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#### Executive Summary

But this is a tactical oversight. When used by trained, ethically guided professionals, **surveillance becomes a form of protection**—a proactive strategy to identify, monitor, and intervene before exploitation occurs.

This paper introduces STCoE’s Watchline™ methodology: a field innovation that transforms surveillance from a passive tool of evidence collection into an **active system of early warning, institutional readiness, and trafficker exposure**. We do not wait for danger to appear. We track it—quietly, precisely, and ahead of time.

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#### I. The Flawed View of Surveillance in the Field
