

Here's What You Need to Get Started

In Chinese brush painting, artist and brush work together as one. A brush painting takes only a few minutes to complete from start to finish; clean-cut brushstrokes are applied directly to the paper without previous planning or pencil sketching. Compositions are based solely on the imagination or memory of the painter. As Kwan explains, "The scenery comes from no particular earthly place and ends in a place we cannot see."


Before you can master Chinese brush painting, you must learn about traditional materials and guiding principles—and how things like viewpoint, center of interest, balance and perspective differ from Western art. An introductory chapter explains it all:

- **Brushes.** "I am able to achieve all the effects I want with a single sheep hair brush," says Kwan. "It is an extension of my artistic self."
- **Inks.** Including how to achieve the right consistency.
- **Paper.** Various types of traditional rice paper and how to choose the best one for you.
- **Compositions.** How to establish the structure and mood of your painting.
- **Brushwork.** 10 elegant strokes, illustrated one by one in a painting of a prawn, are all you need to express your ideas.

Become Familiar With Your Materials

In chapter 1, Kwan introduces you to specific brush painting materials. White sheep hair brushes hold more water than a sable and will allow you to paint expressive brushstrokes without running dry. Save sables for the fine details.

Ink sticks and grinding stones have been used in brush painting for a thousand years. You can combine liquid ink with the dry ink from the sticks to create a suitable consistency.



Chinese Brush Painting Step by Step includes 12 progressive projects to help you develop a strong foundation in Chinese brush painting techniques. They cover a range of traditional subjects, from the four most commonly painted subjects in Chinese brush painting—bamboo, orchids, plum blossoms and chrysanthemums—to pandas, horses and Mandarin ducks.

The beauty of Chinese brush painting is in the expressiveness and economy of stroke—the bold, smashing strokes used to create a hibiscus...the fast-action strokes that capture the swift wings of the swallow...the plunging and dotting strokes that create the peony...the twistings and turnings of grapevine. Through these step-by-step lessons, you'll learn to capture in a few interpretive strokes the flight of birds, the essential characteristics of plants and flowers, the continuous movement of goldfish, the whole world around you.

Because brush painting is so steeped in tradition, Kwan takes time to share insights on the symbolic meaning in these paintings. For example, bamboo exemplifies the man who has an open mind and integrity, who is humble and has a straightforward personality. The orchid represents the individual who can live the simple monastic life in the mountains, free from the luxuries and entertainment of the city. And plum blossoms, which bloom in the late winter, symbolize the kind of person who can create fine things in the midst of adversity.





Learn Art Techniques and Principles

In Chinese brush painting, the goal is to paint how you feel about your subject rather than the actual facts of what you see. Use the same standard—how you feel about it—to measure the quality of your paintings. By looking at and feeling the characteristics of a finished painting, you can learn how to capture the mood and effect you want to create in new paintings.

Putting this concept into action, Kwan uses a series of side-by-side painting comparisons to drive home important tenants: the bird's eye view vs. the horizontal view, airy vs. stuffy, solid vs. superficial, unified vs. chaotic, vitality vs. static, etc.



Vitality vs. Static Sameness is less favorable in Chinese brush painting. Every brushstroke should have its own size, length, texture and color.

Unified vs. Chaotic The directional flow of the brushwork and painting is unified or chaotic. You can control how you want to depict the subject matter by the style of brushwork you choose.
