#### AI & BODY DOUBLES IN INTIMATE SCENES: THE DIGITALIZATION OF CONSENT

AI and digital body doubles are reshaping how intimacy is shown on screen, and not always in ways that center around consent. With current technology, an actor's face, body, or performance can be manipulated to create intimate moments they never actually performed. The latest SAG-AFTRA agreements address this, but in practice, the ethics are murky and the safeguards are thin. Consent isn't just about signing off once. It's a living process that requires context: what's the scene, who's it for, how will it be used, and how might that change over time? AI shortcuts risk--bypassing that process entirely, turning bodies into digital assets that can be reused, remixed, or reimagined without ongoing permission from the performer. For intimacy coordinators, this isn't a side issue: it's the next battleground. Our work is about maintaining safe environments, as well as dignity and autonomy. That doesn't disappear when intimacy goes digital. In fact, it becomes even more urgent. AI can recreate flesh, but it can't recreate trust, vulnerability, or choice: the core of what makes an intimate scene real.



#### AT THE HEART OF INTIMACY COORDINATION IS CARE

Intimacy Coordinators center care in every moment: safeguarding performers, honoring the story, and supporting the creative process. Increasingly, this work overlaps with Mental Health Coordinators (MHCs), whose expertise strengthens emotional sustainability and psychological safety across productions.

Together, ICs and MHCs form a collaborative model of care: ICs guide choreography, container practice, and protocols for intimate or sensitive material; while MHCs offer non-clinical support through check-ins, wellness guidance, and restorative approaches to conflict. MHCs also provide content consultation, collaborating with creatives to ensure mental health is portrayed with authenticity and care in storytelling. Side by side, they create productions grounded in trust, sustainability, and creative freedom.

Amanda Edwards, President and Co-Founder of the Association of Mental Health Coordinators (AMHC), embodies this bridge as both a certified intimacy coordinator and therapist. She explains: "I see the value in our collaboration across departments and the magic that happens when we work together to support the storytelling and the safety of cast, crew, and even audiences."

As this model of care continues to evolve, it sets a new standard for artistry rooted in respect, proving that when care is collaborative, creativity can truly thrive.

#### 1. Silent Check-In

At the close of the safety meeting, invite everyone to take ten seconds to silently notice one word that captures how they're feeling. No need to share aloud, just the pause builds presence and grounds the group.

#### 2. Naming Needs

When giving direction, frame it as a need instead of a critique.

Instead of: "You're not focused."

Try: "We need focus here so this scene feels safe."

This shift keeps communication clear and collaborative.

#### 3. Micro Reset

If tension rises, offer: "Let's all take one breath together." One collective inhale/exhale takes less than 15 seconds and can reset energy without slowing production.


