## Ear and Brain Workouts: Auditory and Listening Training

Presented by Carol Cokely, PhD, Clinical Professor and AuD Program Head School of Behavioral & Brain Sciences at the University of Texas at Dallas

"Workouts are not just for your abs." Manage your hearing loss. Make the best use of the hearing you have. Optimize speech/auditory perception. Develop new auditory skills. Go beyond amplification. These are just a few of the highlights of this presentation.

Dr. Cokely teaches courses in adult aural rehabilitation and research methods, coordinates the AuD independent-research requirement, and directs independent research projects. Each year, she co-directs the Summer Intensive Aural Rehabilitation Conference (SIARC), a five-day program that brings state of the art rehabilitation techniques to adults with hearing loss and their families and provides an excellent learning forum for graduate students.



Dr. Cokely earned a B.A. degree from Queens College of the City University of New York, an M.A. degree from Northwestern University, and a Ph.D. from Indiana University.

## See, Hear, Connect: Assistive Tech for All

Presenter: Erineka Alexander, Deaf and Hard of Hearing Technology Specialist

Erineka Alexander, a cochlear implant recipient herself, is a Deaf and Hard of Hearing Technology Specialist with Texas Health and Human Services, covering Region 3B (Fort Worth and surrounding counties). Erineka evaluates a hard of hearing employee's workplace and recommends technology which can probably benefit the employee. However, you need not be employed to take advantage of DHH services.

At the June 14 meeting, Erineka, via PowerPoint, described a host of alerting devices and real-time transcription applications.

Some extra loud alarm clocks come with telephone signalers and bed shakers. Alarm clocks for the hard of hearing also come in travel-size. AC powered smoke detectors with Smart Strobe have separate flash patterns for smoke and for carbon monoxide. Apartment managers are required to provide hard of hearing renters with visual smoke detectors. Hard of hearing home dwellers may contact Erineka for help with purchasing a visual smoke detector. Bedside smoke alarms with a bed shaker may also be set to detect the doorbell, baby crying, and other sounds.

Some weather alerting devices may include strobe, bed shaker, captions, and voice. The Midland NOAA Weather Alert Radio talks.

#### **WEATHER APPS:**

- MyRadar provides various weather alerts. Users may select which types of weather events they want to be notified about. Closed captioning can be enabled through your device's Accessibility settings. Free.
- NOAA Clime Weather Radar Live. Free. Available in the iPhone App Store.
- NOAA Live Weather Radar Storm Tracker and Live Radar Map. Free for iPhone.
- AccuWeather Weather Forecast is free for iPhone. Subscribe to Premium or Professional level service.
- AccuWeather Weather Radar is free for Android.

In case of an emergency, make sure you have all your hearing accessories with you, and be sure your batteries are charged.

#### **CLOSED CAPTIONING APPS:**

• **Taptic app.** Choose the sounds you want the Taptic app to detect. Receive real-time transcriptions. Notification. Flashlight. Vibration. Send a message to play out loud. *Basic* is free, or subscribe to the upgraded version. tapticapp.com. [Continued on the next page]

- The Safeware wrist band vibrates for calls, alarms, timers, messages, baby monitors, alarm clocks, and smart security systems. Best when attached to a smart watch.
- Ava (www.ava.me), an app for phone or computer, enables real-time live captions. Powered by AI, Ava uses your device's microphone to "listen" to what's being said. Ava is available on iOS (Apple) and Android, the Web, and Desktop App with a subscription.
- Live Transcribe is a mobile app for real-time captioning developed by Google for the Android operating system. Google Live Transcribe for Android is free. Apple also has a free version. You can subscribe to premium features. Live Transcribe provides live captioning of spoken audio, including podcasts in seventy languages.
- Amazon Fire TV Stick can pair with your cochlear implants or hearing aids. Plug the Fire TV Stick into your TV, connect to WiFi, and stream movies, TV episodes, sports, news, and more. You can also pair your devices directly to a certain brand of smart tv.
- NuCaption closed caption eyeglasses have tiny microphones that listen and transcribe speech into text in real-time.
- Convo is on-demand ASL interpreting. Businesses or services provide a QR code. A quick scan connects the deaf user to a live interpreter. The Deaf user can also make phone calls with Convo Video Relay Service.
- The InnoCaption app offers real-time captioning of phone calls. Make outgoing calls from your laptop with InnoCaption's DeskView web streaming portal. Free. Federally funded.
- CapTel, CaptionCall, and ClearCaption are three popular captioned phones. Voice messages and conversations are saved. The FCC, under the ADA, pays for these free captioned phones. Use these phones with your landline, cell phone, or VoIP. Make and receive calls with captions with the CaptionCall Mobile App for iPad. CaptionCall only works with iOS (Apple) products.
- Otter.ai offers real-time transcription. Posts may be edited.
- Rogervoice allows the deaf and hard of hearing to make phone calls. The app is available 24/7. Type-to-Speech: type what you want to say, and Roger speaks for you. Free. FCC Certified. Available on iPhone and Android.
- LiveCaptions (Beta) allows real-time transcription of audio on mobile phones. LiveCaptions will appear for audio in FaceTime, podcasts, and during conversations. Live captioning often in Beta may not be fully polished or perfectly accurate. Available on Android and iPhone.
- Designed for live performances, the **GalaPro** app delivers individual real-time closed captioning and audio description to the user's own mobile device. Free from the App Store or Google Play. New users need to register when you download the app. For Theater, set your phone to airplane mode and connect to the GalaPro Wifi network right before the show starts.

Erineka answered audience questions. After the meeting she gave out her business cards and helped several individuals.

Since 2024, hearing aid battery packages have become notoriously difficult for users to open, often requiring sharp scissors, strength and dexterity. Although frustrating, there are some valid reasons for the changes—mostly related to safety, longevity and regulatory concerns, although disagreement remains about implementation and unintentional adverse effects.
