Friends, neighbors and members: Happy Spring!

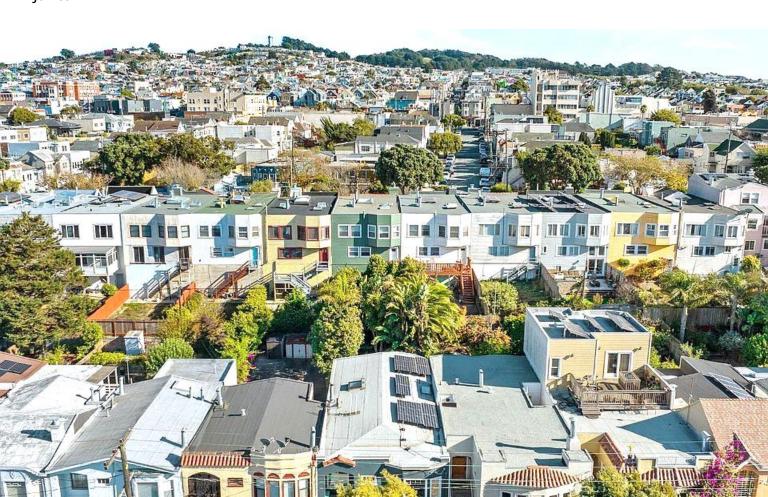

STREET AND TRAFFIC SAFETY

We understand and recognize that more can and should be done to make our local streets safer. Speed cameras have arrived!
One has been installed on Alemany between Naglee and Farragut and will be turned on by mid-April. There will be a two-month grace period, and then drivers who drive 11+ miles over the speed limit will get a warning and then citations of \$50 for each additional violation. WORKING TOWARDS CLEAN SIDEWALKS/STREETS

Hi neighbors, I'm Steve, CNIA board member, and leader of volunteer trash cleanups in our neighborhood since 2021. I'd like to share some information and encourage everyone to participate in different ways so that we can improve the cleanliness on our streets and sidewalks. Perhaps the most important tool and program is San Francisco's 311 service, which is best accessed with the SF311 app for smart \phone; you can also call 311 or go to sf311.org. If you find "dumping" – a sizeable pile of trash, furniture, or other large items left on the sidewalk – you can report it on 311, and generally it gets removed quickly. With the smartphone app, you take a picture, which automatically identifies the location, and with a few taps, the City services get the details and will send the Department of Public Works (or sometimes Recology) to resolve the problem. Using the app is particularly valuable since each entry creates a record of items to show patterns of where problems are and allows accountability to see if each item gets resolved.

Adopt-a-Street

Cayuga is one of San Francisco's hidden gems, and here's a great way to get involved and help keep our neighborhood in tip top shape!

The Department of Public Works will provide you basic equipment to help patrol your one block of your street to pick up litter. You could imagine if more people joined this, each block would always get litter picked up!

The Adopt-A-Street Program is a partnership between the City and its merchants and residents. Groups or individuals agree to adopt an area and take responsibility for keeping the street, sidewalk, and storm drain clean. In return, we provide free street cleaning supplies, and litter and compostable leaf bag pickup.

The Adopt-A-Street Program creates a cleaner, more pleasant environment for everyone who lives, works and shops in adopted areas. The program also strengthens community ties as neighbors and merchants work together to keep San Francisco clean.

The Adopt-A-Street Program began in 1998 and now has thousands of individuals, families, and merchant and neighborhood associations signed on to clean and green their sidewalks and streets.

An update on our local Aging and Disability Resource Center.

In my column last quarter, I introduced you to our local **Aging and Disability Resource Center (ADRC)**. I'm going to recap my introduction first and then provide a site update. Shortly after my column appeared, there was a change in our local ADRC provider and site.

For those of us who are of a certain age, the 'I've fallen, and I can't get up!' ad of the late 1980s created an in en for aging. This column will provide the rest of the story: When you feel that you, or someone you love, has fallen into the quagmire of changes which can accompany aging &/or disability, know this: there are vital taxpayer funded services, including Dignity Fund dollars, which are provided by the City and County of San Francisco Department of Disability and Aging Services (DAS). DAS is a department under the umbrella of the San Francisco Human Services Agency (SFHSA). Aging and Disability Resource Centers will help you get up and going again! There is no charge to those seeking assistance and services through these sites. I am going to introduce you to an important gateway to city services for the aging and disability community in this column.

Our new ADRC is located at the Geneva Community Center at 5050 Mission Street, on the corner of Mission Street and Seneca Avenue.

I arrived mid-afternoon and was greeted by Evonne Zhu, Social Services Program Manager, Self Help for the Elderly. (415) 677–7697.

The site is bright and cheerful! There are a vast array of activities scheduled throughout the week. While there, an intergenerational computer literacy workshop was in session. If the chatter and laughter were any indication, everyone was highly engaged in learning and enjoying the process immensely. Sadly, I did not have photo clearance for this particular activity, so I must capture the sparkling scene with words. The students from nearby Balboa High School had definitely forged a strong connection with their class of eager-to-learn elders! Strong intergenerational relationships are invaluable assets to a well functioning society!



This is also a nutrition site, so the aroma of a lovely meal permeates the atmosphere with homelike warmth. Nutrition sites provide a vital community service. Good nutrition is pivotal to maintaining optimal physical and mental well-being. While the meals are very good and visually appealing, the greatest benefit may be psychosocial. Dining together creates community. Too often in our culture, elders are isolated and thus at greater risk of succumbing to depression & failure to thrive, both of which contribute to corollary declines in holistic well-being. The focus of my visit was the ADRC, located on the mezzanine above the activity and dining area. Evonne introduced me to her information and assistance specialists:

Kristin speaks Tagalog. Shirley speaks Chinese. Spanish translation is available upon request.

I visualize our ADRC professionals as our Lewis and Clarks in the maze of contemporary aging and adult services. They provide a map of what services are available to help with your specific need(s). They can serve as a personal guide for you. Best of all, they can assist you in accessing services! They will help fill out paperwork, make phone calls, follow up on referrals, help with caregiver resources, find economic assistance, etc. One ADRC specialist found a source of affordable, elder friendly cell phone services for her clients. Another specialist focused on assistance with utility costs through PG&E, SFPUC, and Recology.

I always enjoy learning through stories, so I asked Kristin and Shirley to tell me about the most unusual request they'd encountered. I would never have expected their answer. They are now the Vietnamese community specialists in all things related to fishing regulations and obtaining fishing licenses! Having successfully helped an elder navigate the fishing license requirements and application, they now receive requests for help routinely. Their service is very valuable to this community, where fishing provides both family sustenance and a close-knit elder community which socializes while fishing almost every day. Their story captures the essence of the immeasurable value of the ADRC service. In this scenario, fishing is a remedy for social isolation, failure to thrive, and the related need for increased and costly medical interventions. These elders remain engaged in their community & contribute to their families, allowing their younger generations to thrive as well. This fishing license story chronicles a simple, compassionate 'win' for all of us!!! Thank you to our local team of ADRC heroes!
