

GREG SHARPE

Winner of the 2017 Nebraska Sportscaster of the Year award, Greg Sharpe is in his 12th football season as the Voice of the Huskers. Sharpe is also the lead broadcaster for Husker baseball and hosts Sports Nightly. Sharpe began broadcasting Husker sporting events in the winter of 2003, when he was tabbed to do play-by-play on Fox Sports Midwest's broadcasts of Nebraska men's and women's basketball. After filling in on the last three football broadcasts in 2007, he was named the full-time voice of the Huskers in February 2008. Sharpe came to the Husker Sports Network after a successful 21-year run at WIBW Radio and TV in Topeka, Kan, including six years as voice of the K-State Wildcats. Sharpe won two Kansas Sportscaster of the Year awards at WIBW



BEN McLAUGHLIN

Ben McLaughlin is in his fourth season as the sideline reporter for the Husker Sports Network's football broadcasts and his 11th season as a member of the Husker Sports Network team on football gameday. McLaughlin is also a play-by-play voice for Husker baseball and a co-host on Sports Nightly. McLaughlin joined the Husker Sports Network as a UNL student in July 2008, working as a producer for Sports Nightly and Husker sporting events. In addition to his work during the game on the Husker sidelines, McLaughlin has hosted Husker Gameday the past four seasons and also hosts the Locker Room Show.



NICK HANDLEY

Nick Handley is in his fifth year as a part of Nebraska's baseball broadcast team. Handley, who hosts The Nick Handley Show on KXSP-AM was hired in 2016 to the Husker Sports Network baseball broadcast team. Handley joined KXSP in 2013 after a six-year stint in Columbus as the sports director for Three Eagles Radio in Columbus. A Nebraska-Omaha alum, Handley has also served as the public-address announcer for UNO hockey for the past 13 years and Mavs men's basketball for the past seven.



NATE ROHR

Nate Rohr is in his 13th season as part of the football broadcast crew and his 16th season as the broadcaster for Nebraska softball, while also in his fourth season as the public-address announcer for Husker Football games at Memorial Stadium. Rohr began his career with the Husker Sports Network filling in on play-by-play for Nebraska softball in 2004, then took over as the primary broadcaster for Husker Softball the following season. He joined the football crew as a spotter and statistician in 2007, then added on-air duties as host of the Locker Room Show in 2016.



JOSH BANDFRAS

A Lincoln native and former Husker linebacker. Josh Banderas is in his third season as a pregame and postgame analyst for the Husker Sports Network. Banderas closed his Husker career by leading the team with 93 tackles and earning honorable mention All-Big Ten honors while serving as team captain. In all, Banderas made 232 tackles in his 47 career games as a Husker. Banderas' father, Tom, is a former Husker tight end and has served as postgame analyst on the Husker Sports Network.



JOHN BAYLOR

The soundtrack to five volleyball national championships, John Baylor is in his 26th season as the play-by-play voice of Nebraska volleyball on the Husker Sports Network. Baylor became the broadcaster for Husker volleyball in 1994 and has called 16 conference championship teams, 25 NCAA tournaments, and 11 NCAA regional championship teams, along with the five national titles. Baylor has also broadcasted Nebraska women's basketball (two years) and Husker baseball (seven years), while also calling the first five seasons of Lincoln Saltdogs baseball and the first two seasons of Lincoln Stars hockey.



MATT COATNEY

The man who made "You Betcha!" a catchphrase around Nebraska women's basketball, Matt Coatney is in his 21st year broadcasting Nebraska women's basketball and his 19th as the play-by-play voice of the team. In addition, Coatney is in his seventh season as a pregame and postgame host for the Husker Sports Network's football coverage. Coatney began broadcasting Nebraska women's basketball in the 1999-2000 season, taking over on a full-time basis two years later. In 2012, he added pregame and postgame duties on the football broadcasts, including hosting Big Red Reaction, hosting the 5th Quarter Show and serving as studio host during the play-by-play. Coatney has also filled in on broadcasts of Husker volleyball, men's basketball and softball.



LAUREN COOK WEST

Lauren Cook West is in her third season as Husker Sports Network's volleyball analyst. A 2012 first-team All-American, Cook West was a setter for Nebraska from 2010 to 2012. She ranks seventh in school history in career set assists with 3,198. In her All-American senior season. West averaged 11.15 assists per set and had 17 double-doubles. West played professional volleyball for two years in Puerto Rico and Switzerland before returning to Lincoln.



DAVISON

Second-year Associate Athletic Director for Football, Matt Davison is in his 13th season as the analyst on the Husker Sports Network's football broadcasts and 16th year on the HSN's football broadcasts overall. Davison was a standout wide receiver at Nebraska from 1997 to 2000. His catch on the final play of regulation at Missouri in 1997 saved Nebraska's chance to win the national championship. He joined the Husker Sports Network's football broadcasts in 2004 as a sideline reporter and pregame and postgame analyst, before moving into the analyst chair for the 2007 season. Davison also worked as the analyst for HSN's Husker basketball broadcasts for 15 years, before his hiring into athletic administration.



JEFF **GRIESCH**

Jeff Griesch enters his 22nd season as the color commentator for Nebraska women's basketball on the Husker Sports Network. Griesch has served as a media relations contact over that same time period, currently the senior associate director in charge of operations in the Nebraska Athletic Communications Office. Griesch came to Nebraska and started working in the communications office as a student, serving as a wrestling and soccer contact, also working as an analyst for broadcasts of Husker soccer. Griesch has also filled in on play-by-play of women's basketball for the Husker Sports Network.



JAKE MUHLHEISEN

Former Husker point guard Jake Muhleisen is in his third season as the analyst for Nebraska men's basketball on the Husker Sports Network. A Lincoln native. Muhleisen was a four-year starter and three-year team captain for the Huskers under Barry Collier from 2001 through 2005. Muhleisen averaged 9.1 points and 2.8 assists per game for the Huskers. His 98 career starts ranks in the top 10 in school history.



KENT PAVELKA

Kent Pavelka broadcasts his 34th season of Nebraska men's basketball in 2019-20. adding to one of the most legendary careers in broadcasting in the state of Nebraska. Pavelka began broadcasting Husker sports in 1974, when he was hired by KFAB of Omaha to call Nebraska men's basketball and serve as color commentator to Lvell Bremser on broadcasts of Husker football. In 1984, Pavelka was elevated to the playby-play job for Husker football while still calling Nebraska basketball, in an 11-year tenure as voice of the Huskers that included two football national championships. After an 11-year absence, Pavelka returned as a Husker broadcaster for the 2006-07 men's basketball season and was inducted into the Nebraska Broadcasters. Association Hall of Fame in 2019



BRFNDFN STAI

An All-American offensive lineman for Nebraska and an eight-year NFL veteran, Brenden Stai is in his eighth season contributing to the Husker Sports Network's coverage of Nebraska Football on pregame and postgame. Stai was a consensus first-team All-American at right guard as a part of the vaunted Pipeline that paved the way for Tom Osborne's first national championship as NU head coach. After Nebraska, Stai began his career as the starting right guard for the Super Bowl Champion Pittsburgh Steelers.



STEVE

A first-team All-American guarterback for the Huskers, Steve Taylor is in his eight season on the Husker Sports Network's broadcast team. Taylor is a pregame and postgame analyst, after previously working on Countdown to Kickoff and Big Red Reaction, as well as working as sideline reporter. A three-year starter at quarterback, Taylor closed his Husker career with a 31-6 record as starting quarterback, leading NU to three 10-win seasons. Taylor was an All-American in 1987 throwing for 13 touchdowns and 902 yards and rushing for eight touchdowns while guiding NU to a 10-2 record and a No. 6 national ranking. After his time at NU, Taylor played in the CFL for eight years and helped Calgary to the 1992 Grey Cup.

NEW COACH, **NEW ERA**

The Nebraska baseball program begins a new era in 2020, as Will Bolt takes over in his first season at the helm of his alma mater. Bolt, who played for the Huskers from 1999 to 2002, was named the 24th skipper in NU baseball history on June 14.

The Huskers, who have qualified for four of the last six NCAA Tournaments. look to continue that trend this season. NU has been among the top teams in the Big Ten since joining the conference before the 2012 season. The Huskers have finished in the top three of the Big Ten three times in the last four years, including a tie for third in 2019. At last year's Big Ten Tournament, NU took runner-up honors and qualified for the Oklahoma City Regional.

Bolt, who spent the last five seasons

as an assistant coach at Texas A&M. brings 11 years of NCAA Division I coaching experience after captaining NU's first two College World Series teams in 2001 and 2002. He added Jeff Christy and Lance Harvell as assistant coaches before tabbing Danny Marcuzzo as the volunteer assistant coach.

Christy, who played a key role on Nebraska's 2005 College World Series team, brings nine years of collegiate coaching experience to the Husker staff. He will coach NU's pitchers and

catchers. Harvell, who spent the last five years at Sam Houston State, serves as Nebraska's recruiting coordinator. Harvell coaches hitters and outfielders, while also serving as the Huskers' third-base coach. Marcuzzo, who spent one season at Coffeyville Community College, will coach infielders, while also serving as the Huskers' first-base coach.

In 2020, Nebraska will have to replace its weekend rotation after losing departed seniors Matt Waldron, Nate Fisher and Reece Eddins. Colby Gomes, a NCBWA Freshman All-American last season, is a candidate to take a starting role this season after serving as NU's closer in 2019. Gomes recorded 13 saves last season, which ranked tied for 11th nationally and fourth in the Big Ten.

Offensively, the Huskers return both of their All-Big Ten selections from last season, Aaron Palensky and Cam Chick. Palensky, a junior outfielder, led the Husker offense in nearly every offensive statistical category, including batting average with a .320 clip. He also led the team in hits (71), runs scored (43), home

runs (7) and total bases (107), while sharing the team high in doubles (11) and triples (2). Chick, a sophomore infielder, hit .316 during Big Ten play to earn a spot on the all-conference second team and All-Freshman Team.

Returners Mojo Hagge (.280 batting average in 2019), Spencer Schwellenbach (.275) and Joe Acker (.260) recorded three of Nebraska's top four batting averages last season, along with Palensky. Departed senior Angelo Altavilla was the only player in NU's top 10 batting averages from 2019 that isn't on the 2020 roster.

Nebraska's 2020 schedule includes match-ups with seven NCAA Tournament qualifiers from last season. The Huskers open the season against former conference foe and 2019 NCAA qualifier Baylor in Waco, Texas (Feb. 14-16).

The following weekend, Nebraska journeys to San Diego, Calif., for the Tony Gwynn Legacy where they will battle San Diego (Feb. 21), San Diego State (Feb. 22) and Arizona (Feb. 23).

NU continues its season-opening

road trip when the Huskers visit Arizona State for three games from Feb. 28 to March 1 in Tempe, Ariz. Last season, the Sun Devils earned a spot in the NCAA Tournament.

Nebraska's home opener is scheduled for March 6 against Columbia, as the first of 24 games at Hawks Field at Haymarket Park in 2020. The four-game set between the Huskers and Lions continues with a doubleheader on March 7 before the series finale on March 8. NU continues its six-game home stand against Northern Colorado on March 10 and 11.

The Huskers hit the road to face Wichita State (March 13-15) and Kansas State (March 17). The Huskers and Wildcats are scheduled to meet twice in 2020, as K-State visits Lincoln on March 31.

Nebraska hosts UNLV (March 20-22) at Hawks Field and travels to Air Force (March 24-25) before opening Big Ten play. The Huskers begin the conference slate by hosting Northwestern (March

27-29). Nebraska's other home Big Ten series are against Rutgers (April 17-19), Ohio State (May 1-3) and Penn State (May 8-10). Last season, the Buckeyes captured the Big Ten Tournament title en route to a spot in the NCAA Tournament.

Nebraska's four conference road series are against Maryland (April 3-5), Purdue (April 10-12), Michigan (April 24-26) and Indiana (May 14-16). Last season, the Wolverines advanced to the finals of the College World Series before finishing as the national runner-up. The Hoosiers won the Big Ten regularseason crown in 2019 before qualifying for the NCAA Tournament.

NU has four games against intrastate foes in 2020. The Huskers visit
Creighton on April 7 and April 28 at TD
Ameritrade Park in Omaha, Neb., and
host the Bluejays at Hawks Field on
April 21. The Huskers host Omaha on
April 14 in Lincoln. The Bluejays and
Mavericks both qualified for the NCAA
Tournament last season.

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
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

AARON PALENSKY

5'11", 190, JUNIOR, PAPILLION, NEB (SOUTHEAST CC /PAPILLION LA VISTA SOUTH)

Junior outfielder Aaron Palensky made an immediate impact during his first season at Nebraska on his way to second-team All-Big Ten honors in 2019. He led the Husker offense in nearly every offensive statistical category, including batting average with a .320 clip (71-for-222), which ranked eighth in the Big Ten. Palensky also led the team in hits (71), runs scored (43), home runs (7) and total bases (107).



O&A WITH WILL BOLT

GETTING TO KNOW THE NEW COACH

Ben McLaughlin sits down with the first-year coach



McLaughlin: Coach, you've been through a lot having accepted the job as head baseball coach at Nebraska. Now that the season is finally close, what's the feeling?

Bolt: It feels good to be thinking about baseball. Just a lot of juggling of recruiting, getting to know our players this summer, the guys that are on campus, the incoming freshmen, buying and selling houses, getting families moved, so being able to get out and be in our sanctuary, which is the baseball field, feels great.

McLaughlin: How has it been being a head coach the last few months at this level after being an assistant for so long?

Bolt: You start to wear a few more hats, but you also kind of get more of an appreciation for all the support that we do have that are readily available to help; from Renee (Brinkman) to Curtis Ledbetter, to Tanner Lubach, to Katie Jewell and all the support staff; just kind of making sure things run smoothly. It's a lot different than the last time I was a head coach at Texarkana Junior College where I had to wear all the hats and do everything, so it gives you more of an appreciation for all the support that we have.

McLaughlin: Let's talk about your staff and who you decided to bring with you to Lincoln. You decided to bring Jeff Christy back along with Lance (Horvell) and Danny (Marcuzzo). How have you guys meshed together, and for them, taken in what it's going to be like coaching at Nebraska?

Bolt: It's been great. The best way I'd describe our staff is we're like family. I coached both Jeff and Lance a long time ago when they were playing. We've coached against each other in the past at different stops in the past. And our families

know each other really well. And Danny Marcuzzo, he crossed paths with Jeff down at Central Oklahoma, and he came highly recommended to me by a lot of people that I trust, including Jeff, of course. Plus it's a bonus that he's from Omaha. He grew up in the state. He's got strong ties to the Jayhawk League in the Midwest, so as far as the staff meshing, it's been great.

McLaughlin: One big part to this equation is your players. I know when you got here some were out playing summer ball, some were rehabbing injuries and they were scattered. How has it gone getting to know them and being real with them while teaching them what you want Nebraska Baseball to be all about?

Bolt: It's been a lot of fun. Like I said. we had a few guys here in the summer. unfortunately, rehabbing from injury. Some were playing summer ball close by so we got to meet. There were probably about 10 to 12 guys I got to meet right away that were here in the area. And about a month later we had the 11 newcomers, the freshmen coming in for summer school. We really kind of need to see them over the course of the six weeks to see them come out of their shell a little bit and get more comfortable. And a lot of the guys come back after summer ball. So it was like three different waves of meeting players. They have been great at just diving head first in to everything we've asked them to do. There's probably even more familiarity with them then they even know because we followed the program from afar as well, It's been a really fun process getting to know these kids.

McLaughlin: They have a lot to learn from you, but you have a lot to learn from them as well. What have you seen in this team's characteristics, leadership and make-up?

Bolt: It seems like the guys at the top of our roster have been some of the hardest workers, and that's what you want. Any great team has that where it feels like the best players on your team are some of the hardest workers, and they've done everything we've asked them to do, and then some. Now we finally get to go to the baseball part and see how some guys deal with different stress levels, dealing with success, dealing with failure, so it will be a fun process.

McLaughlin: This is a pretty unique situation for you. Usually when a new coach takes over, the culture of a program is in shambles. That's not the case here. Coach Erstad left this place in a pretty good spot. Where do you suppose the culture was at when you got here, and what direction do you want to take it? It's probably not far off from when you were here last as an assistant.

Bolt: Yeah and having been here five short years ago. I see a lot of the things that started to develop in 2011. This program has always been built on hard work. It's been a regional program now for several years. But now the next step is, and we've been telling this to our players, is there's a difference between being a regional level team, and a team that's going to compete to win a regional and have a chance to go to Omaha. They've had a taste of it last year, being so close. You know, having a chance to go 2-0 in that regional and it's a pretty fine line. But I've seen a lot of guys that are very hungry. They're humble, hard workers, and a lot of the things we're asking them to do are things they've already done in the past

McLaughlin: You have a lot of new faces on this team and a freshmen class you're very excited about. How do you keep them from trying to do too much but instead do what got them here?

Bolt: One of the messages we're going to give to them today is, "Be the best version of yourself." If you can just harness that and not try to be Superman. not try to be Mike Trout or Barry Bonds or Nolan Ryan or whoever. But just go be the best version of yourself. And if you can show up and do that - know what your role is, know what your strengths are - do those things every day, you've got a chance to have sustained, consistent success. And so if we get a bunch of individual players to do that and just keep punching the clock every day, then you're going to have a chance to have good consistent team success.

McLaughlin: What did you learn about your pitchers? Do you have enough depth on the mound?

Bolt: Yeah What I've seen is a lot of guys really improve over the course of the fall and just some guys in particular with command of secondary pitches and fastball command and general attack on the mound. I saw some guys that maybe, didn't have a ton of confidence coming in that really improved over the fall and showed a lot of confidence at the end of the fall. I think we have some good pieces. We've got some good right- and left-handed guys. Some guys out of the bullpen that can match up with you. The key is gonna be to find enough guys that can turn over the lineup a few times on the mound and have those three or four starters that you can depend on.

JEFF CHRISTY

Jeff Christy joined the Nebraska baseball staff as an assistant coach in June 2019. Christy coaches pitchers and catchers. Christy, who played a key role on Nebraska's 2005 College World Series team, brings nine years of collegiate coaching experience to the Husker staff. Christy, a graduate of Lincoln Southeast High School, spent the last two seasons as a volunteer assistant coach at Texas A&M under former NU assistant Roh Childress



LANCE HARVELL

Lance Harvell joined the Nebraska baseball staff as assistant coach and recruiting coordinator in June 2019. Harvell coaches hitters and outfielders, while also serving as the Huskers' third-base coach. Harvell spent the last five seasons at Sam Houston State as the team's assistant coach and recruiting coordinator under Matt Deggs. During that span, the Bearkats captured four Southland Conference regular-season titles and qualified for the NCAA Tournament in 2016 and 2017.



DANNY MARCUZZO

Danny Marcuzzo joined the Nebraska baseball staff as a volunteer assistant coach and camp coordinator in July 2019.

Marcuzzo coaches infielders, while also serving as the Huskers' first-base coach. Marcuzzo spent one season as the assistant coach and recruiting coordinator at Coffeyville Community College under Head Coach Jake Martin before coming to Nebraska.





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BIG TEN PREVIEW

ILLINOIS

Coach: Dan Hartleb (15th Season) 2019 Record: 36-21, 15-9 Big Ten

Illinois finished third in the Big Ten and advanced to the NCAA Oxford Regional, falling to Jacksonville State. The Illini made its fourth NCAA Tournament appearance in the last nine years - the best stretch in program history. Illinois returns senior pitcher Garrett Acton, who earned first-team All-Big Ten honors. Acton finished the season with a 2.18 ERA and a record of 2-3. The Illini also set the Big Ten record for fielding percentage in Big Ten games (.987).

INDIANA

Coach: Jeff Mercer (2nd Season) 2019 Record: 36-21, 17-7 Big Ten

Indiana heads into the season after winning the Big Ten regular-season title in 2019 under Big Ten Coach of the Year Jeff Mercer. Mercer became the first coach in the Big Ten since 1982 to win the conference as a first-year coach. Last season, the Hoosiers qualified for the NCAA Regionals but fell to host Louisville. Although Indiana lost Big Ten Pitcher of the Year Andrew Saalfrank, who finished with a 2.84 ERA, the Hoosiers return junior Elijah Dunham on offense. Dunham led the team with a .310 batting average.

IOWA

Coach: Rick Heller (7th Season) 2019 Record: 31-24, 12-12 Big Ten

lowa ended the season with a seventh-place finish in the Big Ten before falling to Minnesota in the Big Ten Tournament. The Hawkeyes lost nine seniors but return redshirt senior pitcher Grant Leonard who earned second-team All-Big Ten honors. Leonard finished with an ERA of 3.37 and led the team with 14 saves. lowa will rely on a heavy underclassmen presence as 21 players are either freshmen or sophomores.

MARYLAND

Coach: Rob Vaughn (2nd Season) 2019 Record: 29-29, 12-12 Big Ten

Maryland's season closed after a loss to Michigan in the Big Ten Tournament. The Terrapins finished eighth in the Big Ten but had a five-win improvement from the 2018 season. Maryland returns Maxwell Costes, who earned the Big Ten Freshman of the Year Award. Costes finished the season with a .257 batting average and led the team with 13 home runs. Costes led Big Ten freshman in home runs, doubles (14), slugging (.500), RBIs (44) and total bases (101).

MICHIGAN

Coach: Erik Bakich (8th Season) 2019 Record: 50-22, 16-7 Big Ten

Michigan comes off a historic 2019 season with a runner-up finish at the College World Series. The Wolverines also recorded the program's most wins since 1987 with a 50-22 record, placing second in the Big Ten. Michigan lost Big Ten Player of the Year Jordan Brewer after being selected in the MLB Draft, but will return pitcher Jeff Criswell who earned first-team All-Big Ten honors. Criswell finished the season with a 2.72 ERA and a record of 7-1.

MICHIGAN STATE

Coach: Jake Boss Jr. (12th Season) **2019 Record:** 20-34, 8-15 Big Ten

Michigan State finished the 2019 season in 11th place in the Big Ten. The Spartans finished the season winning three of its last four Big Ten series, including two on the road. Michigan State returns freshman Zaid Walker who earned a spot on the All-Big Ten Freshman Team. Walker finished with a .285 average, starting 47 of 49 games.



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BIG TEN PREVIEW

MINNESOTA

Coach: John Anderson (39th Season) 2019 Record: 29-27, 15-9 Big Ten

Minnesota ended the season fifth in the Big Ten before falling to Ohio State in the Big Ten Tournament. The Gophers return junior pitcher Max Meyer who earned first-team All-Big Ten honors, and redshirt junior Jordan Kozicky. Meyer finished the season with an ERA of 2.11, while Kozicky led the team with 11 home runs and 49 RBIs.

NORTHWESTERN

Coach: Spencer Allen (5th Season) 2019 Record: 24-27, 11-13 Big Ten

Northwestern did not reach the Big Ten Tournament after finishing ninth in the conference standings. The Wildcats only lost four seniors and will return Michael Trautwein, Shawn Goosenberg and Michael Doherty - three outstanding freshmen who made the All-Big Ten Freshman Team. Trautwein posted the best caughtstealing rate in the Big Ten (41 percent), while Doherty posted a 2.43 ERA in Big Ten competition. Goosenberg led the team with 14 doubles and three triples.

OHIO STATE

Coach: Greg Beals (10th Season) 2019 Record: 36-27, 12-12 Big Ten

Ohio State returns as 2019 Big Ten Tournament champions after defeating Nebraska in the championship game. The Buckeyes became the lowest-ever seed to win the Big Ten Tournament and advanced to the NCAA Tournament where the team fell to Indiana State at Regionals. Ohio State returns junior catcher Dillon Dingler and redshirt sophomore pitcher Seth Lonsway, who each earned All-Big Ten accolades.

PENN STATE

Coach: Rob Cooper (7th Season) 2019 Record: 22-27, 4-18 Big Ten

Penn State concluded the season with a 13th-place finish in the Big Ten. The Nittany Lions lost redshirt sophomore pitcher Dante Biasi to the MLB Draft, but return sophomore Justin Williams, who was named to the All-Big Freshman Team. Williams tied for the team lead in home runs with four, and batted .262 with five doubles, a triple and 18 RBIs.

PURDUE

Coach: Greg Goff (1st Season) 2019 Record: 20-34, 4-18 Big Ten

Purdue placed 12th in the Big Ten in 2019 after taking runner-up honors in 2018. Purdue did not advance to the Big Ten Tournament. The Boilermakers only lost three seniors and could return over 25 letterwinners for the 2020 season, including junior pitcher Bo Hofstra. Hofstra earned third-team All-Big Ten honors and finished with an ERA of 1.62 and seven saves.

RUTGERS

Coach: Steve Owens (1st Season) 2019 Record: 20-31, 9-14 Big Ten

Rutgers closed the season with a 10th-place finish in the Big Ten to fall short of qualifying for the conference tournament. The Scarlet Knights finished the season with nine Big Ten wins, tying the 2016 team for the most since joining the conference. Rutgers returns senior pitcher Tevin Murray who earned second-team All-Big Ten Honors. Murray finished third in the Big Ten with a 1.75 ERA in conference play over eight starts and 46.1 innings.

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

SUCCESSFUL STABILITY

The 2020 Huskers are an experienced team with just three newcomers. Nebraska lost four seniors to graduation, including its starting all-region catcher, Bri Cassidy, and all-conference outfielder Alyvia Simmons.


However, for the second season in a row, the Huskers return their top hitter from the previous season in all-conference and all-region honoree Tristen Edwards. Edwards started all 52 games as a junior and led the team in batting average (.376), homers (15), RBIs (50) and slugging (.758). Edwards earned first-team All-Big Ten honors for the second consecutive season, becoming the first Husker to do so since All-Americans MJ Knighten and Kiki Stokes in 2015 and 2016.

Joining Edwards in the senior class is outfielder Bree Boruff, and infielders Lexey Kneib and Samantha Owen, who combined for 113 starts in 2019. Owen ranked second on the team with a slugging percentage of .492 and 10 doubles. Boruff is expected to help replace Simmons in the outfield after

making 25 starts in left field and one start in center last season. Kneib and Owen will compete for a spot in the infield. Kneib was Nebraska's primary second baseman in 2019, while Owen made 45 starts at third.

The junior class consists of Rylie Unzicker, Sarah Yocom, Ally Riley, Olivia Ferrell and a transfer in Cam Ybarra (Oregon State). Unzicker was a consistent starter, making 44 starts in center field as a sophomore. Yocom will compete for a spot in the infield after playing second base and shortstop last season. Riley will compete to replace Cassidy behind the plate. Riley has made 19 career starts and ranks second among returners with a career batting average of .313. Ferrell is Nebraska's most experienced pitcher with 162.2 innings pitched through two seasons.

Ybarra will look to help the Huskers in the infield, as well as on offense. An All-Pac-12 pick, Ybarra hit .229 in two seasons at Oregon State.

As Nebraska's largest class, the sophomores will play a vital role in the team's success in 2020. Despite being young, the class gained great experience as freshmen. Courtney Wallace and Lindsey Walljasper were major contributors at several positions for the Huskers in 2019 and are expected to play key roles on both offense and defense in 2020. The two were the only players to make starts at three or more different positions last year. Wallace played in all but five games as a freshman and made starts at pitcher, third base, left field and designated player. At the plate,

she led the team with four triples. Walljasper started at pitcher, left field and designated player as a freshman. She played in all but one of Nebraska's 52 games and led the pitching staff in innings pitched (106.1), strikeouts (91) and appearances (31).

Fellow sophomore Peyton Glatter also saw significant playing time and is expected to help replace Simmons in the outfield and at the plate. Glatter played in 38 games, which included 15 starts in right field, 14 starts in left field and three starts as the designated player. At the plate, Glatter led the freshmen in 2019 with a .265 batting average. Anni Raley will also compete to replace Cassidy at catcher. Raley appeared in 33 games last season, but primarily as a pinch runner. A pitcher, Karlee Seevers



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
Sophomore pitcher Lindsey Walljasper

will look to make her first appearance in the circle in 2020. Payton Huscroft and Carson Fischer will add depth in the infield and outfield, respectively. Huscroft made six appearances last season, including one start at designated player. Fischer appeared 28 times as a freshman. She made two starts at second base, but spent most of the time as a pinch runner.

The freshmen class consists of Mikaela Forcum, Keana "KP" Pola and Brooke Andrews. Forcum redshirted last year after not appearing in a game. She will compete for playing time at catcher. Pola and Andrews were standout prep infielders who will look to make an immediate impact. A Santa Ana, Calif., native, Pola, was ranked the No. 57 overall recruit by Extra Innings Softball and was named a first-team high school

All-American by the organization as well in 2018. She finished her career with a .939 slugging percentage with 60 doubles, 12 triples and 10 home runs. She played club for the Corona Angels, the same club that produced current Huskers Cam Ybarra and Tristen Edwards. Her team won the 2014 14U PGF National Championship before placing second at the 18U PGF National Championship in 2017 and 2018, respectively.

An Omaha, Neb., native. Andrews helped Gretna High School to four district titles and four state appearances. The four-time all-conference pick finished with a .445 batting average and was a three-time Lincoln Journal Star Super State Pick and an Omaha World-Herald All-Nebraska honoree.

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
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

HUSKERS HITTING WITH POWER

Nate Rohr sits down with the 28th-year coach



Rohr: What growth have you seen from your team from the end of fall ball to now?

Revelle: There were more balls that flew out of the vard the first time outside than I can remember, so whatever they're doing in the cages is transferring. We put some hop in a lot of balls. The other thing we focused on, we've been able to slow things down, so we've focused on locking our fundamentals in. I just see, even as we go through baserunning things, things are sticking. We're not having to (reteach) as much. From the stuff we said in the fall, we've had to say it once and on we go.

Rohr: What did you get out of fall ball?

Revelle: There were a lot of really positive things. We have three newcomers that saw significant playing time, and we can see how they can have a positive impact on our team. We also ran a straight rotation all fall long so everyone got at-bats, everyone got playing time, and I thought that was great. I thought we were interchangeable at a lot of different positions. We also saw some steps forward on the mound, getting a lot more swings and misses from our pitchers. You didn't necessarily always see it on the scoreboard, but I see what they're doing in getting swings and misses, and we're going to build on that in the off-season, and that's all without Lindsay Walliasper being available to us

Rohr: What have you seen from the infield to this point?

Revelle: That's a picture in progress. We could see a lot of new people in positions. For instance, we're working Peyton Huscroft, Lexey Kneib and Samantha Owen all at first base. Right now, it's very competitive. It looks like Cam Ybarra has pretty much put a lock on second base, especially with her offense that she adds for us, but we have two-deep at every position and three-deep at some.

Rohr: At shortstop, you've used Tristen Edwards, a natural outfielder, the last couple years. How does shortstop look this year?

Revelle: There's really good competition there. We have Sarah Yocom, who's played there her whole career, and then we have Brooke Andrews, a freshman from Gretna, and she's got some good talent, nice hands, and a game savvy about her that makes her really poised out there. She loves defense.

Rohr: Keana Pola is another freshman who could make an impact on the infield. What stands out about her?

Revelle: Nothing seems to rattle her. You can put her in any game situation, offensively or defensively, and she just stays really even. Her competitive poise is at a very high level as a freshman, and competitive poise is something that any coach would pay a premium to have that. The other thing is her softball I.Q. is really high, and she's not only able to translate what she knows about the game, but she's physically able to execute it.

Rohr: Tristen Edwards will move from shortstop back to her natural defensive position of right field. How do you think the lighter load defensively will help her offensively?

Revelle: Let me put it this way: We played a complete Division I schedule in the fall, seven games, and she hit five home runs. Not that she's not capable of that, regardless of what position she's playing, but I think it's just freed her up. She's taken a lot of pride in her defense. The sun can be quite a challenge at Bowlin Stadium in right field, but she's been working like a dog to not only handle the balls in the sun, but also the balls in the gap. She's played admirably defensively, but I think the position move has really freed her up offensively. Midway through the fall. I moved her to the leadoff spot and I really like her there.

Rohr: What does putting Tristen Edwards in the leadoff spot allow her to do that she wouldn't even be able to do in the three or four spot?

Revelle: Right out of the gate, pitchers are already starting to be careful from the very first pitch of the game. The last two games of fall, she swung at the first pitch, hit it hard, not for a hit, but it's really set the tempo for the rest of the game. She also runs well, so that helps. We hit her sister Tatum (Edwards) in the leadoff spot as well, so I'm really excited about it.

Rohr: You have to replace Bri Cassidy at catcher. How does that race look right now?

Revelle: Right now, both Anni Raley and Ally Riley are doing some things well. They're just rotating. I don't know that that will change. It's not that one of them is a liability or one has outdistanced the other. They both have things they bring to the table. The one thing that they've both been doing well is handling the pitchers and getting strikes, and that's been a fun little game we've played this fall, is to see how many borderline strikes each catcher is getting for our pitchers.

Rohr: What have you seen from Olivia Ferrell as she's developed from last year?

Revelle: First of all, she's really strong. She's always been in good shape and that's been really important to her, but she's in fighting shape now. She's ready to go. The thing Olivia has worked on is tempering her game. Olivia has been

challenged by the fact that her desire to succeed as a pitcher is so great, it almost made her tight. She's worked on just understanding how you can take that want and gear it down so your body can perform. She's trained; she's ready to go. Nobody works harder. Nobody puts in as many reps. She's doing just a lot more throwing the ball through the zone. If you look at her stats, she's averaged a strikeout an inning this fall, and I think before, you'd think more about Olivia as a pitch-to-contact pitcher, but when you're averaging a strikeout an inning, you're a strikeout pitcher. She's doing it with better movement and her off-speed has really improved.


Rohr: You also have two pitchers rising from freshmen to sophomores in Lindsay Walljasper and Courtney Wallace. How have you seen them develop?

Revelle: They both struggled with injuries that kept them out of games this fall, but in each of their cases, I have to tip my hat to both of them. Of course they were disappointed that they couldn't play and that they weren't at full speed, but they took what they could do and worked on that. For instance, Lindsey broke her left (non-throwing) hand the first day of fall practice, so she spent most of the fall working on her power game by exploding off the mound. Courtney has worked a lot on her off-speed pitch. So they've taken something to work on and not let themselves get distracted by the injury, and gotten better. You can't buy experience, and last year as freshman, they got significant innings and they're coming in as sophomores now.

LORI SIPPEL

Entering her 31st season at Nebraska in 2020, Lori Sippel has helped Nebraska set nearly every team pitching record, while her pitchers have often played the leading role in the Huskers' 20 NCAA Tournament appearances in the last 25 years, including three trips to the Women's College World Series. In the last 25 years, Nebraska has averaged at least one all-region and all-conference pitcher per season. Sippel has also produced five All-Americans and two Olympians.



DIANE MILLER

Nebraska's offense has exploded under Miller's watch, with 35 school records set during her 11 seasons. Nebraska's record-breaking performances come on the heels of Miller's nine seasons at Colorado State. Individually, Husker hitters have combined to earn 37 all-conference honors, 24 all-region accolades and seven All-America awards under Miller. In her work as Nebraska's catching instructor, Miller has coached four catchers to six combined all-conference awards in her first 11 seasons.







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BIG TEN PREVIEW

ILLINOIS

Coach: Tyra Petty (5th Season) 2019 Record: 33-25, 9-14 Big Ten

Illinois finished eighth in the Big Ten regular-season standings and advanced to the NCAA Tournament. The season ended with a loss to Virginia Tech. Illinois lost seven seniors last year, but returns junior catcher Bella Loya, who earned a spot on First-Team All-Big Ten team. The catcher started all 58 games for the Illini and racked up a .366 batting average that included 12 home runs.

INDIANA

Coach: Shonda Stanton (3rd Season) **2019 Record:** 36-21, 10-13 Big Ten

Indiana, seventh in the conference last year, saw its 2019 season end with a loss to Northwestern in the Big Ten Tournament. The Hoosiers lost First-Team All-Big Ten catcher/infielder Maddie Westmoreland and second-team all-conference pitcher Tara Trainer. IU returns senior pitcher Emily Goodin, who finished with a 2.41 ERA, and senior Katie Lacefield, who finished with a batting average of .313 last season.

IOWA

Coach: Renee Gillispie (2nd Season) 2019 Record: 19-31, 5-18 Big Ten

lowa finished 12th in the Big Ten regular-season standings in 2019. The 2020 Hawkeyes will be led by their six seniors, including Second-Team All-Big Ten pitcher Allison Doocy, who made 38 appearances and led the pitching staff with a 2.70 ERA and 195 strikeouts.

MARYLAND

Coach: Mark Montgomery (1st Season) 2019 Record: 20-31, 4-19 Big Ten

Maryland finished last in the Big Ten standings, falling short of the 2019 Big Ten Tournament. The Terrapins lost their last eight games of the season, but hope to start fresh under first-year head coach Mark Montgomery. Maryland returns junior infielder Sammie Stefan, who earned Second-Team All-Big Ten honors. Stefan finished third on the team with a .299 batting average and led the team with seven homers.

MICHIGAN

Coach: Carol Hutchins (36th Season) 2019 Record: 45-13, 22-1 Big Ten

Last season, Michigan claimed the Big Ten regularseason title and won the Big Ten Tournament. The Wolverines made the NCAA Tournament, but lost in the NCAA Regional to No. 16 James Madison. Michigan returns First-Team All-Big Ten picks in outfielder Lexie Blair and pitcher Meghan Beaubien. Blair led the Wolverines with a batting average of .406, while Beaubien led the team with a 1.87 ERA.

MICHIGAN STATE

Coach: Jacquie Joseph (25th Season) 2019 Record: 16-34, 4-18 Big Ten

Michigan State fell short of the Big Ten Tournament, finishing in 13th place in the conference regular-season standings. The Spartans finished with a record of 16-34. Michigan State lost four seniors and will rely on a strong junior class presence this season, including junior infielder Caitie Ladd. Ladd earned Second-Team All-Big Ten Honors last year and finished with a .299 batting average.

MINNESOTA

Coach: Jamie Trachsel (3rd Season) 2019 Record: 46-14, 20-2 Big Ten

Minnesota is coming off a memorable 2019 season, as the team finished third in the Big Ten and advanced to the Women's College World Series for the first time in school history. The Gophers return Big Ten Pitcher of the Year Amber Fiser and First-Team All-Big Ten infielder MaKenna Partain – both seniors. Fiser finished the season with a 1.27 ERA, and Partain led the team with a .383 batting average.

NORTHWESTERN

Coach: Kate Drohan (19th Season) 2019 Record: 47-13, 21-2 Big Ten

Northwestern finished second in the Big Ten regularseason standings and made a run in the NCAA Tournament before falling to 2019 runner-up Oklahoma in the Super Regionals. The Wildcats earned two Big Ten awards, as Head Coach Kate Drohan won Coach of the Year, and pitcher/utility player Danielle Williams won Freshman of the Year. Williams was a First-Team All-Big Ten honoree and led Northwestern with a 31-8 record in the circle. The Wildcats also return sophomore catcher/utility player Jordyn Rudd, who led the team with a batting average of .328.

OHIO STATE

Coach: Kelly Kovach Schoenly (8th Season) 2019 Record: 35-13, 17-6 Big Ten

Ohio State was an NCAA Tournament team last season following a fourth-place finish in the Big Ten regularseason standings. The Buckeyes will have to replace the loss of nine seniors, including Emily Clark and Lilli Piper, two First-Team All-Big Ten honorees who led the team in hitting. Returners include junior pitcher Skylar Hayward (1.95 ERA) and sophomore infielder Ashley Prange, who finished with a batting average of .311.

PENN STATE

Coach: Amanda Lehotak (7th Season) 2019 Record: 24-32, 7-16 Big Ten

Penn State finished 10th in the Big Ten last season and fell to Indiana in the Big Ten Tournament. The Nittany Lions head into the 2020 season returning sophomore infielder Chelsea Bisi, who earned a spot on the Big Ten All-Freshman Team in 2019, and senior infielder Destiny Weber, who led the team with a batting average of .313.

PURDUE

Coach: Boo De Oliveira (4th Season) 2019 Record: 34-29, 6-17 Big Ten

Purdue finished 11th in the conference regular-season standings and qualified for the National Invitational Softball Championships. The Boilermakers ended their season with a loss to Iowa State. The Boilermakers return sophomore infielder Rachel Becker, who ranked second on the team with a .354 batting average in 2019. Seventeen 17 players on the 2020 team are freshmen or sophomores.

RUTGERS

Coach: Kristen Butler (2nd Season) 2019 Record: 26-29, 11-12 Big Ten After finishing sixth in the Big Ten, Rutgers earned a spot at the National Invitational Softball Championships. The Scarlet Knights return sophomore catcher Katie Wingert and junior pitcher Taylor Manno. Wingert earned Second-Team All-Big Ten Honors and finished with a .317 batting average, and Manno finished with a 2.62 ERA. Rutgers welcomes nine freshmen to the team in 2020.

WISCONSIN

Coach: Yvette Healy (10th Season) 2019 Record: 43-14, 15-8 Big Ten

Wisconsin finished fifth in the conference regularseason standings before qualifying for the NCAA Tournament. The Badgers fell to eventual runner-up Oklahoma in the regional. The Badgers return Big Ten Player of the Year Kayla Konwent, who finished with a .459 batting average and led the team in hits, RBI, doubles, home runs, batting average, slugging percentage and on-base percentage. Wisconsin will look for leadership from their six seniors.

SPRING POWERS

A position-by-position look at the Huskers heading into coach Scott Frost's third spring practice season

QUARTERBACK

Adrian Martinez saw his production dip as a sophomore, but after off-season shoulder surgery, Martinez hopes to return to his freshman form. Talented redshirt freshman Luke McCaffrey, who tantalized fans in limited work in 2019, and heralded true freshman Logan Smothers, who graduated from high school early to take part in spring ball, will push for time.

RUNNING BACK

Dedrick Mills took a while to settle into the Husker lineup, but Mills' last three games (53 rushes, 347 yards) made a case for him to be Nebraska's lead back in 2020. Rahmir Johnson, after playing in the maximum four games he could last season while still preserving his redshirt, will get more consistent work at running back. Ronald Thompkins battled injury last year but will look to push for time during spring ball.

WIDE RECEIVER

The Huskers' lack of production at wide receiver beyond J.D. Spielman and Wandale Robinson hampered the offense all last season. Spielman

returns for a senior season that could revise the Husker record books, while Robinson will look to build on a great freshman season that showed the full range of his skills. Kade Warner is a strong candidate to help on the outside after an injury-plagued sophomore season. Jamie Nance saw a little time as a true freshman but was able to preserve a year of eligibility. Alante Brown, a Chicago native who spent last year at a prep school, will be in for spring ball, looking to get a head start on a crop of talented incoming true freshmen.

TIGHT END

All three tight ends who saw significant time last year return, including Jack Stoll, who enters his senior year with 24 straight starts at the position. Austin Allen and Kurt Rafdal also are back, looking to boost production from the position. In 2019, the three combined for 33 catches for 326 yards and only one touchdown.

OFFENSIVE LINE

An offensive line that found its groove as the vear went along returns intact for the 2020 season. Left tackle Brendan Jaimes could become one of the few four-year starters on the offensive line in Husker history. He's started the last 33 games and the last 24 at left tackle. Matt Farniok has also started the last 24 games and is back at right tackle. Center Cameron Jurgens overcame early snapping trouble to become one of the best on the Husker line. Trent Hixson and Boe Wilson are also back at guard, while highly touted tackle Bryce Benhart will push for time after redshirting last year. Tucker Corcoran, a four-star recruit who played in January's U.S. Army All-American Bowl, will participate in spring.

DEFENSIVE LINE

Nebraska lost all three starters, but with solid depth at the position, the Huskers should be able to fill those holes. Ben Stille will anchor the line after piling up 6.5 tackles for loss and three sacks last season. Deontre Thomas and Damion Daniels also return after

showing promise in backup roles last season. Keem Green and Ty Robinson, two talented recruits who played a little last year, will also push for starting roles. Jordon Riley, a junior-college transfer, will also be in spring camp to angle for playing time.

LINEBACKER

The Huskers need increased production from the linebacker corps. Newcomer Blaise Gunnerson, who will be in for spring, will be one of those competing for time at outside linebacker. JoJo Domann will push to start after ranking second on the team with nine tackles for loss. Caleb Tannor and Garrett Nelson split time at an outside linebacker spot last year and will battle throughout the spring for the edge on starting. At inside linebacker, Nebraska will need to replace its leading tackler Mohamed Barry, while returning the other two players who rotated at the ILB last year, Collin Miller and Will Honas.

DEFENSIVE BACK

Lamar Jackson, who had a terrific senior season (12 pass breakups, three interceptions), departs, but most of the rest of the secondary returns, led by DiCaprio Bootle, who broke up nine passes last year. Braxton Clark also showed promise as a redshirt freshman and has a good chance to start. Cam Taylor-Britt emerged as a big-play safety (3 interceptions, 4 forced fumbles). An already deep group will add more with Jaden Francois and Henry Gray, two four-star Miami-area recruits that will be in for spring.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Injuries at kicker left Nebraska especially vulnerable, as six different players attempted field goals. The struggles carried over to kickoffs as well, where short kickoffs left the Huskers susceptible to long returns, including two for touchdowns. Barrett Pickering returns after an injury-plagued season at kicker, and hopefully improved health will stabilize NU's special teams. The Huskers will have to replace punter Isaac Armstrong as well.

SCHOLARSHIP RECRUITS

ZAVIER BETTS

A consensus four-star wide receiver from Bellevue West. Betts was the first in-state player in the Class of 2020 offered a scholarship by Nebraska. In his iunior year, he made 48 catches for 856 yards and 12 touchdowns. He followed that with 64 catches for 1,185 yards and 17 touchdowns his senior year. For his career, Betts pulled in 29 touchdowns and piled up 2,145 receiving yards, while leading the Thunderbirds to two state championships.

MARQUIS BLACK

As a senior, Black led Eagle's Landing Christian Academy (McDonough, Ga.) to its fifth straight state championship, racking up 15.5 tackles for loss, 4 sacks and 73 total tackles. Black played on four state championship teams, and his ELCA program went 57-1 during his four years playing varsity. A consensus three-star recruit. Black chose Nebraska over Arizona, Kansas State, Louisville, Michigan State, Tennessee and Virginia, among other Power 5 programs.

ALANTE BROWN

A native of the Chicago area and a four-star recruit. Brown will be in for spring after attending St. Thomas More prep school in Connecticut in the fall of 2019. Brown converted to wide receiver after playing quarterback for Simeon High School in Chicago, where he started for three years and led his team to a city championship and the state quarterfinals as a senior. Brown was an all-stater as a senior, throwing for 41 touchdowns and rushing for 12 more.

JIMARI BUTLER

Despite playing just one year of high school football. Butler became a three-star recruit with a senior season in which he piled up 60 tackles, 22 tackles for loss, 14.5 sacks and 21 quarterback hurries in just 10 regular season games. Butler focused on playing basketball early in his high school career. Butler chose Nebraska over Kansas. Indiana, TCU and Tennessee.

ALEX CONN

Conn payed the way for back-to-back state championships and 26 straight wins for Derby High School in Kansas' largest classification. A first-team all-stater. Conn anchored an offensive line that enabled Derby to average 54 points and more than 500 yards of total offense. Conn was rated a threestar recruit, and selected Nebraska over Arizona. Iowa State, Kansas, Kansas State, Oklahoma State and TCU

NIKO COOPER

Cooper comes to Nebraska with three years of eligibility remaining after playing one season and redshirting another at Hutchinson Community College in Kansas. In his lone season of playing for HCC, Cooper made 24 tackles, including nine for loss and 2.5 sacks, while forcing two fumbles. Cooper came to Hutchinson from the Memphis area, where he played at Douglas High School, A three-star recruit, Cooper also visited Kansas State, Texas Tech and Maryland.

TURNER CORCORAN

Corcoran played in the U.S. Army All-American Bowl, then immediately enrolled at Nebraska for spring 2020 after a terrific career at Lawrence Free State, during which he earned first-team all-state honors as an offensive lineman as both a junior and a senior. The four-star recruit turned down Auburn, Clemson, Georgia, LSU, Michigan, Notre Dame, Ohio State and Oklahoma to join the Huskers.

RONALD DELANCY III

Delancy was a big-play defensive back for powerhouse Miami Northwestern, piling up 12 pass breakups and four interceptions, three of which he returned for touchdowns. He added one safety and three blocked field goals. Delancy was a three-time state champion, helping Miami Northwestern to state titles his junior and senior years after winning state as a freshman at Carol City High School. A three-star recruit, Delancy picked NU over Louisville, Miami, Missouri, Pitt and Washington State.

MARCUS FLEMING

A four-star wide receiver for prep powerhouse Miami Northwestern. Fleming drove his team to a state title with 51 catches for 887 yards and eight touchdowns. He also returned a kickoff for

Francois is enrolled for the spring semester after a decorated career at South Dade High School. As a junior, Francois set a county record with 13 interceptions. He had just two picks as a senior, as teams refused to test him. Francois is a consensus four-star recruit who is ranked among the top 200 in the Class of 2020, and as the No. 25 safety in the class nationally by 247Sports, and the No. 27 cornerback by Rivals. He picked Nebraska over Auburn, Florida State, Georgia, Miami, Michigan, Ohio State and Penn State.

HENRY GRAY

Gray is in for spring ball after being invited to the Under Armour All-American Game and winning a state championship as a senior for Miami Central High School. Gray played both cornerback and safety for Miami Central and was listed as a top 25 cornerback in the Class of 2020 by Rivals, while 247sports.com listed him as a top 25 safety. Both services listed him as a four-star recruit, and Gray chose the Huskers over Alabama, Auburn, Baylor, Clemson, Florida, Florida State, Georgia, Michigan, Ohio State and Penn State.

KEYSHAWN GREENE

Greene comes to Nebraska after a massive senior season for Wakulia High School (Crawfordville, Fla.). He racked up 147 tackles, nine tackles for loss, three sacks, two pass breakups, one interception and one blocked field goal. For his work, Greene was selected to the U.S. Army All-American Bowl and was recognized as one of the top 200 players in the class of 2020 by both major recruiting services. Greene picked Nebraska over Florida, Florida State. Miami and Tennessee.

BLAISE GUNNERSON

Gunnerson will go through spring ball looking to push for immediate playing time at outside linebacker. He made an impact on both sides of

the ball for Kuemper Catholic High School (Carroll, lowa), making 47 tackles with 8.5 tackles for loss and six sacks while also catching 11 passes for 149 yards and three touchdowns as a senior after missing his junior year with an injury. Gunnerson was a three-star recruit and also earned offers from lowa, lowa State, Kansas State and Minnesota.

NASH HUTMACHER

A three-sport star at Chamberlain High School in South Dakota, Hutmacher comes to Nebraska looking to push for playing time on the defensive line. Hutmacher was a three-time all-stater and totaled nearly 300 tackles in his career. His last two years, he piled up 29 tackles for loss and 14 sacks. He's also a three-time state champion heavyweight wrestler, entering his senior season with a 124-match winning streak with 32 consecutive pins. He was also a state champion shot put and discus thrower as a junior. For his three-sport dominance, he was named South Dakota Boys Athlete of the Year for 2018-19.

TAMON LYNUM

Lynum enrolled for spring ball after a terrific senior season for Evans High School in Orlando. Last fall, Lynum had 44 tackles, 11 pass breakups, two interceptions and a forced fumble. His size will help him contend for playing time. Lynum was a three-star recruit, and picked Nebraska over Illinois, Kansas and Maryland, among others.

OMAR MANNING

A four-star recruit and ranked as the nation's top junior college wide receiver, Manning comes to Nebraska with two years of eligibility remaining after averaging nearly 20 yards a reception during his two years at Kilgore College. He was a second-time junior college All-American as a sophomore, catching 35 passes for 727 yards and six touchdowns. Manning began his college career at TCU, where he redshirted. He was listed as a four-star recruit and a U.S. Army All-American after his high school career.

ETEVA MAUGA-CLEMENTS

Mauga-Clements will participate in spring ball after playing junior college ball at Diablo Valley

College in California. After beginning his career as a safety. Mauga-Clements added size and strength and moved to linebacker later in his career. His sophomore year, Mauga-Clements was selected as conference defensive player of the year while piling up 23 tackles for loss and seven sacks. A four-star recruit, Mauga-Clements picked Nebraska over San Diego State, South Alabama and Southern Miss.

SEVION MORRISON

Morrison rewrote the rushing record books at Edison High School in Tulsa, besting the prior marks set by Oklahoma All-American and longtime NFL running back Spencer Tillman by over 1,000 yards. As a senior, Morrison ran for 1,798 yards and 26 touchdowns while averaging nearly 10 yards per carry. He was named Northeast Oklahoma Player of the Year. As a junior, Morrison ran for 2,278 vards and 39 total touchdowns. A four-star recruit. Morrison picked Nebraska over Baylor, Kansas State, Minnesota, Utah, Minnesota, Washington and Wisconsin

WILL NIXON

Nixon is a versatile and dynamic addition to the Huskers' wide receiver corps after playing both wide receiver and running back at Midway High School (Waco, Texas). He rushed for 1,837 yards and 27 touchdowns as a running back his senior year, after catching 50 passes for 400 yards as a junior. Nixon's father, Jeff, has been Baylor's co-offensive coordinator the last three seasons. A three-star prospect, Nixon picked Nebraska over Baylor, Kansas State, Notre Dame and Penn State.

PHELDARIUS PAYNE

Payne comes to Nebraska after helping Lackawanna (Pa.) College to the NJCAA National Championship Game last fall. Lackawanna was 21-1 during Payne's two years there. Last season, Payne recorded 30 tackles, including 12 for loss and four sacks. He piled up five sacks as a freshman in 2018. Payne was ranked as a three-star prospect and had offers from North Carolina State, Florida International and Liberty. He also visited Penn State and Syracuse.

JORDON RILEY

Riley will participate in spring ball after a single season at Garden City Community College in which he registered 26 tackles, two sacks and 3.5 tackles for loss, helping GCCC to a top-10 ranking. That came after Riley opened his college career at North Carolina. He played in two games and made four tackles as a true freshman in 2017, then redshirted in 2018. Rilev is a three-star recruit that chose NU over East Carolina.

MARVIN SCOTT III

After a decorated, five-year high school career, Scott looks to push for playing time at running back at Nebraska. Scott made varsity for Warner Christian Academy as an eighth-grader, playing three years for WCA before transferring to Spruce Creek High School to play his last two years of high school at Florida's largest class. In total, Scott rushed for 7,482 yards, the sixth-most yards by a high school running back in Florida history. His senior year, he ran for 1,477 yards and 18 touchdowns.

LOGAN SMOTHERS

Another high-caliber addition to the quarterback crew, Smothers will participate in spring ball after throwing for more than 2,000 yards and 27 touchdowns while rushing for more than 800 yards and 13 more scores as a senior at Muscle Shoals (Ala.) High School. He started his high school career at Athens High School, where he threw for 1,702 yards and 14 touchdowns as a junior. Smothers also ran track at Athens High, finishing fourth in the 400 meters at the 2019 indoor state meet. A four-star recruit, Smothers picked Nebraska over Louisville and Ole Miss

WALK-ONS

BLADEN BAYLESS

A two-way star on the line for Beatrice High School, Bayless will begin his Husker career on the offensive line. Bayless powered an Orangemen rushing attack that averaged more than 225 rushing yards a game. Defensively, Bayless tallied 29 tackles, five tackles for loss and a sack, earning honorable-mention all-state honors.

NATE BOERKIRCHER

Boerkircher earned all-state honors as a senior tight end for Aurora High School. As a junior, Boerkircher helped the Huskies to a Class C-1 state championship and an undefeated season. His older brother, lan, is already a walk-on offensive lineman for the Huskers.

BAYLOR BRANNEN

Brannen helped Millard West to a state semifinal appearance his senior year while anchoring the defensive line for the Wildcats. Brannen earned All-Metro honors as a senior. He also helped Millard West to the state semifinals as a junior.

ELLIOT BROWN

Brown quarterbacked the dynamic Elkhorn South offense for three seasons but will start his Husker career as a wide receiver. As a senior, Brown threw for 1,322 yards and 13 touchdowns while running for five more, en route to honorable mention all-state honors. Brown helped the Storm to three state playoff appearances.

CHASE CONTRERAZ

Contreraz, a kicker, will participate in spring ball looking to stabilize Nebraska's shaky special teams after a second-team All-America freshman season at lowa Western Community College. Contreraz was 15-for-18 on field goals, hitting a long of 47 yards, while hitting 44-of-46 extra points. Contreraz has three seasons of eligibility remaining.

TYLER CRAWFORD

Crawford filled all the kicking duties at Broken Arrow High School as a senior. He averaged 38.1 yards a punt, made 42-of-43 PATs, hit 4-of-7 field goal attempts, and kicked off 65 times for 44 touchbacks. His junior year, Crawford averaged 37.8 yards a punt for the 13-0 state champions at BAHS. He ranked among the top 60 kickers and top 85 punters in the Class of 2020 according to Chris Sailer kicking.

CASEY DOERNEMANN

Doernemann joins the Huskers after starring on both the offensive and defensive lines at Guardian Angels Central Catholic in West Point. He was a two-time all-state performer, tallying 72 tackles including 15.5 tackles for loss as a senior while also helping GACC average 250 rushing yards per game as a senior. His junior year, he had 88 tackles with 10.5 tackles for loss and two interceptions.

BROC DOUGLASS

Douglass earned All-Nebraska honors in his senior season at Grand Island High School, with 60 catches for 1,016 yards and 12 touchdowns. Hahn had 65 catches for 1,353 yards and 23 touchdowns, while also leading the team with 110 tackles and three interceptions. As a junior, he led Johnson-Brock to the Class D-2 state championship, making 62 catches for 1,165 yards and 23 touchdowns, earning Class D-2 all-state honors. He was also a Class D-1 all-stater as a sophomore.

ISAIAH HARRIS

Harris led Class A in rushing, gaining 11.3 yards a carry while piling up 1,859 yards and 27 touchdowns while leading Millard South to the state semifinals. He was named first-team All-Nebraska by the Omaha World-Herald as he gained 2,181 all-purpose yards for the season. Harris also rushed for over 1,000 yards as a junior on his way to second-team Super State honors from the Lincoln Journal-Star.

Luben led Wahoo High School to the Class C-1 state championship with 2,136 rushing yards and 41 touchdowns, including 268 yards and five touchdowns in the state final.
