



Mothers....we would like to ask some of the younger girls to pass out the St. Lucia buns, so please talk with them about it ahead of time. Thank you!









There will come a time when not the persecutions, but money and the goods of this world will take people far from God. Then many more souls will be lost than in the time of the persecutions. On the one hand, they will be putting gold on the domes and will put the crosses on them and, on the other hand, everywhere evil and falsehood will reign. The true Church will always be persecuted. They who want to be saved will be saved with illnesses and afflictions. The way in which the persecutions will occur will be very sly and it will be very difficult for one to foresee the persecutions. Dreadful will be that time; I pity those who will be living then. Fasting is a means and not an end. It is "a tool for training those who desire self-restraint." Without fasting, it is almost impossible to conquer the passions and attain dispassion.

You must not fool yourself. You will not escape from Pharaoh—that is, the devil—and you will not see the heavenly Passover unless you constantly eat bitter herbs and unleavened bread, the bitter herbs of toil and hard fasting, and the unleavened bread of a mind made humble. **Based on Saint John of the Ladder**

<u>The complaint of St. Nektarios</u>: St. Nektarios once appeared to a most-pious cleric and complained: "It's as if we Saints are in retirement...The people don't pray to us, don't entreat us, don't ask us for anything, don't give us any handiwork to do. They don't give us the opportunity to pray to God for them..."

When we show our wounds to the doctor, we mention our pains, our troubling, our illnesses without hiding anything, thus also in confession. We strip our soul, we reveal our wounds, we confess our illness and our personal pain. If this does not occur, we will remain unhealed. Our wounds will grow, the pollution and rotting will advance, the illness will continue undermining our being and sooner or later will lead us to death. *Archimandrite Nektarios Antonopoulos*
