#### God's Faithfulness and Our Future

My dear friends at St. John's,

November 21, 2021, I stepped into the sanctuary to lead our first worship service as your called and settled Senior Pastor. As I look back on these four years of ministry together, my heart is filled with gratitude. It's hard to believe how much life we've shared in that time—baptisms and memorials, celebrations and challenges, new beginnings and faithful continuities. Together we have prayed, planned, laughed, served, and sometimes wept. Through it all, we have witnessed God's faithfulness again and again preparing us for the next season of our shared future.

When I think of our journey, I'm reminded of the words of Philippians 1:3–6: "I thank my God every time I remember you... because of your partnership in the gospel from the first day until now. And I am confident of this, that the One who began a good work among you will bring it to completion by the day of Jesus Christ."

Partnership is the word that stands out to me. Ministry is not a solo act; it's a shared calling. We believe that all who claim the name of Christ are ministers. You've shown what it means to be the body of Christ: each person bringing unique gifts, all working together for a common purpose, all of us doing our part as we worship, love and serve.

We've grown together — sometimes in ways we planned, and sometimes in ways only God could have orchestrated. The landscape of church life has changed, shifted once again through our pandemic experience, and yet our mission remains steady: to love God, to love our neighbors, and to follow Jesus into the world with hope and courage.

As this anniversary is marked, and another year of ministry together continues, we are positioned as a forward-looking people. I believe we stand on the edge of another chapter of grace and hope. The same Spirit who has carried us this far continues to call us forward — to listen

for new voices, to nurture new leaders, to deepen our discipleship, and to extend Christ's love beyond our walls. We don't yet see the full picture of what's ahead, but we can trust that God is already preparing the way and leading us in our next steps.

So, thank you — each of you — for your faithfulness, your prayers, your trust, and your partnership in ministry, especially when it hasn't been easy. Thank you for the ways you have cared for one another and for me and my family. And thank you for daring to believe that the best stories of St. John's are still unfolding.

As we enter this season of Advent, inviting us to anticipate and prepare for the fullness of God to become flesh among us, may we keep walking together in hope, peace, joy and love, confident that "the One who began a good work among us will bring it to completion," together as the people of St. John's UCC, Fullerton, where...

#### **BONNIE BATES**

On our cover we usually have a member of the St. John's family and get to know a little bit more about them from their point of view. This month, we are honored to have our Conference Minister, who while not a member, is definitely a part of our St. John's family. For the past eight years, Rev. Dr. Bonnie Bates has faithfully served as our Conference area.

Bonnie was ordained in 2005. She served churches in the New York Conference, and also directed and taught in the Graduate Human Resource Development program at St. John Fisher College in Rochester. She worked in

Human Resources for several non-profits, and served on several not-forprofit Boards.

While in the New York Conference, she served in a variety of association and conference positions including chair of the Conference Personnel Committee, Executive Council and Executive Committee, Church and Ministry Committee, Staff Redesign, Visioning and Constitutional Revision Committee.

Bonnie then went on to serve as the Associate Minister for Congregational Vitality and Development in the Eastern Ohio and Western Reserve Associations, which is now known as the Living Waters Association. Her role there was to support pastors and congregations in transition, assist with search and call, work with congregational revitalization, and explore new church starts.

Bonnie began her work here as the Penn Northeast Transitional Conference Minister in September of 2017 and then the Settled Conference Minister in 2020. In all her areas of leadership with us, Bonnie expressed the honor it has been to serve here, in this capacity, as her last ministry call, especially working alongside Patty Rehrig and Barbara Jennings. Their wealth of knowledge and experience along with their support and friendship made them a great team.

Bonnie has never been afraid of using her voice, both written and spoken, especially to speak out against injustices. She is self-admittedly stubborn, and she often needs to be reminded to rest. In the last eight years, the Penn Northeast Conference has seen the implementation of the Governance and Ministry Model and the restructuring of the Committee on Ministry. Communities of Practice and Coaching were introduced as a way of offering support to both pastors and congregations, along with many continuing education opportunities.

Bonnie pointed to our willingness as a conference to be open, supportive, willing to embrace change, and willing to step up, that enabled all of these things to happen. Not that there wasn't push back from time to time, but together we all grew both professionally and personally.

The visioning and now the transition to the Keystone Conference has been a significant part of her work over the last few years. She expressed gratitude for the opportunity to work with and become closer to her colleagues - Bill, Carrie, Dave, Nora, Kevin, Sean and with all those who have been a part of this process.

Her role in the day-to-day ministry, included both joys and sorrows including being present and offering support to pastors and congregations during difficult times. Bonnie reflected on the lovely people that we have lost through the years, as well as the celebrations and the rituals that soften the sadness of loss and give balance to ministry. She will cherish worshipping with congregations, celebrating ordinations, installations, and anniversaries, and the great relationships and connections. Reflecting on this journey of ministry, Bonnie said, "Leaving this role will be hard. I loved this work and I loved this place."

On December 14, we will celebrate Bonnie's ministry as she shares her message of Advent Joy with us in worship. For the gift of Bonnie's faith and love, leadership and grace shared with us, we say, "Thanks be to God for Bonnie Bates!"

Isaiah 2:1-5 - "Come, Let Us Walk in the Light of the Lord"

Lectionary Readings: Isaiah 2:1-5; Psalm 122; Romans 13:11-14; Matthew 24:36-44



During the Season of Advent, sentimental stories often share great spiritual truths which with we connect. We will start off the "Advent at the Movies" season message series presenting the first movie, "Wonka," for our theme or Hope, and discover how Willie became Wonka!

We often think we have to create something wonderful for people to believe in us. HOPE is found not in the things, but in who we share life with as we believe in God's gift to us. We begin this Advent seeing how God's Hope guides us to discover the real gift that lies within us all. Pastor Steve Davis will bring the first of our Advent messages.

Communion and The Second Sunday of Advent - PEACE Lectionary Readings: Isaiah 11:1-10; Psalm 72:1-7, 18-19; Romans 15:4-13; Matthew 3:1-12

This week's film is "The Bishop's Wife", a timeless Christmas classic filled with warmth, wonder, and a gentle touch of heavenly humor. Bishop Henry Brougham, having difficulties finding the funding for the building of a new cathedral, prays for divine guidance. His plea is seemingly answered by a suave angel named Dudley, who reveals his heavenly identity only to the clergyman.

Dudley's mission, however, is to guide Henry and the people around him spiritually. Henry has become obsessed with raising funds, to the detriment of his family life. His relationships with wife, Julia, and their young daughter, Debby, are strained by his focus on the cathedral. Where will genuine peace be experienced and found?

Our Ministry Intern, Samantha Kistler, will bring the Advent message, helping us all with a fresh experience of God's peace.

#### SUNDAY, DECEMBER 14

The Third Sunday of Advent - JOY
Special Guest, The Rev. Dr. Bonnie Bates
(Penn Northeast Conference Minister)

Luke 1:46b-55 and Matthew 11:2-11

Lectionary Readings: Isaiah 35:1-10; Psalm 146:5-10 or Luke 1:46b-55; James 5:7-10; Matthew 11:2-11

This week's film is "It's a Wonderful Life", a beloved Christmas favorite that explores how one ordinary life can overflow with extraordinary joy. Another angelic messenger, Clarence, has a mission to help George Bailey discover that George's life has really made a difference. Even in his most challenging moments and facing great trials, there is enthusiastic joy because of the people who share themselves with George.

Rev. Dr. Bonnie Bates will bring the third of our Advent messages, as together we celebrate the joy God brings us in discovering our value to others. Come share in the joy as we celebrate the ministry of our Conference Minister as she retires, having served the Penn NE Conference for the last 8 years.

#### Matthew 1:18-25 "Joseph's Love at Second Sight"

Lectionary Readings: Isaiah 7:10-16; Psalm 80:1-7, 17-19; Romans 1:1-7; Matthew 1:18-25

This week's film is "While You Were Sleeping", a charming holiday romance that lets love appear in the most unexpected places. Fare token collector, Lucy (Sandra Bullock), works for the Chicago Transit Authority. She is secretly infatuated with commuter, Peter, though they are strangers. On Christmas Day, Lucy rescues Peter from the Chicago "L" train after muggers push him onto the tracks. She accompanies the comatose Peter to the hospital, where a nurse overhears her mumbling, "I was gonna marry him." Misinterpreting, she tells everyone that Lucy is his fiancée. And that's where the problem begins.

Not all our Christmas wishes come true. However, the gift of God's love at Christmas always helps us see where love is present, with us,

guiding us. The story of Joseph reminds us of how God helps us embrace even troublesome circumstances in order to find the gift of God.

#### About Our St. John's Cross Logo

Over the last few months, we've been sharing more about the origins or our St. John's Cross in a newsletter article in September, and a video shared during the Consistory meeting and Sunday Social / Ask the Pastor and Elders time in October. We've actually used this logo since the January 2022 issue of the Connection Newsletter, and in every edition since. We use the cross on our website, in our YouTube livestream and on our digital bulletins. Since we don't often print our publications in color due to cost, it's possible to miss the beauty of the digital publications and presentations that help others come to experience St. John's for the first time.

Hearing the recent questions of some in the congregation, it was clear that more communication was desired about our "kaleidoscope" cross. The Elders and Consistory have spent about three months in conversation and discernment, reflecting on who we are as a people who welcome all to know the love of God in Jesus Christ. As an "Open and Affirming Congregation," we intentionally looked for ways to visually communicate that inclusive welcome to the community and congregation.

The choice to incorporate many colors represents the diversity of all we are as a congregation today. We are not simply one thing or another, one label of identity of another, and we share many gifts for ministry. Our kaleidoscope cross of many colors, seen in print on our worship bulletins and newsletters in black and white, often doesn't help us discern the distinction of the fullness of God's love. So the visible reminder of this colorful kaleidoscope cross is on our worship screen and digital/website version of our bulletin and newsletter, helping our online and on site worshippers, and anyone else who finds St. John's online, have more information about us.

Also, note that the cross in the center is empty. We worship the Christ of resurrection life. All of the colors on the outside point to the center, reminding us that the focus we all share is to point people to the love of God we know in Jesus. People get to visually know that we are a place of faith intentionally including every person in the "you are... welcome here" of God's love. This symbol invitingly says,

"We are part of a great and diverse place, where we worship, we love, and we serve – no matter what!" #### Seeds of Faith from Samantha K.

As I think back over my childhood, there was something so magical about experiencing Christmas as a child but the feeling I get watching my own children experiencing Christmas is unexplainable. Their eyes widen at the first snowfall, their laughter fills the room when they decorate cookies, and their excitement builds as they count down the days until Christmas morning. They notice things that we adults tend to overlook like the twinkle of lights, the warmth of a hug, the mystery in a story we've heard a hundred times before.

My oldest daughter broke out her Rudolph pajamas November 1st and my youngest daughter has been perfecting her list for Santa for weeks. The anticipation that my children have this time of year also helps me to realize in this season of Advent that faith isn't just about knowing what we believe but instead it's truly about being open to wonder. In Mark 10:15 Jesus asserts that we must receive the kingdom of God "like a little child." I think that what he is speaking to is that to receive the kingdom of God "as a little child," is to receive it after the manner of a child, with simplicity and faith, humility and love. It means being willing to be surprised by grace, to find joy in small things, and to trust that God is still doing something beautiful, even when we can't quite see it yet.

It is easy for December to become one long to-do list. I know I am more than guilty of this. We rush from one event to another, we make sure we have pictures with Santa, cards in the mail, gingerbread houses constructed, the tree decorated and the perfect gifts purchased and wrapped. The joy of the season quickly turns into a process of checking boxes and managing expectations. But what if this year, we tried to approach things a little differently and tried to see the season through the eyes of a child? What if we slowed down long enough to marvel at the lights, to sing carols with gusto, to let ourselves be moved by the story of a baby born in a manger?

The birth of Jesus was God's way of saying that love shows up in unexpected places; in small towns, in ordinary people, and in moments that seem simple but are sacred. Children understand that better than most of us.

So this Advent, may we look for Christ in the small and simple things. May we let wonder lead us closer to the heart of God. And may our eyes, like the eyes of a child, be open to see the holy all around us.




# **Honoring Timothy Ott - Legacy Tree**

On October 28, Hurricane Melissa made landfall in Jamaica as a Category 5 storm, one of the most powerful and destructive Category 5 storms on record in the Caribbean. Its devastation also impacted Haiti and Cuba. The United Church of Christ has issued an appeal to help immediate and long-term recovery efforts in these countries. The primary needs at this recovery stage are shelter, safe drinking water, sanitation, healthcare, and food.
