Dear St. John's Church Family,

Each and every year is important. As we finish one year and question what the upcoming year will bring, one has to question how it will differ. Will it be better? Will there be more money in your pocket? Will you and your family be healthy? Will you walk closer with God?

Part of my job as your Senior Pastor is to look ahead and set some goals for us as a church. My Call says that it is my responsibility to cast a vision for the future. WOW! That is quite a task. How does one do that? I question God each year (actually every day) just what we should be doing as a church. How can we move ahead in ways that makes God smile, led by the teachings of Jesus and the light of the Holy Spirit?

Recently I started to hear about the National United Church of Christ contest entitled, "Be The Church." This monthly contest began in June 2016 and continued to January 2017. Local churches were invited to share how they were living out the various statements from the UCC "Be The Church" movement. I started to think about us. How does St. John's live out the components of "Be The Church?" How can we Be The Church in better ways?

You may have heard about a mega church in California that did the unthinkable in 2008. They canceled all worship services for a weekend! Rather than meeting in their large, beautiful, air conditioned sanctuary, they cancelled their many weekend worship services. They canceled their services in order to be the church out into the world. Of their 7,000 believers, 5,500 of them showed up that weekend to live out their faith, to be the church. They tackled 139 community service projects at 70 different sites throughout the North San Diego County. This congregation came to understand that it isn't just about going to church, it is about being the church. We need to be the church while in church, in the community, or wherever we are in the world.

Somehow society has begun to think choosing a church and going to church is about meeting our own needs. In reality, a good church is one that sends the believers out into the world to do ministry in the name of Jesus Christ. I am convinced that in order to be a great church, we need to find ways to spiritually feed our people and then challenge ourselves to do more as individuals and as a community. You don't GO to church. You ARE the church!

So, with the nod from Consistory, 2019 we will talk more and more about how to Be The Church. I'm excited! And now I'm inviting you to get on board! Participate! Share your visions. Share ways we can do awesome ministries. Help me to cast the vision!



### From Our Stewardship and Finance Committee

Happy New Year to all of St. John's church family. I'm hopeful that we will have a wonderful, enriching, prosperous church year. I say this knowing it will depend on each one of us being good stewards. The new year and my position as chairperson of the Stewardship and Finance Committee has peeked my interest in the meaning of stewardship. So much of last year the focus was on finances and church budgets and all the things related to dollars and cents. Although this is important, I want to talk about the first part of the committee's responsibility, Stewardship!

What the heck is stewardship anyway? What does it really mean to be a good steward? Even more important, as Christians, what does it mean to be a good biblical steward? I did a bunch of reading about this subject from a few sources on the internet and found an essay by Bill Peel that



spoke to me loud and clear. Below is my attempt to condense this into a short understanding over the next four months/newsletters.

According to Bill Peel, there are four important principles about biblical stewardship we must understand: the principles of ownership, responsibility, accountability and reward.

The principle of ownership: GOD owns everything; (there is much scripture to support this) hence GOD calls upon each one of us to manage or administer whatever GOD places under our control with commitment of ourselves and our possessions to GOD's service. This means we must recognize that we really don't have the right of control over ourselves or our property. How do you feel about this?

According to this, our homes are not our homes, our cars are not our cars, our talents are not our talents. Our church is not our church! They all reside with GOD, GOD owns them. It's GOD's world! How are you doing with this stewardship thing so far? It is tough. Pride cannot exist here, only humility and service to GOD! Let's all pray to be better biblical stewards and see what happens! Through prayer we become closer to GOD and our sense of pride withers and humility can seep in.



# No More Holy Communion Cards? Now It's A Holy Communion Sign In Book!

What is with the Communion Cards? The question gets asked. Why do we use them since they fall out of our bulletins. They frequently are not filled out by our members. The cards are costly and our local vender is no longer in business. So what is with the cards anyway?

The communion cards are meant as a way to keep track of who takes Holy Communion and how often. Cards are filled out and put into alphabetical order and then entered into our data base. It is a time consuming and messy process. At the recommendation of the Worship & Music Committee and the Spiritual Council, we have decided to do away with the cards.

Since our Constitution and Bylaws speaks of membership taking communion on a regular basis we do need to replace the cards with something else. We decided on a Holy Communion Book The book will be in the rear of the sanctuary. You are asked to sign it if you participated in the sacrament. You need only sign it ONE TIME PER YEAR. The book will be alphabetical according to your last name.

The end of the Holy Communion cards means cost and environmental savings. Please participate often in the sacrament and make sure you sign the book at least one time during 2019. We began January 6<sup>th</sup>.

Recently St. John's received a donation to add a new leaf to the Legacy Tree. Our thanks to Kathy Bright for her contribution in memory of her husband, Martin Bright. For more than a dozen years the parlor area has been graced by our "Legacy Tree". On it are leaves honoring or memorializing more than 52 individuals who have been so recognized.

Since its creation, the fund has grown to over \$450,000. Our goal is to reach \$500,000. But not only does this recognize loved ones, it also has a long-range benefit to the church as donations are deposited in our Endowment Account. The use of the monies in this account are controlled by a legal document which identifies how much of the annual growth can be used for church expenses. Over the years, more than \$150,000 (\$20,000 in the last year alone) has been used in this way. Therefore, not only does this honor individuals, it also serves to strengthen the foundation of the church. When passing through the parlor area, take a moment to stop and reflect on the names of individuals so recognized.

Do you have a loved one who you would like to honor? It could be an anniversary, a parent, grandparent, spouse, child or grandchildren to name a few. A plaque on the wall explains the various giving categories. These start at \$1,000 and there is also a provision where one can create an "account" making donations as often as desired toward earning a leaf. Our challenge is to grow our Legacy Tree. Won't you join the many others who have already done so?

### January/February 2019 Music Notes



The choirs of St. John's sang and rang beautifully throughout the Advent and Christmas season. Now in the season of Epiphany, the choirs will "shine".

The Handbell and Jubilation Choirs will ring and sing songs of service, love, and mercy. The Chancel choir anthems focus on love, service, and peace. The Kidz JAM will be singing on the 24<sup>th</sup> of February. They will sing "Lord, I Want to Be a Christian".

"Lord, I Want to Be a Christian" is an African American spiritual. It was likely composed in 1750s Virginia by African-American slaves exposed to the teaching of evangelist Samuel Davies. The music and lyrics were first printed in the *1907 Folk Songs of the American Negro*, edited by brothers Frederick Work and John W. Work, Jr. An interesting fact is many of the enslaved of antebellum America did not want to become Christians because they did not want to adopt the religion of their captors. But this spiritual attests that the Christian faith was an internal strength and aim for many.

The word *Christian* was first used with the people of Antioch because they believed the account of the gospel by personally accepting God's free gift of salvation and making Christ the Savior and Lord of their lives. (Acts 11:26)

The simple and repetitive words of this spiritual help us focus on what it means to be a Christian.

### HealthCare Ministries

Happy New Year St. John's! The holidays are over for another year and it's time to get prepared for the winter weather. In mid-November we experienced that first winter blast of snow that left so many of us stranded for hours on icy, slick roads with traffic at a halt everywhere! Many times, it takes times like that to spur us into thinking about how we should be better prepared for emergencies! Here are some reminder tips on how to prepare for winter and keep yourselves safe.

Prepare your car

- 1. Keep the gas tank full to avoid ice in the tank and fuel lines.
- 2. Use a wintertime formula in your windshield washer.
- 3. Check the tire tread; replace with all-weather or snow tires.
- 4. Service the radiator and maintain the antifreeze level.
- 5. Prepare a winter emergency kit to keep in your car in case you get stranded. It should include:
  - cell phone, portable charger and extra batteries
    - blankets \*snacks and water \*flashlight, battery-powered radio
    - first aid kit \*plastic bags for sanitation \*compass or maps
  - booster cables, flares, tire pump, bag of sand or cat litter for traction

If you do plan to travel

- 1. Avoid traveling when the weather service has issued advisories.
- 2. If you must travel, inform a friend of your route and estimated time of arrival.
- 3. If you become stranded, move anything you need from the trunk into the passenger area. Run the engine for 10 minutes every hour. Turn on the inside overhead lights to make yourself more visible during a storm when the car is running. Make sure the exhaust pipe is not blocked. Keep your body warm by wrapping yourself in blankets, stay close to another person and keep moving your body for increased blood circulation and warmth.

At home, equip in advance for emergencies

- 1. Stock food that needs no cooking or refrigeration and store water in clean containers.
- 2. Keep your cell phone fully charged.
- 3. Keep an up-to-date emergency kit including battery-operated devices such as a flashlight, radio and lamps.
- 4. Prepare a first aid kit. Make sure you have extra medicine, enough baby items and some cat litter or sand for icy sidewalks.
- 5. Protect your family from carbon monoxide by keeping grills, camp stoves and generators out of the house, basement and garage. Keep generators at least 20 ft. from your house. Leave your house immediately if the CO2 detector sounds, and call 911.

The winter season, with the occasional fresh blanket of pure white snow covering everything, is beautiful to behold! Many of us still like to get outdoors to enjoy this aspect of nature. Whether it be to ski or ice skate, sled or build a snowman, shovel or walk, it is part of a natural order of our planet and we should embrace it and enjoy it as much as we can. All you have to do is dress for it! Layers of light, warm clothing, a windproof coat, mittens, hats, scarves and waterproof boots will do the trick!

Last, but not least, check on vulnerable friends and family ; young children, older adults and the chronically ill when bad weather strikes. Don't forget to bring your pets inside or provide them with warm shelter and unfrozen water to drink. Don't over stress yourself shoveling heavy snow, take lots of breaks or get younger people to help you. Let it SNOW!
