Tonight, the celebration of the Easter Triduum begins.

This is the eve of the passion of Jesus – the night that the Passover lamb was presented in the temple, the night that the Jewish people gathered to celebrate the Passover of their freedom, the night Jesus last gathered with his closest friends before his own passion.

On this night, known as Maundy Thursday, Jesus gave his disciples a new and great commandment, to love one another as He loved us. He showed his friends the true meaning of this commandment, the ultimate sign of His humility and love for them, when he knelt to wash their feet. He then demonstrated the full meaning of His life and death, by giving us the gift of the Holy Eucharist, as he broke the bread, symbolic of his body, and drank the wine, symbolic of His blood with them. Yet, on this very night, it would be in the Garden of Gethsemane, that Jesus wept alone as His apostles slept.

Tonight is not merely a remembrance of things done, it is an actual celebration, a making of those events present here and now.



Now before the festival of the Passover, Jesus knew that his hour had come to depart from this world and go to the Father. Having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end.

The devil had already decided that Judas son of Simon Iscariot would betray Jesus. And during supper Jesus, knowing that the Father had given all things into his hands and that he had come from God and was going to God, got up from supper, took off his outer robe, and tied a towel around himself.

Then he poured water into a basin and began to wash the disciples' feet and to wipe them with the towel that was tied around him. He came to Simon Peter, who said to him, "Lord, are you going to wash my feet?" Jesus answered, "You do not know now what I am doing, but later you will understand."

Peter said to him, "You will never wash my feet." Jesus answered, "Unless I wash you, you have no share with me." Simon Peter said to him, "Lord, not my feet only but also my hands and my head!" Jesus said to him, "One who has bathed does not need to wash, except for the feet, but is entirely clean. And you are clean, though not all of you." For he knew who was to betray him; for this reason he said, "Not all of you are clean."

After he had washed their feet, had put on his robe, and had reclined again, he said to them, "Do you know what I have done to you? For I have set you an example, that you also should do as I have done to you.

Invitation to Handwashing

One: Eternal Father, blessed is our brother Jesus, who on that night before Passover, rose from the Supper, laid aside his garments, took a towel, poured water, and washed his disciples' feet, saying to them: "If I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet. If you know these things, blessed are you if you do them."

All: Come now, mighty Spirit of God, wash us and make us one body in Christ, that as we are bound together in this act of love, we may no longer be in bondage to the principalities and powers that enslave creation, but may know your liberating peace, like nothing the world can give. Amen.

The Invitation to Receive

One: The parade is in the past, the hosannas have hushed, and Jesus has retreated to an upper room to quietly dine with his disciples.

All: We have been invited to the table, to share in the mystery of broken bread, a cup of wine and of feet humbly washed, challenging us to eat, drink and remember together, and most importantly, to love and serve one another just as Jesus loves and serves us.

One: We have been invited to the table to see Judas get up from his seat and walk out the door, where Peter will soon deny Jesus and the others all flee in the night, challenging us to look into our hearts, and glimpse the signs of our own acts of betrayal and denial.

All: May we take our place at this table, to be cleansed and fed, where we sense our brokenness and experience God's grace all at once.

Stripping of the Altar

After the Last Supper, less than 24 hours remained in our Lord's earthly life. Events moved rapidly: prayer in Gethsemane, betrayal by Judas, arrest, mock trial, painful beating, the trudge to Golgotha and execution. As his life was stripped from him, so we strip our altar of the signs of comfort and life to symbolize his suffering and death.

Tonight, as we bring our service to a close, we will remove the symbols of our faith and proclamation of the gospel in the Stripping of the Altar. This is an ancient custom of the Church done on Maundy Thursday.

Then Jesus went with them to a place called Gethsemane; and he said to his disciples, "Sit here while I go over there and pray." He took with him Peter and the two sons of Zebedee, and began to be grieved and agitated. Then he said to them, "I am deeply grieved, even to death; remain here, and stay awake with me." And going a little farther, he threw himself on the ground and prayed, "My Father, if it is possible, let this cup pass from me; yet not what I want but what you want." Then he came to the disciples and found them sleeping; and he said to Peter, "So, could you not stay awake with me one hour? Stay awake and pray that you may not come into the time of trial; the spirit indeed is willing, but the flesh is weak."

Instrumental Verse of Go to Dark Gethsemane

One: We extinguish our altar candles and remove them, in addition to the decorations surrounding our altar and chancel. Lights are dimmed along the way to symbolize the light of Christ as he prepares to pray in the Garden, leading to his passion.

Verse 1 of Go to Dark Gethsemane

One: Our offerings represent one way of loving and serving God. As the offered body of Jesus was removed from sight in burial, so we remove our offerings.

Instrumental Verse of Go to Dark Gethsemane

One: Jesus' offered body and his shed blood have been given to us in the form of bread and wine and juice in this Holy Mystery. As he was removed from us in the grave, so we remove the vessels of this sacrament.

Verse 2 of Go to Dark Gethsemane

One: Our altar and communion table are where our Lord Jesus serves us as both host and meal at His banquet feast. The coverings are made of fine linen; material appropriate for feasting with our King. As our King's body was stripped in crucifixion, so our altar and table are stripped of their coverings.

Instrumental of Go to Dark Gethsemane

One: The remaining consecrated bread and wine represent Christ's body. They are carried to the rear of the sanctuary and veiled to represent his lying in the tomb.


