Introduction

VATSIM is a free network which allows you to log in as a Pilot or Controller, and communicate with one another as if in real life.

It's a global network and hosts regular busy events worldwide but it does require some preparation before jumping in for the first time!

This document relates to Radio Telephony – that is – what you will need to say on the radio when using the VATSIM Network. Dependant on country, it will differ slightly but this pdf will use UK RT as a base for you.

As a reminder – this is only to cover the basics. You can read the CAP 413 Document written by the Civil Aviation Authority in the UK. That covers everything you need in great detail. I hope you find it useful for simulation use only

CAA Publication CAP 413

Always remember – don't interrupt in the middle of messages between controllers and other aircraft. Wait for a natural gap to transmit.

CALLSIGNS

Airlines use pre-assigned company call signs to identify themselves to controllers... you'll recognise famous call signs like SPEEDBIRD for British Airways, EASY for EasyJet and so on

Be sure to check the company code designator when you log into VATSIM to make sure it is accurate

i.e. British Airways = "BAW"

If you are using an airline callsign, you cannot shorten it unless told to by ATC. If you flight number is ACA 2948 for example, you must call up as "Air Canada 2948" and so on

If you are a Heavy aircraft, you would also add "Heavy" to the end of your call sign as well

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What about General Aviation?

As an example, you're in a Cessna 172 and your registration on the aircraft is G-BRAV. The following page gives an example of how you would call up in this case

Example



Coventry Tower, Golf Bravo Romeo Alpha Victor (G-BRAV) on the South Apron with Information Bravo, request taxi to the active

G-BRAV (read phonetically), Coventry Tower Information B correct, taxi to Runway 23 hold at Echo





Taxi to Runway 23 hold at Echo Golf – Alpha Victor (G- AV)

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Here, we initially call up with the full aircraft registration at first contact with a controller – but then use the abbreviated registration of G-AV instead of G-BRAV.

What about Aircraft Type Codes?

Be sure to check what aircraft you are using when flying on the network and connect with the correct type code

Currently Microsoft Flight Simulator only has a few aircraft types available – and each aircraft has a unique code – they aren't always what you would guess either

A quick google search of your aircraft followed by "type code" usually brings up the answer you need but to give a few ideas:

| Aircraft | Type Code |
