- ♥ **Harnesses:** A front-clip harness, such as the Easy Walk harness, is ideal for training and everyday use. Front-clip harnesses discourage pulling and give you better control during walks (source: Whole Dog Journal).
- ♥ **Leash:** Avoid retractable leashes, as they can pose safety risks for both you and your dog. A sturdy standard leash (4–6 feet) is best for daily walks. For playtime and recall training, a 30–50-foot leash works well.

Food and Treats: Nutrition is Key

- ♥ **Food:** According to Dr. Karen Becker, a veterinarian and pet nutrition expert, a raw diet is often the healthiest option because it mimics what dogs would eat in the wild. - ♥ **Chews:** Bully sticks or animal bones are great for dental health and satisfying your dog's chewing instincts. Skip rawhide products, as they can pose choking hazards or cause digestive problems (source: Veterinary Centers of America).

Crate Training: A Safe Space

A crate is a valuable tool for safety and training. The Humane Society of the United States (HSUS) explains that crate training helps dogs feel secure and can prevent destructive behaviors when you're not home. Choose a crate that:

- ♥ Provides enough room for your dog to stand, turn, and lie down comfortably.
- ♥ Is made of durable material (wire or plastic).
- ♥ Avoid mesh or nylon crates, which aren't escape-proof or safe for unsupervised use.

Grooming Essentials

Maintaining your dog's coat and skin health is essential, especially for breeds prone to matting. Here's what to include in your grooming arsenal:

- ♥ **Comb:** A comb is excellent for detangling and removing mats, particularly for long-haired or double-coated breeds.
- ♥ **Slicker Brush:** This is effective for removing loose fur and smoothing the coat. According to the AKC, using the right brush for your dog's coat type is key to preventing tangles and maintaining a healthy coat.

Beds and Comfort

Dogs need a comfortable spot to rest and sleep. Instead of splurging on designer beds, head to budget friendly stores like Marshalls or TJ Maxx, where you can find high-quality beds at reasonable prices. Look for beds with washable covers and adequate cushioning for your dog's size and age.

Toys: Stimulation Without Overwhelm

- ♥ **A ball** for fetch
- ♥ **A stuffed toy** for cuddling
- ♥ **A squeaky toy** for engagement
