The Morning Scriptures

A reading from the prophet Isaiah 40:28-31-

Do you not know? Have you not heard? The LORD is the everlasting God, the Creator of the ends of the earth. He will not grow tired or weary, and his understanding no one can fathom. He gives strength to the weary and increases the power of the weak. Even youths grow tired and weary, and young men stumble and fall; but those who hope in the LORD will renew their strength. They will soar on wings like eagles; they will run and not grow weary, they will walk and not be faint. A reading from Paul's first letter to the Corinthian Christians, chapter 9, verses 16-23;

For when I preach the gospel, I cannot boast, since I am compelled to preach. Woe to me if I do not preach the gospel! If I preach voluntarily, I have a reward; if not voluntarily, I am simply discharging the trust committed to me. What then is my reward? Just this: that in preaching the gospel I may offer it free of charge, and so not make full use of my rights as a preacher of the gospel. Though I am free and belong to no one, I have made myself a slave to everyone, to win as many as possible. To the Jews I became like a Jew, to win the Jews. To those under the law I became like one under the law (though I myself am not under the law), so as to win those under the law. To those not having the law I became like one not having the law (though I am not free from God's law but am under Christ's law), so as to win those not having the law. To the weak I became weak, to win the weak. I have become all things to all people so that by all possible means I might save some. I do all this for the sake of the gospel, that I may share in its blessings.

A Reading From the Gospel of Mark, Chapter 1, verses 29-39

As soon as they left the synagogue, they went with James and John to the home of Simon and Andrew. Simon's mother-in-law was in bed with a fever, and they immediately told Jesus about her. So he went to her, took her hand and helped her up. The fever left her and she began to wait on them. That evening after sunset the people brought to Jesus all the sick and demonpossessed. The whole town gathered at the door, ³⁴ and Jesus healed many who had various diseases. He also drove out many demons, but he would not let the demons speak because they knew who he was. Very early in the morning, while it was still dark, Jesus got up, left the house and went off to a solitary place, where he prayed. Simon and his companions went to look for him, and when they found him, they exclaimed: "Everyone is looking for you!" Jesus replied, "Let us go somewhere else—to the nearby villages—so I can preach there also. That is why I have come." So he traveled throughout Galilee, preaching in their synagogues and driving out demons.

FROM MY HEART TO YOURS...

Dear Friends,

Today is the fifth and last Sunday of Epiphany, the climax of Christmastide. The term "epiphany" in Greek means "to manifest" or "to show." Today's lectionary readings are from the prophet Isaiah and the Gospel of Mark. Isaiah assures people that God gives strength to the faint-hearted. The Gospel lesson records the beginning of Jesus' ministry of healing.

When Epiphany began weeks ago, we were recalling the story of the wisemen and the spread of the Gospel to the world. We affirmed that Jesus is the eternal word of God that is spoken in the darkness of this world, and that we are the ones to insure the prophecy that Christ's light will never be overcome by darkness.

One cause of darkness in the world is the subject of one of our nation's celebrations this month. February is black history month. May the light of Christ shine on us in such a way that we are enlightened, inspired, and taught (again) that <u>all people</u> are blessed by the life, ministry, and sacrifice of Jesus Christ. And may we participate in shedding that light.
