Pastor's New Year Reflection

"What History Are We Making?"

As we step into a new year together, I find myself returning to a simple but searching question: What history are we making? Not the kind that will fill textbooks or archives, but the quiet, holy history that unfolds in the daily life of a congregation - our choices, our compassion, our courage, our witness and our love.

One verse keeps accompanying this question: Jeremiah 29:11— "For I know the plans I have for you," says the Lord, "plans for your wellbeing and not for harm, to give you a future with hope." These words, spoken to a community living far from home and facing an uncertain future, remind us that God's story always bends toward hope. Even in seasons of upheaval, God is at work shaping a future that leads us toward life.

We live in a world that feels increasingly chaotic. The headlines can be heavy, the pace of change dizzying, and the pressures around us unrelenting. Yet the church has always been shaped not by the calmness of the world, but by the constancy of Christ. We do not wait for perfect circumstances to be faithful; we bring the light of Christ into the circumstances we have. This is our history-making work.

Throughout Scripture, God's people found themselves in confusing and uncertain times. Still, God invited them to create a different kind of story - one marked by love, justice, hope, and steadfast presence. Jesus did the same. Surrounded by conflict, division, and overwhelming human need, He chose compassion over cynicism, mercy over judgment, and healing over fear. He made history not by overpowering the world, but by loving it fully.

So the question for us is both challenging and full of promise:

How will we embody the love and hope of Jesus in this particular moment? St. John's has not been shy about making history in the past. What will it look like for us in the year to come?

We make history.

We make history every time we speak kindness instead of criticism.

We make history when we welcome someone who feels alone.

We make history when we show up - steadily, consistently, imperfectly - for one another and for all those who are "othered" in the community around us.

We make history when we risk generosity in a culture of scarcity.

We make history when we let grace soften what the world has tried to harden.

The church does not exist to escape chaos; it exists to bear witness to God's presence within it. Our calling is not to be perfect, but to be faithful. And faithfulness, lived over time, creates a history worth passing on - a history that says to future generations, "They loved well. They hoped boldly. They gave their best effort. They stood up, spoke up and made sure to rise up to the challenge. They trusted God through it all."


Jeremiah's promise assures us that God's plans are still unfolding - plans for our well-being, plans that ground us in hope rather than harm. When we choose love, when we enact compassion, when we build community, we align ourselves with that divine future and participate in the history God longs to create with and through us.

As we enter this new year, may we listen carefully for the ways God is inviting us to shape the story of our life together. May we choose the kind of history that reflects the heart of Jesus. And may our church continue to be a place where light, courage, and welcome are made visible - one act, one choice, one day at a time.

EPIPHANY SEASON & WORSHIP SCHEDULE

As we prepare to enter the season of Epiphany, we step into one of the most radiant moments of the church year — a time when the light of Christ breaks open the ordinary world and reveals the extraordinary grace at its heart. Epiphany celebrates the moment the Light was made known not just to a few, but to the whole world. It is a season of joyful recognition: God has drawn near, incarnation has taken on flesh, and the world has been changed because of it.

But after the star's brilliance fades and the Magi go home by another road, the church moves into what we traditionally call "Ordinary Time," and the color returns to green. This shift invites a faithful question: "Now what?"

illuminates our attitudes, our relationships, and our sense of purpose. And we'll consider how we might become bearers of that same light in a world that still longs for hope, healing, and grace.

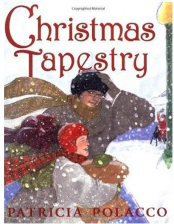
NEW SERVICE ANNOUNCEMENT

Remembering the baptism of Jesus, we come to renew the covenant we have in God's unconditional love. This moving time invites us to claim our faith in Jesus Christ and our identity as beloved children of God, using the waters we have gathered from around the world as part of our sacred time of renewal.

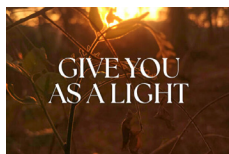
Baptism of the Lord Sunday is not just preaching about Jesus' baptism, but centering our worship around the connection between Jesus' baptism, our baptisms, and our baptismal identity as the Body of Christ. It shows us that baptism is about initiation into community with God and one another, and Jesus shows us the way into this community through his baptism.

SUNDAY, JANUARY 18, 2026

Week of Prayer for Christian Unity

Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Sunday

Lectionary Readings: Isaiah 49:1-7; Psalm 40:1-11; 1
Corinthians 1:1-9; John 1:29-42



As we journey further into the season after Epiphany, we continue to reflect on the many ways God's glory is made known in our world. Epiphany reminds us that the light of Christ shines brightly, revealing God's heart to all people. Yet this week's reading from Isaiah 49 invites us to look at that revelation from a different angle: not only does God's glory shine to us, it also shines through us.

On this Martin Luther King, Jr. Sunday, and at the beginning of the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity, we are reminded that God's servants are called to be bearers of light and healing in a world longing for justice, peace, and reconciliation. Through the prophet Isaiah, God speaks a bold truth: that our lives, our witness, and our work can be

vessels of divine glory in ways far beyond what we imagine.

Today, we gather with a spirit of remembrance, unity, and hope, ready to listen for how God continues to reveal glory in us and through us.

SUNDAY, JANUARY 25, 2026

Health and Human Services Sunday

Lectionary Readings: Isaiah 9:1-4; Psalm 27:1, 4-9; 1 Corinthians 1:10-18;
Matthew 4:12-23



The light has come. We've received the light and the call to bear the light to all the nations. Got it. Can do. Easy right?! Well...maybe not.

The rubber meets the road when we begin carrying the light into a world that likes to hide things in the shadows, push people to the margins, and threaten anyone who declares that things should be otherwise. We quickly discover that carrying the light doesn't get rid of fear. But, as the psalmist demonstrates this week, the light does show us how to not let fear control us and keep us from living in the glory of God's salvation.

When we get to verses six through eight, we find out that the fruit of what we do outside the walls of the worship space matters more than what happens in the worship space.

The Stewardship & Finance Committee and Consistory have reviewed the projects and shared recommendations to advance these opportunities to grow and improve our facilities and our outreach. They will also share a recommendation for retaining a portion of the estate funds to be added to our endowment to provide for ministry support for years to come.

There will also be some minor language changes to our Constitution and Bylaws to accommodate the transitions from the Penn Northeast Conference (PNEC) to the new Keystone Conference UCC in 2026, as well as our previous area being in the governance model of the Mountain Valley Association.

In addition, each area of our ministry, and there are many, share a report of their activity in 2025. Our focus this year builds once again on our mission affirmation... "We Worship, We Love, We Serve - No Matter What!" Each ministry area is asked to describe how our ministry has risen above challenges and changes to grow St John's. Reports are due to the Church Office by January 5 to give time for preparing our Report Book. The congregation will gather in Fox Hall following worship. Bring your favorite food item to share. Our lunch will be potluck.

Since January 2022, we have used this Kaleidoscope Cross as our St. John's logo. We have created a wonderful video to share it's origins and how it was developed. This cross is used on our website, in our YouTube livestream and on our digital bulletins. Because we don't often print our publications in color due to the cost, we often miss the beauty of the digital publications and presentations that help others come to experience St. John's for the first time.

We intentionally share and visually communicate our warm and inclusive welcome to the community and congregation, reminding us and all others that "you are... welcome here!"

To St. John's UCC:

We want to thank the walkers, sponsors, and other donors who raised over \$30,000 last month through the Greater Allentown and Bethlehem CROP Hunger Walks on behalf of our food-insecure neighbors. Twenty-five percent of the funds raised will return to the Lehigh Valley to benefit such ministries as the Allentown Area Ecumenical Food Bank and the Lehigh Churches' Conference Kitchen in Allentown, as well as Essentials Café and several food pantries in Bethlehem. The remaining funds are used to aid disaster relief, development, and resettlement efforts world wide. CROP Hunger Walk funds have been used recently to assist those devastated by flooding in the U.S. & by the war in Ukraine. What a wonderful tribute to one very tangible way in which congregations work together with businesses, local political and community leaders, schools and other groups and individuals to help our neighbors in need!

It doesn't take very long if we have several handy helpers. Please contact Patrick Sandt if you can help!

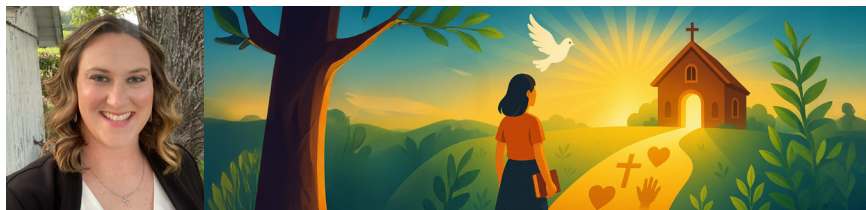
Dear Friends at St. John's:

New Year, Epiphany, and Growing Faith at Every Age

January always feels like a fresh start. Children head back to school with stories to tell about winter break and excited to share what Santa put under the tree, teenagers try to remember their routines full of band practice and sports, and adults look at a brand-new calendar wondering how we got here so quickly. Whether or not we make formal resolutions, the turning of the year invites all of us to reflect, reset, and imagine what might be possible.

The church's calendar meets us in that moment with Epiphany, the day we remember the magi following a star toward something they didn't fully understand. Children latch onto the sense of wonder in this story; the sparkle, the journey, the mystery. Adults appreciate the courage it took to follow a light without a clear map. And some of us may even recognize ourselves in the quiet, faithful openness that carried the magi through unfamiliar terrain. It is a story roomy enough for all ages.

Epiphany also gives us a few delightful details that spark curiosity: early Christians actually celebrated the Feast of Epiphany long before they celebrated Christmas, and the magi were neither kings nor necessarily three in number. Epiphany is about more than recognizing Christ's manifestation to the Gentiles in the persons of the magi, readings for this season also include narratives such as Christ in the temple as a boy, his first miracle at the wedding of Cana, his baptism, as well as other passages that emphasize the divine nature of Jesus of Nazareth.

As we step into a new year, Epiphany gently shifts our focus from resolutions, which can sometimes feel like pressure, to practices that help us grow in faith. For our children, this may look like exploring new Bible stories, practicing small acts of kindness, or learning to talk to God and pray in their own way. For older youth and adults, it might take the form of setting intentions, making space for quiet

reflection, or looking for God's presence in everyday moments.

I recently had a conversation with someone during fellowship hour about the beauty of the intergenerational life that happens in the church. Our lives and our experiences overlap in the most simple but meaningful ways. A child's curiosity reminds adults to stay open; an adult's steady reflection becomes a model for younger eyes; an elder's wisdom anchors the whole community. Epiphany teaches us that following the light is something we can do at any age and in every season and requires just one small step at a time. May this new year bring clarity, gentleness, and enough light for each of us, no matter our age or our pace, to find the way forward.

Generosity with New Opportunities

St. John's is blessed with great generosity! So many of you give to a variety of ministry opportunities. As new persons come to our congregation, and as ministry needs change over time, we offer new ways to make certain your contributions have the most significant results.

In 2024-2025, we shared generously in disaster relief efforts, especially when there were multiple natural disasters to which we were trying to respond. Now at the end of 2025 and looking to 2026, we will be shifting any "General Disaster Relief" donations to Missions in the more general category.

The congregation voted in October 2025 to move forward with current contributions and the estate gift to fund the Elevator Modernization Project. Once again, at the end of 2025 and now moving forward, we ask you to reallocate "Elevator" funds to either reducing our Pavilion Loan or to the Property Needs funds. Both are ongoing projects and funds that can use our faithful support.

For those who were not part of St. John's before the Pavilion's completion in 2021, the congregation has a 30 year mortgage on the Pavilion property. Our lending rate was low and our interest rate on investments has been quite good, so we are choosing to pay the mortgage down monthly and make money on this long-term loan. Many in the congregation made a 3 year pledge to help construct the pavilion. We invite everyone to help us pay down this loan over the years to come.

Thank you for the tremendous spirit of generosity you share and for your faithful and consistent support. Your stewardship of resources is creating a season of blessing at St. John's.

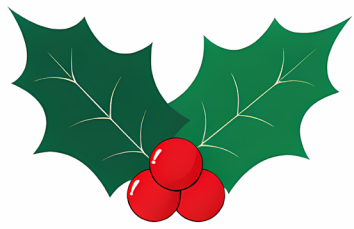
