1.) WHERE ARE YOU FROM?

That can never be a simple answer (lol). I was born in Birmingham, Alabama, then moved immediately to Detroit, Michigan until I was 9 years old. I then moved to Washington, DC for less than 1 year and migrated to Dallas, Texas before I turned 10, in which I currently reside. Detroit and Dallas really shaped me but all of the states had a major impact on who I am today.

2.) HOW WAS IT GROWING UP IN MALE DOMINATED A HOUSEHOLD?

Being the only girl in the home (my father was a single parent), had its pros and cons. I was definitely spoiled by my father. We didn't have much but we didn't want for anything and I still, to this day, wonder how he did it. Having brothers kept me on my toes, as far as knowing how most males think and move. It exposed me to a lot and made me demand my respect and fight hard in every way possible. I grew up wanting to do what they did from rapping, banging, riding bikes, climbing trees, and doing a lot of things I'm not proud of but grew from.

3.) HOW OLD WERE YOU WHEN YOU WROTE YOUR FIRST SONG?

I was 12 years old when I wrote my first rap song.

I wrote it to 8ball and MJG "Pimps in the House",
for me and my friend, who clearly wasn't
interested (IoI). After that, I wrote so many to
Bone Thugs & Harmony "For the Love of Money
Instrumental", same beat, different words.

4.) WHO & WHAT INSPIRED YOU TO BECOME A SONGWRITER?

I was infatuated with Tupac, Bone Thugs and Harmony, 8ball & MJG, No Limit and a few others. I use to rap their lyrics so hard. It was my homeboy Big Lurch that actually challenged me to write and rap my own lyrics though. I use to freestyle with my brothers and homeboys in the neighborhood and I always got encores.

I always rapped hard because that's the life I was used to. My surroundings, my experiences and I found a positive outlet to express myself.

5.) WHAT DO YOU LOVE THE MOST ABOUT THE MUSIC INDUSTRY?

To be totally honest, I'm not in love with the music industry itself. I love the genuine people that I meet, and the genuine relationships that's built. I love the fans/family that's formed and the impact it has overall. The industry can be one sided, unbalanced and toxic. For that reason, I have no complaints, and I just use the gift God gave me and let the universe work.

6.) WHO INSPIRED YOU TO BECOME AN ACTRESS?

I love a challenge and I love trying different things. I don't consider myself one-dimensional so acting came natural. I think the energy that people feel from me opens doors that I didn't even knock on. If I can recall, Dallas Mogul Byron Love Luv was one of the first ones to reach out and offer me a role in one of his movies. It was no script, just dialogue and from there I was getting contacted on roles and appearances. I've had roles from a mobstress, to a bounty hunter to a funny, non successful stripper. I respect the actresses that really do it though, it's a lot of hard work and retakes, but it's fun and fulfilling.

7.) OUT OF ALL THE PLACES THAT YOU /
HAVE LIVED, WHICH ONE MADE THE MOST
IMPACT ON YOUR LIFE & CAREER?

All of the states had a major impact.

It's easier to say the least impact was
Alabama, and that's because I left when
I was too young to remember much, but I
was born there. If I really had to choose,
I would say Detroit. Detroit exposed me
to so much, so early and it prepared me
for anything, good or bad.

I had my first fight with someone my age in Washington with the neighborhood Bully name Cookie. That was impactful because I was the first to hand her tail to her and to this day, I can't stand a bully and I fear none, but I move smart. I have a lot to lose. Dallas was slower than Detroit but humbled me. I lost so many people at a young age.

8.) HOW DID YOU FEEL WHEN YOU HAD
RECEIVED THE MOST CONSISTENT
INDEPENDENT ARTIST GLOBALLY
RECOGNIZED WITH OVER 65 MUSIC AWARDS?

I felt so appreciated, heard and impactful.

Every acknowledgment is as major as a win.

I'm always grateful but never satisfied.

Appreciative but never comfortable. When u get comfortable, your effort slacks. I don't ever get comfortable and I keep going. It's my life, my therapy and I'm creating my legacy, one day at a time. I can't thank everyone enough for just paying attention. I'm blessed and beyond grateful. It's so many people that would die not even knowing what hearing their voice on a record feels like.

9.) HOW IS IT FOR YOU BEING THE CREATOR OF YOUR OWN BRAND ACHIEVEMENTS?

It's a great feeling actually. A lot of Females are handicapped by men and feel that can't move without one. I've been in several groups, lost managers, promoters, investors and team members to death and at one point didn't know how to move. God will give you all you need and a sound mind and a will to learn tops everything. I'm responsible for 100% of anything involving Buttagoharder and it's been lots of work and no short cuts. When you see my hair, nails, makeup, and style, that's all me. The ideas from my graphics to videos, I'm 100% involved. My projects are all me, 100% on the pen, arrangements, vocals and drops. I'm proud of myself for not letting anything or anyone make me Curl up and be stagnant.

10.) WHAT INSPIRED YOU TO START YOUR BRAND?

I've been in rap groups, professionally, and at one point signed, since i was 15. I've went through name and rebrand changes due to deaths, incarcerations, and so much more. Through it all, my love for creating music never stopped and the impact was still there. It was sink or swim and I was gone atleast learn how to doggie peddle. That inspired me to start my brand and create "Buttagoharder". My name alone pushes me.

11.) WHAT DOES YOUR BRAND STAND FOR AND HOW WOULD YOU LIKE FOR VIEWERS TO SUPPORT?

My brand stands for Not giving up on yourself. Don't limit yourself. Believe that you can do it too. I'm involved in the prison system engagements now, something I would have never ever thought I'd be doing. The "Goharder" is what I live by. Visit my site Buttagoharder.com and just get on board. Stay tuned in. Support by paying attention, purchasing music, streaming, downloading for free, using word of mouth and look out for more merch. My 1st trap Gospel EP is dropping Mid 2025. Except the balance in music.

12.) WHAT ADVICE WOULD YOU GIVE TO THE YOUNGER VIEWERS?

The advice I would give the younger viewers are simple and real. For my females, don't think sex is all you have to offer. Don't think that's the only way to succeed. Push yourself, respect yourself, and if it feels forced, whatever it is, don't do it. For my males, don't do what you hear the gangster rappers rap about. Don't let 15 secs cost you 15 years or more of your life, or your life overall. To both, be the change. Be a trend. Be a leader, "Go Harder"!!

INTERVIEW WITH

1.) WHERE ARE YOU FROM?
Born in Poughkeepsie NY, raised in the DMV, currently in the DMV, lived in Detroit, Mississippi, and Brooklyn NY by way of Chicago, Milwaukee, and Tennessee! My mom was/is a jazz singer.

2.) HOW LONG HAVE YOU BEEN

ON THE GO-GO SCENE?

I was exposed to Go-Go when I first moved to the DMV in 4th grade. I frequented Go-Go's and have always felt a deep rooted connection to this genre. I've been in the Go-Go scene since, I started creating music and always desired to blend Go-Go percussive elements with my jazzy style.

3.) WHO COMES UP WITH THE LYRICS TO THE SONGS?

I am a writer. I write songs, plays and poems. I primarily write my own song lyrics. I also work with a team, Grady McCain of WIAW RECORDS and Bruce Gardner who are also writers and we submit lyrics and songs to each other for consideration.

4.) WHAT MOTIVATES YOU TO KEEP GOING?

I've always wanted to be an example of what "following your passion" looks like. I'm a performing arts teacher and every day I encourage my students to explore their creative gifts. I want to live what I profess. I want to make a living off of my talent and creativity. I want to inspire my children and others to spend their existence living their authentic selves. Living mine is a great way to do that. This is what keeps me going.

5.) WHAT MADE YOU WANT TO BE A SINGER?

Music and the stage are in my blood. Which is why I love live performances so much. My musical roots come from my mom, K. Shalong, a jazz singer, and my dad, a percussionist of Honduran descent. They infused rhythm in everything they did. Watching my mother rehearse and perform always fascinated me. The ability to bring so much joy and freedom to the audience has always been impactful and I wanted to do that! My mom saw my desire and put me in everything "performance arts."

From storytelling competitions to talent shows. From theatrical productions to competitive classes/programs/ensembles/troupes. The more my passion grew, the more encouragement I received from my mom, and kept the fire burning.

b.) WERE THERE EVER TIMES THAT YOU FELT LIKE GIVING UP?

Absolutely! And I have, several times. My senior year in college I had the incredible opportunity to audition for a 5-girl singing group led by TEO Aron Lee and Darryl Minus, students at Hampton University. I made the group and after several vocalist changes, the 3-member group KEI (Kashi, Eboni & Iris) was born. We were signed to Atlantic Records. That roller coaster ride was filled with exciting experiences, notable exposure and immeasurable lessons. We sang background for the iconic duo Salt-N-Pepa. We appeared in the movie 'Kazaam,' starring Shaquille O'Neal, contributed to the soundtrack of "Space Jam," and sang background on Patra's album, 'Scent of Attraction.' But with the music business being what it was and bouncing around to different record labels who struggled with envisioning our unique brand, we were shelved.

This experience caused uncertainty and selfdoubt. Ultimately mismanagement and disappointment took its toll on the group, and we separated. I felt like giving up. I had a decision to make and chose to go it alone. I had the honor of performing with renowned artists such as Sarah McLachlan, Michelle Indigoicello, and Cheryl Crow at the Lilith Fair. My solo experience taught me more about the business of music as well as shedding light on the ills. For many reasons, that part of my journey disappointedly ended and again, I contemplated giving up. I decided to take a different angle and began exploring my more theatrical passions. This led me to study acting at The New School in New York, where I honed my Acting craft and took classes under the guidance of renowned mentors such as Susan Batson and Joi Lee. I also served as a resident actor for Arena Stage, in Washington DC, as a part of their educational outreach division.

I performed a one-woman show by Dael Orlandersmith, "The Gimmick", under the direction of Ralph Remmington, Director of Cultural Affairs for the San Francisco Arts Commission. I had the privilege of performing at Arena Stage in August Wilson's "Ma Rainey's Black Bottom," directed by Tazewell Thompson, and at Columbia's Rep Stage in 'The Piano Teacher' directed by Kasi Campbell. I combined my love of teaching with my passion for theater by being a resident actor for the New Theater of Medicine, a new kind of theater under the direction of Jeffrey Steiger. I LOVE Acting yet still, that didn't feed the totality of my artistry and in the meantime, life was lifin' and I now had 3 sons depending on me. Responsible decisions had to be made, and I chose to give up performing and focused on teaching the Arts. During this time, I received numerous acknowledgements and awards including the Montgomery County Executive Community Award for Excellence in the Arts and Humanities for my work with the Finest Performance Foundation (my family's nonprofit organization).

I wrote and directed several plays and created award winning youth performance troupes. I poured all of my passion into my teaching. That part of my creativity was truly fulfilling and still is. But I missed the stage. I missed performing. I missed singing. After years of ups and downs I found my way back to the mic as a vocalist. Currently, I am a solo artist with a local independent record label WIAW (World Inside a World Records) owned by Grady McCain and I frequently perform throughout the DMV with Bruce Gardner and the BGX band. I am a Creative Movement/Dance teacher at a prestigious private school in Potomac, Maryland, where I get to nurture the artistic spirit of the next generation. Clearly "giving up" is not an option.

7.) WHAT IS YOUR FAVORITE THING ABOUT BEING IN THIS INDUSTRY?

The freedom to express myself creatively and the opportunity to share it with others is my favorite aspect of being in the industry.

I'm not really a fan of the commerciality of the music industry and the effect it has on the art form, but I do appreciate the enormous amount of talent we all get to share and experience.



8.) WHICH ONE OF YOUR SONGS IS YOUR FAVORITE OUT OF THEM ALL?

That's tough. But if I had to choose only one,
I would say "9-Livez". It was inspired by
someone I love. He has "eyes like a cat"and he
was my muse. This song allows me to express a
"character" that speaks to my sensuality.
I have an affinity for cats, and "9-Livez"
accentuates that connection. It also lets me
showcase my rapping abilities.

9.) WHAT ADVICE WOULD YOU GIVE TO THE YOUNGER VIEWERS?

So much to say, but I would narrow my advice down to 4 key points:

- (1)-Find the balance between trust and naïveté.
- (2)-Surround yourself with a team of like-minded, creative individuals who share a common vision and passion. People you feel most comfortable sharing your ideas with. People who you trust, believe in, and who believe in you. People who motivate and challenge you to be your best self and are willing to do what it takes to stay the course.

 (3)-Be open to opinions and suggestions yet trust your creative voice, that's your gift. (4)-Take time to learn yourself, find out who YOU are. There is no giving up on your art if it's truly WHO you are.

1.) WHERE ARE YOU FROM?

Nurse Diesel: I'm currently in Ridley Park, PA but growing up I lived in Drexel Hill then Tinicum then Crum Lynne, then Rutledge. All Delco! (Delaware County)

Phil E Basher: I currently live in the suburbs of Wilmington, DE (1/2 way between Elsmere & Newark). I grew up (70's/80's) in Elsmere, DE & spent my young adult life (90's) in the thriving punk scene of Newark, DE. I moved back to Wilmington in the 00's & have been here ever since. All in New Castle County, DE.

Cpt. Spencer: Originally from NE Philly, spent time in Bucks
County and currently live in Montgomery County PA

TURSE DIESEL

1.) HOW DID YOU GET INTERESTED IN MUSIC AND WHAT INSPIRED YOU TO GET INTO HORROR PUNK MUSIC?

Welp this question has many answers. When I was growing up, my grandmother used to sing with me when we had sleepovers at her house. I loved singing along to Barbra Streisand with her. I used to go to church when I was a kid and teenager, and loved to sing in church. I could have been in the choir but my folks wouldn't let me due to their schedules. As an adult I love karaoke and have been told by many that I have powerhouse vocals. This led me to a local bar that hosts karaoke on Mondays and I learned they had live music every weekend. Until I moved in with my husband, I didn't really have too many concert going opportunities so to be able to attend events locally was a real eye opener for me. At one of the shows I attended with a friend, which was a fundraising event called "BobFest" to raise money for someone I actually knew previously but didn't know that was the Bob they were referring to. At that event I heard some Horror Punk and Punk bands, and fell in love with the genre. I had always been a metal/rock/pop/hip hop person; punk was newer to me in a sense. Going forward we made a lot of friends in the local community of music lovers; and eventually an opportunity fell in my lap.

See, I had been participating in an Adult Band Camp program at Let There Be Rock School, singing covers and playing bass on occasion. It was there I honed my vocal skills and was recommended by our friends Ronin and Steph to audition for a local horror punk band called The Geriatrics. I had seen them perform a few times and enjoyed the schtick, and they were looking to change it up, and instead of an inmate at the lead, they wanted a head nurse in charge. I embraced the audition and worked hard learning the songs I needed to audition. I took an extra step in providing an example of vocals for a parody idea our lead guitarist and band founder, CC Martin (aka Captain Spencer) and he was hooked. It's been a great four years already! I joined when Covid was still a thing, and we have had another lineup change since then (we welcomed Phil.E.Basher as bassist). We've recorded quite a bit of music since I joined.

2.) WHAT IS YOUR FAVORITE THING ABOUT BEING IN THE BAND?

My favorite things are the camaraderie, the jokes, and the ability to create our music together as a whole; meaning, sharing ideas and adding to each other's ideas, and bringing ideas to life. We don't fight over creating music. We work together, and I think that's super important for successful bands.

3.) HOW IS THE WRITING OF THE SONGS?

It's fun! I recently had an idea that I brought to life with the help of my band mates and I'm super excited to debut that song. Keep an ear out for "Monster"! I love the fact, again, that we can pool ideas and meld and mold them into songs. I'm not the music writer but I have contributed to lyrics. Even if they don't fit a melody someone else has in mind, I have found just writing out possible lyrics in a note and sharing it with the guys is helpful in the creating process. The boys are super talented, and I'm grateful for that, and their confidence in me.

4.) ARE YOU REALLY A NURSE?

Heck no!! But I'm a Geriatric so I see a lot of nurses and doctors! I actually am a house cleaner, and I work for myself. It's grueling physical work, and so is keeping these inmates in line so they keep creating and not beheading!

PHIL E BREHER

1.) HOW LONG HAVE YOU BEEN A MUSICIAN?

For Xmas '86 my Mom got me my 1st Instrument - a '86
Peavey Patriot bass guitar. I started playing in my 1st band on day one, even though I barely knew how to play. In '88 my 2nd bands' guitarist left, so I decided to switch to rhythm guitar and purchased my 2nd Instrument - a used '84 Kramer Striker electric guitar (still have it to this day!). I've played Bass or Guitar in dozens of Punk bands from '86 - '97 but in 2000 I stopped playing due to some medical problems and having a son. Then in '22 I bought a new bass guitar with the idea of finding a new band to play with.

2.) WHAT INSPIRED YOU TO BE A MUSICIAN?

Basically all the musical artists I listened to in the 70's, 80's & early 90's, from hard rock/metal/thrash metal to HC & punk. Saw my 1st live concert in April '86 (Metallica/Ozzy) & was hooked ever since.

3.) WHAT IS YOUR FAVORITE THING ABOUT BEING A MUSICIAN?
Without a doubt playing live "on stage". I feed off the
energy from the crowd & it can be a rush! I LOVE it!!!

- 1.) HOW DID YOU COME UP W/ THE NAME OF THE BAND?

 It's partially me poking fun of myself as an "old" punk but it's also an homage to how I met my wife. She was working in the nursing home where my grandmother was living. She always used to say she loved the "Gerrys"
- 2.) HOW LONG HAVE YOU BEEN PLAYING THE GUITAR?

started at 14 and was pretty active through college when I was singing in a band. It wasn't until 8 years ago that I got serious again about performing.

My brother in law, Kevin Krimson was drumming for 90s touring band Green Jello (of Three Little Pigs song fame) and got me playing East Coast shows with them. I eventually got opportunities to play some amazing venues like The Whiskey a Go-Go and even the KISS Kruise. The singer had a plan to bail for Europe permanently so we formed The Geriatrics as a way to continue to play entertaining music but to have full control. We were all huge horror movie fans and the horror punk genre seemed like the perfect match.

- 3.) WHAT GOT YOU INTERESTED IN BEING A MUSICIAN?

 Cpt. Spencer: I started as a KISS fan at age 9, heavy metal and punk basically saved me in high school. I did a brief stint as a singer in the 90s but the chance to play with Green Jello made me believe I could play as a regular thing.

Cpt. Spencer: Definitely watch how we grow as a family and build our following. I love the collaboration on song writing.





 That's when things started to click.



1.) WHERE ARE YOU FROM?

I was born and raised in Atlanta, Georgia a true Georgia peach. It's where I call home, and it's shaped so much of who I am.

Z. WHO OR WHAT INSPIRED YOUR CAREER CHOICE?

I honestly believe my career chose me. When you're connected to your purpose, it feels like a calling that's bigger than you - I truly feel that's from God. I always thought I wanted to be a lawyer, but deep down, I had this profound love for the arts because of my mom. She introduced me to the arts even when I was in her belly and throughout my entire life. From the very beginning, I was immersed in creativity. I couldn't imagine doing anything else now. I'm a true creative at heart.

3. I SEE THAT YOU STARTED DANCING AT THE AGE OF 2 YEARS OLD...WHO INSPIRED YOUR STYLE OF DANCE?

My mother was the biggest inspiration for my style of dance. She was one of the first Black-owned dance schools in Georgia, called the Gaither School of Dance. She taught me ballet, jazz, tap, acrobatics, baton twirling, pointe, modern, and even how to truly perform and captivate an audience. She always told me to give 150% when I was on stage - and I carry that with me every time I perform. I owe everything to her for nurturing my natural gift and laying the foundation for my dance journey. When I was introduced to African dance in ninth grade, it felt like a natural extension of what my mom had already taught me. I am so grateful to her for pouring into me the way she did. The world would not know Eshe Light if it weren't for her. I miss her dearly - she passed in November 2015, but her spirit is always with me.

4. WHO IS YOUR FAVORITE AUTHOR OR SONGWRITER?

Honestly, I don't have a single favorite author or songwriter. I admire so many people's work, and there are just too many to choose from. I love to read, and right now, I'm juggling about five books! I'm reading Elevate and Dominate by Deion Sanders, Disruptive Thinking by T.D. Jakes, Self-Love Workbook for Women by Megan Logan, The Body Keeps the Score by Bessel Van Der Kolk, M.D., and one of my all-time favorites, The Mountain Is You by Brianna Wiest. I'm also working on writing my own books and getting my mother's work out there for the world to experience. There's so much beauty and wisdom to be found in the words of others, and I'm grateful to be able to contribute to that world as well.

As far as songwriters go, I absolutely love Jimmy Jam and Terry Lewis, Quincy Jones, Stevie Wonder, Smokey Robinson, Babyface, H.E.R., Dolly Parton, and the list just goes on and on. I'm a true lover of music in every form, from songwriting to vocals and vocal arrangements, to the composing musicianship – every aspect of it, including mixing and mastering. I truly love it all.

5. OUT OF EVERYTHING THAT YOU DO WITHIN YOUR CAREER, WHAT'S THE MOST PASSIONATE AND REWARDING FOR YOU?

The most rewarding part of what I do is seeing people happy when I perform—when my work uplifts their spirits or makes them feel better. That brings me so much joy! I've also had the privilege of doing Artist Development and music management, working behind the scenes with other artists. I find so much joy in helping others achieve their dreams and seeing them reach their full potential. Supporting others in their journey and helping them get to the place they were always destined to be truly warms my heart.

I'm deeply passionate about ART! When I'm in my creative space, I feel alive in ways I can't fully describe—everything about it just sparks joy and inspiration in me.

6. WHAT DO YOU LOOK FORWARD TO IN PRODUCTION THIS YEAR?

I'm incredibly excited about the many projects I'm working on right now. I'm currently editing a documentary that I've been working on for the past three years, and I can't wait to share it with the world. I also have new music coming out, featuring Rasadon, an original member of Arrested Development. I'm so eager for people to hear it-it's fresh, it's genuine, and I pray it moves people the way it moves us. I'm also looking forward to continuing to manage my amazing daughter, who is a model and actress. She's also doing multiple TV and film projects. Additionally, I'm diving into more creative direction, production, TV projects, and other exciting opportunities.

7. WHO ARE YOUR TOP 5 INFLUENTIAL MUSICIANS?

I don't have a "top five" when it comes to influential musicians because there are so many incredible artists who have impacted me in different ways. However, there are a few who have greatly influenced my journey: Michael Jackson, Donny Hathaway, Tina Turner, Quincy Jones, Janet Jackson, Al Green, Queen Latifah, MC Hammer, Prince, and a whole host of other amazing artists. 
