# **TIDES**

They were next to each other on dry sand three hundred yards out in the bay!

# **Don's Tide Report for March 2025**:

The best times in Port St Joe are Sunday March 9th at 7:13 am with a -.5 and March 10th at 8:08 AM at -.3. In Panama City Beach the low tides on March 9th are 5:32 AM at -.6 and March 10th at 6:13 AM at -.5. I expect Mexico Beach and Crooked Island to have about the same low tides on both of those days.

# FIELD TRIP TO CARRABELLE, FLORIDA

Exploring a new area can be exciting, and at times somewhat tedious. Two of us started our morning at Carrabelle Beach. It was dreary, and surprisingly quite desolate, so we quickly moved on to the next suggested spot, Turkey Point. Our spirits were crushed when we discovered it is now a newly developed gated community. We continued our drive east to Bald Point Road, and paid our four dollars to park. There, we found multiple Angel Wings (Cyrtopleura costata) and this silly-faced Scallop.

Others, "the professionals" as I like to call them, started their search at five in the morning. Each, only equipped with a flashlight, had already acquired multiple specimen before I even got out of bed. They chased the familiar trail of a White Baby's Ear (Sinum perspectivum) and scooped it up from the wet sand. Have you ever seen a live Baby's Ear? I once read its appearance being described as a, "poached egg" and honestly, I can't come up with anything better than that. Another notable early morning

find by The Professionals, is the beautiful Pear Whelk (Fulguropsis spirata) pictured below. Common to to find, but still always a thrill.

#### Field Trip #3 Tuesday, July 8 USS Lexington Aircraft Carrier

Visit the USS Lexington, an Essex-class aircraft carrier built during World War II. She participated in several major campaigns in the later years of the war in the Pacific: Battle of the Philippine Sea, Battle of Leyte Gulf, raids on Tarawa, Wake Island, Gilbert Islands, Marshalls and operations on the Japanese home islands. She was awarded 11 battle stars and a Presidential Unit Citation during World War II. See the many restored Naval aircraft on the flight deck and witness Naval Aviation history. Most naval pilots after World War II made their first carrier landing on the Lexington, as she became the main training carrier for Naval Aviation and was stationed at Pensacola Naval Air Station in Florida for many years before being decommissioned in 1991. She was given to the City of Corpus Christi in November, 1992. The Lexington Museum is one of the U.S. National Historic Landmarks.

# Oh, Where Art Thou Janthina?

If you've talked to me for any length of time, this article should come as no surprise.

I'm obsessed with purple shells. Stay with me, I know this particular purple shell is probably the last, or near-to-the last on your list. There are much bigger, cooler shells to collect, right? But indulge me for a moment while I lament over my inability to find one of these little vacant mollusk homes. Ever since I discovered a purple prize like this exists, I have desired to find it above all other shells, and for years, it has eluded me.

I grumble at the word, "common" in it's name each time I pass page thirteen in my well-worn shell id book (page 7 in my Seashells of the Florida Panhandle book) - "Common Purple Sea Snail" or "Common Janthina." I finally caved and purchased several just to have them in my hands, but every shell collector knows, part of the joy comes from combing the beach, and finding that sought after shell yourself.

Please feel free to take me by the hand and point one out to me, the next time you spot yours.

## Janthina janthina (Linnaeus, 1758)

Janthinas go which-ever-way the wind blows. No, not because of their easily swayed opinions, but because literally, that's what happens when they form their little bubble boats. Janthinas create an extension of mucus covered bubbles to stay afloat while waiting for their next meal. Fortunately for beachcombers, strong winds can bring dozens to shore at a time, and sometimes these thickened bubbles are still attached.

In my quest to find one, Linda Brunner shared with me a telltale sign your chances will be good. You see, Janthinas feed on By-the-Wind-Sailors, and Portuguese Man-O-War. When those begin to wash ashore, it's time to search. Casually, she mentioned the purple dye they can leave behind on your hands. I'm guessing when my mouth fell agape, she was reminded she was speaking to a novice. This purple dye came in handy for the clothing of Ancient Greeks. It sounds like I would have fit right in, or at least would have been happy to dye their clothes for them.
