The Zero Dose Immunization Programme empowered ANMs, ASHAs, and community groups to identify and support to reach zero dose children. It motivated frontline workers, addressed vaccine safety concerns, and strengthened collective efforts, significantly advancing timely immunization coverage and community trust."





KEY ACHIEVEMENTS

Achieved 72% linkage for zero dose children (0–2 yrs) and 88% linkage for children (2–5 yrs), closing immunization gaps in early childhood.

Completed vaccination for 204 out of 306 partially immunized children, reaching a 67% completion rate across intervention blocks.

Supported Pulse Polio campaign, reaching 500+ vulnerable children with community collaboration.

Conducted Anaemia testing camps and supervised MCHN sessions to improve maternal-child health diagnostics and service quality.

Linked 237 vaccine-hesitant families and integrated missed communities into RI microplans for sustained coverage.

Breaking Barriers: The Chawarchha Brick Kiln Transformation

In Chawarchha Village, Ahore Block, migrant worker families were apprehensive about vaccinations, fearing adverse effect to their 20 children. Despite repeated visits, parents remained resistant. Our team, ANM Sunita, CHO Soni Singh, ASHA Shobha Devi, and Coordinator Jitendra Singh engaged the brick kiln owner, gaining his trust and support. His endorsement convinced skeptical families, breaking resistance. In a single campaign, all 20 children received their scheduled vaccines. Now, ASHA Shobha Devi conducts regular follow-ups, ensuring ongoing protection. Chawarchha brick kiln stands as a testament that community leadership and persistent healthcare efforts can overcome fear and safeguard children's health.



Under the Zero Dose Immunization Programme at CHC Bakhasar, we identified children who were not listed in existing immunization records. With the block coordinator's support, I arranged special outreach sessions. Regular coordination significantly improved immunization coverage, reaching more children and strengthening regional health outcomes.

MAJOR INTERVENTIONS

Strengthened healthcare infrastructure across **38 CHCs**, **117 PHCs**, and **805 Sub Centers**, with focused outreach in **348 priority sites** to improve rural service coverage.



Identified and linked **142 zero dose children** (0–5 yrs) and **204 partially immunized children** through systematic surveys, catch-up drives, and follow-up interventions.



Conducted **40 orientation sessions** and trained **2,093 FLWs** and **348 community structures** to enhance immunization delivery and communication capacity.



Secured **41 departmental support** letters and engaged **483 influencers** to reinforce inter-sectoral coordination and community trust in RI services.



Participated in **31 ICDS**, **5 SRLM**, and **11 school-based activities**, integrating health education, nutrition and indigenous practices into outreach.



Developed **243 social maps**, conducted **6,577 home visits**, and validated **808 headcount surveys** to identify unvaccinated children and develop microplanning.



A Promise Kept In the Kalbeliya Ki Dhani

In remote Kalbeliya Ki Dhani, migrant families had gone three months without Routine Immunization session. Rakesh, a worried father held his two-year-old daughter who had missed her scheduled dose. "We move so often that vaccines never catch up," he sighed.

Our team arrived on October 18th, found more children with immunization gaps. Instead of lecturing, we listened. We shared success stories from other villages, building trust gradually.

Seven days of regular follow-up brought the intended transformation. Every child in Kalbeliya Ki Dhani was immunized. Rakesh's daughter giggled during her shot while he smiled with relief. A grandmother whispered, "Now children are in safe hands."

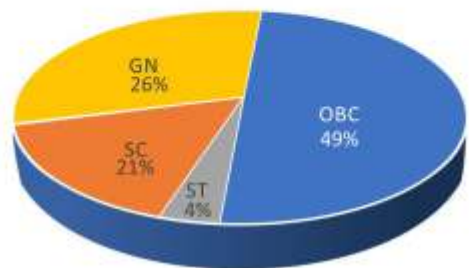

For Dhoodi, a Tanka Means Freedom

In the remote hamlet of Sode ki Dhani, Jaisalmer, Dhoodi a mother of five, once walked miles daily under the harsh sun to fetch drinking water. The toll on her health and her children's education was immense. Through the Swajal Project and VDC's support, a Tanka was built at her home. For Dhoodi, it's not just a water tank it's a symbol of dignity and relief. With the monsoon near, clean water is now just steps away. "We feel seen and supported," she says. Her life has transformed, less hardship now, more time for family and brighter hopes for her children.



KEY ACHIEVEMENTS

Year-Round Water Security: Over 1,050 rural residents in remote hamlets gained reliable water access, despite lacking of local supply.

Reduced Burden on Women & Children: Time and effort spent fetching water decreased, improving health and school attendance.

Rainwater Storage: More than 23 lakh litres of water stored through new construction, renovations and rooftop harvesting systems.

Safe Water Access: 150 hand pumps installed, reducing contamination risks and preventing accidents ensuring safety for children.

Inclusive Planning: Vulnerable households (widows, elderly, persons with disabilities) prioritized through Village Development Committee-led planning.





MAJOR INTERVENTIONS

Tanka Construction:

Built 28 new underground rainwater harvesting tankas (2 in progress), benefitting 214 households (893 individuals).



Tanka Renovation:

Repaired and cleaned 50 existing tankas, adding 4,00,000 litres of water storage for 185 households (559 individuals).



Rooftop Rainwater Harvesting:

Installed 100 RRWHS units (99 households, 1 school), collecting approx. 13.11 lakh litres of water, benefitting 879 individuals.



Hand Pump Installation:

Set up 150 hand pumps on tankas for safe, easy and hygienic water access.



Inclusive Selection:

Prioritized vulnerable households including those headed by widows, women, elderly and persons with disabilities.



Preserving Every Drop: Kohariya's Rainwater Revival

In Kohariya village, ten vulnerable families struggled with water scarcity despite having traditional tankas. Without rooftop connections, precious rainwater was lost and women walked miles daily for water. Through the Swajal Project, filtered rooftop pipelines were installed, linking homes to tankas. Local masons were trained, and women actively participated in the process. Now, with the monsoon approaching, tankas are expected to store rain water, ensuring year-round water security. "With rooftop connections, our tanks will finally fill and so will our lives," says Rehana Bano. Capturing the dignity, hope and transformation brought by this simple yet powerful innovation.

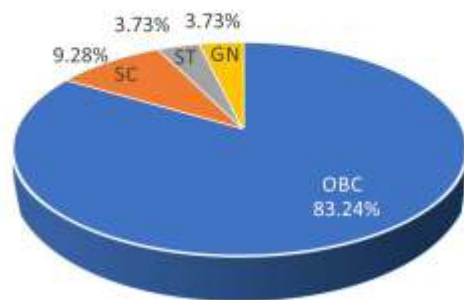

Madina Bano's Educational Renaissance

Madina Bano, a resident of Ragh pura block Masuda, always dreamed of becoming a teacher. Though she completed her education up to the 12th grade, her aspirations were cut short when her family arranged her marriage. With four children and a husband working as a laborer, financial hardships weighed heavily on her. Yet, Madina remained determined. She began tutoring neighborhood children, finding fulfillment in nurturing young minds. Her turning point came when Disha Organization launched recruitment for tuition classes under the Knowledge Hut Project. Madina applied with hope and was selected as a Bal Mitra for the Government Primary School, Ragh pura. Training sessions deepened her understanding of education and library management, boosting her confidence. Today, she not only inspires children but has reignited her own dream of becoming a change-maker through education. The library became a symbol of her resilience, transforming her journey from struggle to empowerment.



KEY ACHIEVEMENTS

9,040 students, 225 teachers and 2,608 community members accessed 25 libraries set up under the project to foster inclusive learning.

933+ community members engaged in school governance, through the formation of School Management, Child Protection and Education Development Committees.

School infrastructure improved in schools, through upgraded libraries
Ramp & Toilets → 15
Clean Water Facilities → 23

Learning levels improved by 34.4% for 648 slow learners, via targeted remedial classes and tuition support.

70 families boosted nutrition intake, by cultivating home gardens supported by seed distribution and guidance.





MAJOR INTERVENTIONS

Praveshotsav Admission Campaign launched in collaboration with Samagra Shiksha Ajmer, featuring rally vans, songs and radio outreach; engaged 2,597 participants across 25 schools to boost government school enrolment.



Quarterly Community Meetings involved 1,097+ villagers and committee members (EDC, SMC, CPC), focusing on child safety, school development and home learning environments across 25 villages.



Advanced learners increased across subjects and slow learners significantly reduced, thanks to focused academic interventions



993 people participated in Child Protection Committee meetings, building awareness and support for children's rights.



Lokesh's Leadership Journey

Lokesh, a 10-year-old student from Government Primary School in Bachpadi, emerged as a young leader through the Knowledge Hut Library Project by Disha Organization. Despite financial challenges at home, Lokesh's parents ensured regular schooling, even when other children in the village opted for work over studies. The newly established library offered access to vibrant books, digital tools and engaging activities like camps and fetes. It sparked love for learning and leadership among students. Lokesh was appointed President of the Bal Manch (Children's Forum), where he learned responsibility, decision-making and peer engagement. Participation in workshops further boosted his confidence and inspired him to lead by example. The project transformed his outlook, nurturing intellectual and social growth and helped him believe in a brighter future through education. Lokesh now motivates fellow students and credits the library and guidance from mentor Ghanshyam Sir for shaping his journey as a responsible young change-maker.



SUSTAINABILITY PROMOTED

Child Management Committee Workshop trained 30 selected children across 25 schools two days of training, covering library setup, literary activities and leadership development, guided by experts and supported by teachers.

Summer Camp Across 25 Schools engaged 893 children, 80 teachers, and 116 community members with hands-on creative activities, nurturing imagination, motor skills and artistic talent.

70 Kitchen Gardens established in Year 2, promoting nutrition and sustainability through seed distribution and home-level guidance to children, parents and volunteers.

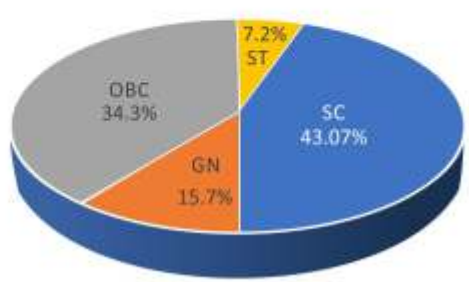

Empowering Women Farmers through Organic Practices

Hemi Devi from Maroodi Village, Barmer, faced livelihood challenges due to erratic rainfall and limited work. Owing 5 bighas of land, she joined the project's Self-Help Group and attended training on Improved Agricultural Practices and vermi-composting through NABARD & Manos Unidas supported programs. With the support from 'Annapurna Project' Hemi Devi and her SHG set up a vermi-compost unit. She now uses compost from her cows and goats' dung, replacing chemical inputs with organic manure. Over the past two years, she has grown three crops with visibly better quality. "Thanks to RCDSSS, I've returned to organic farming and now see real improvements," she shared proudly.

KEY ACHIEVEMENTS

975 households established kitchen gardens, ensuring access to fresh & organic vegetables.

18,924 animals vaccinated, benefiting 1,962 families and reducing disease risks

529 SHG members actively participated in local development and decision-making.

1,347 women trained in agriculture, livestock, and allied livelihoods, expanding income opportunities.

Rainwater harvesting extended water availability by up to **81 days** for drinking and irrigation.





MAJOR INTERVENTIONS

Trained 345 members on water budgeting and efficient usage for drinking, farming and horticulture.



Planted 3,000 fruit and shade trees, benefitting 759 families.



Raised health awareness among 3,703 individuals on diseases, vaccinations and services.



Trained 617 on natural farming and bio-inputs.



Distributed seeds and compost to 975 households.

Promoted Kiradu Mahila FPO with 450 shareholders and ₹2.5 lakh turnover (FY 2023–24).

Harvested 17 lakh+ litres of rainwater, increasing availability by 81 days.

Enabled 487 women to manage vermi-compost units.

Trained 162 women in handicrafts and millet products.

Vaccinated 18,924 animals across 1,962 families emphasizing the importance of vaccination.

Community Water Security Transformation

In the drought-prone Kiradu village cluster, over 200 families faced relentless water scarcity, struggling for both drinking water and crop survival. Through Annapurna 3.0, the community took charge of building rainwater harvesting structures and learning water budgeting techniques. With technical support and collective effort, the village now captures over 17 lakh litres of rainwater annually, extending access by 81 days beyond the monsoon. This breakthrough enabled year-round farming and halted seasonal migration. Villagers maintain the water systems themselves, and trained budgeting practices ensure every drop is used wisely turning a crisis into a model of resilience and self-reliance.

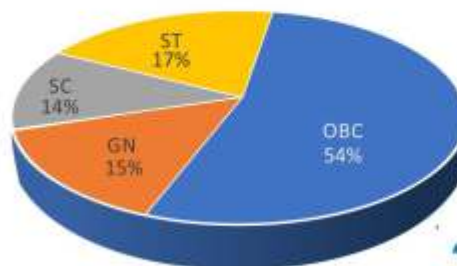

KEY ACHIEVEMENTS

279 students overcame financial barriers to education through fee assistance -198 in school and 81 in higher education made possible via targeted educational support from the project.

Stronger emotional bonds were built with letters written by 287 children, thanks to the sponsor engagement initiative that encouraged regular communication.

Volunteer efforts boosted project effectiveness through enhanced data accuracy, enriched case studies and child psychology workshops organized by four committed volunteers.

Graduates like Safina, Rakesh, Akash, and Vandana secured employment, demonstrating successful career readiness as a result of personalized mentoring and academic support.

174 sponsors supported 287 children throughout the year, including 127 from Spain, 25 from Germany and 32 from India mobilized through consistent outreach and sponsor integration activities.





MAJOR INTERVENTIONS

Academic & Career Guidance:

Conducted counselling sessions for 72 students of Class 10 & 12 focusing on academic planning and career orientation.



Support for HIV-affected Children:

Provided holistic care to 14 children with HIV/AIDS, ensuring access to medical aid, emotional support and uninterrupted education.



Sponsor Engagement & Village Outreach:

Welcomed 16 sponsors and volunteers (Spain, Germany, and India) for home visits and community interactions, reaching to 235 children in villages of Ajmer and Beawar.



Educational & Material Assistance:

Distributed school fees to 198 children, supported 14 children with groceries and medical aid, assisted 26 children with stationery and uniforms and gifted 2 laptops to Diksha children.



Sponsor-Funded Gifts & Celebrations:

Enabled meaningful sponsor-child connections by distributing gifts to 34 children, fostering emotional ties and celebrating community support.

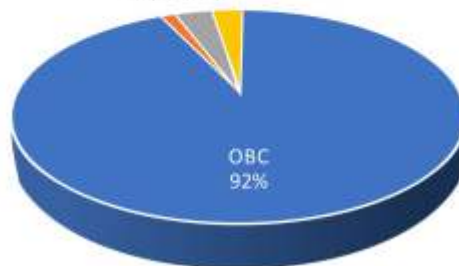

KEY ACHIEVEMENTS

17 Pashu Sakhis supported **3,499 families** through home visits and awareness sessions on goat management, vaccination, deworming and housing improvements.

85% of families are regularly vaccinating their cattle (9367) reducing mortality rate by 7%, indicating improved herd health

80 Organic Kitchen Gardens were set up, helping vulnerable women meet nutritional needs and generate income through vegetable sales.

1,562 families received **3,400 moringa plants**, encouraging adoption of locally grown & nutrient-rich produce in daily diets.

762 community members accessed government schemes and services related to health, nutrition and livelihood through **e-Mitra assistance**, improving overall social security.

Saveena's Journey to Self-Reliance

In Neemgarh village, 25-year-old Saveena, a mother of three, once struggled daily with limited income from her husband's labor and small farming. Life changed when she joined the Unnati Project and became part of the village Goat Resource Group. Through hands-on training and support with two improved Sirohi goats, she learned scientific goat-rearing practices.

With dedication, she expanded to nine goats and now earns additional INR 4,000-4,500 monthly through milk and goat sales, supported by Swanirmaan Farmer Producer Company. This income has improved her family's stability and earned her respect in the community.

Saveena's story reflects not just financial growth but personal empowerment proving that with the right support, even the most vulnerable can become resilient changemakers.

"After my husband's death, I was left alone with my two sons and a few unproductive goats that often miscarried or delivered weak kids. I had no stable income and felt helpless. After sharing my struggles in a GRG meeting, I received a healthy Sirohi buck through the Unnati Project. That one change transformed everything. My goats started giving healthier kids some even twins and my herd has grown from just 4 to 14 goats. As a result, last year I sold five goats/bucks for around INR 60,000 and have been earning an additional INR 2,000 per month by providing buck services in nearby villages. Today, I not only manage my household expenses but also guide other women in goat rearing. This project has given me a fresh start, financial stability and a renewed sense of purpose."

Conducted 6 health camps serving 410 community members with free medical services



Developed 10 Goat Kid Nurseries as sustainable income-generating units



Educated 482 women on balanced nutrition using locally available resources during Nutrition Month



96 Pashu Sakhis and Goat Resource Group members gained practical knowledge via exposure visits to key institutes in Mathura and Avikanagar.

Trained 166 FPO shareholders in governance, achieving 100% participation target

Laxmi's Rise from Rejection to Recognition

Laxmi, a 36-year-old from Harrajpura village, was abandoned by her husband and left to raise two daughters alone. With no steady income, she returned to her parental home and turned to goat rearing for survival. Her breakthrough came when she was nominated as a Pashu Sakhi during a Goat Resource Group meeting. With training support from the Unnati Project, she gained skills in animal care from RCDSSS Ajmer and IGFR Mathura.

Now, Laxmi earns ₹ 4,000–₹4,500 per month through livestock services, plus an incentive of ₹ 2,000 monthly from project Unnati. She manages her household with dignity and educates her daughters in a private school. Her success has inspired four more village women to pursue training-making Laxmi a symbol of resilience and empowerment.

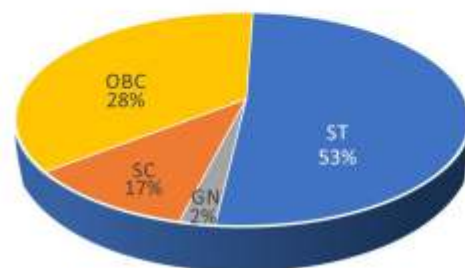

Jashoda's Organic Farming Journey From Learner to Local Leader

In Garal Rai Singh village, Jashoda transformed her family's livelihood by embracing organic farming. After attending a two-day workshop on 'Bio Resource Input Centre' (BRC), she converted her 3 bigha land into a pesticide-free vegetable farm using vermicompost, cow dung manure and Nimastra a neem-based solution. She installed drip irrigation to conserve water, dramatically improving yields and crop quality. Her brinjal and garlic harvests not only sustained her family but brought in a steady monthly income of ₹11,000. Jashoda's commitment to sustainable agriculture and ecological resilience inspired nearby farmers to adopt natural methods, making her a respected role model in the village.

Radha Devi From Vulnerability to Village Champion

Radha Devi, from Mehroniyon Ki Dhani, emerged as a transformative leader through the Saksham Project. Once financially unstable and unaware of government schemes, she joined the Bharat Mata SHG and quickly took charge as its president. Under her leadership, the group mobilized access to pensions, farmer schemes and savings programs for over 50 families. Radha participated in tailoring, embroidery and food processing trainings, eventually setting up a business with her daughter. Together, they earn ₹23,000/month. She now leads awareness campaigns, files documentation independently and trains others empowering dozens of women to build self-reliant lives while reshaping governance dialogues in her Panchayat.

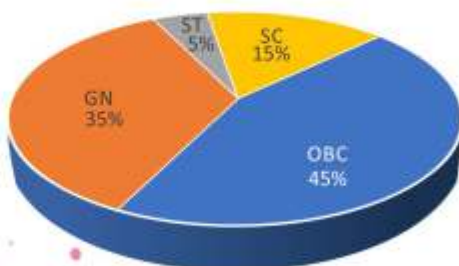

Leela the Entrepreneur

Leela Devi from Gohana, once struggled to meet her family's needs. Through the Durga Maa SHG under Disha-RCDSSS, she accessed a ₹50,000 bank loan to buy a sewing machine together with a cow and a few goats to support her income. Starting with neighbourhood stitching, she soon expanded by sourcing Rajputi dress material online and later specialized in bridal and festive orders. Alongside dairy and goat rearing, her sewing business steadily grew into a small integrated women-led enterprise. Today, she not only sustains her household but also provides work to her friends. Her journey reflects how self-reliance empowers women. "Earlier I depended on others; now my sewing machine and livestock are my strength." she proudly shares.

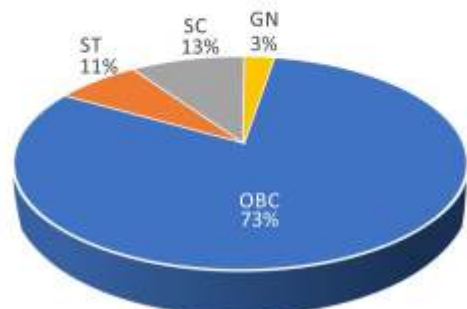

After joining the Dana Baba Self-Help Group, I received an inter-loan which helped me restart my shop with confidence. Today, I earn an additional amount between ₹ 3000-4000 per month and support my family with dignity."





Dual Benefits of Vermicomposting

Mrs. Nainu Devi from Sarupa village initially focused only on traditional farming and had never considered vermicomposting as an additional livelihood option. Motivated through SHG meetings and demonstrations, she established a vermicompost unit despite initial hesitation. Within 45–50 days, her first unit was ready and the application of vermicompost in her maize field showed encouraging results in crop growth, soil health and reduced input costs.

Thereafter, she harvested around 1000 kg of vermicompost, out of which she sold 280 kg at Rs. 10 per kg and earned Rs. 2800, while the remaining manure was used in her own fields. Along with additional income, she adopted healthier and chemical-free farming practices. Today, she regularly produces and sells vermicompost at Rs. 10-15 per kg, creating a sustainable source of income for her family.

Strengthening Financial Security

Mrs. Meena Devi, wife of Nainul from Baghmal village, belongs to a financially vulnerable family. Inspired by the positive changes she observed among neighbouring SHG members, she joined the Self-Help Group with hope for a better future. She actively participated in meetings, trainings and project activities.

During a goat management training organized under the Ujjwal Project, Meena Devi learned scientific practices such as timely vaccination, balanced feeding, seasonal disease management and improved methods of purchasing and selling goats. Motivated by the training and supported with seed money of Rs. 5000, she purchased an additional goat, which gradually became an important asset for her family.

With proper care and improved management practices, her confidence grew further. Later, she also availed a loan from her SHG to purchase another goat and steadily increased her herd size. Today, she owns 5 goats together with a couple of goat-kids. Goat rearing has now become a dependable livelihood option for her family, enabling her to manage household financial needs without depending on external loans during emergencies.





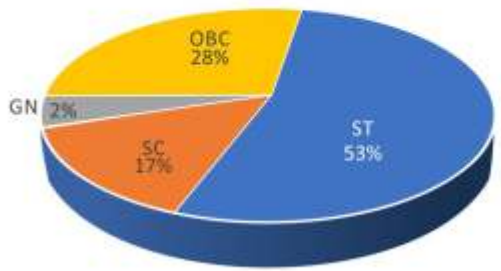

Transition from Child Labour to Formal Education

Farukh, a 15-year-old boy from Gidani village was pulled out of school to work at his father's roadside eatery due to financial stress. During a visit, RCDSSS outreach workers noticed Farukh working and intervened with the help of local police. They informed the father that employing minors violates the Child Labour Act and deprives children of education and childhood. The father was counseled, accepted his mistake and re-enrolled Farukh in school. Farukh is now back with his friends, happy to study again, with continued support for his education and growth.

Suman now motivates other girls to speak up, pursue education and delay marriage. Her courage and awareness became a catalyst for change in her village, proving how informed-youth can drive social transformation.

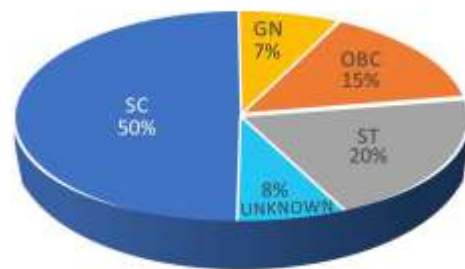

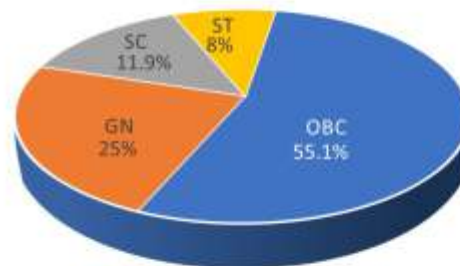

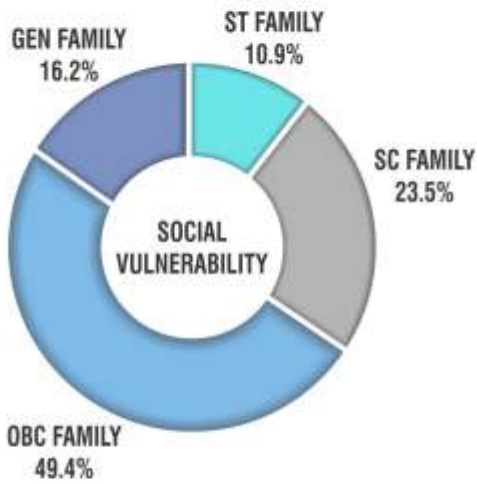


Learning to Save, Leading to Inspire

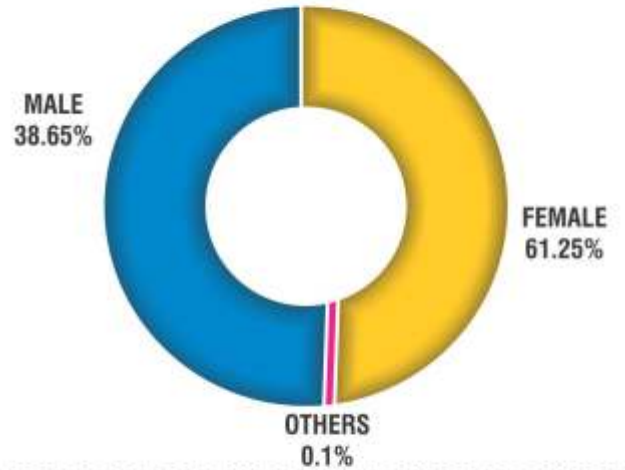
Salmaa Banu, 38, from Raati Dang village in Ajmer lived a life centered around household chores, relying entirely on her husband's income. Savings and investments were unfamiliar concepts and digital banking felt out of reach. In 2024, everything changed when she attended a financial literacy workshop under a community empowerment initiative. She learnt the basics of budgeting, saving schemes like RD and PPF, investment options such as SIPs and gold bonds and digital tools like UPI. Salmaa opened her first savings account and started a ₹500 recurring deposit. Joining a self-help group, she took a microloan and launched a small tailoring business. Her household income grew by 20%, and she gained confidence in managing money independently. Today, Salmaa mentors other women, inspiring five of them to start saving and investing. Her journey reflects how basic financial knowledge can transform lives and empower communities.
