Happy New Year, Church!

This is the time of year when we begin to look forward thinking about what the new year will bring. At St. J's, we began 2020 with Epiphany. We were reminded that Christmas isn't over until the Magi, the wise ones, bring their gifts to the Christ Child. At St. J's the gift giving wasn't over! The worshippers randomly selected a star gift.



The star gift was a word. A gift from God for the year ahead.

The word may have been very timely, the receiver knowing immediately the word's meaning in their life. The gift may have been a word that's meaning would become clearer as the year went on. Or the word's meaning may change for the receiver through the year ahead. The worshippers were encouraged to keep their star gift where they could see it every day . . . a constant reminder of the gift received from God through 2020.

(even though I couldn't imagine what person would need the word Shelter) . . .and to my surprise my star gift word was... "Shelter". I am not quite sure what meaning "Shelter" will have in my life this coming year, nor why the Spirit chose it for me, yet I am convinced it was the word I was meant to receive.

On St. J's Facebook page many of our members shared their own star gift words and what they thought they meant for this new year. Others requested star gifts be picked for them. Whatever your star gift word is, my prayer is that you will spend time with God as you reflect on its meaning throughout the entire year.

Bob Bold Retires from Parkland School Board

After half a century in education, Robert Bold retired this month from the unpaid post he held for the last 20 years on the Parkland School Board. Bob began his career in education in 1967 as a teacher at what was then Harrison-Morton Junior High in Allentown and later moved to Allen High School, where he taught industrial arts — or what was then called "shop" — for most of his career. He retired in 1997, did some substitute teaching and joined the Parkland School Board in 1999.

Over the last two decades, Bold served as board president five times and vice president three times and as president of the Carbon Lehigh Intermediate Unit since 2009. He is credited with advocating for the creation of the Parkland Education Foundation, which since 2011 has raised more than \$1 million for special projects and needs in the district's schools. In 2018, the Parkland teachers union gave him its first Friend of Education Award for his advocacy for children, education and educators.



Here is how the pastoral roles have changed for the few months until our Interim Senior Pastor begins at which time Pastor Cliff will leave the staff and Pastors Michelle and Dave will go back to their regular ministerial duties.

◆ Pastor Michelle will continue as Acting Lead Pastor - *Full time Her responsibilities include: Head of Staff, Primary Worship Leader/Planner - focus on creative/blended worship, preaching 2X/month, Sacraments & Rites, Consistory Retreat, new member sessions as needed, oversee current ministerial responsibilities, delegating to others as necessary

Committees: CE, Youth Ministry, CELC Board Meetings, Staff Meetings, Elders & Consistory, Music & Worship, STARs, Stewardship & Finance, Personnel, Interior and Church Usage

◆ Pastor Dave will continue as Visitation Pastor - *Part time
His responsibilities include: all emergencies M-F, hospital visits, & Primary Funeral Pastor, along with current responsibilities

Committees: Visitation Committee, Staff Meetings, Elders & Consistory (as able/desired)

◆ Pastor Cliff will be our Bridge Associate Pastor - *Part time
His responsibilities include: Worship leadership, preaching 2x/month, deliver children's messages
on rotating basis, share in Sacraments & Rites as needed, weekend on call, Friday office hours
(Pastor Michelle's day off) help with pastoral care/funerals as needed by Visitation Pastor, develop
new Bible study or Sr. lunch fellowship program, extra duties as requested

Meet Our Bridge Associate Pastor

I am the Rev. Cliff Herring, who will be serving as a Bridge Associate Pastor at St. John's until the interim arrives in the spring. My position is simply to help Pastors Michelle and David by staffing some committees, preaching every other week, and helping in any other ways as needed. I plan to be in the church office on Fridays from 9:30 to 11:30 AM.

I am a retired UCC Pastor who has served in the Penn Northeast Conference for my entire career. Before I retired I was the Pastor at St. John's UCC (Howertown) just outside of Northampton. Since retirement, I have served at Bethel UCC, Slatington; Emmanuel UCC, Allentown; and Salem UCC, Pocono Pines among others. Many people know me through my hobby which is riding roller coasters. I belong to ACE (American Coaster Enthusiasts) which is a club of over 7,000 people who enjoy this hobby. I have travelled extensively to visit amusement parks throughout the US, Canada, and the United Kingdom.

I am thrilled to be serving at St. John's and look forward to meeting many of you as we walk through this time of transition together.



Now is the time to plan for 2020 Tax Return!! Have an IRA? Now, or soon to be over 70 1/2?

Have you ever thought you would like to increase giving to St. John's, but could not fit it into your budget? While most of us are still struggling with 2019 tax returns, it may be helpful to start planning for **2020** returns.

While everyone should do this planning, it is especially true for individuals over 70 ½ who must take a "Required Minimum Distribution" from an IRA account. With proper planning, directing some of this RMD to the church can be beneficial to you personally, as well as to St. John's. It can be a way of increasing contributions while, at the same time, not costing anything additional.

There is logic behind this: For anyone who is not able to itemize deductions under the new tax law there would be no credit for contributions. One alternative is to make contributions <u>directly</u> from a 401k to St. John's. By doing so, reportable and taxable income from the IRA is reduced—hence the tax savings.

Consider, for example, contributing \$2,000 as a direct payment from the financial institution to the church. (It would not have to be lump-sum. Any timeline or increment of contributions could be chosen.) Envelope contributions of this \$2,000 may not be tax deductible if thresholds for itemizing are not met. On the other hand, a direct IRA distribution would reduce reportable income by that amount and could result in a \$500 tax savings (assuming a 25% tax bracket).

Therefore, these "savings" can be used to increase donations to the church with a net, "no cost" to you. While this may not work for everyone, prudent financial planning requires that one look at all options. And, this is one that may be worth considering.

For additional information, you may contact Tom Moyer or John Viglione. But, as with any such decisions, it is always recommended that these be made with the advice of a financial advisor.



Church Envelopes - Furnace Fund

This past year St. John's was faced with a financial dilemma. There was an urgent need to replace our heating system with a bid of just under \$60,000 – but there were no funds to address this issue.

Stewardship and Finance deliberated the issue and decided that, since the Capital Campaign funding envelopes were ending 2020, a substitute titled Furnace Fund would be created. This is not a pledge situation, but rather a request that members consider contributing to replenish the funds take from the Capital Campaign.

This funding method of borrowing from ourselves, saves the significant interest that would have accrued from that size of a loan. While it will delay some of the work envisioned by the Capital Campaign, there is confidence that this will only be a temporary delay.

When you notice the envelope mailings that you receive, please note the red-bordered envelope that appears once a month and help to replenish funds needed to fulfill our Capital Campaign goals.

Endowment-Legacy Tree Update

This past fall, a new leaf was added to our Legacy Tree which is located in the church parlor. It is in memory of long-time member, Thomas Broad, and represents the family's contribution to our Endowment Fund.

Over the years, this fund has generated significant income from its balance of over \$400,000. The legal document which governs the fund's use dictates that contributions can never be spent. (Only a percentage of annual income can be withdrawn and these proceeds have been used to help finance the operations of the church.) To date, well over \$100,000 has been applied to our budget from this fund. It remains a goal that this fund balance would reach \$500,000.

Endowment contributions provide an opportunity for members to honor or memorialize a family member. As you look to those special occasions, consider joining the ranks of those who have done so.





Church World Service Hygiene Kits



Church World Service (CWS) was founded in 1946 and is a cooperative ministry of 37 Christian denominations and communions, providing sustainable self-help, development, disaster relief, and refugee assistance around the world. When disasters like earthquakes, hurricanes, tornadoes, or wildfires strike, CWS works with partners on the scene to provide shelter, food and water, blankets, recovery kits, counseling – the basics needed to ensure the survival of individuals and communities at risk. CWS's mission is to eradicate hunger and poverty and to promote peace and justice through collaborations with partners here in the United States and around the world.

During the month of February, we will be collecting items for CWS's Hygiene Kits.

Our goal is to provide 25 kits. You can help by donating the following needed items:

- ◆ Hand towel measuring approximately 15" x 28" to 16" x 32" (**no** fingertip, bath, dish towel or micro-fiber)

HealthCare Ministry

Medical marijuana vs. recreational marijuana: What is the difference?

Recreational marijuana is any form of marijuana that is used without medical justification. There are currently 11 states and Washington, D.C. where the use of recreational marijuana is legal. Recreational marijuana strains are typically more THC-dominant. THC produces psychoactive effects and the "high" associated with marijuana. In the states where recreational marijuana is legal, anyone over 21 can buy recreational marijuana from a dispensary with a valid photo ID.

While derived from the same plant and fundamentally the same, medical marijuana and recreational marijuana often elicit different effects due to the type of products that are manufactured and sold to the two consumer bases. The strains of marijuana sold in medical dispensaries are typically richer in cannabidiol (CBD). CBD-dominant strains do not elicit the psychoactive effects associated with THC and are more common among medical marijuana patients. To receive a recommendation, patients must have a qualifying medical condition. Some examples of qualifying conditions so far are ALS, Cancer, Crohn's disease, Epilepsy, Glaucoma, HIV/AIDS, Multiple Sclerosis, Parkinson's disease, PTSD, Anxiety, Depression, Migraines and Chronic nonmalignant pain. These qualifications do vary between states. Medical marijuana patients receive an official ID card that they must have to purchase their marijuana products. Medical marijuana is legal in 33 states in the US.

Research is still needed and ongoing to verify Marijuana's effectiveness on medical conditions. The FDA, the US agency that regulates medicines, hasn't approved the plant as a treatment for any conditions. It did approve a manmade cannabinoid medicine for nausea due to chemotherapy and for severe epilepsy. However, many people do claim to find relief of some symptoms through using marijuana. To take medical marijuana, you can smoke it, inhale it from a vaporizer, eat it (in a brownie or lollipop), apply it to your skin, or place a few drops under your tongue.

Some side effects of medical marijuana that have been reported are bloodshot eyes, depression, dizziness, fast heartbeat, hallucinations and/or low blood pressure. The drug can also affect judgment and coordination, which could lead to accidents or injuries. Marijuana contains some of the same chemicals found in tobacco so there are concerns that smoking it can harm the lungs. The higher the level of THC in a marijuana product and the more it is used could lead to dependency.

Most importantly, be careful where you buy your marijuana. If you buy it illegally, on the street, you don't know for sure what you are getting. It could be mixed with more powerful drugs or ingredients that could result in harm or death. Secondly, medical marijuana dispensaries, although more reliable can still vary in the quality and purity of their products, so proceed with caution. Several studies done in CA and WA states showed that the amount of marijuana that was supposed to be in brownies sold to patients was far less than what was advertised. If you have a medical condition that warrants giving marijuana a try, talk to your doctor to get their advice and possible recommendation.
