How is the Capital Campaign Doing?

Now that the new handicapped restroom in Fox Hall is nearing completion, and the Field of Dreams is being utilized, you may wonder how well our Capital Campaign is doing.

Our 3 year Capital Campaign called "Called to Grow, Launching the Dream", officially began in January of 2017. (Pledges were accepted in 2016 after our kick-off banquet.) At this time we are a few months past the halfway point of our campaign, which is scheduled to end at the end of 2019.

Here are the totals, as of the end of August, 2018:

Amount Pledged - \$221,959

Pledges Received - \$163,282.30

Unpledged gifts - \$8,368.00



Thirty-five people have fully paid their pledge, and most of the others are on schedule to complete their pledge by the end of 2019. For all of these donations, both pledged and unpledged, we thank you.

From the Property and Finance Committees

The Property Committee has recently dealt with several necessary but unplanned issues that will strain the financial resources of the church. Items such as these are

related to the fact that, as we continue to grow our ministry, we must also maintain our beautiful church and its equipment. That commitment is becoming more problematical as our church



(like our congregation) ages. Some recent examples of expensive "upkeep" items that we are facing include:

ELEVATOR UPGRADE: In its present condition the elevator door closes with some force on any object (or person!) in its path before it retracts. A non-contact sensor that will to eliminate this potentially hazardous situation will cost \$2,215.

HVAC REPAIRS: The sophisticated HVAC equipment that was installed through the airport's Sound Abatement grant six years ago is malfunctioning. The warranty has expired and repairs will cost over \$4,000.

BELL TOWER MASONRY REPAIRS: Our bell tower exterior needs masonry work to seal out moisture and retard the deterioration which has recently been observed in a few of its many "cast stone" (concrete) structural elements. Several days of masonry work with the use of a high-reach lift are necessary and also a vented cap over the chimney flue is being designed. The cost of this work is expected to be about \$10,000.

An envelope is included in your newsletter to contribute to these repairs. We have a Property Fund that gets depleted quickly when a major repair comes. With three major repairs we could use some additional funding.

Meals on Wheels Update

Effective August 22nd the Meals on Wheel of Lehigh County and Meals on Wheels of Northampton County merged. The new entity is now known as Meals on Wheels of the Greater Lehigh Valley. They will operate as one organization, providing the same services to this larger combined service area.

While the mission and core values of the new agency might be phrased differently the commitment to supporting the client's choice to age in place with dignity while maintaining their social connectedness, is stronger than ever.

The Power of \$2.00

The summer of 2018 has been a financially challenging time for St. John's

Typically, as families vacation or are away for holidays, donations decline. And that is, once again, the case this year. As of August 31, our budgeted Offerings for Current Expenses were \$201,386 whereas actual offerings were \$181,922. To date, we are running a deficit of \$15,103 and that is after having used the \$20,000 allocation from the endowment fund.

This is not a case for panic because we are still in a financially solid position, but it is an issue we must address so it does not become a problem in the future. And, as one would expect, the Goal of Stewardship and Finance is to pro-actively work toward solutions.



Is this a short or long-term issue? Simply put, we don't know. Addressing that question is the challenge facing Stewardship and

Finance as it begins work on the 2019 budget. Instead of simply talking about the problem it is important for all of us not only to be aware of the issue but constructively consider solutions. Do we want St. John's to be the growing church providing the programs and services we now enjoy? Do we believe that, individually, we are better off having St. John's as part of our lives? If so, it may be a time to ask ourselves, "What can I do about the deficit?" It's such a large number!!

Each of must may need to reflect on our personal giving. Some food for thought: When was the last time you adjusted your giving— weekly donations or electronic contributions to Offerings for Current Expenses? Do you "catch up" on giving for those Sundays when you are not in attendance? (Maybe enrolling in electronic giving may be a way to "cover" those times when you are unable to attend. Expenses do not take vacations.)

When the budget was adopted last fall, all were advised that, to make the 2018 budget work members would have to step up their giving. Did you do that?

While it may seem a small commitment, if each of us were to increase weekly giving by \$2.00 (some may be able to do more, and some may not be able to do that much), we would be on the path to reducing the problem.

To all of us, St. John's has been a pillar of strength—something we can rely on for our daily spiritual needs as well as being there to provide comfort and support in time of need.

All of that comes, of course, with a cost and it is a measure of the value we place on the St. John's that dictates our financial support.


Will you be part of the solution? Prayerfully consider how you will respond.



A wonderful hymn with the general theme of service and the dominant theme of equality of all peoples in Christ – rich and poor and black and white – are our neighbors, is "Jesu, Jesu, Fill Us with Your Love." This hymn will also be sung on Children's Sabbath.

Following African independence movements throughout the 1960s and 1970s, a number of Western missionaries encouraged the composition of Christian song in African idioms. Thomas S. Colvin (1925-2000) was one of these missionaries.

Colvin was a pastoral missionary for the Church of Scotland in Ghana from 1958-1964 and Malawi from 1954-'58 and 1964-74. He was also an active member of the ecumenical Iona Community in Scotland for nearly 50 years. His missionary ministry was characterized by justice issues such as Christian service committees, refugee resettlement and community development projects.

The songs collected by Colvin have been spread by members of the Iona Community around the world. Several of his texts set to African melodies have found a home in Western hymnals. Colvin nurtured new African congregational songs by adapting local melodies and writing new texts appropriate for African Christians and, as it turns out, Christians around the world.

"Jesu, Jesu" is Colvin's most popular hymn. The melody is adapted from a Ghanaian folk song he heard during his years of service in that country. The tune name CHEREPONI comes from a town in northern Ghana, where the hymn was written.

Missionaries brought the Gospel to a foreign land. Now that the gospel has taken root around much of the world, this hymn suggests that relationships among all peoples should be as equals, where our love for each other through Christ "puts us on our knees, showing our faith by our deeds, serving the neighbors we have from you."

The composition of the hymn itself is symbolic of collaboration between two cultures. The text comes from a European Christian inspired by his service in Ghana. The melody comes from a West African country. In this composition, even the act of hymn singing may become a metaphor for neighborly relationships that are possible in Christ.

Jesus loves all His children – young, old, red, yellow, black, white. And He asks us to do the same by loving and serving all our neighbors.



HealthCare Ministry

This month the Healthcare Committee has arranged for Miller Memorial Bloodmobile to be at our church for blood donations again. They are always in need of blood as there are many people in crisis situations every day. Blood is produced in our bone marrow. It consists of platelets, red blood cells and plasma. Platelets constitute a small percentage of total blood volume and they are needed to control bleeding. People saved if you donate platelets are leukemia and cancer patients, cardiac surgery patients, burn victims, organ and bone marrow transplant recipients, and people with bleeding disorders. Red blood cells

make up about 45 percent of blood volume and carry oxygen throughout the body. Lives saved from increased red blood cells are premature infants, trauma victims, surgical patients, people battling cancer, kidney disease, and anemia. The remaining 55 percent of blood volume is made up of plasma, a pale yellow mixture of water, proteins, and salts. It also helps promote clotting. Lives saved with plasma include burn victims, cardiac surgery patients, liver transplant recipients, patients suffering from shock or bleeding and immune disorders. There are four blood types that are determined by our genetics. They are A, B, AB and O.





There is also an Rh factor that is positive or negative. The blood bank determines your type and will match it appropriately to a person in need.

Blood is essential for life. It carries oxygen and nutrients throughout the body, fights infections and helps heal wounds. Our blood is a self-generating resource that can be generously given to others in their time of need. Anyone 17 and older can donate blood. You should be healthy and weigh at least 110 lbs. You should also be free of antibiotics for 24 hours and symptom- free for 72 hours following a cold or the flu. Infectious disease testing is performed for the safety of the blood supply.

St. John's Healthcare Committee arranges for the bloodmobile to come once or twice a year. If you have any questions regarding blood donation, please contact Marion DeMilio or anyone in the Healthcare Committee. The national average for blood donations is only 5 percent! Please consider giving the gift of life to a person in need. One in three people will need blood during their lifetime. That little needle stick doesn't compare to the feeling you get from helping to save a life!


