

Our "Welcome to St. John's" begins long before people come inside the building. However, we want to be sure to add some "warm welcome" to the winter months. For Advent, we shared coffee and hot chocolate to welcome each other to worship. This will continue during the season of Christmas and into the winter months of 2025! We want to welcome our worship participants with a warm beverage option before worship as well as our Sunday Social time following worship. As you arrive during this season, come enjoy a cup of coffee, hot tea or hot chocolate!

9:30am Children's Faith Formation Children gather with the congregation in worship through the Children's message, then are let to Room 101 and our "mini theater" room for the weekly topic lesson. "HOLY MOLY" is our curriculum theme this year! We believe our children are blessings, and we want them to grow in our love and the love of God. The children's table is set up in the Parlor for activity if desired for those who choose to remain during worship with parent supervision for any children not participating in regular faith formation activities. "Kids Busy Bags" are also available at the welcome table.

REMINDER TO PARENTS FOR COMMUNION SUNDAYS.

Children who attend "Holy Moly" on the 1st Sunday of the month when the congregation celebrates the sacrament of Holy Communion will be brought back to the sanctuary to join their family in worship. We know some parents welcome their children participating in the sacrament. Others want their children to wait until they are confirmed or until they have a stronger understanding of the meaning of this sacred meal of love and grace.

At St. John's UCC, Fullerton, we observe an OPEN Communion Table, which means that ALL PERSONS, regardless of age or full understanding of the sacrament, are welcome to receive. After all, how many of us as adults in our faith can fully express or explain the significance of this sacred meal. Children will have an abbreviated lesson on the first Sunday of the month to accommodate their participation in Holy Communion, as those who observe in participation or as those who receive in participation. We have both wine and grape juice in the trays to meet the needs of all.

9:30am Morning Worship - Our faith community gathers to Worship, Love and Serve every Sunday morning! We have a place for you, one and all, and YOU ARE... WELCOME HERE! We have created places in the congregational seating for those with mobility issues and assistance support. We are working to make our spaces and worship experience more accessible for everyone, including those with hearing impairment.

Join us each week in the gathering spaces, the classrooms, the sanctuary, online, and with Sunday Social time following worship in Fox Hall. We welcome you in to the experience of God's love through St. John's.

11am Confirmation Class for 7th & 8th Graders - Affirming Faith through Confirmation Class held in the third-floor Youth Room.

ALL YOUTH are welcome to come to the youth room during our Sunday Social time and share with our Confirmation Class as well as spend time with other youth and grow in your faith.

Confirmation Class participants will be visiting with you during our Sunday Social time. Please look for Nicholas Santee, Aiden Hannis and Lucas Williams in the minutes before we move to our class sessions each week, or on 4th Sundays when they generally have more time to connect with the congregation. Express your thanks for their worship participation and leadership. Join them in the journey of discovery to affirm their faith in God through Jesus Christ.

Confirmation sessions continue through the end of May with class lessons, worship experiences, service projects, church life, and learning with friends, leaders and mentors. These young men will look to YOU, the people of St. John's, to model what faith looks like. They will witness how you WORSHIP, LOVE and SERVE to create your own "No Matter What" kind of faith. What we live before them matters every single day!

As we make this Affirming Faith journey together, you are invited to pray for them by name, to share your encouragement with them. Get to know these guys and help them know who we are and how our lives have been changed in the love of God.

As 2024 draws to a close, we reflect with deep gratitude on our year of life and ministry together. Your year-end gift will help us carry our mission into 2025, ensuring we can continue making a meaningful impact in the world. No gift is too small, and every contribution makes a difference.

As we celebrate Christmas and look ahead to the New Year, we do so with hope and anticipation, knowing that, together, we can

continue to be a beacon of light in our community and beyond. We are called to be people of Epiphany and "LET LIGHT SHINE!" We are incredibly grateful for your support and excited to continue this journey of faithful living with you.

Thank you for your prayerful consideration. May this season bring you hope, peace, joy and love as we welcome the Light of the world to our lives with renewed faith.

The tradition of candles in the windows has long been a sign of hope, welcoming strangers to a safe place, and reminding others of our hospitality. Giving, Shopping, and Supporting Our Ministries —All Made Easy

In response to your requests for more convenience and flexibility, St. John's UCC is introducing several new ways to support our ministries, participate in our programs, and make everyday purchases that benefit our church community. We've heard your feedback: you want simpler, more secure methods to give, contribute, and get involved. Now, with just a few steps, you can make an impact—whether you're signing up for special events or doing your weekly grocery shopping.

A NEW WAY TO GIVE AND PURCHASE

We are pleased to offer credit and debit card payment options for our many activities and opportunities. Through our secure, encrypted systems onsite and via our website, you can now use your

card to purchase Giant and Weis gift cards, IronPigs game tickets, bus trips, candies, pasties, nuts, flowers, or even bingo tickets. Speak with Alison, Michelle, Tom, Carol, or Pastor Steve, and they will help get you started. This streamlined approach puts more choices at your fingertips, making it easier than ever to support St. John's.

UNDERSTANDING THE COSTS OF CONVENIENCE

Providing this added convenience does come at a cost. Like any retailer or organization that accepts card payments, St. John's incurs transaction and processing fees. For most major cards, there is a \$0.45 transaction fee and a 2.85% processing fee. American Express carries a slightly higher processing fee of 3.5%. Previously, the church absorbed these costs. To sustain these services, we kindly ask that you cover the transaction fee and processing percentage as part of your payment. By doing so, you help ensure that the funds raised go directly to supporting our ministries rather than covering administrative expenses.

GROCERY SHOPPING THAT GIVES BACK

Beyond using your cards for church-related activities, there's another simple way to contribute: your routine trips to the grocery

store. When you buy Giant and Weis gift cards through the church, St. John's receives 5% back on each purchase—while you still earn your usual gas and store rewards. Gift cards can be obtained from the church office or by seeing Tom Moyer or Carol Raszler before or after Sunday worship.

If you frequent Redner's, you can help even more by saving your register tapes. Through Redner's "Save-A-Tape" program, St. John's receives 1% back on every eligible receipt. Simply mail your tapes to the church office or place them in the collection jar in our lounge area. It's a small step that quickly adds up, turning your everyday errands into ongoing support.

STRENGTHENING MINISTRIES THROUGH YOUR INVOLVEMENT

All of these options—using credit and debit cards for direct purchases, buying grocery gift cards, and saving Redner's tapes—offer convenient avenues to strengthen our church's ministries. Your participation ensures that we continue to grow, serve our neighbors, and nurture the spiritual life of our community. By embracing these new methods, you help St. John's maintain its commitment to faithful ministry and responsible stewardship.

At our Fall Congregational Meeting we approved a new budget for 2025 with the full understanding of what is required of us to meet our goals of sustaining and expanding our ministry opportunities. Week after week, Pastor Steve has shared in worship examples of how our generosity is changing lives. Our goal each month has been to meet or exceed \$22,500 in monthly offering donations. To do this, Sue Weldner, our Treasurer, shared how our collective increase of a few dollars will make a big difference. With a projected deficit in 2024, we are asking everyone to consider increasing your generous support by 4%. So, if you give \$25 each week, you increase it to \$26. If you give \$50 each week, you increase it to \$52. These small increases may not be possible for everyone, but we believe most all of us who regularly participate in worship can make this adjustment for 2025.

St. Johns Kitchen Corner

Welcome back to St. John's kitchen tour. Let's talk about the kitchen counters. Under the cabinets at the far left end there is a big can opener which can be used to open large metal cans. Behind it are 2 black cases with hardware tools. Next to that is My Personal Red Bag of kitchen odds and ends. On top of it are baking

pan size sheets of parchment paper which can be used as needed. A toaster oven/air fryer appears as we continue down the counter. This appliance can be used to toast, air fry or bake. The instruction booklet is generally on top of it.

The supply of decaf and regular coffee follows and this leads us to the coffee makers. The Keurig and the Ninja coffee makers can both make single cup coffee and tea OR pots of coffee. I have posted lengthy instructions on how to use both of these when making pots of coffee. Many are intimidated by these very friendly and easy going machines. But do not be afraid! I promise they are very user friendly. All you need is WATER, A FILTER, COFFEE GROUNDS and ELECTRICITY. The filters are in the drawer and both pots take 3/4 cup of coffee grounds for a full pot. I usually have the measure cup right in the coffee cans. All usage instructions are posted directly above the coffee makers. Not to worry...I will continue to make all the coffee for Sunday Social Hour and I am also happy to train you at any time. At the end of this counter is our new and improved microwave oven. At the other end of the window counter top you will find the electric coffee pot warmer.

Until next time, remember to keep St. John's kitchen a happy place.

Hurricanes Helene & Milton Disaster Relief

Just weeks apart in September and into October, two powerful hurricanes battered the southeastern United States, causing widespread devastation and impacting countless lives and communities. Over 250 people have perished; towns, homes, and businesses were destroyed; roads and bridges were wiped out; and people were left without shelter, water and electricity.

Along with three other churches, we continue to collect items for Church World Service's Emergency Cleanup Bucket Kits. Our commitment at St. John's is to collect the following items:

- 5-gallon clean-up bucket with resealable lid (if used, please scrub clean). No buckets that held chemicals of any kind. No screw lid.
- Scrub brush with or without a handle.
- 6-9 oz. bottle of non-aerosol insect repellent. Pump spray bottles must have protective covers. Packs of 10-20 insect repellent wipes are also acceptable.
- Two pairs of heavy-duty, waterproof dishwashing gloves.
 Latex-free, non-surgical. Durable for multiple use.

Donated items can be placed in the basket and on the table in the coatroom area by the sanctuary.

In addition, you can also make a monetary donation for UCC Disaster Ministries with checks payable to St. John's. Contributions can be sent to the church office, put in the offering plate, made online or by text. Be sure to put Hurricane Relief in the memo section.

Women's Retreat: "There Are Angels Among Us"

This past November, thirty women from St. John's came together at the Tuscarora Inn and Conference Center in Mt. Bethel, PA, to share in a spirit-led weekend of reflection, fellowship, and fun. Held from November 22 through November 24—just before Thanksgiving—the Women's Retreat offered a meaningful opportunity to rest, connect, and explore how we can be "Angels Among Us."

Under the guidance of Pastor Emerita Rev. Dr. Becky Beckwith, former church secretary Susan Kuder, and PEEPS leader Colleen Kulhamer, participants delved into biblical passages on angels. In small groups, they discussed selected scriptures, examining the ways angels appear in God's story and considering how we, too, can act as God's messengers. The leaders created a safe, welcoming environment where everyone could share freely—be it personal experiences, beliefs, doubts, laughter, or tears—without judgment.

"The retreat was filled with sharing, listening, tears, laughter, and love," said Pastor Becky. "Differences of opinions were safely shared and discussed without malice. Conversations happened about what we are supposed to believe and what we do believe. It became a weekend to lift each other up without judgment or put downs." Stories of angelic encounters touched many hearts, inspiring participants to become "angels" for one another.

This spirit of togetherness extended beyond the study sessions. There were moments for worship, devotions, communion, singing, and even a bit of dancing—Susan and Colleen delighted everyone as dancing and singing "angels." Laughter echoed through the halls during silly games, and songs were lifted in praise around an indoor "campfire." Throughout the weekend, the women also enjoyed walking along the scenic river and sampling a wide variety of snacks and baked goods, including a memorable 16-foot table overflowing with treats. As one participant joked, "A girl gets hungry!"

Women traveled from near and far to be part of this special experience. Margaret Baatz and her daughter Tammy even journeyed from Grantsville, Maryland, to join the gathering. Each participant's presence enriched the community spirit, as they formed

new friendships, deepened their faith, and found common ground—even in their differences.

In addition, the retreat received notable recognition beyond the church community. On December 7, Pastor Becky's reflection on the weekend appeared in the Morning Call's "Faith and Values" column. Inspired by Isaiah 6:6-8, Pastor Becky discussed how angels are portrayed in Scripture, how we can serve as God's angels in our daily lives, and how simple acts of kindness, attentive listening, and supportive presence can make a profound impact. As the weekend drew to a close, everyone left feeling renewed and inspired—more aware of the angels that walk among us and more committed to living as God's messengers here on earth. In the words of one attendee, "It was a good weekend!"
