## Welcome to 2026 and the New Year!

As I pause to think about the reality of the new year, I am reminded of the passage of time and how it seems to accelerate as we age. Have you ever wondered why three months seemed so much longer when we were young? I suspect the reason for this is because when we were in our teens, three months was a much larger percentage of our collective memory than it is when we are in our 60s.

This concept of time is hinted at in the way Jesus's disciples asked him questions that strongly suggested they believed he would return in their lifetime. Fifteen hundred years later, some of the great reformers of the Christian faith (such as Martin Luther and John Calvin) also thought that Christ would return within their lifetime. Today, many of us have grown up with the belief that Christ will return in our lifetime.

As we enter this new year, we might wonder whether 2026 will finally be the year. Of course, none of us can know the answer to that question, and even Jesus said "that day was not known to himself or even to the angels in heaven, but to only the Father".

Rather than focus on when Christ will return, I encourage us to begin this new year by focusing on the reality that he will return. His second coming will fulfill the prophecies that began way back in Genesis chapter 3 and continue throughout the Old Testament, which gives us many pointers to his first coming.

Until that day, let us focus on the reality that time is growing short. We don't know exactly how short, but we do know that every major biblical prophecy of his return has been fulfilled. Let us focus on that he is coming again and that we have a calling and a mission to encourage one another by sharing the good news of the gospel with those who have not yet come to believe.

Together, may that be our mission for 2026 and beyond, until he comes again or he calls us into his presence, whichever comes first.

### BUSY MARY-MARTHA CIRCLE LADIES!



It's important for our congregation to know how the church is doing financially. The year-end edition of *The Spark* is a good time to share an update, since we are now four months into the 2026 fiscal year—about one-third of the year. Below is a summary of our income and spending so far. The “budgeted” amounts reflect what we expected to have after one-third of the year.

## Income (Giving and Other Revenue)

- General Giving: We expected \$86,100 and received \$85,653. This is only \$447 less than planned.
- Missions Giving: We expected \$13,854 and received \$11,810, which is \$2,044 below budget.
- Investment Income: We expected \$3,923 and received \$3,497, which is \$426 below budget.

## Spending

- Church Operations: We planned to spend \$86,100 but have spent \$96,487 so far. This is \$10,387 over budget.
- Missions: We planned to spend \$13,854 and have spent \$13,506, which is \$348 under budget.

## What These Numbers Mean

Overall, church income is very close to where we expected it to be at this point in the year, which is encouraging. However, there are a few important things to keep in mind.

In September and November, we saw some dips in giving. In December, several large year-end gifts helped bring giving back up. Some of these gifts were connected to Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) tax planning, which was explained in a note recently placed in mailboxes.

While these gifts were a blessing, part of this money represents giving that normally would have come in over several months. That means we may see lower monthly giving later in the year. In simple terms, we experienced a boost now that could lead to a dip later. Because of this, we will need to watch giving carefully over the remaining eight months. The budget was created very carefully, using last year's actual giving as a guide. One of the biggest questions when setting the budget was whether giving would remain at the same level as last year. We prayed that it would, and we continue to trust God as we move forward.

## Why Spending Is Over Budget Right Now

General spending is currently over budget, but this is mostly due to a few large, one-time expenses.

- In October, the church paid its annual insurance bill—\$9,367—all at once. This covers the church

buildings, the van, workers' compensation, and liability insurance.

- In September, the church also gave a one-time gift of \$20,000 to help Cedar Bay Camp & Retreat Center with a critical septic system project. Through a matching gift program, that \$20,000 became \$40,000 for Cedar Bay.

Because these were one-time payments, overall spending should come down in the coming months, although snow plowing may continue to be an exception!

Missions spending is right on track, but missions giving is currently below our monthly goal. The church made a big commitment this fiscal year by increasing missions giving from 8% to 15% of the total budget. This allowed us not only to continue supporting existing missions, but also to add new ones, including Samaritan's Purse, Cedar Post, Rafiki, The Promise FM, and Berean Mission Alliance. The congregation supported this decision when the budget was approved. As you hear testimonies and watch videos about these missions, please prayerfully consider supporting them through your giving on Missions Sundays.

## Looking Ahead

Our budget reflects our desire to share God's Word through missions, support our community, care for our congregation, invest in youth, and maintain our historic church building—the “Grand Lady.” We will continue to watch the budget closely as we move through the remaining eight months of the fiscal year, trusting God to provide and guide us.

## Christian Education Update

One highlight was participating in the **All About Jesus guided walk** in Cedarville, where they joined local volunteers to help create a peaceful winter experience that invited visitors to reflect on the life of Jesus and His extraordinary love for us.

Another powerful opportunity came through **Operation Christmas Child in Chicago**. Our youth helped sort and prepare Christmas boxes destined for children around the world. Together, they helped process **37,788 gift boxes**—enough to fill two shipping containers bound for Guyana and three more headed to Haiti.

To close out the month, our High and Middle School youth group joined other members of First Union Church for an evening of Christmas caroling, sharing joy and music with residents throughout Cedarville and Hessel. Thank you for faithfully supporting our youth ministry and helping provide opportunities for our young people to serve wherever God calls them to be **His hands and feet**.
