



<u>Spiritual Morsels</u>

("If the world is against truth, then I am against the world!" St Athanasius the Great)

Above all this, we have been given humility, which watches over all the virtues and is that great holy strength with which God clothed himself when he came into the world. Humility is the rampart of the virtues, the treasury of works, the saving armour and the cure for every wound.

When they made fine linens, the wrought gold, and all the fittings of the Tabernacle, they covered them with sackcloth (Ex 27:9-16, Jdt 4:11). Humility is least among men but precious and glorious before God. If we acquire it we shall trample the whole force of the enemy underfoot (Luke 10:19). It is said, Whom shall I consider, if not the humble and meek? (Is 66:2). **Abba Pachomius**

It is through whispering that the serpent drove Eve out of Paradise. So he who speaks against his neighbor will be like the serpent; for he corrupts the soul of him who listens to him and he does not save his own soul. **Abba Hyperechius**

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"I cannot say that I have ever met bishops who tried to eliminate the impassible chasm between the levels of the hierarchy and remained in their personal capacity brothers, friends, coworkers and fellow servants at the altar of God. However, unfortunately, this is a rare occurrence. It is astonishing how strongly the social forms of life of every historical movement influence the life of the Church. It is astonishing how rarely you encounter the consciousness that our Christianity is an absolute religion and therefore must lead to the awareness of one's independence from the rest of the world, where any 'structure,' any 'regime,' any 'order' inevitably bears within itself the possibility of abuse, corruption, exploitation, and, subsequently, complete degradation. "If we turn once again to the Church, to what we see in its life for the last two centuries, then we cannot remain indifferent to the fact that bishops who protected the spiritual ('esoteric') [i.e. the inner mystery of the Church's life] and theological principles of the Church are almost an exception to the rule. And in the past, such warriors as Saint Maximus the Confessor or Saint Simeon the New Theologian or Saint Gregory Palamas (before his episcopacy) had to overcome impoverishing spiritual and theological influence of their bishops. The extreme of the perverted understanding of Church hierarchy, which is esoteric [i.e. mystical, hesychastic] in its essence, is, of course, the Vatican. Glory to God that we don't have that. But the tendency to establish 'external' authority is found among us to a greater extent than it should be.
