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



There is Help Available

Introducing San Francisco's Aging and Disability Resources

For those of us who are of a certain age, the 'I've fallen, and I can't get up!' ad of the late 1980s created an indelible meme for aging. This column will provide the rest of the story: When you feel that you, or someone you love, has fallen into the quagmire of changes which can accompany aging &/or disability ~ know this: there are taxpayer funded services, through the Dignity Fund, provided by the City and County of San Francisco which will help you get up and going again!!!

I am going to introduce you to an important gateway to city services for the aging and disability community in this column.

I was delighted when Supervisor Safai invited me to become the district 11 Representative on the Disability and Aging Services Advisory Board in 2022. I chose a career in gerontology 40 years ago and I have never regretted that decision! Though a San Francisco native, my professional life was anchored in San Mateo County. Despite my many years in elder care, I had no idea of the amazing depth and breadth of services which San Francisco offers our elder and disabled community members, their families, and all who care for them! In each column, as your DAS advisory representative, I will provide information on one specific service.

Last week, I visited our District 11 **Aging and Disability Resource Center (ADRC)**, which is located at 65 Beverley Street (near the Junipero Serra/19th Avenue split). This site is also the Catholic Charities OMI Senior Center. There is adequate parking available, and it is accessible via multiple Muni transit lines.

I arrived at the Catholic Charities OMI Senior Center at 12:30pm & was greeted by an array of ebullient elders. I found I could not stop smiling! I remembered the magic of my past career. While waiting for my host, Rosa, to join me I found myself swept into a ballroom dance class. I don't ballroom dance, I'm clumsy. I ballroom danced until rescued by Rosa. I had so much fun! This sense of wonder permeated the visit. In an adjacent room, there was a well-attended computer literacy class underway. A food bank was setting up outside of the building.

Rosa Mendez is the Assistant Deputy Director for Aging Case Management/Home Subsidy Services. She introduced me to a breath-taking array of indepth services which can be accessed through the ADRC. Rosa's vast understanding of extensive and complex city systems and services was presented clearly. She is a delightful, calm, and consummate professional.

Last quarter, I introduced readers to the downtown HUB. Your local ADRC is an easily accessible, very local gateway to an array of services so extensive that I cannot begin to list them here! Rosa provided an outline of the vast scope of programs offered by Catholic Charities, through its contract with the San Francisco Human Services Agency, and the huge network of related service providers.

I was then introduced to Jennifer Chang and Yvonne Bucay, Information and Assistance Specialists. These two professionals are miracle workers! In my mind, I began to picture them as weavers of an intricate tapestry. They keep their sewing box filled with supplies through a vast knowledge of resources. These are the threads which they weave into a design which will cover many, or all, of your needs. They will learn your story and then begin weaving a network, and providing a 'map', which will help you to address your needs &/or the needs of the person you are assisting. Jennifer and Yvonne will also provide practical assistance geared to your unique situation. They are bilingual and can help you fill out forms, assist with calls you may need to make, find transportation which fits your needs, and so much more. I asked them what recent successes have lifted their spirits. Their smiles, as they thought of services they had located and secured for their clients, were beatific. I can only give a few examples: they managed to locate a program which provided RING services for qualified recipients & which covered the major expense of the program. This resource is vitally important to elders who are at risk of social isolation due to the fear engendered by the media focus on hate crimes. They also linked elders to affordable smartphone access provided by Assurance Wireless services and low-cost energy assistance through PG&E. These cited program examples are a small percentage of their innovative successes in discovering elder and disability services for their clients.



Updates from your C.N.I.A. Board

Casa Colibri (Mission Inn) Advisory Group | The "CCAG" by Barbara Fugate

The Casa Colibri (Mission Inn) Advisory Group has continued to meet every month since December. We are happy to report that there has not been any impact on police services at this location since they started accepting residents in the late fall, 2023. No crime, no arrests.

The new construction that you see now is Phase II of the project. There will be 3 ADA rooms, a community room, and the building will be painted. Budget cuts may limit any changes to the front fencing. The final goal is to house 51 people.

In March and April, the group was advised about phase II of the project, and the residents' needs, such as hygiene items. If you can, donations of shampoo, conditioner, razors and shaving cream, deodorant, soap, lotions, etc. would be greatly appreciated. Additionally, socks are always needed, and there are two dogs and three cats who would appreciate dry and wet canned food.

The CCAG has also discussed the possibilities of medical insurance, internships and jobs (of note, the OMI has a terrific job assistance program). Currently, the staff has been able to help residents work towards obtaining their security guard card or CNA license.

You can donate items yourself by dropping off with the staff in the front office, just inside the gate. In the interest of protecting client's privacy, please take a moment to call before delivering your donations: 628-285-2455. Alternatively, you can drop them off with me (Barbara) and I will take all the donations up once a month.

Oh, by the way...

Did you know that Recology (the waste management company that picks up our green, blue, and black waste bins) provides more than just curbside pickup? For example:

- They offer free special services to residents who are physically unable to set their bins near the curb. If you need help with your bins, call Recology at 628-201-0077 for assistance.

Remembering Marilyn

I'm sure all of us recognize those very useful memo pads which show up in our mailbox each year. Our grocery & to do lists often feature a photo of a community realtor with contact information. Many of us find Marilyn Driscoll smiling at us from atop our indispensable reminders ...'don't forget to clean the fridge before mom visits', 'make my dentist appointment', 'wash my good blouse for tomorrow's meeting'...etc. etc.

Those of us who routinely drive along Cayuga, between Mt. Vernon and Ottawa, would smile every time we saw the brilliant seasonal decorations splashed across Marilyn's home. No holiday was unrecognized, as Marilyn celebrated life unreservedly and shared her joy with her community!

A sparkling spirit has transitioned to a higher community now and we will miss her! Marilyn was an energetic supporter of the Cayuga Neighborhood Association for the 49 years she called Cayuga Avenue home. Years of health challenges did not dim her spirit! She left us early Tuesday, May 7, on the anniversary of her first holy communion.

Marilyn was a quintessential Irish San Francisco native. Her childhood family home was located on the corner of Caesar Chavez and Guerrero. She celebrated her life's milestones in St. Paul's Church and was a graduate of St. Paul's high school. She met her lifelong 'best friend' Sister Nora, O.P., who was also raised on Caesar Chavez & Guerrero, before she was one year old. She lived there until purchasing her Outer Mission home on Cayuga 49 years ago.

Once settled in her forever home, Marilyn became an active member of the CNIA. She served in many offices over the ensuing almost 50 years, including being our Sunshine Committee leader for 30 years, making sure members received greeting cards or calls on special occasions.

As our community began to age, we realized that there was a need for an Aging in Place network. Marilyn hosted the formative committee meetings exploring this need and how to respond to it in her home. Thanks to her participation, the Cayuga Community Connectors were launched in 2012. Marilyn, with Glenda Hope, was instrumental in creating San Francisco's first aging in place network. There are now 8 Connector groups, and the movement is growing every day!

Glenda Hope contributed her memory of Marilyn: "Marilyn received the 'Good Neighbor Award' from the Cayuga Community Connectors in 2024 because she was always so welcoming, opening her heart and her home to meetings, organizing for the neighborhood of Cayuga Terrace, and giving generously to those in need, especially children. Her friends in Cayuga organized 2 mornings (10–12 AM) for people to come by for coffee and donuts and to celebrate her 85th birthday (April 13 and 14). 70 people came! One family of 8 children came in the evening, bringing Chinese takeout, and sat in a Circle of Love so each could tell her what she meant to them, and she could respond. Miss Marilyn had become a surrogate mother since their own mother died many years ago."

Marilyn's sparkling spirit will live on, infusing the community which she enriched for over 49 magical years!

May her memory be a blessing!
