

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Report of the Senior Pastor- 2025

“No Matter What!”

From the January 2026 Connections Newsletter:

January’s cover looks different because this moment feels different. Many congregations are navigating uncertainty, and some are even closing their doors. St. John’s is choosing a clear, confident response: not shrinking back, not coasting, but stepping forward with renewed purpose and a public-facing message about who this church is called to be, in and for the community.

That’s what “No Matter What” means. It’s a statement of identity and intention — steadfast welcome, steady compassion, and a willingness to lead with hope when it would be easier to play it safe. This January, we are looking past the traditional list of New Year’s resolutions. Instead, we are making a bold commitment to the future. We are capitalizing on the incredible generosity and spirit that has brought us this far, using it to fortify our foothold in this community. We are moving forward with intention, ensuring that our legacy is one of active, dynamic faith.

The coming year will ask something of each of us, and it will also offer a beautiful opportunity: to strengthen what has been built, to widen the circle, and to invest in what lasts. When St. John’s shows up consistently — with faith, courage, and open hands — neighbors notice. And a church that is clear about its calling becomes a beacon: not just for the people already inside, but for the people still looking for a place to belong.

*Let January be a fresh beginning — grounded in gratitude, shaped by vision, and lived out together, **No Matter What!***

Our focus this year builds once again on our mission affirmation... “We Worship, We Love, We Serve - No Matter What!” Each ministry area is asked to describe how our ministry has risen above challenges and changes to grow St John’s. Over the last four years, rising up from the experience of Covid-19 Pandemic shutdowns, St. John’s has looked intentionally forward, renewing and expanding our connections with each other and in our community and conference areas. We’ve faced many challenges with staffing needs, financial support, property maintenance and changes in our membership and programming. Through all we’ve faced, we have shared a hopeful outlook, trusting each other and God to guide our next steps.

Serving in the Penn Northeast Conference UCC (PNEC) has been a great honor. I’ve helped represent St. John’s by providing leadership for the Committee on Ministry Oversight Working Group, which supports clergy in maintaining their standing in the conference and denomination, as well as working with congregations and clergy where there are issues in maintaining our covenant and standards. I’ve participated in ministerial authorization, ordinations and installations, representing our connection with our sister congregations.

I also served on the Keystone Study Group, bringing a resolution and plan to the UCC General Synod for the unification of all four of our Commonwealth’s conferences into a new

Keystone Conference of the UCC, which officially began January 1, 2026, as well as our new Mountain Valley Association. Again, being part of the General Synod delegation would not have happened without the support of our St. John's congregation. As our connectional relationships change with time, our commitment to being part of the wider Church has not wavered. With great intention and resolve, we are a United Church of Christ congregation, which is proudly Open and Affirming (ONA), welcoming ALL persons to embrace the journey of faith with us. We want every person to know the warm welcome of St. John's and to affirm our mission as...

So as 2025 closes, we are not asked to become someone else. We are invited to become more fully ourselves — rooted in truth, shaped by grace, and steadied by the knowledge that we have never walked alone. As the next year opens, may we step forward gently, knowing that love has already gone ahead of us.

As 2025 fades into memory and 2026 opens before us, we carry forward what has shaped us and release what no longer gives life. We trust that the love which sustained us this year will not disappear with the turning of the calendar. God is already present in what comes next — quietly, faithfully, and without condition. Wherever the new year leads, each of us can step into it knowing that we are held, we are seen, we belong and we are loved!

Our vision helped our Consistory leadership, with Wendy Fox as our President, and Spiritual Council Elders, Wendy Fox, Colleen Kulhammer and Paul Raszler, look at how we might guide the congregation to continue to take steps forward in faith, pushing our boundaries and expanding our outreach. We've learned along the way from both successes and setbacks, and we've listened to the congregation and the Spirit. Our "No Matter What!" spirit has helped us push beyond our comfort zones and take risks to engage the community around us with hope and compassion. As we enter 2026 with Paul Raszler as our Consistory President, Colleen Kulhammer as our Vice-president, and Linda Powell as our newest Elder to our Spiritual Council, we feel blessed by God with those God has brought to lead and guide us forward.

St. John's remains a vibrant congregation where new people continue to make their faith home. Our Worship is faithful and meaningful. Our Love strives to be unconditional and resilient. How we Serve continues to change lives in our area and around the world. We continue to find creative ways to increase our outreach to children and youth in our congregation and in others. In 2025, after another successful year of Faith Formation for adults and children, we held a wonderful Vacation Bible School and resumed the new school year with Faith Formation for our kids and our Confirmation Class. We shifted for the 2025-2026 school year to partner with St. George Antiochian Orthodox Church in Allentown for over 100 children and youth each week to use our classrooms to support their ministry. This partnership is blessing both congregations.

In addition, we joined leaders of St. John's UCC, Fullerton, Grace UCC, Allentown, and UCC, Greenawalds, to have all three congregations support a unified Confirmation Class experience, "Growing in Faith Together," recognizing the GIFT of faith we share with each other

in Jesus Christ. Once again, this is a new way of being and doing Church together. There have been many changes, yet it is our faithful approach to ensure that our young people have a meaningful experience, whether there is only 1 or 12. God is faithful and we remain grateful for new ways of being Church.

With the additional commitment to have Samantha Kistler brought on staff for her Field Education Placement as she completes her seminary training, we are providing her the opportunity to grow in her skills and gifts for ministry. Each quarter, we shift to add a new area of experience for her. When her seminary training is complete, we have her commitment to remain in covenant with us for an additional year, and perhaps longer as she completes her work toward ordination and becoming an authorized minister in the Keystone Conference of the UCC. We are thrilled with the congregation's affirmation to support this ministry of growth for us, by intentionally using financial resources to invest in both her leadership and our children and youth.

As with every year, St. John's has seen some members move to other areas and faith communities; we have removed some who have not maintained their membership covenant requirements over the last two years; some who have been received into the Church Triumphant; and received some who have chosen to make St. John's UCC, Fullerton, their place to **Worship, Love and Serve - No Matter What!** With three opportunities to take part in a Connections Class, we received 16 persons in 2025 into our faith family who are participating and finding their place of support for our ministries. Still others are actively participating who have not yet made the decision to unite with us. With the anticipated closure of our sister congregation, St. John's UCC, Mickleys, in the Fall of 2026, we know others will be making the decision to become part of area congregations. We know some will be looking closely at the vibrant life we experience here at St. John's UCC, Fullerton.

As a congregation with an increasing homebound membership, we have relied on the compassion and serving of some amazing women who join me in being part of our Visitation Committee, along with a few Consistory members who help share communion with our homebound. This ministry of connection and love makes a huge difference since we still have only one clergy person for our Congregational Care ministry. These laypersons sharing their care and support means so much to our most senior members of St. John's. I'm so thankful for these partners in hospitality, reminding our congregation that whoever you are and wherever you may be on life's journey, they still belong and are loved by our larger community of faith.

Sunday worship continues to create meaningful and growing connections as the beloved community, committed to doing justice, loving kindness, and walking humbly with God. We have celebrated our baptismal covenant with Christ as God's beloved family. We have rejoiced with families presenting their youngest and adults reaffirming their faith in Christ. We have shared in the great mystery of faith in Holy Communion as we receive and become the Body of Christ for our community and world. We have celebrated lives and grieved with families as beloved and cherished friends have been received into God's eternal loving embrace. We have

shared in different styles of worship, in different locations – indoors, outdoors at the Pavilion, with other congregations – all to celebrate the love of God in Jesus Christ which unites us.

St. John's remains a place with diverse viewpoints and expressions of how best to share our faith in an ever-changing world, yet we remain committed to being together, not in spite of our differences, but because of them. We share and appreciate what each person brings to the full life and ministry of our community. We are unashamedly progressive about many things. We insist on being a congregation whose welcome and affirmation of all people is genuinely experienced. We are thoughtful and respectful of our theological diversity and grateful for the person of Jesus, the love of God, and the power of the Spirit that continues to move us forward. We are financially responsible with the resources God provides through you, our members, and seek to be the best stewards possible to ensure a place of hope and faith for generations to come.

With all kinds of experiences in worship, study, fellowship, missions, and great fun, St. John's has felt the hand of God touch our hearts in countless ways. I'm grateful for the partnership in ministry I experience through the generosity and collegiality of our retired and connected clergy. We have numerous pastors and spouses who have chosen to make St. John's, Fullerton, their faith home. While many are still actively serving other congregations and denominations from time-to-time, we've been blessed with the leadership of Rev. Becca Stephens, Rev. Dave Mohr, Rev. John Hoff, Rev. Cliff Herring, Rev. Todd Fennell, Rev. Dennis Schappel, Rev. Bob Stephens, Rev. Janet Boyd, Rev. Evelyn Stupp and of course, our beloved Pastor Emerita, Rev. Dr. Becky Beckwith. These gifted and amazing leaders and members have made my leadership more effective, and I'm grateful for their friendship and support.

This past November, I noted the completion of my fourth year of ministry with you. As Easter 2026 approaches, I will have been honored to serve at St. John's UCC, Fullerton, longer than I have been able to serve in any congregation throughout my almost 40 years of ministry. Noting the United Methodist appointive system that moved clergy every three years or so, I've been so blessed in the United Church of Christ to share my gifts and to grow in my ministry because of you. You've empowered a faithfulness and authenticity in my ministry which I had not known until March 7, 2015 when I was first authorized as a minister in the UCC.

First and foremost, we are committed to being the Church, the people of God, whose love and grace is present for every person, always! We have prioritized our mission to focus on bringing people together in worship, in growing in faith, in expressing and extending God's love into the community, and focusing intentionally on being a place of radical hospitality and welcome. These priorities have not come easily. They have cost us people and relationships, resources and energy. Yet at the heart of who we are is the foundation of God's love through Jesus Christ. This is who we are together. **We Worship, We Love, We Serve – No Matter What!**

I've so greatly appreciated those who have shared their questions and their struggles about what the changing world of being Church today means for us – what it means to you in particular – individually and collectively. Whether in conversations around anti-racism, voting,

climate change, hunger in the Lehigh Valley, fair funding for education across the Commonwealth, LGBTQIA+ inclusion, systems of inequity and systems of privilege, we have learned that we can have conversations and engage with each other, knowing we are respected, honored and loved, whether we agree on all the issues or not. Whether we find the political, social or relational challenges easy or difficult to navigate, I'm thankful that we take seriously the covenant relationship in which we've promised to hold one another. **We Worship, We Love, We Serve – No Matter What!**

People near and far are joining us for worship, sharing in our love, and serving God, through our St. John's Fullerton community wherever they may be. Thank you to all who give so generously and supportively to this shared ministry. We also cannot express enough how grateful we are as a congregation for people who have invested not only their time, talent and treasure with regular faithfulness, but also for those who give in greater abundance remembering St. John's in their estates with gifts which will support this vital ministry in our community in foundational ways. With the incredible generosity of Adrienne Kiesbar through her estate, this simple and humble woman shared a portion of her investments over her lifetime to bless St. John's with a gift of \$762,000. The Committee on Stewardship and Finance, as well as the Consistory, are bringing a recommendation to the congregation to retain \$425,000 of that gift in our Endowment Fund. The balance would fund projects to enhance vital property updates and facilities improvements, along with funding areas of our program ministries and technology outreach, and support to help us with our annual giving through the 5% proceeds from our Endowment toward our general operations. "Thank you!" to Adrienne seems insufficient, yet we will faithfully seek to celebrate her generosity with each of these projects and through her support which will bless generations.

As we move forward in another year of ministry, we anticipate challenges and blessings, moments of grief and loss as well as celebrations and growth. The Church is alive and still speaking the truth of God's hope and unconditional love to a world and people in need. Our message rings out in all these things because of God's unending faithfulness. With your faith in action, the mission of St. John's UCC, Fullerton will thrive, because...

Personal Reflection

As I reach the halfway point of my internship, I honestly can't believe how quickly this first semester has gone. My time with the congregation of St. John's, Fullerton has been a real gift, and I am deeply grateful for the warmth, kindness, and trust you have shown me. From worship to conversation to the everyday moments of church life, you have welcomed me in and made space for me to learn, try new things, and grow into my call to ministry. I continue to be thankful for the ways you share your stories, your questions, and your faith so generously.

Looking ahead, I'm excited for the semester to come and for all that it will hold. I anticipate graduating from seminary this May, and this spring I'll be taking two courses that connect closely to the ministry I'm learning alongside you. As I think about the year to come — both here at St. John's and in the next steps of my ministry — I find myself returning to a verse that has become a gentle guide for me: "*The human mind plans the way, but the Lord directs the steps*" (Proverbs 16:9). It reminds me that while we make plans and set goals, faith invites us to stay open to where God may be leading next. This verse helps me hold the future with trust rather than certainty, and with gratitude for the people who help me listen for God's direction along the way. I'm thankful to be walking this season with you, learning together how to notice and follow where God is already at work among us.

Consistory President's Report and Spiritual Council Report – 2025

Hello members of St. John's. Wow, what a year and how fast it went!

What was accomplished in 2025?

We continued with our Home Communion. We had another member of Consistory join the team that goes out to our homebound members to give them communion.

In January the updated By-Laws were presented to Consistory and approved. They were then presented to the congregation at our Annual Meeting in February.

In June we confirmed three new youths, Adian Hannis, Nicholas Santee & Lucas Williams.

In July DonnaLee Yeatts and I co-chaired our second Vacation Bible School. The theme was “Egypt - Joseph’s Journey from Prison to Palace.” This year we tried doing it from Sunday to Thursday. We had about 12 children join us. We had worship, story time, crafts, snacks and music each evening. We had wonderful help. Hoping to do another VBS in 2026 and with even more help. Please consider this, even if you can only do one evening that week.

Pastor Steve and Tyler Shankweiler attended the General Synod meeting in July. They voted for the merger of the four Pennsylvania area conferences of the UCC into a new Keystone Conference which begins January 1, 2026.

In July the Elders reached out to the congregation to give us feedback on what is good and what “needs improvement” in the church. We had a wonderful response and after meeting with Pastor Steve we started the “Ask the Elders/Pastor” during Fellowship Hour. We did this for the months of September through November. There is talk about bringing that back in 2026 but maybe on a quarterly basis. More to come from the 2026 Elders.

In August we welcomed our Field Education Member in Discernment Samantha “Sam” Kistler. She has been a wonderful addition to Faith Formation for our young children and Sunday services.

In October, St John's was given a wonderful gift from Adrianne Kiesbar. Ms. Kiesbar passed away January 28, 2025, and in her will she bequest St John's a large sum of money. We were able to put a down payment for upgrading our elevator that will be done Spring/Summer of 2026. The Consistory approved the suggestion from the Stewardship and Finance committee to move \$425,000 into the Endowment. In early 2026 Consistory will be making decisions on what to do with the remainder of the money.

I'd like to thank all the outgoing Consistory members for their service over the past three years: Sharon Antrim, Kathy Roth and Tyler Shankweiler. We unfortunately didn't have a youth member, so finding one is a goal for 2026.

Lastly, I want to thank you all for allowing me to be your president this year. Hopefully your expectations of me were met.

Elevator Modernization Project

October 12, 2025

Following the morning worship service, congregation members remained to vote on the motion from the Stewardship and Finance Committee to authorize funding for the **Elevator Modernization Project** proposed by the Property Committee. The quote from Reading Elevator would secure a price of \$122,204, with 20% down in accepting the contract. It is estimated that additional work to prepare the elevator mechanical room will be done by a separate contractor, estimated to be between \$25,000-30,000. Funds for completion of this project will be paid from the Kiesbar Estate gift.

The motion did not require a second as it came from the committee. After a couple of clarifying questions about the scope of the project and the benefit to the congregation, the motion was unanimously approved.

Fall Congregation Meeting Minutes

November 16, 2025, 11:00 am

Wendy Fox - Meeting was called to approve the 2026 budget and the new 2028 Consistory members.

Pastor Steve – prayer

Sue Weldner - presented the 2026 budget to the congregation. Budget lines were reviewed, comparing 2025 vs 2026. Expenses are expected to increase in most areas, including health benefits (which are still unknown). It was suggested that a 3% increase from the Congregation in their giving will be needed to help meet the monthly expenses for 2026. The Keisbar Bequest was also discussed. The finance/stewardship committee will be reviewing the many

suggestions on uses for this new fund to help with upgrading the Church building. We want to be thoughtful and purposeful to honor Ms Keisbar with her monetary donation. 2025 Stewardship & Finance Committee Report

A big Thank You to all committee members for all they do to support the work of this committee! Also, thank you to the congregation for their on-going financial support of all we do here at St John's, Fullerton!

In 2025 we saw a 6% increase in offerings from the congregation! Overall, income from all our various sources increased 3.4% from the previous year.

While we continued to closely manage our expenses in 2025, we did see an approximate 4.5% increase in spending. Our total spending in 2025 exceeded our plan by about \$6,500 – mainly due to unanticipated increase in cost, occurrences of snow removal, and salting.

As we move into 2026, we have planned for a 10% increase in our budget. Along with general rising costs, we've increased the budget for snow removal. And we've added a part-time pastoral staff position. We encourage all members to do what they can to support that increased giving goal.

In addition to our General Fund, we have other financial resources: Mission funds, Restricted funds, Property funds, Endowment funds.

Mission funds: All our Mission giving is directly a result of specific designated mission contributions by the Congregation. Total Mission giving for 2025 was \$24,360. Details are included in the Mission Committee's report.

Restricted funds: These are monies given for a specific purpose, or they have been set aside by Consistory for "special needs, rainy day funds." At the end of 2025, we have \$42,000 available

for use with Consistory approval. An additional \$15,000 is earmarked for specific purposes, based on donor designations.

Property funds: At the end of 2025, we have \$17,000 available for larger property expenditures and significant, unplanned maintenance needs. During 2025 we utilized Property funds for several projects:

- \$2,035 Fox Hall bathroom repairs
- \$1,220 Fox Hall lighting upgrade to LED (will save in future electric costs)
- \$3,195 air conditioning repairs
- \$1,250 landscape cleanup, weeding, pruning

The Congregation approved the use of approximately \$150,000 from the Adie Keisbar bequest to be used for the modernization of the elevator. We expect that work to occur during the summer of 2026.

The Consistory approved an additional \$165,000 from the Adie Keisbar bequest to be set aside for future projects in 2026, to be reviewed, aligned and approved during the coming year.

We also have \$54,400 in the Pavilion fund. \$43,850 is invested to provide an income stream to support the monthly pavilion-related expenses. We have a 30-year mortgage for the Pavilion construction – the outstanding balance at the end of 2025 was \$80,930. We continue to encourage giving toward the payment of our Pavilion mortgage.

Endowment funds: at the end of 2025, we have \$996,675 in our Endowment fund. In 2025 we had two bequests added to our Endowment: \$5,000 from the Rarich family, in remembrance of Timothy Ott, and \$425,000 of the Adie Keisbar bequest was approved by the Consistory to be added to our endowment funds. In 2025, we gained approximately \$81,000 in interest, dividends, and market value growth. We supported our General Fund operations with \$23,300 in income distributions for the year. The generous additions to our Endowment in 2025 will begin to benefit future years with increasing annual income distributions.

The S&F Committee will continue to review our monthly financial results – sharing regular updates with the congregation, to keep us all informed, giving each of us the opportunity to support as we can!



The Christian Early Learning Center at St John's UCC, Fullerton, is a program offering classes to 3–5-year-olds. We run Monday, Wednesday, and Friday from 9-2pm. We have been able to

maintain an in-person classroom. We started the school year with 18 Students and now currently have 19 students enrolled.



We have been able to maintain an in-person classroom without wearing masks by cleaning daily and making sure we are all washing hands correctly.

We are currently working with two classrooms with a head teacher in each and one assistant. We have most students staying from 9-2 for the higher rate of \$240 a month. (15 out of 18). Students that stay 9-12:30 pay \$200 a month.

We are looking forward to growing the preschool program to its greatest potential. We have had requests to add more days to our schedule which would require more employees. This will be looked into for next year after some research is done about PA laws and regulations.

Whether through teaching, helping with activities, or offering an extra set of hands, support makes a real difference. Looking ahead, we will also begin preparing for Vacation Bible School, which continues to be an important and joyful part of our ministry with children and families.

Pastor Steve and I have also been spending meaningful time with our joint confirmation class, which includes students from St. John's UCC, Fullerton, Grace UCC, and UCC, Greenawalds. This group has been a joy to work with, bringing thoughtfulness, energy, and openness to each conversation. Together, we have been exploring big questions of faith in ways that invite curiosity rather than easy answers. Our conversations have ranged from topics like the Trinity, often one of the more challenging ideas to wrap our heads around, to talking about how we pray and what it means to speak honestly with God. These discussions have created space for students to ask real questions, share their own experiences, and grow more comfortable expressing what they believe and what they are still figuring out.

We are really looking forward to the time ahead with this group as we continue to explore faith together, deepen relationships, and support one another in this important season of growth. It has been a gift to walk alongside such thoughtful, engaged, and faithful young people.

Overall, faith formation continues to be a place of learning, curiosity, and connection at St. John's. I am grateful for the ways this congregation supports young people as they grow in faith and for the many hands and hearts that help make this ministry possible. It is a joy to be part of this work, and I look forward to all that the coming months will bring as we continue learning, wondering, and growing together.

Looking Ahead: Confirmation Class of 2025–2026



Verso-Chat: A Faith Formation Lectionary Group – 2025

Verso is a Latin word meaning *conversation*, and great conversation is at the heart of this ministry. Our lives are shaped by meaningful dialogue: with God, with Scripture, and with one another. Verso-Chat exists to nurture that kind of holy conversation, creating space for curiosity, listening, and faithful connection.

Each Wednesday morning from 9:00–10:00 a.m. on Zoom, Pastor Steve gathers with six to ten members of our faith family for an open, welcoming conversation centered on the lectionary readings that will ground the upcoming Sunday sermons. The group follows the Vanderbilt University Common Lectionary (now in Year A), engaging Scripture with attentiveness and expectation.

Participants receive the selected readings one week in advance and again the day before the meeting by email, allowing time for prayerful reading and reflection. Some members choose to go a step further, consulting commentaries and other resources and bringing those insights into the discussion. No preparation is required from previous weeks to participate, as our curiosity and openness are always enough to create a good conversation.

Verso-Chat is intentionally informal and invitational. Questions are welcomed. Diverse perspectives are honored. Pastor Steve gently guides the conversation, while participants share how Scripture intersects with their own life experiences. Over time, these honest exchanges have fostered deep relationships and strong bonds of trust, reminding us that faith is formed not only by what we believe, but by how we listen to and learn from one another.

Week by week, we open ourselves to ancient texts that continue to speak timeless truth, revealing God's enduring desire to be in loving relationship with us and with the world. This year, we were deeply saddened to lose one of our most faithful and enthusiastic participants,

Nancy Bowman. Her contributions to the group always shared something new and inspirational to start our conversation. In a note to Pastor Steve, she wrote:

“Verso-Chat has changed how I hear Scripture. The conversations help me slow down, listen more deeply, and discover how God is still speaking through these ancient words and through one another. It’s become a meaningful part of my week.” — Nancy Bowman

There is no obligation or long-term commitment. Each week stands on its own, so participants are welcome to drop in whenever they are able.

Food Pantry – 2025

The Whitehall Food Pantry, located at St. Stephen’s Episcopal Church, 3900 Mechanicsville Rd. in Whitehall, had another successful but challenging year in 2025. Donated food and items received from Second Harvest Food Bank are selected and packed into boxes and bags on the 1st through the 4th Monday mornings of each month. The packed items are then distributed to approximately 200 local families per month in the respective evenings.

St. John’s has about 20 excellent volunteers who donate their time and energy on the 4th Monday of each month. New volunteers are always welcome. Volunteers are needed in the morning from 9:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m. to sort food supplies and stock shelves. Volunteers are also needed in the evening from 5:30 p.m. to 7:30 p.m. to distribute food to pantry patrons.

In February, in observance of football’s Super Bowl, the church participated in the “Souper Bowl of Caring.” With a goal of collecting 250 cans of soup, we were pleased to have received 354 cans of assorted soups. In addition, we also received \$160.00, which was collected in soup pots after worship by our Confirmation Class.

St. John’s Ministry Fair was held on Sunday, September 21, during the Social Hour following worship. Members could check out the posters of the various committees, including the food pantry, and speak to the volunteers who come to help at the pantry every month.

From October into November, the U.S. federal government shut down as Congress failed to pass appropriations legislation for 2026. Funding for various programs was withheld. Families faced hardships with no SNAP payments coming in (Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program

– formerly food stamps). Food pantries found themselves in the same situation. The Mission Committee made an urgent plea in November for everyone to consider giving extra financially to the food pantry. We were very pleased that the congregation responded with \$1,657.49 in contributions in just that one month. With those funds, it was possible for the pantry to purchase grocery gift cards for their patrons for their Thanksgiving and Christmas meals. In addition, members helped surpass our goal of 180 boxes of stuffing mix for the holidays by donating 259 boxes of stuffing mix.

A shopping cart to place donated food items can be found in the coatroom area next to the sanctuary. For 2025 a multitude of assorted food items were collected. During the year, we requested items missing from the pantry shelves but that were in demand and in need: pancake mix, pancake syrup, jelly, juice, coffee, baked beans, canned fruit, and instant potatoes. Other grocery items were always welcomed. We received a total of \$4,575.49 in monetary donations for the year. What incredible generosity! Please keep up the good work for this very necessary service we provide.

Thank you to everyone who donated packaged and canned groceries and/or monetary contributions in 2025. We have a great group of volunteers and have a lot of fun doing this kind of mission work. It is very rewarding knowing we have helped people who face a food shortage crisis and seeing how appreciative they are for the food we've given them. “Fun-Raising” Committee – 2025

The fundraising events scheduled by the “Fun-Raising” Committee in 2025 contributed greatly to the financial needs of the church. Our events offered a time of fun, fellowship, and outreach not only to our members but also to our community. The “Fun-Raising” Committee met 12 times in 2025, offering both in-person meetings in Room 201 and Zoom meetings.

Members who served on the “Fun-Raising” Committee were Amy Feidler (Chairperson), Ginny Brokenshire, Bill Castello, Pastor Steve Davis, Brian Fisher, Jacke Maxon, Tom Moyer, Carol Raszler (Secretary), Lori Stocker, Karen Stoisits, Brian Strauss, and Barb Thomas.

This year our fundraisers realized a gross profit of \$19,810.90. The practice of tithing 10% of the profit from all our fundraisers for Mission Outreach continued in 2025. The tithing at the

end of the year amounted to \$1,981.08, which the Mission Committee designated to be distributed equally between the Lehigh Conference of Churches and the Whitehall Food Pantry—each receiving \$990.54.

On Sunday, September 21, a Ministry Fair was held in Fox Hall after worship. Posters from all the committees were on display, and the “Fun-Raising” Committee members could meet and greet and talk about the workings of the committee. We were pleased to have Jackie Maxon and Lori Stocker sign up and join our committee.

Dine and Donate Events and Give-Back Sales from various merchants were held in 2025. A certain percentage of the money from all sales was given back to St John’s. They included:

- 2026 Lehigh Valley SaveAround Books – sale began in November and extends into 2026.

For the fun and social end of our events and extending to the community, we held the following:

- Mardi Gras Gift Card Bingo – Friday, February 28.
- Phantoms vs. Penguins Hockey – Sunday, March 16.
- Kentucky Derby Gift Card Bingo – Friday, May 2.
- IronPigs vs. Bisons Baseball Party Porch – Sunday, May 25.
- Basket Social & Bake Sale – Saturday, May 31 & Sunday, June 1.
- IronPigs vs. RailRiders Baseball Grandstand – Tuesday, August 5.
- Halloween Gift Card Bingo – Friday, October 17.
- 29th Annual Road Rally – Sunday, October 19. Dinner destination took us to Hometown Restaurant in Breinigsville. Thank you to Tom and Emilie Moyer for once again organizing this tradition.
- St. John’s Bazaar – Saturday, November 8.

St. John’s is known for providing many delicious things to eat with our fundraisers. Our food sales this year were:

- Pastie Sale – Pickup Thursday, March 27 & Sunday, March 30.
- Pastie Sale – Pickup Thursday, October 2 & Sunday, October 5.

Under the organizational leadership of Tom Moyer, our bingos this year were rousing successes not only because of the profits earned, but because it brought people of the church and community together once again. The three Friday-night bingo events were our biggest

fundraisers, making a gross profit of \$11,207.44. Food, beverages, and baked goods were available to purchase, most of which were donated. We also had 50/50 drawings and tricky trays to bid on. Thank you to Pastor Steve and Paul Raszler for serving as the “callers” and to Bill Castello for his computer knowledge and producing an electronic bingo display board.

Besides the bingos, our other two big fundraisers were the Basket Social and Bake Sale and St. John’s Bazaar, both co-chaired by Amy Feidler and Carol Raszler. The Basket Social and Bake Sale was held for two days on May 31 from 9:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. and on June 1 before and after worship. Thank you to the many people who donated baskets, gave money for the committee to purchase and assemble baskets, or baked items for the bake sale. We were fortunate to have 97 baskets and gift cards available for people to bid on with 61 winners out of 152 participants. The event earned a gross profit of \$3,182.00.

The committee tried something new this year in scheduling the St. John’s Bazaar on Saturday, November 8, from 9:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. For a few months ahead of time, the congregation was asked to bring in new or used items they no longer needed or wanted. Departments were organized which included: appliances & small furniture, books & CDs, Coca Cola memorabilia, dishes & glassware, household décor, jewelry, knick knacks, linens, pots & pans & kitchen utensils, purses, seasonal décor, toys & games & puzzles & sports equipment. For the entire week before the Bazaar our group of 29 volunteers sorted, priced, and set out displays of the items received. Bill Fink and his crew made food available to purchase for lunch, and people made items for the candy and bake sale. Our crafters, “Keeping You in Stitches,” had a booth selling their craft items. At the end of the day, customers could come back and fill a grocery bag with any leftover items of their choice for \$5. Under the leadership of Gary Black and his fellow volunteers, any remaining items were taken to Good Will and to the Salvation Army. Some of the books were taken by Amy Feidler to the free library boxes located in neighborhoods throughout the Allentown area. Leftovers of soup, chili, BBQ, candy, and baked goods were then sold the next day before and after worship. This event proved to be a huge success, earning a gross profit of \$2,669.53, which did not include the craft sales.

The following Family Fun Nights were held in 2025:

- Super Bowl Tailgate Party & Family Feud Night – Saturday, February 15. The event was postponed from February 8 due to inclement weather. Participants wore clothing of their favorite football teams. The menu included chili, cornbread, dessert, and beverage. Everyone was asked to bring cans of soup for the “Souper Bowl of Caring,” which were donated to the Whitehall Food Pantry. Teams were formed and played Family Feud.
- Comedy Night & Meal – Saturday, April 26. People came for a lasagna meal, bread, salad, dessert, and beverage. Several people volunteered to be comedians and told jokes or funny stories. Clips of old Carol Burnett and Ellen DeGeneres shows were shown. The laughter and fun poured over into the next day for Holy Humor Sunday at worship.

- Movie & Ice Cream Night – Saturday, December 6. Choices of ice cream and toppings, popcorn, snacks, and beverages were served as members watched the hit movie “Wonka.”

It was with regret that we had to cancel our bus trips to Ocean City, New Jersey, on June 28 and our bus trip to New York City, New York, on December 13 due lack of response and not having enough seats reserved to fill a bus. We hope to have a better response to our bus trips in 2026.

Throughout the year, the congregation continued to save Redner’s tapes and purchase grocery gift cards from Giant and Weis markets. We thank Tracey Glass and Tom Moyer for ordering the Weis gift cards; Barb Thomas for ordering the Giant gift cards; and Karen Stoisits for the awesome task of tallying and submitting the Redner’s sales tapes. All three together brought in a total gross profit of \$1,124.30.

We held our RaiseRight (formerly Scrip) Gift Card Sale in December with \$8,915.00 in gift cards being purchased by our members and friends for the holidays. We thank Karen Stoisits for compiling the orders along with Carol Raszler. The profit for this sale amounted to \$416.72. The committee is always looking for new ideas and events that are both enjoyable and profitable for the church. We invite anyone to join the “Fun-Raising” Committee and share your ideas. Words of appreciation go to Bill Castello for all his great technological skills and ideas in creating wonderful bingos, family fun nights, and displays on the big screen in worship promoting our fundraising events.

We appreciate and thank ALL the many other volunteers who helped whenever needed for this committee and for the many food, beverage, basket, and tricky tray donations this past year. Last but not least, thank you to everyone who financially supported and participated in all our fundraisers in 2025.


The Men of St. John's – 2025

Over the course of the year, Reverends Steve Davis, Becky Beckwith, George Eckstein, Todd Fennell, Cliff Herring, David Mohr, and Dennis Schappell took turns to lead discussions on a variety of faith issues. We usually average about 12 men in attendance.

It is with sadness that we mention the passing in December of both Bob Bold and Rev. David Mohr. Bob was instrumental in the formation of the Men's Breakfast and leadership of the group over the past ten years. He was responsible for getting the speakers and reserving the

restaurant for our meetings. Rev. Mohr was one of our speakers and provided interesting lessons and discussions over the course of several years. Both members will be sorely missed.

As 2025 comes to a close and we move ahead in 2026, we invite all men from St. John's to join our monthly gathering for breakfast and fellowship and encourage you to bring a friend.



Mission Committee – 2025

Our St. John's Family continued to generously support all our Mission Outreaches this past year—locally, in Pennsylvania, across the United States, as well as around the world.

Our committee met six times in 2025—all by Zoom. Those who served on this committee were: Gary Black, Pastor Steve Davis, Marion DeMilio, Kim Hillegass, Jean McGonigle, Carol Raszler (Secretary), and Cindy Reck. We also welcomed Emma Rarich to the committee to learn more about Pinebrook Family Answers and how we could include this non-profit in our mission giving. Various members served as chairpersons at our meetings.

The following Mission Projects were carried out by the Mission Committee in 2025:

- CROP WALK: The CROP Walk was held on Sunday, October 19, at 1:30 p.m. The 10K and "Golden Mile" routes began at St. Timothy's Lutheran Church, located at 140 S. Ott St. in Allentown. A thank you goes to Karen Stoisits for participating in the walk. Contributions from our members amounted to \$922.00. The event teamed up with St. John's Healthcare Ministry for its fall Walking Challenge.
- GENERAL DISASTER RELIEF FUND: The United States experienced several disasters throughout the year including wildfires, hurricanes, and floods. The ongoing war between Ukraine and Russia also found our members responding to the needs of the Ukrainian people. Listed below are the following Disaster Relief Funds to which St. John's contributed:

- HURRICANE DISASTER RELIEF: The aftermath of Category 4 Hurricane Helene in late September 2024, followed almost two weeks later on October 4 by Category 5 Hurricane Milton, left over \$200 billion in damage to Florida, Georgia, both Carolinas, Virginia, Tennessee, and up the East Coast. Almost 300 lives were lost. St. John's sent \$1,050.00 in donations to UCC National for hurricane relief. St. John's also participated in aid through Church World Service and attempted to collect items for CWS's Clean-Up Bucket Kits from 2024 into 2025. While the response wasn't what we hoped for in bucket supplies, we never had enough of the required items to complete the bucket kits. The committee decided not to purchase any of the missing items but

that better use of the monetary contributions would be to send the remaining \$869.00 directly to CWS for them to purchase the necessary bucket supplies and help pay for shipping and processing costs. The few bucket items we did receive either remained at St. John's or were given to other non-profits.

- CALIFORNIA WILDFIRES DISASTER RELIEF: Unprecedented in size, speed, and destruction, raging wildfires occurred in California in February. Many homes and businesses were burnt to the ground; entire neighborhoods were wiped out; and lives were lost. The fires were exacerbated by drought conditions, low humidity, a build-up of vegetation from the previous winter, and hurricane-force Santa Ana winds. Because of our members, contributions amounting to \$1,585.00 were received and sent to UCC National. In addition, we learned from our former Visitation Pastor, Rev. David Quinn, that his son's family lost their home and belongings in the wildfires, and \$900.00 in donations from members were given to the family.
- "SEVERE STORMS" DISASTER RELIEF: In July, Texas and other parts of the country experienced catastrophic flooding resulting in loss of homes, businesses, and property. Many lives were lost including campers and counselors at Camp Mystic, a Christian summer camp for girls. St. John's members again responded by sending \$685.00 to UCC National. Additional funds were received by the end of the year, and \$130.00 will be sent to UCC National the beginning of 2026.
- UKRAINE DISASTER RELIEF: Our outreach for this war effort ended in December 2024; however, an additional \$50.00 was received in 2025 and was sent to UCC National for Ukraine Relief. This war began on February 24, 2022, when Russia attacked Ukraine. As the war rages on today, we pray for a just and equitable peace.

➤ MINISTRY FAIR: After worship on September 21, a Ministry Fair was held in Fox Hall during the Social Hour. Posters describing the various committees at St. John's were on display. Each committee had a spokesperson to share the function of their committee with the congregation.

➤ "OPERATION SANTA" – MITTEN TREE PROJECT: A Christmas tree was put in place at the back of the sanctuary in the beginning of November where members selected paper mitten ornaments and made monetary contributions towards Phoebe Ministries and/or Pinebrook Family Answers. A total of \$1,045.00 was received and disbursed as follows:

- PHOEBE MINISTRIES – Phoebe is a multi-facility organization specializing in healthcare, housing, and support services for the elderly. Donations were received in the amount of \$955.00. The funds were used to purchase gift certificates to Phoebe's beauty salon and barber shop and to Phoebe's gift shop for Phoebe's residents.
- PINEBROOK FAMILY ANSWERS – Through Pinebrook's "High Fidelity Wraparound Program," which assists youth and their families experiencing poverty and mental health issues, donations were received in the amount of \$590.00. The funds were used to purchase

Christmas gifts on their client's "wish lists" and they were able to take the youth bowling for a fun-filled event over the holidays.

- PINEBROOK FAMILY ANSWERS EASTER BASKETS: In April the congregation generously donated Easter baskets filled with candies, goodies, widgets, and other items for the children and youth attending the "High Fidelity Wraparound Program" at Pinebrook.
- WHITEHALL-COPLAY HUNGER INITIATIVE COMMUNITY MEAL: In order to alleviate hunger, free meals were offered to anyone on the first Sunday and third Tuesday of every month from 4:00 p.m. to 6:30 p.m. at various locations in the community. Although St. John's was not in a position to provide a meal, anyone could volunteer to help at whatever church is sponsoring the event.
- WHITEHALL-COPLAY SCHOOL DISTRICT BACKPACK & SCHOOL SUPPLIES: School supplies were collected during the month of July and with a drive-by on July 19. The congregation donated over 1,900 school items. It included 21 backpacks, 3 calculators, 990 sheets of loose-leaf notepaper, 15 boxes of crayons, 348 pencils, 42 pocket folders, and many other items. Your donations helped the needy school children in Whitehall as well as the school district itself with educational supplies for the school year.
- WHITEHALL FOOD PANTRY: The food pantry is located at St. Stephen's Episcopal Church, 3900 Mechanicsville Rd. in Whitehall. Our congregation supplied food during the year, contributed financially, and sent volunteers to help at the pantry. Under the leadership of Gary Black, about 20 volunteers helped on the fourth Monday of each month to sort, stock shelves, and hand out food items to the pantry's patrons.

For the months of January into February, 354 cans of soup and \$160.00 were collected for the "Souper Bowl of Caring." We surpassed our goal of 250 cans of soup. We also joined forces with the "Fun-Raising" Committee on February 8 to have a Super Bowl Tailgate Party & Family Feud Night where people were also asked to bring in cans of soup.

For the Thanksgiving and Christmas meals, we received 259 boxes or bags of stuffing mix. We surpassed our goal of 180 boxes.

Thank you to everyone who donated canned and packaged groceries in 2025. Your monetary donations for the entire year amounted to \$4,575.49. A critical time happened from October 1 to November 12 when the federal government shut down due to Congress failing to pass appropriations legislation for the 2026 fiscal year. Vital programs like SNAP (food stamps) were disrupted, forcing millions in the United States to turn to food pantries for emergency food. In November, because of this crisis, we initiated a special offering campaign to encourage people to give more financially towards the pantry and \$1,657.49 was received.

In 2025 St. John's continued to maintain our "5 for 5" status with UCC National thanks to the generosity of our members. The Mission Committee coordinated the following special offerings:

- OUR CHURCH'S WIDER MISSION: Our congregational gifts give financial support to a wider UCC ministry through our Penn Northeast Conference and through national settings. Among other things, OCWM funds the work done at our local conference. It invests in programs needed to keep local UCC churches strong. It assists in pastoral placement and education for church leaders. It exposes youth to retreats and regional and national youth events. Contributions were received all year long and totaled \$11,393.00 at the end of December.
- CHRISTMAS FUND: This fund provides direct financial help to retired and active UCC authorized ministers and lay employees and their surviving spouses and includes pension and health supplementation. Contributions of \$470.00 were received in December.
- NEIGHBORS IN NEED: One-third of the NIN's offering supports the Council for American Indian Ministry (CAIM) and two-thirds is administered by the Justice and Witness Ministries to support a variety of justice initiatives, advocacy efforts, and direct service projects through grants. Contributions of \$365.00 were received in October.
- ONE GREAT HOUR OF SHARING: OGHS supports partners in countries with ministries that fund health, education, and agricultural development; emergency relief; refugee ministries; and both international and domestic disaster response. Contributions of \$440.00 were received in March.
- STRENGTHEN THE CHURCH: Strengthen the Church supports church growth; pastoral and lay leadership development; and youth and young adult ministries within the conference. Contributions of \$260.00 were received in May.

The St. John's Crafters group, "Keeping You in Stitches," was hard at work all year long making craft items to sell (see their report). The total profit from this year's sales amounted to \$1,224.51. The Mission Committee designated the 2025 profit to be given to St. John's Property Fund to be used towards the purchase of a new kitchen stove in 2026.

It is the policy of St. John's to give 10% in tithing from our fundraisers to Mission Outreach. This past year the 10% tithing amounted to \$1,981.08, which was divided equally among the following charities or organizations:

- LEHIGH CONFERENCE OF CHURCHES – \$990.54. The LCC is a joint ministry that includes 145 congregations and faith-based organizations. They provide essential services to the community focusing on hunger, homelessness, and mental health. They also provide free meals at their soup kitchen, assist former inmates as they return to society, and promote unity among the faith communities. LCC is located at the former Dubbs Memorial UCC, 457 Allen St., in Allentown.
- WHITEHALL FOOD PANTRY – \$990.54. Due to cutbacks in federal funding in October and November, the food pantry was in need of contributions in order to purchase food for their patrons who depend on the food pantry for their groceries. Volunteers from St.

John's participate the fourth Monday of every month to sort, stock shelves, and distribute food to the pantry's patrons. The food pantry is located at St. Stephen's Episcopal Church, 3900 Mechanicsville Rd., in Whitehall.

When St. John's held the Ecumenical Thanksgiving Service on November 24, the free-will offering received was given to the Northampton Food Pantry and the Whitehall-Coplay Hunger Initiative. Over \$150.00 was received in offering.

The Mission Committee is always looking for more people to join our committee. If you've wondered how you can be a part of this committee, please contact any committee member. Thank you to everyone in our congregation who supported our Mission Outreaches in 2025.

These gatherings strengthened relationships within the ministry and affirmed the joy of serving together as one body.



STARS Team – 2025

(St. John's Technical and Artistic Resources)

Introduction

The St. John's UCC STARS team oversees the technical and artistic resources that support worship, programming, and community life within the church. As we move through 2026, our work is guided by a simple commitment: *No Matter What*. No matter the age of our systems, the complexity of the work, or the constraints of time and budget, the team remains focused on providing dependable, thoughtful, and high-quality technical support for worship and fellowship.

Over the past year, the STARS team has made steady progress through visible upgrades and important behind-the-scenes planning, laying the groundwork for continued improvements in the year ahead.

Key Achievements and Ongoing Work

Enhanced Live Stream Capabilities

In response to the ongoing demand for high-quality livestreamed services, the STARS team invested in three OBSBOT Tail Air cameras to provide multiple viewing angles and more dynamic visual coverage. These cameras enhance the overall professionalism of our broadcasts and better reflect the life and movement of the sanctuary for online participants.

To maintain real-time video during worship, the cameras are connected using physical cables instead of operating wirelessly. Wireless connections can cause slight audio and video delays, while direct cabling keeps everything properly synchronized.

The cabling required for this setup will be completed in-house by the STARS team as part of our broader infrastructure improvements. Full implementation of the wired camera system is planned for Spring 2026.

Audio Enhancements for Children's Faith Formation

This past year, the STARS team focused on improving the media environment used for children's faith formation. Updates to the sound system in St. John's Movie Theater have created clearer, fuller audio that supports storytelling, music, and video-based learning. These improvements benefit both weekly programming and special events, helping children remain engaged and focused.

Dedicated Technology for Faith Formation

To support consistency and ease of use, the team established a dedicated laptop specifically for children's faith formation programming. Maintaining a single, reliable system has reduced setup time, minimized technical interruptions, and allowed educators and volunteers to focus on content rather than troubleshooting.

Continued Use of ProPresenter

The STARS team continues to build on the successful transition to ProPresenter for worship service production. This platform supports improved visual consistency, smoother transitions, and more effective integration of multimedia content. Ongoing refinement of ProPresenter workflows has strengthened service presentation and increased flexibility during live worship.

Audiovisual Support Beyond Worship

Beyond Sunday services, the STARS team provides audiovisual setup and support for a wide range of church and community events, including bingo nights, movie nights, and special gatherings. This behind-the-scenes work helps ensure events run smoothly and remain welcoming, accessible, and engaging for all participants.

Infrastructure Improvements

The STARS team is actively working to strengthen and modernize the church's technical infrastructure. In December, the team consulted with Lehigh Electric, who located original paperwork and drawings from 1978 related to the installation of the dimmer panel that provides power to the overhead sanctuary lighting. Access to this documentation has been essential for understanding the existing system and planning responsible upgrades—no matter what future changes are required.

Over the past year, several energy-efficient and modern lighting and technology updates have been installed throughout the building, with additional improvements planned. Multiple vendors have consulted with the STARS team to help evaluate options for updating key lighting and sound systems, offering guidance that supports both short-term improvements and long-range planning.

Looking Ahead in 2026

During 2026, the STARS team plans to begin incorporating vendor recommendations that will further enrich the worship experience in the sanctuary. The focus remains on thoughtful, mission-driven improvements that enhance worship, music, and congregational participation—no matter what challenges arise related to budget, scheduling, or infrastructure limitations.

Technical Booth Redesign

Plans are underway to redesign the technical booth at the rear of the sanctuary. A new platform and enclosure are being designed to support a flexible desk arrangement that accommodates two to three people at a time. This redesign will improve workflow, ergonomics, visibility, and collaboration for those supporting worship and special events.

In addition, space reclaimed from Pastor Steve's office—originally a secondary doorway—will be repurposed to house new rack-mounted equipment. This change will improve organization, accessibility, and long-term maintainability of the church's technical systems.

Stewardship and In-House Work

The team evaluated proposals from an outside company to run new cabling required for upcoming upgrades. After receiving a quote that was determined to exceed a reasonable cost, the STARS committee decided to complete this work in-house. By doing so, the church will save a significant amount of money while maintaining control over quality and scheduling—demonstrating careful stewardship and adaptability, no matter what constraints we encounter.

Collaboration and Conclusion

This work reflects the dedication and shared expertise of the STARS team, along with the support of volunteers, staff, and partners who make this ministry possible. Together, we remain committed to serving St. John's UCC with care, creativity, and responsible stewardship. In 2026 and beyond, no matter what challenges arise, we will continue to support worship and community life with intention and excellence.

Wording for Constitution & By-Law Updates:

Motion to Adjust Language for each of the following sections to update the Name of the Conference and the Association for our governance structure of St. John's Constitution and Bylaws.

The Congregation shall be a member of the **MOUNTAIN VALLEY ASSOCIATION** of the **KEYSTONE CONFERENCE** of the United Church of Christ, **or their successor entities.**

ARTICLE III - POLITY

This Church shall be a **part** of the United Church of Christ and shall sustain that relationship to the national church and the General Synod by affiliation as a local church of the **Penn Northeast Conference.**

ARTICLE VIII - PROPERTY

Upon dissolution of the Church, its assets and all property and interests of which it shall then be possessed, including any devise, bequest, gift, or grant contained in any will or other instrument, in trust or otherwise, made before or after such dissolution may be transferred to the **Penn Northeast Conference** of the United Church of Christ or any of its succeeding bodies. Since this is not required by the General Synod, the congregation may, during its discussion of such possible dissolution and in consultation with the **Penn Northeast Conference** Minister, decide by congregational vote to transfer all or portions of its assets to a qualifying not-for-profit organization (or organizations) qualifying for tax-exempt status pursuant to section 501 (C) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

SECTION 3 - PASTOR(S)

As soon as a pastoral vacancy becomes known, it shall be reported to the Conference Minister. An interim minister or supply pastor approved by the **Penn Northeast Conference** shall be sought and secured to temporarily fill the pastoral vacancy. This person shall be approved by Consistory.

SECTION 3 – A -SEARCH COMMITTEE

2 The Pastoral Search Committee shall seek the counsel of the **Penn Northeast Conference Placement Committee.**

SECTION 3 – B -THE CALL

3. When a Senior Pastor is elected, the Pastoral Search Committee shall work with the Senior Pastor and the **Penn Northeast Conference** to schedule and hold a service of installation.
