"...then come, follow me."

- Luke 18:22

Every time I hear Bryan Sirchio's song, "Follow Me (87 Times)," where he reports that someone counted eighty-seven occasions in the New Testament where Jesus asked people to follow him, I am reminded how important listening for and responding to God's guidance and direction is in my personal spiritual life as well as in my preaching and teaching. As Bryan's song goes, [Jesus] never said, "Come acknowledge my existence" or "Believe in me, I'm the second person of the Trinity," but eighty-seven times, he said, "Follow me." According to Jesus, faith is much more than an intellectual assent to some specific doctrine. Faith is something that propels us to action and may very well change the way we live our lives.

Psalm 121 reminds us that the idea of the faithful life being a sojourn, an on-going journey towards God, is a very old concept. Psalm 121 has been nicknamed "a traveler's psalm," historically, it was probably sung by the Hebrew people as they journeyed to Jerusalem to celebrate one of the holy feasts. In the psalm, the travelers confess their faith not only in an awesome God, the "maker of heaven and earth," but also in a very personal God, "the keeper of Israel," who guided the steps of each and every pilgrim to the Holy City. But the movement of the psalm itself suggests a wider application referring to life itself as a journey: the last verse promising, "The Lord will keep your going out and your coming in from this time forward and forevermore."

The image of life as a circle with us posed stationary in the center, surrounded by familiar family, friends, possessions and routines might feel more comfortable, but it is the image of life as an on-going journey that has been consistent throughout the Biblical witness. Jesus also never said, "Gather round me here in this building," or even "Agree with what I am saying." But eighty-seven times, he said, "Follow me." Even to Jerusalem.

Do It Yourself (DIY) Palm Sunday Palms!

Do you know why Jesus was greeted with waving palm branches when he rode a donkey into Jerusalem the week before he was crucified?

Many in that first century crowd hailed Jesus as the new King of Israel, so they joyfully greeted him as they would any celebrated figure at that time, including royalty, conquerors and even victors of Grecian games. Calling out “Hosanna!” (an exclamation of praise also meaning “save us” or “Savior”), they lined his path with articles of clothing, and enthusiastically cut branches off native trees, which happened to be palm trees, to wave triumphantly and scatter in his path as he rode by. In ancient times, palm branches symbolized goodness, well-being, grandeur, steadfastness, and victory.

So... most of us don't have palm trees growing nearby, and since we will be celebrating Palm Sunday (March 28th) via Zoom and will not be able to distribute palm branches prior to worship, how can we celebrate Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem this year?

But if you're not feeling that crafty, look around! If there were a parade to greet Jesus in your neighborhood today, what would you wave as a symbol of welcome, joy and victory?

Bring whatever you come up with to Zoom worship on 3/28 - we'll ask God's blessing on whatever we bring and imagine Palm Sunday in a new way this year!




We also need volunteers for our craft projects. We could use help if your talents include: knitting, crocheting, sewing, counted cross stitch, gluing and assembling of crafts.

MARCH MUSIC NOTES



Palm Sunday Jesus rides into Jerusalem surrounded by shouts of glory, only to be left alone to die on the cross, abandoned by even his closest friends. We will triumphantly sing *All Glory, Laud, and Honor*. But there will be a change in tone with conversation about how Passion/Palm Sunday gives us space to be loud and quiet, to wave our palms and also to lay them down. This is the beginning of Holy Week and our service will end with singing the hymn *Ah, Holy Jesus*.

Ah, Holy Jesus might be an unfamiliar hymn to many. The background of the hymn is quite interesting. It is believed to be based on an eleventh-century Latin meditation. The text was written by Johann Heermann who was born in Austria in 1585. He was one of five children who survived and his health was not good. He lost property and nearly his life during the Thirty Years War. He became a Lutheran minister in 1611 but stopped preaching in 1634 due to a severe throat infection. Many hymns and poems are credited to Heermann. His hymns are distinguished by depth and tenderness of feeling, by firm faith and confidence in the face of trial and by deep love to Christ and humble submissiveness to the will of God. Heermann did not ask “why me”, but “why Thee”. Why did Jesus have to suffer when we are all guilty of sin? But the good news is that Christ who died to remove Johann Heermann’s guilt, died to remove our guilt too. Because of Christ it is possible for us to be right with God. That is the good news as proclaimed by this hymn.

The tune was composed by Johann Cruger and J. S. Bach used the tune in both St. Matthew Passion and St. John Passion.

As the Passion/Palm Sunday service is ended on a somber note, may we move into Holy Week remembering Christ’s last meal with his disciples and to focus on His commandment: “Love one another”; and gather in solemn devotion on Good Friday with Jesus’s disciples at the foot of the cross and pray for the whole world as Christ’s death offers life to all. Departing silently, we anticipate the Resurrection of Our Lord on Easter Day.
