Friends,

As we bask in the joy of the Easter season, often called Eastertide, we have time to reflect on all that we experienced in Lent. I hope that you found worship to be meaningful and that you found a deeper faith at the end of this journey. We enjoyed seeing our church family more often than usual with Sundays, Lenten Mondays and our night church on Wednesdays. One of the symptoms of deep faith is feeling joy at being with other believers. Now that Lent is over, we

resume our Wednesday evening bible study at 7 p.m., after our Celtic candle worship.

An amazing thing happened over Lent. We received a package in the mail addressed to the Rev. Chip and Lisa Graves with no return address. Inside was a lace frontal and a note that told a story of its origins. It read that a N.J. lady was visited by her British mother during the early stages of World War II. She begged her mother to stay with them in N.J., but her mother felt her country needed her. She secured tickets on the last sailing of the Oueen Elizabeth II. Her daughter prayed that her mother would make it. She finally received a letter confirming she was indeed safe in England but they were not safe at all. Bombs rained down and they were constantly on alert. At once this devout Episcopalian began making a lace frontal in thanksgiving to God for her mother's safe arrival in England and when it was complete she gave it to her Church in N.J.. The frontal was used for Christmas, Easter and special occasions until the church closed in February of 2023. The beautiful Frontal is the perfect size for the portable altar we use at night church.

What a wonderful legacy we carry on in using it for our lovely night worship. We give thanks to God for the witness of faith and for our anonymous donor who allows us to continue it's use! A few weeks ago someone asked us why we use the paper bulletins instead of the Book of Common Prayer. We use these booklets for a season, and save them for use in the coming year. The primary reason is that it makes it so much easier for newcomers and visitors to follow along in the service. When people can't find their place in a new church, they sometimes feel frustrated or even foolish, and may not come back.

We want to make it as easy as possible for all of us to worship God. For those who love to use the Book of Common Prayer, you still can. We always start on page 355 unless it's Lent, and then you can flip to the right Eucharistic prayer when it's time. We are using Prayer B currently. The beautiful part about our church is that we insist that there are many right ways to worship!

I pray that Easter remains in your heart, as it does mine! What a joyous season!

I am so happy that we are on the other side of Easter. Though I love our Season of <u>Lent</u>, it can become a bit heavy-laden after several weeks of piety. As we enter the Season of Easter my step seems a bit lighter, my heart a bit more joy-filled and I know the cave is empty. Alleluia! Alleluia!

Sally French Elected Bishop of New Jersey

The Episcopal Diocese of New Jersey has elected the Rev. Sally French to serve as the 13th bishop of the diocese. Pending the required consents, she will be consecrated and installed as the bishop of New Jersey on June 24, succeeding Bishop William H. "Chip" Stokes, who is retiring.

French currently serves as canon for regional ministry and collaborative innovation in the Diocese of North Carolina. Prior to joining the diocesan staff, she spent 20 years in parish ministry, serving congregations of many sizes and types. Raised in Toronto, Canada, French earned a bachelor's degree from Trinity College, University of Toronto, a Master of Divinity through the Toronto School of Theology, and a Doctor of Ministry degree from Virginia Theological Seminary. She was ordained a priest in 2001. She and her husband Clarke have two children living at home.

In brief remarks delivered via Zoom after the election results were announced, French thanked the voters, the Search and Transition Committees, and her fellow candidates. Concerning her forthcoming position as bishop of New Jersey she said, "I look forward to serving with love."

The bishop-elect was chosen from a slate of five nominees by clergy and lay leaders representing each congregation of the diocese during a special hybrid convention held on Jan. 28 at Trinity Cathedral in Trenton and online via Zoom. She was elected in the third round of balloting with 68% of the clergy votes and 56% of lay votes. A majority of both clergy and lay votes in the same round was needed for election.

"I believe the Holy Spirit has led us to a remarkable leader who is deeply grounded in the faith and love of Jesus Christ," Stokes said. "Canon French brings gifts and skills in ministry that are well aligned to address the needs and challenges facing the church and the Diocese of New Jersey at this moment in its life and history. I look forward to welcoming her and her family to the Diocese of New Jersey and serving with her in this exciting time of transition."

The other nominees were the Rev. Dena Cleaver-Bartholomew, canon to the ordinary, Diocese of Rhode Island; the Very Rev. Troy Mendez, dean, Trinity Episcopal Cathedral, Phoenix, Arizona; the Rev. Janine Schenone, rector, Good Samaritan Episcopal Church, San Diego, California; and the Rev. Mauricio Jose Wilson, rector, St. Paul's Episcopal Church Oakland, California.



Spotlighted This Month......Susan Burkhardt

One of the many reasons we are blessed at St. Stephens is that our congregation has people that have surprising backgrounds. Susan Burkhardt is one of those talented people that has so much to bring to our table of worship. Susan was born in Philadelphia and spent most of her formative years in Pennsylvania. As the oldest of 5 siblings, she matured at a young age. While in the sixth grade she remembers feeling a call to be a nurse and spent 28 years in a career as a registered nurse. She worked in Critical Care and

the Intensive Care Unit. She also remembers that when she reached the age of 40, she felt that she was an old soul with a gift to be shared in healing and giving. After her nursing career, Susan continued with her gift of healing by working in Home Care for a quadriplegic woman as her assistant. She worked with her taking care of students with disabilities and was her assistant for a total of 18 years. During that time, she was a single parent raising two daughters.

Susan's parents lived in Forked River. Her mom had died in 2012 so in 2013 she moved in with her father to care for him.

As a cradle Episcopalian, Susan joined St. Stephen's in 2017. With her, she brought some special talents in the field a Reiki Master acquired in 2006 and Integrative Energy Master, acquired in 2004. These energy modalities can work for believers and non-believers. Also, as a member of Order of St. Luke since 2005, she continued this healing at St. Stephens. These types of healing were used on her family, friends and even her dog. She found that she has the ability to heal with her good intuition and a sense for what was coming. Energy is the source of all that is here on earth and Susan has the ability to utilize that energy to sense what is going on in your body. Her nursing has been an intellectual guide as the Reiki and IET is a spiritual and intuitive guide. Susan is also a breast cancer survivor which was caught early enough to keep her well.

As to St. Stephen's volunteering, Susan works at the Thrift Shop, does healing with the Order of St. Luke and is always the first one to help wherever needed. Chapter 3 #10

In 1972, when I first became a police officer, I knew there would be holidays and special occasions when I would be separated from my family. Knowing this fact, did not make the task any easier. The celebrations I missed those first years depressed me and often made me question my career choice. Working on Christmas Eve was always the worst.

Then, on Christmas Eve in 1977, that all changed; I learned that blessings come disguised as misfortune and sadness, and honor and reward come in ways that can only be held in one's heart. I was riding a one-man radio car on the midnight shift in our most northerly zone which is mostly residential and I was missing Christmas with my 2 infant sons. The night was cold and everywhere I looked I saw reminders of the holiday; families in cars going to and from church; their cars packed with presents, beautifully decorated trees in living rooms and yards adorned with wonderful decorations. It all added to my holiday funk. The evening had been relatively quiet even for a city cop; calls for barking dogs and false burglar alarms, nothing of any great importance to make my shift pass any more quickly. I thought of my own family and sunk further into my own selfish depression.

Shortly after midnight I was dispatched to the home of what turned out to be an elderly terminally ill man. I parked my radio car in front of the simple Cape Cod style home on Meadow Lane. First aid kit and oxygen in hand, I walked up the short path to the front door. As I approached, a small, slightly stooped, elderly woman in a bathrobe who appeared to be in her 80s opened the door. "He's in here," she said, leading me to a back bedroom. We passed through a living room that was furnished in a style I had come to associate with older people. The sofa had an afghan draped over its back and a dark, solid but worn Queen Ann chair sat next to an unused fireplace. The mantle was cluttered with a mixed assortment of photos, some ceramic figurines and an old antique clock. A floor lamp provided soft but insufficient lighting and a small Christmas tree sat on an end table. We entered a small bedroom where a frail looking man lay in bed with a blanket pulled up to his chin. He had a sad stare on his ashen and skeletal face. His breathing was shallow and labored. He was barely alive. The trappings of illness were all around his bed. The nightstand was littered with a large assortment of pill bottles. An oxygen bottle stood nearby. Its plastic hose, with facemask attached, rested on the blanket.

I asked the woman why she had called the police. She simply shrugged and nodded sadly toward her husband, indicating to me that it was his request. I looked at him and he stared intently into my eyes and said nothing but he now seemed relaxed. Considering the circumstances, I did not understand the suddenly calm and relaxed expression on his face.

Slightly perplexed, I looked around the room again. A dresser stood along the wall to the left of the bed. On it was the usual memorabilia: small ornate perfume bottles, a white porcelain pin case, a wooden jewelry box, a small crucifix and several photos in simple frames. It was one of these photos that caught my eye and I walked closer to the dresser for a better look.

The picture showed a handsome young man dressed in a police uniform. It was unmistakably a photo of the man in the bed. It suddenly came to me; I knew instantly why I was there. I looked back at the old man and he gave me a weak but warm smile and he motioned with his hand for me to approach the side of his bed. I walked over and stood beside him. He took my hand with his thin fingers and held it with surprising strength. We just stood there for several moments in silence looking at each other. He motioned for me to lean towards him and whispered to me with obvious emotion, "stay with me." I felt his grip start to weaken as he continued looking at me. There was no fear in his eyes; he knew he was dying and that his time was very near. As with all of us, there was some apprehension of what was happening and he wanted to have a fellow cop with him when he started his journey. A caring God had seen to it that this child of his would be delivered safely to him. The honor of being his escort had fallen to me.

When my tour ended that night, the temperature seemed to have risen considerably, and all the Christmas displays I saw on the way home made me smile. I no longer felt sorry for myself. I would still rather be with my family, but now I know of an even greater mission. I have chosen an honorable profession. I pray that when it is my turn to take that final journey to God that there will be a cop there to hold my hand and remind me that I have nothing to fear. MERRY CHRISTMAS.
