Steadfast Love

A February Playlist for the Soul and the Beginning of Lent

February often arrives wrapped in the language of love. We share cards, candy hearts, and sentimental songs that promise affection as long as feelings remain warm. Yet the love at the heart of our faith is deeper, steadier, and far more resilient than romance or mood. Scripture speaks again and again of God's steadfast love, a love that endures, persists, and refuses to let go, even when we wander or forget who we are. A love that calls us to God's heart of grace to wrap us in unconditional love.



This February, that reflection on Steadfast Love also becomes the doorway into our Lenten journey. On Ash Wednesday, February 18, we will be marked with ashes and reminded of our humanity, our fragility, our mortality, and our deep need for grace. Lent does not begin with shame or fear, but with honesty, and it is honesty held by love. We begin this season not by proving our worth, but by trusting that we are already beloved as we affirm our baptism.

Music has always been a companion to faith. Long before most people could read, they learned theology by singing it. Hymns shaped belief, comforted grief, and carried hope across generations. Contemporary faith music continues that sacred work today, giving voice to the same truth in new language and fresh sound. We create playlists of our favorite kinds of music. Playlists to match our activity. Maybe you have a playlist for working out or walking. Playlists for our moods, to calm us or to excite us, others for styles of music like classic jazz, pop rock, classical or rap, organ music or trumpet fanfares or playlists to help soothe our rattled nerves or inspire us with a great beat. Together, these musical expressions form a kind of spiritual playlist, reminding us that God's love is unconditional, faithful, and wide enough for all, even as we enter a season of reflection and return to God's Steadfast Love. Here's some old and new which make my playlist of "go to" music.

Our hymn tradition is rich with songs that proclaim God's enduring

mercy. ["Great Is Thy Faithfulness"](#), often associated with Thomas Chisholm, anchors us in the promise that God's compassion "fails not."

["O Love That Wilt Not Let Me Go"](#) names the divine love that refuses abandonment, even when life feels uncertain. I love loud and triumphant organ music, so for me, the [Widor "Toccatta"](#) from his 5th Symphony inspires me like nothing else, as does the instrumental brass version of the tune ["Jupiter" by Gustav Holst.](#)

Holst's tune has been used by many lyricists to share a powerful text with a known and cherished tune, such as with ["I Vow to Thee, My Country."](#)

I cannot hear ["Highland Cathedral"](#) and the sounds of the Scottish bagpipes without tears moving me in gratitude to God for the gift of the music.

I'm moved in moments of honoring the men and women who have given the ultimate sacrifice of their lives for the cause of freedom, justice and liberty. ["Mansions of the Lord"](#) reminds me of the "divine embrace, eternal light," received by those who lay down their lives for others.

["There's a Wideness in God's Mercy,"](#) which has been set to many memorable tunes, sings of a love broader than human limits, challenging narrowness with grace.

And ["Love Divine, All Loves Excelling,"](#) Charles Wesley's soaring hymn, celebrates a love that transforms, heals, and makes room for grace to grow within us.

These hymns and music are not relics of the past; they are living prayers. When sung today, they remind us that God's Steadfast Love carried earlier generations through war, loss, repentance, and renewal, carrying us still today.

Alongside these familiar hymns, contemporary artists continue to give voice to the same enduring truth. ["Reckless Love" by Cory Asbury](#) speaks of a God who pursues us relentlessly, not because we earn love, but because love is God's nature.

["You Say" by Lauren Daigle](#) offers a powerful affirmation of our identity as beloved children.

["Build My Life" by Pat Barrett](#) calls us to root our lives in a love that will never fail.

["Loved" by JJ Heller](#) tenderly names the healing power of being

seen and cherished exactly as we are.

Adding a powerful and timely voice, [Mark Miller's "I Believe"](#) based on the hope shared by a Jewish person in Cologne, Germany during the mass exterminations by the Gestapo by the Nazi regime.

["Draw the Circle Wide"](#) reminds us that God's love is never meant to be restricted or hoarded. With its call to widen the boundaries of welcome, the song echoes the gospel truth that steadfast love always moves outward toward inclusion, justice, and compassion, especially as Lent calls us to examine how we live that love.

["Hope" by Jason Robert Brown](#), might come to mind in the midst of turbulent and chaotic times when we need the reassurance of God's presence, and the Light of Hope shines through our darkness.

You might also include another modern set of praise songs, ["How He Loves" by John Mark McMillan](#) or ["Beloved" by Tenth Avenue North](#), songs that echo the same promise sung by the psalmists: "The steadfast love of the Lord never ceases." "I've never heard of some of these modern songs," you might say. Well then, it's time to create a new playlist and open yourself to a fresh experience of God's Steadfast Love.

As we move from February's Light into Lent's reflection, I invite you to create your own playlist or enjoy this one of God's steadfast love. Let it accompany your commute, your prayer time, or quiet moments of reflection. Sing along. Listen deeply. Allow the words to settle into your spirit. In a world where love often feels conditional or fragile, these songs and melodies remind us that even in repentance, even in return, in our crying out for God and in the gentle reminder of Christ's hope, we are held and renewed.

May these melodies carry you through the weeks ahead as a reminder that you are known, grounded in grace, and endlessly loved.

Faith Formation & Worship Celebrations!

Light that Guides us to Reflection

A playlist for Lent? It might sound unexpected. Lent is often imagined as a quiet, even austere season, marked by silence, reflection, and a turning inward. And indeed, there is holy space in stillness, in listening for God beneath the noise of daily life. Yet for many of us, music is one of the ways that stillness opens up, a companion that helps us listen more deeply.

As we begin this new Lenten worship series on Steadfast Love, we offer these experiences in worship as a gentle guide for the journey. Each week is designed to lead us from the Glory of Christ's Transfiguration, to a moment of humility in worship on Ash Wednesday, all the way through Easter Sunday, not as a prescription for worship itself, but as an invitation to prepare the heart. These celebrations of worship are meant to help us make connections between scripture and lived experience, between faith and the wider world, between what we carry and the love that holds us. However you choose to engage them, we pray these moments together draw you more fully into worship and into the enduring, steadfast love that meets us throughout this Lenten season.



Music at St. John's

Scene One: A young boy—whose grandmother was a pianist, whose grandfather played the tuba and sang, and whose great-grandmother taught voice, with a mother and brother who both played the clarinet—decided he wanted to go to church with his family. There he sat in the pew, fascinated not so much by the beautiful stained-glass windows around him or the priest speaking from the pulpit, but by his grandfather's voice, not to mention the choir that was singing. *Hey, if these people can do it—plus my grandfather—why can't I?* the young boy wondered.

But could he even carry a basic tune? It was soon discovered that the boy had a clear soprano voice, and that the question of whether he could sing was only the beginning of the journey. Before long, he was asked to sing a duet at the 10:00pm Christmas Eve Mass. Soon more opportunities followed: singing *Panis Angelicus* in Latin for Maundy Thursday, singing for the church's Easter Vigil, and—at the ripe age of thirteen—being introduced to the organ and realizing that church music wasn't just something reserved for Sundays, but was quickly becoming a passion.

Scene Two: A mid-sized congregation in an eastern city called a new music director. For several decades they had enjoyed a significant music ministry, including students and faculty at a local college and several area musicians who called this church home. Over the years, however, most of that had faded. This new music director was hired to "create the magic" once again, but the neighborhood, the congregation, and the world had changed.

Shortly after the new director arrived, a teenager from the neighborhood was hanging out in the church yard, clearly bored and looking for mischief. The music director got to know the kid and found out that he had always wanted to play timpani. Ironically, just a few days before, the director had discovered a neglected set of timpani locked in a basement room—a relic from a more glorious time. He dug them out and gave the kid some basic instruction. That Easter, the worshiping congregation sang accompanied by their spirited new organist—and a grinning teenager playing timpani, his first time in a worship service.

Scene Three: A suburban congregation of more than 3,000 members was deeply committed to outreach to the homeless population. This congregation was served by a music minister who consistently discovered and nurtured people's gifts. As a result, the

congregation enjoyed an enormous and flourishing music ministry, including a principal adult choir of more than 100 voices.

One day a homeless man showed up. He was fascinated by the music and the spirit of the congregation and stayed around. As he got to know people, including the music minister and some members of the choir, he confessed that once upon a time he had been a decent trumpet player. Full disclosure: this man had challenges. In addition to being homeless, he experienced several phobias, including a need to keep a bag of rocks under each arm—only he knew why. Other members of the choir befriended him, and in time the choir pooled their resources and bought him a used trumpet, which became a prized possession. He turned out to be not only quite gifted but also deeply loyal to the choir and the music ministry. Several times after that, in the chancel of this elegant legacy congregation with a truly big heart, stood a somewhat shabby trumpeter wearing an old overcoat (to keep the rocks under his arms), joining in the worship of God with his trumpet.

What do these stories have in common? For one thing, they’re all true—the first story is actually mine. Beyond that, they illustrate a common reality: most people think church musicians are hired to create music for the church. Our actual calling, however, is to help other people create the church’s music. Whether you’re the only musician in a small congregation or the principal professional responsible for a large and diverse ministry, music ministry is about using the gifts God has given us to discover and nurture the gifts God has given others.

Music ministry allows us to be invested in our people, starting with the congregation as a whole. How can we nurture more enthusiastic singing? How can we make hymns and the liturgy more meaningful? How can we draw out musical gifts and expand the congregation’s repertoire?

Music ministry also requires us to be constantly on the lookout for people who have gifts and interest in music—especially children and youth—and to make room for them to discover the joy of sharing those gifts.

Finally, music ministry asks us to respond with grace and humility when—not if—those who are first sharing their gifts may fall a little short of the congregation’s expectations, or even our own. In doing so, we develop a healthy, gospel-shaped humility, discovering the joy of growing alongside the people we serve while cultivating an atmosphere of grace and gratitude.

At the center of worship today is...worship. Micah 6:1-8 is about worship. Now, we can get caught up in the final three verses of this passage, which, to be fair, are profound and worth deep exploration. When we get to verses six through eight, we find out that the fruit of what we do outside the walls of the worship space matters more than what happens in the worship space.

SUNDAY, FEBRUARY 8, 2026

Glory Revealed: Call to Action

Lectionary Readings: **Isaiah 58:1-12; Psalm 112:1-9; 1 Corinthians 2:1-12 (13-16); Matthew 5:13-20**

Rooted in Micah's vision of justice, mercy, and humility, we hear Isaiah gently but firmly calling us to act, beginning with confession. As Lent draws near, this practice becomes an opening of the heart, making room for love to move within us. In the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus reminds us that such love is never meant to stay contained; it flows outward as blessing. Confession, then, is not about shame, but about healing, restoring wholeness in ourselves so we may help bring wholeness to others.

SUNDAY, FEBRUARY 15, 2026

Transfiguration Sunday

Glory Revealed

Lectionary Readings: Exodus 24:12-18; Psalm 2
or Psalm 99; 2 Peter 1:16-21; Matthew 17:1-9

Transfiguration Sunday offers us a bridge from the Light of the season of Epiphany to the Reflection of Light into Steadfast Love in the season of Lent. The Transfiguration is a foretaste of the glory of Resurrection, a revelation of Jesus' divinity that has been hidden in mystery, yet is no less real. The Transfiguration does not erase Jesus' humanity, it demonstrates the union of full humanity and full divinity in the person of Jesus.


Lenten Season Soup & Bread Dinner & Devotionals

Every year, we gather to share our year in review as well as our plan moving forward for the year to come. At our Annual Meeting, we will note those whose membership relationship with St. John's has changed, those who have passed to the Church Triumphant, and those who have been received in covenant relationship with us. These are important and sacred moments of witness.

We will also present our plan for utilizing the estate gift of Adrienne Keisbar. Various ministry area groups have prepared project ideas with estimates of funding needs. The Stewardship & Finance Committee and Consistory have reviewed the projects and shared recommendations to advance these opportunities to grow and improve our facilities and our outreach. They will also share a recommendation for retaining a portion of the estate funds to be added to our endowment to provide for ministry support for years to come.

There will also be some minor language changes to our Constitution and Bylaws to accommodate the transitions from the Penn Northeast Conference (PNEC) to the new Keystone Conference UCC in 2026, as well as our previous area now being in the governance model of the Mountain Valley Association.

In addition, each area of our ministry, and there are many, shares a report of their activity in 2025. Our focus this year builds once again on our mission affirmation... "We Worship, We Love, We Serve - No Matter What!" Each ministry area is asked to describe how our ministry has risen above challenges and changes to grow St John's.

Our report book is available for you to view online and download, and it was emailed to those for whom we have this preference selected. We are only printing 20 copies of the 51 page report book for those who want a copy. Please let the church office know so we can reserve a copy for you. Per our Bylaws, the Annual Meeting report book has been prepared and circulated two weeks prior to the Annual Meeting. Join us as the congregation gathers in Fox Hall following worship on February 1. Bring your favorite food item to share. Our lunch will be potluck.





"Souper Bowl of Caring"



Each year thousands of individuals and groups from all 50 states participate in the "Souper Bowl of Caring." In the last 35 years, over 300,000 groups have participated and have generated more than \$220 million in monetary and food donations for food banks and community-based charities.

It's an annual event where communities come together, inspired by football's Super Bowl, to tackle hunger locally. As millions of people tune in to watch football's Super Bowl, we're also tuning in to the needs of our neighbors. The "Souper Bowl of Caring" is about taking action to fight hunger at the local level, ensuring that no one has to go without the food they need.

For all of January and up to February 8, we are collecting all kinds of canned soups for "Souper Bowl of Caring." Our goal is to

collect 250 cans of soup. We particularly request everyone to bring a can of soup on Super Bowl Sunday, February 8. Our Confirmation Class will be on hand with soup pots after worship if you would like to give a monetary donation. All contributions will go to the Whitehall Food Pantry.

Whether you're a sports fan or not, it's a chance to be part of something bigger. Let's come together as a team to tackle hunger. Every can and every dollar count in the fight against food insecurity and make a real difference in the lives of those who need it the most. About The Whitehall Food Pantry

The Whitehall Food Pantry was established in 1974 at St. Stephen's Episcopal Church, located at 3900 Mechanicsville Rd. in Whitehall, and has been serving Whitehall and surrounding community residents ever since.

About 50% of the food supplies have been obtained from Second Harvest Food Bank (state and federal grants based on the number of recipients). Second Harvest serves six counties in Northeastern PA, distributing over four million pounds of food each year through 84 food pantries like the one in Whitehall. However, in more recent months, the pantries along with Second Harvest are experiencing serious declines in food supplies due to political and economic pressures.

The remaining food supply comes from individual donations and a generous community effort with the active collaboration of Whitehall churches: Faith Lutheran (Whitehall), St. John's Lutheran (Fullerton), First Presbyterian (Hokendauqua), St. John's UCC (Mickley), and St. John's UCC (Fullerton). Individuals from other churches and the community will also drop off food and volunteer.

Civic groups and area businesses play a large part in the pantry support as well. Every Monday morning, Whitehall Food Pantry volunteers pick up several cases of food from the Giant Food Store (Coplay), Redner's Markets (Whitehall), and Weis Market (Whitehall). Chick-fil-A and Egypt Star Bakery also provide regular food donations.

Many volunteers across our community give of their time, which is the cornerstone for sustainability and growth of the food pantry. The pantry continues to expand its outreach, serving about 200 different families each month and over 4,600 individuals in the course of a year. Some of their families just need short-term emergency aid while others suffer continuing situations. If you are in need of food assistance, the pantry is accepting new and returning clients and you can contact Doreen Wagner at (484) 246-5715 for an appointment.

For the month of February, we are collecting cans of soup for "Souper Bowl of Caring," pancake mix, pancake syrup, and coffee. Items can be placed in the shopping cart found in the coatroom area next to the sanctuary. Other food items as well as monetary donations are always welcome. If you would like to volunteer at the pantry on the 4th Monday of every month, please contact Gary Black at (484) 274-2405 or email him at gary.t.black@outlook.com

Update on Other Mission Outreaches

- December's special offering for the Christmas Fund amounted to \$470,00. It is an annual UCC offering for retired and active UCC pastors and lay church workers and their families facing financial need. A check was sent to UCC National.
- At the end of 2025, the profit received from the sales of our Crafters "Keeping You in Stitches" amounted to \$1,224.51. The funds were given back to St. John's for the Property Fund to be used to help purchase a new kitchen stove.
- At the end of 2025, the 10% tithing from all our fundraisers amounted to \$1,981.08. Those funds were divided in half with \$990.54 each given to Lehigh Conference of Churches and the Whitehall Food Pantry.


