

We Need to Pray Series (Phil. 4:4-7) Why We Need to Pray (Part 2) (Eze. 22:23-31)

- I. Adam was God's <u>representative</u> on the earth. (Gen. 2:15)
 - A. Adam was to "keep it" (*shā-mar*) to guard, protect, preserve, etc.¹
 - a. This word shamar is used as a watchman or guardian in certain passages of scriptures. (Psa. 127:1 Except the LORD build the house, they labour in vain that build it: except the LORD keep the city, the watchman waketh but in vain.)
 - B. A representative is someone who re-present the will of another; to be a substitute or agent for another, or to be an example or type of a group.
- II. Man was created for this purpose—he was made in the image and likeness of God. (Gen. 1:26)
 - A. Image *(selem)* a phantom, i.e. (figurative) an illusion, resemblance, hence a representative.²
 - a. An illusion is something that you think you see, but upon closer observation, you discover that it's not.
 - B. Likeness ($dum\hat{u}t$) comes from the root work ($d\bar{a}m\hat{a}$) which means to compare, by implication to resemble.
 - a. Adam was similar to or comparable to God.
 - b. In Psa. 8:5 It is stated that man was made just a little lower than God (*Elōhîm*), not angels. Man was not made in the likeness of angels, but of God.
 - c. Also in in this passage, it is stated that man was crowned (ātar) which means to encircle or compass

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(*Psa. 5:12, 103*), with glory (*kābôd*) which means heavy, weighty.

- 1. This definition is connected to authority. We use this term today in phrases like, "He carries a lot of weight around here". Adam carried a lot of weight on earth—he represented God to all of creation!!!
- d. Glory (doxa) as is used in the New Testament (1 Cor. 11:7) means recognition or that which causes something or someone to be recognized for what it is.
- e. When creation observed Adam, they were supposed to see God's image or God's likeness, or God in him.
 - 1. This was so that man could properly represent God and creation could understood that they were to respond in deference to man.
- C. God gave mankind the ability to create eternal spirits. None of God's other creation has this ability.
- III. When Adam fell, mankind lost the Glory of God and creation no longer recognized the image and likeness of God. (Rom. 3:23)
 - A. For the image of God to be totally restored, we must be changed back from glory to glory. (2 Cor. 3:18)
- IV. God wanted a family that could personally relate to Him. He wanted the earth full of His children! *(Gen. 1:28)*
 - A. He wanted children that would choose to reverence Him, love Him, and follow Him—they would do this based upon who He was.
- V. Adam authority on earth was so complete that he could give the earth away, the same way that God gave it to him.



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- A. So complete was God's decision to work through man on earth, that it would cost Him His only Son of Heaven to regain what Adam lost.
- B. With this action, God was forever connected to joint authority with man on the earth. (Daniel 7:18, 7:27; 2 Tim. 2:12; Rev. 5:10, 20:6, 22:5)
- VI. Though God is sovereign and all powerful, He limited Himself to work with and through man on earth.
 - A. Isn't this why the earth is in such a horrible condition.
 - B. Man was given the authority to make earth like heaven, a paradise; but man made it like hell, a place of suffering.
- VII. In scripture, the Lord encourages us to pray. (Luke 18:1)
 - A. Doesn't God encourage us to pray that His kingdom come and His will be done. Didn't He tell us to pray for daily bread? (*Mat.* 6:10-11)
 - B. Didn't he tell us to pray to the Lord of the Harvest for laborers? (Mat. 9:38)
 - C. Aren't these things that the Lord wants to happen? Why then do we need to pray?
- VIII. Elijah Prays Fervently (1 Kings 18)
 - A. God said that <u>He would send rain</u> upon the earth. (1)
 - B. Elijah prays to God. (41-46)
 - C. Why did Elijah have to pray?
 - D. Why did he pray seven times?
 - E. It was Elijah's prayers that stopped the rain and started it again. (Jam. 5:17-18)
