# Cayuga Improvement Association General Membership Meeting April 17, 2021, 10:00 am (held online via Zoom) MG Thomas

The meeting was called to order at 10:05 am. Acting President Dillon welcomed attendees and gave the CIA's contact and social media information: Website: cayugaimprovementassociation.org

Report from Ingleside Precinct, SFPD Captain Nicole Jones joined the SFPD in 2007 and worked 5 years in Ingleside. Her email is nicole.h.jones@sfgov.org. SFPD is preparing response plans to the Chauvin trial with outreach efforts to the community. Generally, crime trends are down in the precinct except for robbery and burglary. There have been many garage break-ins and the SFPD has put information in their newsletters about how to avoid break-ins. There is also a very slight increase in auto theft. More campers have been parking illegally overnight; report this to the police department when you see it.

Sideshows are ongoing and the SFPD has created a consolidated response team. Please call 911 if you see a sideshow in progress; don't assume someone else has reported it. The SFPD is fully aware of the increase in attacks on AAPI people. They are working with all communities, trying to make people more comfortable calling and reporting all incidents directly to the police, and not just posting on social media.

A question was raised about thefts of catalytic converters. Captain Jones explained that these aren't individuals - they are well-organized teams that can do this in minutes. Research is ongoing about how to prevent these thefts; making the catalytic converter secure in a car is very expensive. For now, if you see something, say something. If you catch something on your home or

business security camera, please share it with SFPD. It was noted that there has been an increase in unruly behavior in Cayuga Park. Captain Jones said they can increase their "passing routes" in the area.

Report from the Supervisor's Office Ernest Jones is a Land Use and Planning Specialist in Supervisor's Safai's office explained about Home-SF, which is an optional program for developers constructing mixed-income buildings in certain areas of San Francisco. Under HOME-SF, 20 to 30 percent of the units in a new housing project must be affordable to low and middle-income families. As far as parking in these developments, it's an ongoing struggle. The city prefers for people to use public transit and not have parking spaces in new developments. There is coordination between new construction sites and SF Muni to determine whether additional buses will be needed. Ernest also gave an overview of some nearby construction projects. The site at Foote and Mission has been delayed. Originally, it was going to be a live-in care facility but now discussions are being held about making it a residential building instead; at this point nothing is firm. The planned residential building to be constructed at the Safeway location on Mission Street will be all rentals, all 100% affordable housing. Preference will be given to people already in the general neighborhood. A question was raised about carbon neutrality in new construction. Ernest explained that all new buildings are being built with environmentally friendly components and there are also tax credits for the developers to do so. There is a new cannabis dispensary planning to open at 5801 Mission Street. Ernest will attend their upcoming meeting. The supervisor is aware and concerned about another dispensary in the area.

Lauren Chung was asked about our suggestion to get a Pit Stop installed. She said it would have to go into the next budget. It's on their radar, but no firm plans yet.

BUSINESS MEETING: It was moved and seconded to approve the General Meeting minutes from February 2021. Treasurer's Report: Renee Anderson reminded attendees that our dues are \$10/year. Dues can be paid on our website with PayPal, or by mailing a check payable to Cayuga Improvement Association to Renee at 322 Rome St, SF, 94112. Since our last meeting, we paid \$200 for flyer printing and \$180 for our web hosting service.

TEAM REPORTS Vehicle Triage Site: The final report from Barbara Fugate is in our newsletter. Friends of Cayuga Park: Yoni Carnice has expanded his thesis into a book with extensive information on Cayuga Park. The information will be added to our website when the book is released. Several of the park statues are being stored for safekeeping

and repair. When the pandemic restrictions are lifted, we will have a painting party to refresh the statues' colors.

CPAB: Joelle Keneally reported that the next meeting will be held on Tuesday. NERT: Jane Merschen reported that a recertification training will be held soon for those who are already NERT certified. Other: A new vaccine site is now open on Norton Street. The meeting was adjourned at 11:25am.

#### Treasurer's Report Renee Anderson

Since our last General Membership meeting we have spent an additional \$200 for membership flyers. Many members are now taking advantage of the savings when paying 4 or 5 years membership dues in advance. Yearly dues remain at \$10 a year. If you wish to pay for 5 years the dues would be \$40. In the near future expect a notice on your status. Due to Covid we have found that many of us have forgotten if we owe dues or are current.

It is also very important that we get updated information on our members. We promise you we will not share you information, your information will remain private and only the CNIA board will have access for CNIA business.

Why does the Board believe it is important that we have your contact information? Because there are times when we would like to update members, especially when we are made aware of safety concerns for our neighborhood. Capt. Jones may have a safety alert she would like everyone to know about and time is of the essences. And of course we need your email information to make sure you get a copy of the quarterly newsletters.

#### Cayuga Park Volunteers

Cayuga Park volunteers have been on break due to Covid quarantines. Volunteers repaint Demi Braceros statues to help preserve them and generally help with tasks needed outside the Rec and Park staff areas.

<u>Community Connector neighborhoods</u> are holding outdoor walks where neighbors can meet in person. Cayuga Connectors gather together every Wednesday, 12 noon, at Cayuga Park. Often we have homemade treats, we have live music, and always we have great conversations.

Slow Streets – Coming Soon, Cayuga Slow Street Slow streets are residential streets that cars and people walking and bicycling use as a shared roadway. With the use of barricades and signage, slow streets discourages through traffic but does not restrict access for local traffic, emergency vehicles and delivery vehicles.

Slow streets is <u>not</u> a road closure. Slow streets does not give people walking or on foot exclusive right-or-way. and Slow Streets <u>does not</u> take away any existing parking.

#### **Building** project

4742 Mission St at Onondaga – Work has started with demolition in progress. The 7065 sq foot single story commercial building will be replace it with a 45,235 sq foot eight story dwelling unit. The project includes 7 off street parking spaces and 46 bicycle spaces in the basement. Plans are available for viewing at https://sfplanning.org/notices or contact Planning Dept Staff Linda Ajello Hoagland 628-652-7320 for further information.. The project has passed CEQA. Editor's Note: At this time these appear to be market rate apartments not mixed rate or subsidized.
