



5 General Principles (& many ethical standards)

- A. Beneficence & Non-maleficence**
 - Protection from harm, Cost/Benefits analysis, Confidentiality
- B. Fidelity & Responsibility**
 - Uphold professional and scientific standards of contact
- C. Integrity**
 - Honesty and accuracy in science
- D. Justice**
 - Freedom from coercion
- E. Respect for people's rights and dignity**
 - Basic courtesy, Informed consent, Debriefing, Avoid deception

When the author and publisher are the same (as in the examples), omit the publisher name to avoid repetition. To cite a specific section of an ethics code, create a reference to the full code and then indicate the specific section in the in-text citation. Use the language of the code to refer to sections (e.g., sections, provisions, standards). Here are some examples: Parenthetical citations to sections of an ethics code: (American Counseling Association, 2014, Section A.1.d.; American Nurses Association, 2015, Provision 1.4; American Psychological Association, 2017, Standard 3.04) Narrative citations to sections of an ethics code: American Counseling Association (2014, Section A.1.d.), American Nurses Association (2015, Provision 1.4), and American Psychological Association (2017, Standard 3.04) The format for any APA reference is: Author. (Date). Title. Access information. The first step is to have the document either in hand or displayed so that you can easily locate the information needed for each segment of the reference. Author (Who wrote it?): NAEYC Date (When it was published): 2009 Title (What is it named?): Developmentally Appropriate Practice in Early Childhood Programs Serving Children from Birth through Age 8 [Position Statement] Access (Where can I access it?) Located online at So, putting this all together, the APA reference would look like this: Find articles in journals, magazines, newspapers, and more. The APA 7th edition Publication Manual provides discussion of how to cite websites in the body of a paper: Therefore, if one were following normal APA procedures (and the guidance of our citation software, NoodleTools), one might create a reference that looked more or less like the one below (group author, date, title, source information URL): National Association for the Education of Young Children. If this method was chosen, the matching in-text citation might look like: The National Association for the Education of Young Children (NAEYC) website has a great deal of information, resources, and educational resources for those working with children age 0-8 (NAEYC, 2012). In fact, its "professional development" section has some phenomenal resources that all early childhood practitioners should be aware of including online learning opportunities, DVDs, and more (NAEYC, 2012). If one is referring to specific parts or pieces of information from the website, then the reference would be to the individual page within the website.
