cycle has a specific purpose all of our seasons are designed "to prosper us and give us a hope and a future". (Jeremiah 29:11) Although the problems we face may seem to contradict God's plan, we must see problems as opportunities to wait on God, who may not come when you want, but who is indeed, always on time.

Ecclesiastes 3 notes that there is even a time and a season of temptation. Jesus experienced His season of temptation during a 40-day period when, being filled with the Holy Spirit, He was led into the wilderness. The scriptures tell us that Satan presented numerous temptations to Jesus during His wilderness season. Jesus was hungry; Satan offered food. Jesus was humbled and lowly; Satan offered vast riches and great wealth. Jesus called on His Heavenly Father; Satan offered the Word of God.

But Jesus' season of temptation was also His season of strength. When Jesus exercised His authority over Satan the devil had to flee. Satan only viewed this as a temporary setback however. Luke 4:13 records that "when the devil had finished tempting Jesus, he left Him until the next opportunity came." This simply means that although harsh seasons may return in your life, God will provide what you need to endure.

God equips us for the seasons of our lives. The Holy Spirit provides strength, nourishment, wisdom, power, and authority so that we can move forward throughout the seasons of our lives as they come and go. Each season has a purpose in God's plan for our lives, and God assures us that we will reap a harvest of blessings *if we do not become weary in doing good*. When we experience our season of reaping, it will be in righteous abundance. (2 Corinthians 9:10)

Trust God through every season of your life, whether good or bad. The secret to knowing peace with God is to discover, accept, and appreciate God's perfect timing for your change of season.
