I was beyond nervous to fly across the world and fully engulf myself in a culture that I knew nothing about. On my first day of teaching first graders English, I quickly connected with a young girl named **Anong**. As she caught on to the words I was teaching her, I could see the thankfulness in her eyes. At the end of the day, she put her (do gesture) thumb and her pointer finger together forming a heart while she waved goodbye with her other hand. I asked my guide what this meant. He said that because of the language barrier this is how they say "**Thank you and I appreciate you**."

This was the moment I knew that I wanted to carry on my newfound passion for philanthropy into college and beyond. So to start, I would like to say **thank you** and I **appreciate you all for coming** with the same gesture that changed my life. *do gesture*

My name is Anna Riedl and I joined Phi Gamma Nu in the Fall of 2019. I served as the philanthropy chair in the Spring of 2021 because of the same drive which pushed me to join - to encompass the philanthropic culture of Phi Gamma Nu.

The memory I shared with you just now was an emotional moment for me; it was the moment I realized that putting someone else's needs before my own provided me with feelings of **wholeness** and **love** - emotions that I have continued to chase. This is what philanthropy means to me and - **what I quickly realized** - is what philanthropy means to Phi Gamma Nu, an organization filled with **like-minded**, **altruistic** individuals that feel the same strong connection to giving back as I do.

Partnerships with local organizations have not only worked because of our **commitment** to their **missions**, but have **thrived** because of the **personal bonds** we have formed with each person. I remember experiencing this first hand when I volunteered at my first event at **Urbana Prairie Winds**, a local assisted living facility. We strive to support a community that has given us a *home away from home* while we pursue our college education. These are just a few of the many events that we participate in. Bettering your surroundings means bettering yourself.
