

When **Abba Macarius** lived in Egypt, he returned to his cell one day to discover a thief with a donkey who was stealing his belongings. Pretending that he was not the owner, Macarius helped the load his donkey and sent him away with a smile. He thought "We bring nothing into this world. The Lord gives and the Lord takes away. Blessed be the name of the Lord" Sayings of the Desert Fathers

"Today, children are destroyed by two things: first, the secular world in which we live; secondly, the fact that their parents are largely secular. This secular environment has a great impact. Only a few children will be reserved... Audacity makes children unmanageable. Parents will bring their children to me at say: 'Father, my child is possessed.' And I see that the children - God forbid - do not have a demon; possession is a rare thing. Most of them suffer from external demonic influence. In other words, the demon actually rules their life — not from inside, but from the outside. But even in this way, he manages to get the job done. And how does it all start? It starts with impudence and audacity. When children begin to speak to adults with audacity, they drive God's Grace away. And when God's Grace departs, the demons get to work; children become rowdy, and get into all kinds of mischief. But take children who have reverence and respect, who listen to their parents, their teachers and their elders, and you will see that they are full of Grace and blessed by God. God's Grace protects and shelters them."


"It is actually not unusual to hear even a student at the Athonias Academy to tell the Director, who is a Bishop, 'Holy Director, let's speak man to man.' There is where things have come to. And what's worse, they will come tell you: 'Why? What did I say that was so bad?' He will not say, 'Forgive me, Father, may I have your blessing to express a thought, as dumb as it may be?' Instead, they come to you and speak their mind — as if there were nothing wrong. 'It's your opinion versus mine.' Do you see what I mean? Unfortunately, this same spirit has entered Monasticism and spiritual life. You hear novice monks saying: 'I have told the Elder so many times, but he does not understand me. You know how many times I have told him?' It's like they are saying, 'The Elder will not correct himself.' 'Why,' they go on, 'can't I even express my opinion?' I feel like exploding when I hear such things. And at the end, they will tell you: 'Oh. I didn't realize that I upset you! I'm sorry.' He wants me to forgive him — not for his audacity and impudence, but for making my blood boil!'"

"There are times when I get so upset! You see older, serious people, with high positions in society, having a conversation, and then these children come and interrupt with such audacity — only to say something foolish, and they consider it an achievement. I gesture them to stop interrupting, but nothing. You must put them to shame, before they will stop. Otherwise, they will go on talking. No Patristic text says that young people should talk that way. In fact, we read in the *Gerontikon(*)*: 'An Elder once said...' It does not say anywhere: 'A young man once said...' In the old days, children would not speak in the presence of adults; and they were happy with that. Nor did they sit where the adults sat. They were reserved and respectful... On the Holy Mountain, if a monk did not have a white beard, he was not allowed in the choir. Nowadays, everybody is allowed; novices and pre-novices are gathering around the lectern to chant. At least they should behave with respect and reverence."

In the Holy Eucharist, we accomplish the exchange of our limited and temporal life for the unlimited and infinite life of God. We offer to God a piece of bread and a little wine, but in that bread and wine, we place all our faith, love, humility, expectation of Him, all our life.

And we say to God, 'Thine own of thine own, we offer unto Thee in all and for all.' We offer to God all our life, having prepared ourselves to come and stand before Him and do this act. And God does the same: He accepts man's offering and He puts His life - the Holy Spirit - in the gifts, transmaking them into His Body and Blood, in which all the fullness of Divinity is present, and He says to man, 'The Holy things unto the holy.' God accepts our gifts and fills them with His life, and He renders them back to us.
