



Spiritual Morsels

(“If the world is against truth, then I am against the world!” St. Athanasius the Great)

Nevertheless, even after baptism Satan still acts on the soul, often, indeed, to a greater degree than before. This is not because he is present in the soul together with grace; on the contrary, it is because he uses the body's humours to befog the intellect with the delight of mindless pleasures. God allows him to do this, so that a man, after passing through a trial of storm and fire, may come in the end to the full enjoyment of divine blessings. **St. Diadochus, bishop of Photike**

Working within and around himself, the Christian gives himself entirely to ascesis, but he does this, and is able to do it, only through the ceaseless activity of the divine power that is grace. When you pray, try to mentally embrace the feet of Christ, like the sinful woman. Do not abandon prayer. Fear negligence. If you pray in the morning with devotion, you will "fly" all day. But if you go without prayer, the whole day will be off. **St. Nektarios of Aegina**
