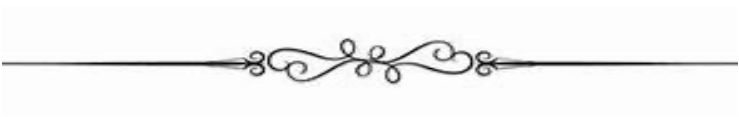

- 3. **Exclusive Laptop for Children’s Faith Formation:** To streamline and simplify video presentation for Faith Formation, the STARS Team set up a dedicated **laptop** exclusively for the St. John’s movie theatre. This laptop is used to display videos and digital content during children’s Faith Formation, ensuring that the technical side is as smooth and professional as possible. It has proven to be an invaluable resource for the educators and children alike, providing consistent, high-quality multimedia presentations.
- 4. **Migration to ProPresenter for Service Production:** In an effort to improve the overall presentation of our services, the STARS Team made the decision to migrate from PowerPoint to **ProPresenter**, a more powerful and professional software option. ProPresenter offers greater flexibility, streamlined workflows, and a more refined approach to live service production. This migration has enabled our team to create visually stunning slideshows, manage lyrics and sermon notes more effectively, and integrate multimedia content more seamlessly. The transition to ProPresenter has been a game-changer in enhancing the quality and professionalism of our worship services.
- 5. **Audio-Visual Support for Church Events:** Beyond Sunday services, the STARS Team has provided essential technical support for a variety of church events, including **Bingo nights, movie nights**, and other community gatherings. We have set up and operated audio-visual equipment for these events, ensuring that they are fun, engaging, and run smoothly. Our team's efforts help make these events more enjoyable for attendees, contributing to the church's mission of fostering fellowship and connection.

Report of the Senior Pastor- 2024

“Together We Are Stronger!”

St. John’s UCC, Fullerton, offers a strong and vibrant message of hope and inclusion in our community. We are known as a warm and welcoming congregation. We can take great pride in the words of guests who have become active and involved as members of this faith community, “St. John’s made me feel like I belong and am part of the family.”

During 2023 and 2024, I had the great honor of representing St. John’s as a member of the Keystone Study Group. Made up of select pastors and leaders from each of the four Pennsylvania area conferences, our task was to study, make detailed recommendations and proposed steps for the merger of the four conferences into one, The Keystone Conference of the UCC. Our rallying statement came to us as a breath from the Spirit, speaking something life-giving to us. **“Together We Are Stronger!”**

This vision compelled our team and inspired other delegates as we all met together for one large event with all four areas in June 2024. St. John’s Fullerton was well represented by our Consistory President, DonnaLee Yeatts, our Youth Delegate, Tyler Shankweiler (who was also elected to the PNEC Board of Directors), and by me and our many retired clergy who participated. The Spirit of God, deeply felt and present, gave power to the presentations, filled our conversations with others from across the commonwealth, and caused us to see our shared potential and the gifts we bring to ministry. **“Together We Are Stronger!”**

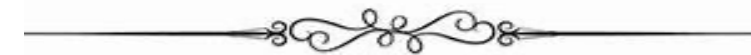
Our congregation has come through 2024 stronger as well. St. John’s Fullerton felt the power of being one congregation in worship together, even as we struggled with the challenges of trying to fit many Sunday activities into our morning. We found ways to accommodate faith formation for adults, children and a confirmation class. New formats and meeting times opened greater opportunities for hospitality and connections. STARS Team – 2024 (St. John’s Technical and Artistic Resources)

Introduction

The St. John's, UCC, STARS Team, tasked with overseeing the technical and artistic resources of our church, has made tremendous strides in enhancing the worship experience and supporting the vibrant life of our congregation. This year, we embraced the theme "Together, we are Stronger!" and focused on improving our audio-visual capabilities, ensuring that all church activities, from Sunday services to community events, were more engaging, professional, and accessible. The following report highlights our key achievements and initiatives throughout the year.

Key Achievements

1. **Enhanced Live Stream Capabilities with OBSBOT Tail Air Cameras:** In response to growing demand for high-quality livestreaming, the STARS Team invested in three **OBSBOT Tail Air cameras** to provide multiple camera angles during livestreamed services. These cameras will elevate the quality of our broadcasts, offering dynamic, professional coverage that enhances the worship experience for both onsite and online congregants. With these new camera angles, our livestream will feel more engaging, immersive, and reflective of the energy in the sanctuary.
2. **New Surround Sound System for Children’s Ministry:** Recognizing the need for a more immersive audio experience for our children's ministry, the STARS Team successfully installed a **new surround sound system** in the St. John’s movie theatre. This upgrade ensures that our young attendees have a more engaging, clearer, and exciting auditory

Property Committee - 2024

This past year the Property Committee members came together to oversee the installation of the new elevator pump and components to get the elevator back up and running. We also oversaw repairs to the roof above the coat room.

With the donation of a zero-turn mower, members are able to mow the grass around the church and the field of dreams. With this we were able to save the cost of hiring a landscape company to do this job.

The steps were painted by the alley entrance to help preserve them. In addition, there was re-pointing done to the bell tower to help preserve it.

New contracts were established for both electricity and natural gas usage. A boiler inspection was performed and a contract put in effect for further inspections. Semiannual kitchen inspections were completed along with the required fire inspections.

The feelings that have touched our hearts beyond our ability to express are so often found in worship. I’m grateful for the partnership in ministry I experience through the generosity and collegiality of our retired and connected clergy. We have numerous pastors and spouses who have chosen to make St. John’s, Fullerton, their faith home. While many are still actively serving other congregations and denominations from time-to-time, we’ve been blessed with the leadership of Rev. Becca Stephens with our Children’s Ministry. I’m grateful for the wise counsel and deep friendship these clergy members share with me. I want to acknowledge Rev. Dave Mohr, Rev. John Hoff, Rev. Cliff Herring, Rev. Becca Stephens, Rev. Todd Fennell, Rev. Evelyn Stupp and a few other visiting clergy who have come by to be with us in worship. **“Together We Are Stronger!”**

Our beloved Pastor Emerita, Rev. Dr. Becky Beckwith, provided great leadership in worship which allowed me to bring my mother from New Mexico to Pennsylvania. Becky’s spirit of partnership and deep friendship makes us not just colleagues in ministry, but always welcome friends. We were honored by her leadership in a magnificent and greatly desired Women’s Retreat this past November. The clergy of this congregation, with their prayers and affirmations, their partnership and diligent commitment to St. John’s Fullerton has so greatly added to my joy in being your Senior Minister. **“Together We Are Stronger!”**

In November, I celebrated the completion of three years of ministry together with you. The time has flown by for me. Yet in the time we have shared already, we’ve become more familiar with each other’s commitments, priorities and foundational aspects of our faith. First and foremost, we are committed to being the Church, the people of God, whose love and grace is present for every person, always! We have prioritized our mission to focus on bringing people together in worship, in growing in faith, in expressing and extending God’s love into the community, and focusing intentionally on being a place of radical hospitality and welcome. These priorities have not come easily. They have cost us people and relationships, resources and energy. Yet at the heart of who we are is the foundation of God’s love through Jesus Christ. This is who we are together. **“Together We Are Stronger!”**

Over the last three years we have purposefully worked to rebuild and strengthen our ministry since the hard changes we had from COVID. This has been a monumental task. The setbacks from COVID hit us hard, yet we have been resilient. We have made some significant gains: returning to collective worship and expanding our online experience to a strong and consistent outreach, renewing our connections in faith formation and social connections. We added the weekly lectionary bible study experience that has 8-10 regular participants and has received great appreciation. We still struggle to broaden our outreach in faith formation with other adults, with only one regular Sunday morning adult class, yet still adding occasional book studies during Lent or over the summer. These have been largely positive, although smaller in size.

We also still greatly struggle to have a more robust children and youth faith formation experience. With the tremendous leadership of Rev. Becca Stephens and a few extraordinary and dedicated volunteers, we have offered three different approaches to the Sunday morning program for children to try and grow their experience and participation. Our commitment to youth has remained strong with confirmation classes; however, we have greatly struggled to provide any other consistent option for our young people. This has been disappointing and frustrating. The broader congregation has given financial support, but not the volunteerism needed to make these things happen for our children and youth. Those we have do an amazing job and for the difference they are making, we are grateful. **“Together We Are Stronger!”**

I’ve participated in training events and professional development to help us more deeply explore how our Open and Affirming status as a congregation helps us live out our commitment to a fully inclusive place and ministry for every person. I’ve so greatly appreciated those who have shared their questions and their struggles about what this means to them. Whether in conversations around anti-racism, LGBTQIA+ inclusion, systems of inequity and systems of privilege, I hope you’ve found me to be one with whom you can engage in conversation and know you are respected, honored and loved, whether we agree on all the issues or not. Whether we find the political, social or relational challenges easy or difficult to navigate, I’m thankful that we take seriously the covenant relationship in which we’ve promised to hold one another. **“Together We Are Stronger!”**

Our onsite Worship Attendance in 2024 saw a small decrease to an average of 92. We worship together and the feeling of a more connected community has moved us to stay and enjoy our social time together as a highlight of our week. Our online Worship Attendance has an average of 44 participating unit households and continues to increase. This can be individuals, couples or families. We regularly explore ways to improve the worship experience and intentionally include those sharing and participating on Sundays and throughout the week in other locations. Worship is happening many times, in many places, and people have shared with us how significant it is to connect with their St. John’s Fullerton community wherever they may be. **“Together We Are Stronger!”**

At year-end 2024, we had a projected deficit of almost \$9,000 of income over expenses for our ministry. The generosity of the people of St. John’s Fullerton reduced the deficit to \$3,625. We increased our giving and fund raising in all other areas, but our regular weekly offerings decreased by over \$19,000. Through significant financial management and restraint where possible and a wonderful blessing of insurance to cover our elevator repair costs, we closed a difficult financial year better off than we expected. Thank you to all who give so generously and supportively for this shared ministry. Unfortunately, this still leaves us unable to add to our program and ministry staff on a consistent basis, yet we have great hopes to progress toward that goal. You make the difference! **“Together We Are Stronger!”**

St. John’s Fullerton is deeply connected in our community, with strong support for local missions, support for Phoebe Homes residents and the Valley Youth House, and Pinebrook Family Answers. Our outreach extends beyond local ministry to national crisis relief and causes

St. John’s had the opportunity to experience the Lehigh University Choral Music Program under the direction of Dr. Steven Sametz in March 2024. It was a truly inspirational afternoon of music. The afternoon concluded with refreshments in appreciation of the students’ hard work. This year, we hope to be welcoming Moravian Academy’s Handbell Choir as these gifted students share their talents with us.

It was with great joy and excitement that St. John’s held its third annual “Service of the Nativity” on Sunday, December 22, 2024. Our choir once again combined with members of Christ Church UCC, Bethlehem, and Sacred Heart Church of Bethlehem to form a 34-member choir, in addition to enhancing the beauty of the music with guest instrumentalists and our very own Bell Choir. This was truly a highlight of 2024 for the music ministry and a beautiful way to begin the Christmas season.

As we embrace a new year, the possibilities for the music ministry are endless, but we need YOU and YOUR support to keep going! Maybe 2025 is the year for you to get involved? Maybe it’s time to become a member of the bell choir or adult choir?

I continue to thank and give gratitude to this church and the members of the music ministry. It is through your support, encouragement, and dedication, I am able to see dreams and ideas come to life!

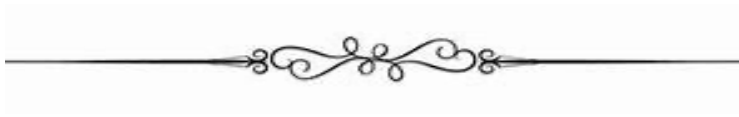
It is the policy of St. John’s to give 10% in tithing from our fundraisers to Mission Outreach. This past year the 10% tithing amounted to \$2,576.70, which was divided equally among the following charities or organizations:

- Lehigh Conference of Churches – \$1,288.35. The LCC includes 140 congregations and faith-based organizations. They seek to unite people through community services, ecumenical ministry, and advocacy for social justice. LCC is located at the former Dubbs Memorial UCC in Allentown.
- Turning Point of Lehigh Valley – \$1,288.35. Turning Point is a safe place where survivors of domestic and intimate partner abuse and their children can find refuge. Their mission is to eliminate domestic and intimate partner abuse through empowerment, education, and engagement.

The Mission Committee is always looking for more people to join our committee. If you’ve wondered how you can be a part of this committee, please contact any committee member.

His words of hate were intended to harm and create discomfort for anyone who came to our place of worship. He intentionally singled me out as a gay pastor, and our congregation for having me as your leader.

I’m so proud of how we responded to him, extending hospitality, not engaging in like manner of promoting division. Instead, it was our female clergy family, myself and a few other leaders who engaged with dignity and grace, sharing who we are as a people of love. Your warm and thoughtful messages to me that night and in the days which followed my congregational email and blog post on our website gave me great encouragement and hope. I’m grateful for who you are and who we choose to be together. **“Together We Are Stronger!”**

As we move forward in another year of ministry, we anticipate challenges and blessings, moments of grief and loss as well as celebrations and growth. The Church is alive and still speaking the truth of God’s hope and unconditional love to a world and people in need. Our message rings out in all these things of God’s unending faithfulness.

Consistory President's Report and Spiritual Council Report – 2024

Hello members of St. John's and followers. It seems as though a year goes by so fast. What was accomplished in 2024? We have seen new faces join us during worship services, which is a blessing. Some of those people have made a commitment to St. John's and have joined our church family. The number of people worshipping online on-line has increased, too. It is pleasing to see our church attendance grow and my hope for the future is for that trend to continue. At our Annual Meeting last February, I stated, "Wouldn't 150 be nifty?" Well, we're not quite there yet, so that is something for which we will continue to strive.

In April, our Elders provided mini-sermons on 'stories of faith and witness' while Pastor Steve was helping his mother, Jackie, pack up to move to PA.

In conjunction with our Christian Education committee, Wendy Fox and I co-chaired our first Vacation Bible School (VBS) planning—something we haven't been able to do in over five years. The theme we chose was "Hometown Nazareth-Where Jesus was a kid." We had over 16 children join us for worship, storytelling, games, snacks and crafts each day of the week in mid-July. Of course, I would be remiss if I did not mention the tremendous help we had for the children of our church and our greater community. Without your help, we wouldn't have been able to pull it off. Looking forward to VBS again this summer; please consider donating a few hours of your time in the evening, whether it is only one night or all five nights. It is a lot of fun for the children and the adults.

Members of our consistory and clergy attended the Keystone UCC Conference Meeting at the Penn Stater Hotel & Conference Center from June 7 through June 9 -- the theme was "Together We Are Stronger." What a joy it was to have four PA conferences come together to discuss the benefits of merging into one conference. The energy in that conference room was contagious. Thoughtful discussions, prayer, praise, questions and answers, worship and more prayers, prepared us for the ultimate vote by all four conferences in November. The vote passed with over 92% in favor of merging. We now wait for General Synod to review and provide their final approval.

We had a group of consistory members review our current consistory by-laws to determine where we may need to make changes as we continue to grow in our faith. Plus, it is always a good thing to check to make sure we are in alignment with those by-laws. Those changes will be voted on during the 2025 Annual Meeting.

I want to acknowledge Kay Chryst, who has started a welcome ministry filling our souls with a beverage at the beginning of service. In turn, I ask that you prayerfully consider how or where you can serve your church community. As I mentioned in our Annual Meeting in November, "If you're only at church on a Sunday morning, you may need to join a committee." Every Sunday

➤ WHITEHALL FOOD PANTRY: The food pantry is located at St. Stephen's Episcopal Church, 3900 Mechanicsville Rd. in Whitehall. Our congregation supplied food during the year, contributed financially, and sent volunteers to help at the pantry. Under the leadership of Gary Black, about 20 volunteers helped on the fourth Monday of each month to sort, stock shelves, and hand out food items to the pantry's patrons. A story about the food pantry along with pictures was published in the April newsletter.

For the month of February, 368 cans of soup and \$245.00 were collected for the "Souper Bowl of Caring." We surpassed our goal of 250 cans of soup. Then in July, during Vacation Bible School week, 22 cans of food and 10 non-perishable food items were collected.

Canned fruit, canned vegetables, and canned sweet potatoes were collected for the Easter meal. We received 180 boxes or bags of stuffing mix for the Thanksgiving meal. Canned sweet potatoes, canned corn, and cake mixes were collected for the Christmas meal. Monetary contributions were used to purchase gift cards for turkeys or hams during the holidays.

Thank you to everyone who donated canned and packaged groceries in 2024. Your monetary donations for the year amounted to \$3,375.00 and an additional \$15.00 for sponsorship of the Wheat Basket at worship.

In 2024 St. John's continued to maintain our "5 for 5" status with UCC National thanks to the generosity of our members. The Mission Committee coordinated the following special offerings:

➤ OUR CHURCH'S WIDER MISSION: Our congregational gifts give financial support to a wider UCC ministry through our Penn Northeast Conference and through national settings. Among other things, it funds the work done at our local conference. It invests in programs needed to keep local UCC churches strong. It assists in pastoral placement and education for church leaders. It exposes youth to retreats and regional and national youth events. Contributions were received all year long and totaled \$13,176.00 at the end of December.

➤ CHRISTMAS FUND: This fund provides direct financial help to retired and active UCC authorized ministers and lay employees and their surviving spouses and includes pension and health supplementation. Contributions of \$550.00 were received in December.

➤ NEIGHBORS IN NEED: One-third of the NIN's offering supports the Council for American Indian Ministry (CAIM) and two-thirds is administered by the Justice and Witness Ministries to support a variety of justice initiatives, advocacy efforts, and direct service projects through grants. Contributions of \$220.00 were received in October.

➤ ONE GREAT HOUR OF SHARING: OGHS supports partners in countries with ministries that fund health, education, and agricultural development; emergency relief; refugee ministries; and both international and domestic disaster response. Contributions of \$435.00 were received in March.

gloves, and 6-9 oz. non-aerosol insect repellent. At the end of 2024, St. John's had received \$1,739.00 in donations which will be used to purchase bucket supplies and send monetary contributions to CWS and to UCC National's Hurricane 2024 Relief Appeal. We also received \$150.00 in contributions from Old Zionsville UCC in Zionsville, PA. Contributions and supplies are still being requested by the Mission Committee and the Confirmation Class into 2025.

➤ ISRAEL-HAMAS WAR DISASTER RELIEF: St. John's contributed \$95.00 from January to July with funds given to UCC National's Middle East Support Fund. Since the war began on October 6, 2023, we have given a total of \$135.00 to UCC National.

➤ MINISTRY FAIR: After worship and after the Annual Meeting on February 4, a Ministry Fair was held in Fox Hall. Posters describing the various committees at St. John's were on display. The posters and committee members could meet and greet members of the congregation after worship on the remaining Sundays in February.

➤ MITTEN TREE PROJECT – "OPERATION SANTA": A Christmas tree was put in place at the back of the sanctuary in the beginning of November where members selected paper mitten ornaments and made monetary contributions towards Phoebe Ministries and/or Valley Youth House. A total of \$1,935.00 was received and disbursed as follows:

- Phoebe Ministries – Phoebe is a multi-facility organization specializing in healthcare, housing, and support services for the elderly. Donations were received in the amount of \$865.00. The funds were used to purchase gift certificates for Phoebe's beauty salon and barber shop and for Phoebe's gift shop.
- Valley Youth House – VYH's mission is to help all youth who have been abused, have run away, or are homeless. Donations were received in the amount of \$1,070.00. The funds were used to purchase Christmas gifts on their client's "wish list."

➤ UKRAINE DISASTER RELIEF: St. John's contributed \$155.00 from January to July with funds given to UCC National. Since this war began on February 24, 2022, we have given over \$6,400.00 in funds to Ukraine through Project HOPE, Ukrainian Orthodox Church of the USA, UCC National, and World Central Kitchen.

➤ WHITEHALL-COPLAY HUNGER INITIATIVE COMMUNITY MEAL: In order to alleviate hunger, free meals were offered to anyone on the first Sunday and third Tuesday of every month from 4:00 p.m. to 6:30 p.m. at various locations in the community. Although St. John's was not in a position to provide a meal, anyone could volunteer to help at whatever church is sponsoring the event.

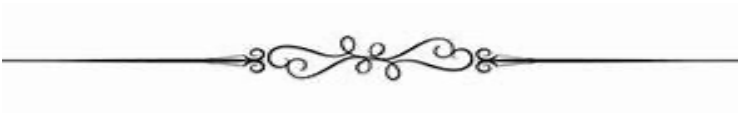
➤ WHITEHALL-COPLAY SCHOOL DISTRICT BACKPACK & SCHOOL SUPPLIES: School supplies were collected with a drive-by at the church pavilion on July 20. The congregation donated 1,246 school items. It included 20 backpacks, 10 calculators, 31 boxes of crayons, 84 markers, 74 notebooks, 216 pens, 363 pencils, 129 pocket folders, and many other items. Your donations helped the needy school children in Whitehall as well as the school district itself with educational supplies for the school year.

Mission Committee – 2024

Our St. John’s Family continued to generously support all our Mission Outreaches this past year—locally, in Pennsylvania, across the United States, as well as around the world.

Our committee met six times in 2024—all by Zoom. Those who served on this committee were: Gary Black, Pastor Steve Davis, Marion DeMilio, Kim Hillegass, Jean McGonigle, Carol Raszler (Secretary), and Cindy Reck. Various members served as chairpersons at our meetings.

The following Mission Projects were carried out by the Mission Committee in 2024:

➤ CLIMATE HOPE POSTCARD CAMPAIGN: UCC National’s Environmental Justice Ministries instituted a postcard campaign again this past year to address the climate situation across the globe. Over 200 “Vote for Climate Hope” postcards were sent out in the September newsletter and in the bulletin for the congregation to voice their concerns. The postcards could either be given back to St. John’s to record or members could post online. Disappointingly, only five postcards were returned; however, many more could have been registered online without our knowledge. A UCC delegation will meet with members of Congress on Valentine’s Day of 2025 to share concerns on climate initiatives.

➤ CROP WALK: The CROP Walk was held on Sunday, October 13, at 1:30 p.m. The 10K and “Golden Mile” routes began at St. Timothy’s Lutheran Church, located at 140 S. Ott St. in Allentown. Thank you to Amy Feidler, Donna Held, Cindy Reck, Jennifer Rarich and son, Rowan, Susan Rarich, and Karen Stoisits for participating in the walk. Contributions from our members amounted to \$1,390.00. The event teamed up with St. John’s Healthcare Ministry for its fall Walking Challenge.

➤ EARTH DAY: Through the April newsletter, the congregation was informed of the importance and history of Earth Day, which was celebrated on Friday, April 22. Founded in 1970 by Senator Gaylord Nelson and inspired by protests of the 1960s, Earth Day began as a teach-in on the environment. Our members were given ways to take care of our planet dealing with climate change, air and water pollution, erosion, recycling, renewable fuels, and energy efficient cars. Climate awareness was noted during the Social Hour following worship on April 21 thanks to a display by Colleen Kulhamer.

➤ GENERAL DISASTER RELIEF FUND: The aftermath of Category 4 Hurricane Helene in late September, followed almost two weeks later in October by Category 5 Hurricane Milton, left over \$200 billion in damage to Florida, Georgia, both Carolinas, Virginia, Tennessee, and on up the East Coast. Almost 300 lives were lost. As a result, St. John’s participated in aid through Church World Service and collected items for CWS’s Clean-Up Bucket Kits. Partnering with three other churches (Christ UCC in Lowhill, Good Shepherd UCC in Boyertown, and St. John’s ECLA Church in Whitehall) each church was responsible to collect several items (16 total) to go in the buckets. For St. John’s, we looked for donations of buckets, scrub brushes, dishwashing

November we were thankful for fun, food and friends as we did some science experiments and created works of art. There was quite a bit of laughter during this interesting evening together.

Our last meeting of 2024 was the story of Jesus birth which is part of the Chosen series as well.

The friendships that have been made, the stories and the prayers these women have shared and the evenings of being together, relaxing and knowing this is a safe place is priceless. Together we are definitely stronger!

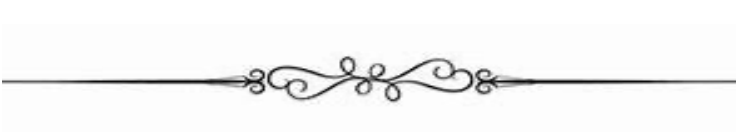

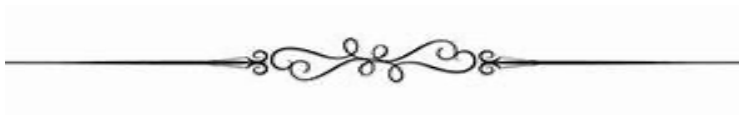

A covered dish meal was served followed by the movie “80 for Brady.” Everyone was asked to bring cans of soup for the “Souper Bowl of Caring,” which were donated to the Whitehall Food Pantry.
- Family Supper & Movie Night – Saturday, December 7. Donations of assorted soups, breads, and desserts provided a meal followed by the Christmas movie “Polar Express.” A visit from Santa was also part of the activities, thanks to Rick Borgman.

Throughout the year the congregation continued to save Redner’s tapes and purchase grocery gift cards from Giant and Weis markets. We again held our RaiseRight (formerly Scrip) Gift Card Sale in December with \$8,825.00 in gift cards being purchased by our members and friends for the holidays. We thank Tracey Glass and Tom Moyer for ordering the Weis gift cards; Barb Thomas for ordering the Giant gift cards; Tracey Glass and Carol Raszler for coordinating the RaiseRight gift cards; and Karen Stoisits for tallying and submitting the Redner’s sales tapes.

It is with regret that we accepted the resignation of Kathy Haggerty in June, and we thanked her for her service to the committee.

“Fun-Raising” Committee – 2024

The fundraising events scheduled by the “Fun-Raising” Committee in 2024 contributed greatly to the financial needs of the church. Our events offered a time of fun, fellowship, and outreach not only to our members but also to our community. The “Fun-Raising” Committee met 12 times in 2024 with both in-person meetings in Room 201 and with Zoom meetings.

This year our fundraisers realized a profit of \$25,766.90. The practice of tithing 10% of the profit from all our fundraisers for Mission Outreach continued in 2024. The tithing at the end of the year amounted to \$2,576.70, which the Mission Committee distributed equally between the Lehigh Conference of Churches and Turning Point of the Lehigh Valley.

Stewardship & Finance Committee – 2024

A big Thank You to all committee members for all they do to support the work of this committee! Also, Thank You to the congregation for their on-going support. However, in 2024 we did see a 4% drop in overall income. Offerings from the congregation dropped 8% from the previous year, ending the year at \$220,000.

We continued to closely manage our expenses in 2024. As in previous years, our actual spending is below the budget for the year.

As we move into 2025, we have budgeted a 4% increase in giving. We encourage all members to do what they can to support that increased giving goal. We would love to be able to support further growth, particularly in our children’s ministries, with a pastoral staff position. However, that will require financial support much higher than our current levels.

In addition to our General Fund, we have other financial resources: Restricted funds, Property funds, Endowment funds.

Restricted funds: these are monies given for a specific purpose, or they have been set aside by Consistory for “special needs, rainy day funds.” At the end of 2024, we have \$35,000 available for use with Consistory approval. An additional \$10,000 is earmarked for specific purposes, based on doner designations. All our Mission giving is considered Restricted funds, as the congregation designates their giving in this area. Total Mission giving for 2024 was \$20,495. Details are included in the Mission Committee’s report.

Food Pantry – 2024

The Whitehall Food Pantry, located at St. Stephen’s Episcopal Church, 3900 Mechanicsville Rd. in Whitehall, had another successful year in 2024. Donated food and items received from Second Harvest Food Bank are selected and packed into boxes and bags on the 1st through the 4th Monday mornings of each month. The packed items are then distributed to approximately 200 local families per month in the respective evenings.

St. John’s has about 20 excellent volunteers who donate their time and energy on the 4th Monday of each month. New volunteers are always welcome. Volunteers are needed in the morning from 9:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m. to sort food supplies and stock shelves. Volunteers are also needed in the evening from 5:30 p.m. to 7:30 p.m. to distribute food to pantry patrons.

In February, in observance of football’s Super Bowl, the church participated in the “Souper Bowl of Caring.” With a goal of collecting 250 cans of soup, we were overwhelmed to have received 368 cans of assorted soups. In addition, we also received \$245.00, which was collected in soup pots after worship by our Confirmation Class.

The Whitehall Food Pantry, along with pictures, was featured in St. John’s April newsletter. It highlighted the work of our volunteers and the gratitude of the pantry’s patrons. It also inspired two church members to join in helping at the pantry once a month.

From July 15 to July 19, St. John’s held its Vacation Bible School. The theme was “Hometown Nazareth—Where Jesus was a Kid.” Fox Hall was decorated to resemble a marketplace. One of the activities was to collect food for the food pantry. A total of 22 cans and 10 non-perishable items were received from the children, their families, and VBS leaders.

For the holiday meals, we collected canned fruits, canned vegetables, and canned sweet potatoes for Easter; 180 boxes and bags of stuffing mix for Thanksgiving; canned corn, canned sweet potatoes, and cake mixes for Christmas. The pantry also handed out grocery gift cards to purchase turkeys and hams.

A shopping cart to place donated food items can be found in the coat room by the sanctuary. For 2024 a multitude of assorted food items were collected. We received \$3,375.00 in monetary donations, and \$15.00 for sponsorship of the wheat basket on the altar in worship. What incredible generosity. We contribute the second most amount of the four churches that serve the pantry. Please keep up the good work for this very necessary service we provide. God is good, all the time.

Thank you to everyone who donated food items or monetary contributions over the course of this past year. We have a great group of volunteers and have a lot of fun. Feel free to join us. Call me anytime at (484) 274-2405.

Faith Formation, Verso Chat Lectionary Group – 2024

"Verso" is the Latin word meaning "conversation." Our lives long for conversation and significant and meaningful connection, with God and each other.

Pastor Steve and nine to twelve of our faith family meet every Wednesday morning from 9 to 10 a.m. on ZOOM to discuss the scriptures following the Vanderbilt University common lectionary that will be the basis for upcoming sermons. We receive the selected readings a week in advance of our meeting and again the day before by e-mail. This provides time to read and study scriptures. Several group participants prepare additionally by reading commentaries relative to the scriptures, bringing these thoughts to the informal discussion. Questions are welcomed in an open, accepting environment, guided by Pastor Steve. We learn one another’s views and life events that have influenced our perceptions, creating strong bonds of connection among us. Each week we open our lives to the ancient words that still share the timeless truths of God’s desire to be in a relationship of love with us.

Please consider joining us! There is no obligation for attendance, drop in whenever you are able. Each week is its own contained set of scriptures for review and sharing.

Property funds: at the end of 2024, we have \$14,000 available for larger property expenditures, significant, unplanned maintenance needs. During 2024 we utilized this money for several projects:

- \$800 parking lot line painting
- \$5,760 roof repair
- \$7,605 bell tower masonry repair

We have also begun a fund for Elevator Modernizations. At the end of 2024, we have \$4,540 in this fund. The Property Committee estimates for all modernization needs are in excess of \$115,00. We encourage the congregation to continue to contribute to this fund as they can. And we will continue to align with the Property Committee on timing of the modernization work, other options we may have for funding this project.

We also have \$56,240 in the Pavilion Fund. \$42,265 of this is invested to provide an income stream to support the monthly pavilion related expenses. We have a 30-year mortgage for the Pavilion construction – the outstanding balance at the end of 2024 was \$82,430.

Endowment funds: at the end of 2024, we have \$508,925 in our Endowment Fund. This continues to provide approx. \$23,000 annual income to our General Fund. In 2024, we gained approx. \$60,000 in interest, dividends, and market value growth.

The S&F Committee will continue to review our monthly financial results – sharing regular updates with the congregation, to keep us all informed, giving each of us the opportunity to support as we can!

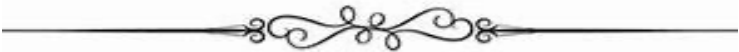

We all watch the video together and afterwards divide into the two age groups.

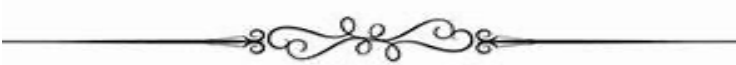
I am pleased to report that this approach is holding the interest of the older children, and we have engaged two additional classroom helpers.
