Beloved,

Since last week, we celebrated and tearfully said goodbye to our wonderful Bishop John who has been with this Diocese since December 5, 1979. That is an amazing 50 years this coming December. I met him for the first time in September 1981 when I attended a Cursillo retreat when I was a mere 23 years old. I had been contemplating priesthood in a religious order, but when this man greeted me that weekend at Camp St. John, I knew this is where I was called by Jesus.

He attended his first FAITH & SHARING retreat for those with mental and physical disabilities along with their families and friends in 1981. He never missed celebrating Mass at this retreat until last year. His giftedness with special needs was awesome and o so holy. From this retreat blossomed CAMP I AM SPECIAL where high school "buddies" are paired up with special needs "campers". This ministry which has touched thousands and thousands of lives is mind boggling.

Bishop John ordained me 29 years ago. He was also at my 25th anniversary Mass. For a little while, he was in my small Emaus group for priests. He often beat me in tennis, but always encouraged me. He ordained me when many didn't believe in my calling. He encouraged me to remain a chaplain in the Naval Reserves.

When I was assigned to San Juan del Rio after returning from the Battle for Fallujah, I was blessed to live in the next apartment for two years at Casa San Pedro while ministering to San Juan del Rio church. He never coddled me, but he was a genuine spiritual father to me. Once when I thought I might lose my priesthood for being treated unjustly, I shared with him my frustration, anger and self-righteousness. He merely said to me,

"Ron, sometimes you just have to carry your cross."

Although I did not want to hear that, he was absolutely right. I knew my sin and begged him to hear my confession. If anyone knows me, they know I would never go to a bishop for my confession. And so the man who ordained me a priest through the laying on of hands simply smiled. He then spoke the words of absolution and laid his hands on me. I felt restored as a priest. On my way to help out at a reconciliation service, I had to stop my car on the side of the road as the oils of my ordination seemed to pour out over my head and into my eyes. The peace and compassionate love of Jesus overflowed from my heart.

The next confession I heard that day was very similar to mine. I had to share with that person and many since then, "Beloved, sometimes you just have to carry your cross."

In one of my last encounters of being with this great man, he was in Baptist South Hospital. He was alone and I shared with him my love and deep gratitude for ordaining me. He kidded with me, "Don't blame me." There was no TV on and his Rosary was in hand, but he was definitely carrying his cross. I even doubted he remembered who I was. As I was leaving, he called to me from his bed. He simply said,

"Ron, be the man God called you to be."

It was as if Jesus was speaking to me at the breakfast at the lake after the resurrection.

Three times he asks me, "Do you love me." Three times I answer in the affirmative followed by Jesus telling me,
"Feed my sheep" "Tend my lambs" and "Feed my sheep".


This of course leads to Jesus inviting me: "Follow me."

Thank you Jesus, for blessing me with the Bishop John J. Snyder. Thank you for leading me to this phenomenal Diocese of St. Augustine that has brought me to this exceptional beautiful parish of St. Monica. Our tears will definitely be turned into dancing.

Bishop John J. Snyder A Compassionate Bishop Goes Home to the Lord

Bishop John J. Snyder, who led the Diocese of St. Augustine for more than 20 years, died today, Sept. 27, on the feast of St. Vincent de Paul. He was 93. He led the 17-county diocese during a period of tremendous growth, when the number of Catholics more than doubled, requiring the addition of eight new parishes, seven elementary schools, and two high schools, St. Francis Catholic Academy in Gainesville and the school on the Westside that bears his name. He built the Catholic Center, the diocesan offices in Mandarin; renovated and expanded a riverfront estate into the Marywood Retreat and Spirituality Center and converted the old Immaculate Conception school downtown into the



Providence Center that provided offices for social service agencies. Bishop Snyder also built five retirement homes for low-income elderly, a nursing home and a retirement home for priests, where he spent his last years. But he was best known as a people's bishop – gregarious, approachable and interested in the lives of ordinary people. In the spirit of the Second Vatican Council, he empowered laypeople, especially women, to assume leadership roles in their parishes and diocesan ministries. "I will measure the effectiveness of my leadership by the ability and willingness of this local church to call forth, develop and utilize the gifts and talents not only of its priests and religious but all its people," he said on Dec. 5, 1979, when he was installed as the eighth bishop of the Diocese of St. Augustine. Bishop Snyder also reached out to groups that did not feel welcomed in the church – the divorced, the disabled, gays and lesbians, inmates, farmworkers, refugees, and immigrants. He streamlined the annulment process for the divorced. He established ministries for farmworkers, refugees, and immigrants, offering medical services and legal assistance as well as pastoral support. The disabled were particularly close to his heart. He established the Ministry for Persons with Disabilities that runs summer camps for disabled children and adults, who come from all over the country to attend. It wasn't unusual for Bishop Snyder to drop in to visit the campers attending Camp I Am Special. On the state level, he advocated for prison reform and spoke out against the death penalty. He was active in prison ministry and after his retirement in 2000 ministered to inmates on Death Row. He was one of the founders of the Interfaith Council in Jacksonville and was active in ecumenical discussions and events. In 1987 he was awarded the Brotherhood Award by the National Conference of Christians and Jews [now the National Conference of Community and Justice]. In 1991, he became co-chairman of the Anglican-Roman Catholic Dialogue, an outreach of the Committee on Ecumenism of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops. In that role he traveled with Catholic and Episcopal bishops, first to England to meet the Archbishop of Canterbury and then to Rome to meet Pope John Paul II. At the national level, Bishop Snyder also took a leadership role on women in the church. From 1992 to 1995 he was the chairman of the bishops' Committee on Women in Society and in the Church. Bishop Snyder was a New Yorker, born Oct. 25, 1925, into an Irish Catholic family. He grew up in Queens and Flushing. He was the second of three sons. The eldest, Eugene, died in World War II; the younger, James, worked with inner-city children who died of cancer in 1997. They had an adopted sister, Nancy who passed away in 2017. Bishop Snyder said he grew up playing baseball, basketball, tennis, and golf, but baseball was a special love. In his wallet, he carried an old photo of his school team, the Andreans. He was a lifelong fan of the St. Louis Cardinals. It's no mistake that the cardinal is the mascot of Bishop John J. Snyder High School, where he was a regular at football games. He studied at the Seminary of Immaculate Conception in Huntington, N.Y. and was ordained a priest on June 9, 1951. He served for six years in his neighborhood parish before he became the personal secretary to Brooklyn Bishop Bryan J. McEntegart. On Feb. 2, 1973, he was ordained a bishop to serve as auxiliary to Bishop Francis J. Mugavero in the Diocese of Brooklyn. Though he missed parish work, working in the diocesan office gave him the opportunity to be in Rome for the first session of the Second Vatican Council. He said in a 2014 interview that seeing bishops from all over the world made him realize that the church was universal. The council reforms also revolutionized his faith and his understanding of the church as the People of God.

App is a good place to start. If you find yourself getting distracted, which is normal, simply turn your mind back to God. Offering each decade for a special petition can help keep you focused. No matter how you choose to pray the rosary, you'll find it will bring you peace. If you don't have a rosary, help yourself to one found in the Adult Formation Centers at the entrances of the church. You'll also find pamphlets there that include the prayers and when to pray them. There are also CDs that you can listen to that include not only the rosary, but its history, along with the Divine Mercy Chaplet.
