

IAN CRUICKSHANK, SAUCHENLOAN - CREAM OF THE RNAS CROP

Ian Cruickshank, Sauchenloan, Rothienorman has triumphed with his crop of Blackstoi winter wheat, winning the overall championship in this year's Royal Northern Agricultural Society (RNAS) cereal growing competition.

Sponsored by agricultural merchants McCreath, Simpson and Prentice, this annual competition fulfils one of the aims of the RNAS - to improve agricultural production — through promotion, recognition and reward for good husbandry practice in crop growing. Each standing crop is scored for disease, weeds, uniformity, mechanical operations, crop density and size of ears.

Regional sales director Robb Milne said "McCreath Simpson & Prentice is delighted to continue this event sponsorship, which helps to demonstrate best practice in the north east of Scotland. As an industry, it is very important - especially in a year like 2025 where crops have struggled with lack of water - that best techniques are studied and shared to benefit the whole cereal sector."

Commenting on this year's competition, convenor Mike Morrice said "It is an important showcase for the excellent crop husbandry in this area and it's good to see previous entrants coming back to the competition and some new names in the prize list too. Of the 49 entries, we had an increase in the oats section, particularly with winter oats which are becoming more prevalent for rotation with wheat crops."

Succeeding a crop of oilseed rape, Ian Cruickshank's Blackstoi wheat was sown on 2 October 2024, with an application of chicken muck pre-ploughing. All nitrogen applied was in liquid form and the agronomy programme was carried out by Andrew Dalgarno, Frontier. Yield was 4.71 tonnes/acre.

His crops of winter wheat (Blackstoi, Skyscraper), winter barley (Tardis, Kingsbarn) and oilseed rape are marketed through Aberdeen Grain. Highly renowned for his seed potatoes, lan grows 170 acres on an eight year rotation with production concentrated on the north African and English markets.

Judge John Veitch awarded reserve championship to Stracathro Estates with Extase winter wheat and the LFA winner was John Sim, Rorandle, Monymusk with Sassy spring feeding barley.
