Dear St John's Family & Friends, Children often teach the most profound lessons.

It was a simple act, one I had seen many times in the past. The three-year-old had been swiping away at her paper with a crayon. There was little effort to stay within the lines. She joyfully watched as more color came onto her paper with every swipe of her own hand. She was happy.

When her coloring masterpiece was complete she stood up and admired her work. After a few seconds her smile grew even bigger as she ran over to her mother, coloring sheet in hand. The little girl jumped up and down with excitement as she shouted, "Mommy, Mommy, this is for you!" The child beamed with joy! She had created something and she generously was giving her creation, as a gift, to another. The little girl could have held on to her treasure. She could have run to her room and put her treasure somewhere to keep it safe and away from the eyes of others. But she did not. She gave away her treasure. She gave away something she considered to be very valuable and that made her happy!

I was left wondering, at what age we are taught to be generous? Is this something many parents teach their children? Are acts of generosity something most adults practice? Do we give with a joy-filled heart or do we give because we feel we must?

As I watched the little girl generously turn over her treasure to Mom I wondered. Was the child taught to be generous or was this something that was part of her nature. Then I reflected deeper. If this was part of her human nature, then why aren't human beings more willing to be generous? Is generosity something we 'unlearn' as we grow older and try to keep more treasures for ourselves?

At our recent Consistory meeting I asked each member to share what brings them joy. As we moved around the table speaking of grandchildren, family, nature and more, one individual said, "It brings me joy to be generous, I love giving things away."

There is great joy that comes from generosity. We don't talk about that enough. There is a special feeling that comes when we give. The joy that comes from giving is awesome. The little girl felt that joy.

What I remember most of this child/mom encounter was how happy the child was to give someone a gift. Her act of generosity brought her joy. As she gave yet she received. When you participate in the act of generosity you put others before yourself, then you may find that it is you who get the greater gift.

My family gathers together each Thanksgiving at our home. We have created several traditions that I now hold sacred. One given is the table will be loaded down with food well beyond what we consume. The grandkids will each say a prayer before we eat and I'll silently thank God for how each person around our table has been a gift to my life. It will be a good day. God has generously blessed us. I want us to generously bless others – and we will start with our church.






# Capital Campaign has another success!

Our hymns that evening will be traditional Thanksgiving hymns. "For the Beauty of the Earth" celebrates earth and harvest and is a prayer to the God who has made it all possible. This hymn was written by Folliot Sandford Pierpoint near his native city of Bath, England, around 1864.



He found himself walking in the countryside on a beautiful spring day. He saw the ocean of green, the blue dome of heaven, and the winding Avon River cutting through the flowery landscape. Overwhelmed with God's creative brilliance, he wrote this poem. He intended it primarily for communion services in the Anglican church, but when it jumped the Atlantic, it quickly became associated with the American Thanksgiving holiday.

"For the Beauty of the earth" is one of only a few songs devoted purely to giving thanks. Pierpoint not only wrote about creative blessings, but also recalled his social blessings—friends and home, those relationships that bring such enriching dimensions to our lives. Each of the blessings in Pierpoint's hymn is then directed to God with a "hymn of grateful praise."

Help fill the sanctuary Thanksgiving Eve and let your heart well up with emotion as we sing praise and thanks to God for everything.

Two-thirds of the offering is used by the UCC's Justice and Witness Ministries to fund a wide array of local and national justice initiatives, advocacy efforts, and direct service projects. One-third of the offering supports our American Indian neighbors in the UCC. A special offering envelope was in September's newsletter and in the bulletin on October 7. A final tally will be in the next newsletter.

**CROP Walk** – The CROP Walk was held on Sunday, October 14. As we go to press, the sponsors for our several walkers have donated over \$600. # PNEC & PSEC Sponsoring Mission Trips to Puerto Rico

In the year since Hurricane Maria decimated Puerto Rico on September 20, 2017, the UCC has accompanied the people of this U.S. territory in their journey toward recovery. The Category 4 hurricane took down power lines and grids, disrupted the country's water supply, crippled communication systems, wiped out entire neighborhoods, damaged countless homes, and nearly 3,000 people died as a result. The UCC Disaster Ministries has invested almost \$500,000 so far in the rebuilding effort and coordinated the scheduling and management of scores of local church volunteers from across the country.

Through the joint efforts of both Penn Northeast and Penn Southeast Conferences, two Mission Trips to Puerto Rico are planned in 2019—April 28 to May 4 and May 12 to May 18. The cost will not exceed \$1000 per person, including all costs for transportation, food, lodging, supplies, etc. Registration details will be released soon with a deadline of November 15 and a deposit of \$50 (check payable to PNEC).

There is much to be done in the rebuilding efforts, including among other things roof and home repairs and working on the food supply since the storm wiped out 80% of the crops. The next planning meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, November 20, at 6:30 p.m. at Greenawalds UCC, 2325 Albright Ave., Allentown.

With the valent efforts of our local volunteers coming together to help this disaster-stricken area, St. John's has answered the call to assist them financially in their endeavor. The Mission Committee has designated that any profit from our 2018 sales by our Crafters Group be given the PNEC & PSEC Disaster Relief Team to Puerto Rico. We

wish them "God Speed" as they work to help restore the lives of the Puerto Rican people.



# HealthCare Ministry

### Shingles and Chickenpox virus

Shingles is a viral infection that causes a painful rash. Although shingles can occur anywhere on your body, it most often appears as a single stripe of blisters that wraps around either the left or the right side of your torso.

Shingles is caused by the varicella-zoster virus — the same virus that causes chickenpox. After you've had chickenpox, the virus lies inactive in nerve tissue near your spinal cord and brain. Years later, the virus may reactivate as shingles. While it isn't a life-threatening condition, shingles can be very painful. Symptoms can include itching, rash, blisters, numbness, tingling, fever, headache, and fatigue. If you seek medical help in the first 72 hours, a physician will prescribe antiviral and pain medication that will decrease the symptoms, shorten the illness, and prevent complications. Sometimes the shingles rash occurs around one eye or on one side of the neck or face. If the pain and rash occur near an eye promptly contact a doctor to prevent permanent eye damage. Also seek medical help if 60 or older, have a weakened immune system, or a very large painful rash. The shingles virus can be transferred to other individuals by contacting the blisters. If someone touches the blisters and does not have immunity against varicella-zoster, the person can get the chickenpox. The biggest problem with shingles is postherpetic neuralgia or nerve pain that can last days, weeks, or even years after the infection. It is important for pediatric patients to get vaccinated against the virus to prevent chickenpox, and it is also important that older adults get vaccinated for shingles.

Vaccines can help reduce the risk of shingles. The risk of shingles increases as you get older, and the CDC recommends that healthy adults 50 years and older get two doses of the shingles vaccine called Shingrix (recombinant zoster vaccine), separated by 2 to 6 months. Studies have shown that Shingrix is much more effective in preventing shingles than the older Zostavax vaccine. Over many years patients that received the Zostavax vaccine were not as protected from getting shingles. Zostavax is available as an alternative if allergic to Shingrix. The CDC recommends two doses of chickenpox vaccine Varivax for children, adolescents, and adults. Children should receive two doses of the vaccine—the first dose at 12 through 15 months old and a second dose at 4 through 6 years old.

The American Academy of Pediatrics, the American Academy of Family Physicians, and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention all strongly support protecting children with recommended vaccinations. Vaccines prevent children and adults from getting many diseases. Vaccination also helps the many people in society who can't get vaccinated that could get exposed to the disease like cancer patients. If one day all of the children get vaccinated for chickenpox, there may be a day that no one gets shingles or the bad complications from the virus.


