




St. Lucia Festivities - Sunday, December 13th

<u>Spiritual Morsels</u>

When one keeps silent, he is given time and freedom for prayer and concentration, but when he passes his hours carelessly, he does not have time to pray. Furthermore, through his careless speech he accumulates various sins. For this reason the Holy Fathers placed the virtue of silence at the summit of the virtues, for without it no virtue is able to remain in the soul of man. **Elder Ephraim of Arizona**

A brother asked **Abba Poemen**, "If I see my brother sin, is it right to say nothing about it?" The old man replied, "whenever we cover our brother's sin, God will cover ours; whenever we tell people about our brother's guilt, God will do the same about ours."

"The long-suffering [patience] of God is unchangeable and His mercy is kind...How many criminals are there who go out to kill and rob that He conceals in order that they may not be captured and placed under tortures? Pirates sail the sea and God does not order the sea to drown them. How many falsely swear by Holy Communion and He tolerates not repaying them for that with evil? Robbers steal on the road and He does not give them over to the beasts to tear them to pieces...Libertines go off with prostitutes and He tolerates them. Why all of this? Because He waits for repentance and conversion. Truly, God does not want the destruction of a sinner...That is why, brethren, let us be ashamed before the most lenient Lord God." – **St. John the Merciful, Patriarch of Alexandria**

The saints are, of course, these positive contributors in the long-suffering of God for the sake of the world. It is the prayers of the saints. It is the prayers of the Most Holy Theotokos. And they extend the longsuffering of God. In any case, the main mark of the citizens of the kingdom is longsuffering. Longsuffering is a great medicine in trials, say the Fathers. A great medicine! Long-suffering is very sweet and useful, while sharp gall, anger and bitterness are useless." (unknown)
