"Repairers of the Breach"

"The LORD will guide you continually and satisfy your needs in parched places and make your bones strong, and you shall be like a watered garden, like a spring of water whose waters never fail. Your ancient ruins shall be rebuilt; you shall raise up the foundations of many generations; you shall be called the repairer of the breach, the restorer of streets to live in." - Isaiah 58:11-12

Ain't gonna let nobody turn me around Turn me around, turn me around, Ain't gonna let nobody turn me around I'm gonna keep on walkin', keep on talkin', Marchin' up that freedom land.

Do you find yourself feeling weary? In your weary moments, do we fall back? At the height of the Civil Rights Movement, Dr. King said, "Nothing would be more tragic than for us to turn around... we must press forward." And from his words, a song rose up to meet the marchers in the movement with new power.

"Ain't Gonna Let Nobody Turn Me 'Round" is a freedom song based on the spiritual "Don't You Let Nobody Turn You Round" and became an American civil rights era anthem. It was sung during demonstrations for civil rights in the United States, including during the Memphis sanitation strike in 1967, led by the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. After marches of civil disobedience were met by violent actions of brutality, the watching world took note. The nation began to wrestle within itself over our lives of privilege and those who live under oppression. The call of Dr. King was not just for African Americans, but a call to the poor of our nation; the injustice of poverty anywhere, for anyone of any race, color or creed. In the face of water cannons and rubber bullets, mounted "officers of the law" with billy clubs and bats, police with dogs ready to attack and bite into the flesh of protestors, all designed to turn people back, turn them around from their cries for justice and silence them, the people stood united and sang in their marches... "Ain't Gonna Let Nobody Turn Me 'Round."

I first heard these words in 2017 when marching with generations of women and those who love and support them in Seattle, Washington, almost 50 years after they were first shared. "Nothing would be more tragic than for us to turn around." We heard the call of a new preacher, pastor and prophet speaking to this generation. Having just come through Black History Month for February and Women's History Month for March, the words of the Rev. Dr. William Barber have been resounding in my mind as he called us then and even last week, to embrace our heritage as those who are repairers of the breach, restorers of the soul of the nation, through the example of Jesus.

Bishop William J. Barber II, DMin, is President and Senior Lecturer of Repairers of the Breach, as well as a professor in the Practice of Public Theology and Public Policy and Founding Director of the Center for Public Theology and Public Policy at Yale Divinity School. For the last decade, he has led people of faith and good will in a weekly emphasis to explore and call for our collective pursuit of justice through what he calls the "Moral Monday Movement." I still receive his messages and invitations to join in the work of the Church joining with those of other faiths and no faith in doing what is right to lift ALL PEOPLE. Dr. Barber said, "Nothing would be more tragic than for us to turn around. We must go forward," echoing the words of Dr. King half a century ago.

"What do we do when we are weary?" the question stayed with me. Often, when I'm weary I want to take a break, get some rest, have some refreshment, and sometimes... turn away from the urgency of the moment. Yet our faith welcomes us to embrace the One whose love is steadfast and everlasting; to not turn around, but follow in faith, taking the hand of those alongside us and walk stronger together.

When we are weary, God invites us to join in the journey of hope to see God at work through us... when we meet hate with love, when we meet meanness with mercy, when we meet evil and greed with trust in God's abundance. We can see God at work through us... when we meet lies with the truth, when we meet treachery with triumphant love. Theologian Jurgen Moltmann said we see the glory of God when people of faith see things that are wrong and they decide to put their hands and their bodies to work to change what is wrong. That's when hope comes! Hope comes when you go to work.

During this season of Lent, may we be those who claim our place as the "repairers of the breach" to bring hope and welcome justice. May we be those whose lives reveal the confidence of walking with God, sharing love for God and each other. May we hear the voice of God remind us that we are God's beloved people, those who choose to love God, love our neighbors and love ourselves in our journey of faith. We are those who take action and step forward... "for nothing would be more tragic than for us to turn around." We are St. John's UCC, Fullerton, and...

and Worship Celebrations! Sunday Mornings for Children, Youth & Adults

Welcome to the growing and expectant faith we share together at St. John's! Here's what we have to look forward to as we engage in faith formation and worship together.

8:30am Adult Faith Formation - The Friendship Sunday School Class meets in Room 201, to accommodate those with physical mobility needs. All are welcome to discuss topical studies, biblical reflection and group discussion, led by various class members. Anyone needing assistance, please use the Grape Street elevator entrance and come to the sanctuary level. There's always great conversation and some tasty treats to start your Sunday morning well! Contact Tom and Emilie Moyer for more information.

9:30am Children's Faith Formation - Children gather with the congregation in worship through the Children's message, then are led to Room 101 and our "mini theater" room for the weekly topic lesson. "Holy Moly" is our curriculum theme this year! We believe our children are blessings, and we want them to grow in our love and the love of God. Please visit with Rev. Becca Stephens or Wendy Fox for more details about the "Holy Moly" experience with our kids...

The children's table is set up in the Parlor for activity if desired for those who choose to remain during worship with parent supervision for any children not participating in regular faith formation activities. "Kids Busy Bags" are also available at the welcome table.

REMINDER TO PARENTS FOR COMMUNION SUNDAYS.

Children who attend "Holy Moly" on the 1st Sunday of the month when the congregation celebrates the sacrament of Holy Communion will be brought back to the sanctuary to join their family in worship. We know some parents welcome their children participating in the sacrament. Others want their children to wait until they are confirmed or until they have a stronger understanding of the meaning of this sacred meal of love and grace.

At St. John's UCC, Fullerton, we observe an OPEN Communion Table, which means that ALL PERSONS, regardless of age or full understanding of the sacrament, are welcome to receive. After all, how many of us as adults in our faith can fully express or explain the significance of this sacred meal. Children will have an abbreviated lesson on the first Sunday of the month to accommodate their participation in Holy Communion, as those who observe in participation or as those who receive in participation. We have both wine and grape juice in the trays to meet the needs of all.

9:30am Morning Worship - Our faith community gathers to Worship, Love and Serve every Sunday morning! We have a place for you, one and all, and YOU ARE... WELCOME HERE! We have created places in the congregational seating for those with mobility issues and assistance support. We are working to make our spaces and worship experience more accessible for everyone, including those with hearing impairment.

Join us each week in the gathering spaces, the classrooms, the sanctuary, online, and with Sunday Social time following worship in Fox Hall. We welcome you into the experience of God's love through St. John's.

11:00am Confirmation Class for 7th & 8th Graders - Youth Room (3rd Floor)

AFFIRMING FAITH

ALL YOUTH are welcome to come to the youth room during our Sunday Social time and share with our Confirmation Class as well as spend time with other youth and grow in your faith.

Confirmation Class participants will be visiting with you during our Sunday Social time. Please look for Nicholas Santee, Aiden Hannis and Lucas Williams in the minutes before we move to our class sessions each week, or on 4th Sundays when they generally have more time to connect with the congregation. Pray for them by name each week for this time of exploring and affirming their own faith. Express your thanks for their worship participation and leadership. Join them in the journey of discovery to affirm their faith in God through Jesus Christ.

Confirmation sessions continue through the end of May with class lessons, worship experiences, service projects, church life, and learning with friends, leaders and mentors. These young men will look to YOU, the people of St. John's, to model what faith looks like. They will witness how you WORSHIP, LOVE and SERVE to create your own "No Matter What" kind of faith. What we live before them matters every single day!

As we make this Affirming Faith journey together, you are invited to get to know these guys and help them know who we are and how our lives have been changed in the love of God.

Wednesday evenings and Sunday mornings in Lent, starting March 5) we will seek to open our faith to a greater experience and realization of God's love for us.




With the backdrop of the book by John Pavlovitz, If God is Love, Don't Be a Jerk! Finding a Faith that Makes Us Better Humans, we will journey with Jesus and each other toward a deeper relationship with God. In the introduction we learn the author's intent: "This book is about the walking: about imagining what love should or could look like if we take that mandate seriously. It's about the ways a bigger God is going to yield a greater capacity to love more people, and about what that will cause us to confront and confess and jettison."

While Pavlovitz addresses many of the doctrines that are core to the Christian faith, he looks at them in new ways, particularly at the actions that result from our theological beliefs. I acknowledge in advance that John writes with a particular point of view as a decidedly progressive, liberal pastor, not afraid to deal with faith and the policies and practices that touch our lives every day. While we might disagree with some of his assertions, he shares out of his many years of pastoral experience how his faith and understanding has changed as he has come to experience God in bigger ways, opening his own capacity for love and being a better human being. I hope you will enjoy the journey together.

Wednesday evenings will offer more conversation and interaction with the book subject matter. Each message will focus on what we can do to grow our understanding of loving God and loving our neighbor, the first and greatest commandment. Plan now to take part in worship and devotionals this Lent as we journey together toward Holy Week and the triumph of God's love this Easter.

California Wildfires Update

On January 7 and for the rest of the month, a series of 17 destructive wildfires affected the Los Angeles metropolitan area and San Diego County in California. The fires were exacerbated by drought conditions, low humidity, a buildup of vegetation from the previous winter, and hurricane-force Santa Ana winds, which in some places reached 100 miles per hour. As of January 31, the wildfires have killed at least 29 people, forced more than 200,000 to evacuate, and destroyed or damaged more than 18,000 homes and structures.

Most of the damage was from the two largest fires: the Palisade Fire in Pacific Palisades and the Eaton Fire in Altadena. The picture in this newsletter shows the Altadena UCC Community Church after the Eaton fire. The fire reduced the 78-year-old sanctuary and building to ashes as well as consumed the homes of at least 15 members who belonged to this small, aging United Church of Christ congregation.

The devastation has left countless families without homes, communities in mourning, and landscapes forever changed. As the smoke clears, the work of recovery begins—and it's a long road ahead. Your support can bring lasting hope to those affected by this crisis. Your gift will help provide resources including emotional and spiritual care to families in need. It will also support long-term recovery efforts, ensuring communities can rebuild stronger and more resilient.

We will continue to accept monetary contributions for the California wildfires until the end of March. General Disaster Relief Fund envelopes can be found on the table in the lounge area.
