Aims and Objectives of The Live and Learn Foundation

The Live and Learn Foundation® is a Section 8 Non-Profit Organization (under Indian Law). It was incorporated on the 24th of November 2021 by the Ministry of Corporate Affairs, (MCA) India.

The aim of The Live and Learn Foundation® is simple: to create a world without poverty, in which the ideal of social equality can slowly become a reality.

The true wealth of every nation consists of the people who inhabit that country; the adults and the children. Human beings are the true wealth of Humanity.

We believe that all human beings have equal rights to create and enjoy sustainable financial and material wealth for themselves and their families in transparent and ethical ways; while honoring, cherishing, and protecting the Earth and conserving her environment, her flora and fauna, her wealth of natural resources, and her natural beauty, for future generations.

This means that we believe in creating and providing:

- Education for all. Education provides knowledge, and knowledge is power. Education enables people to choose what to do with their lives. Education enables people to enrich their own lives, and enrich humanity.
- Transparent, ethical, and sustainable sources of financial income and material wealth that do not cause damage to the perfectly balanced natural eco-systems in which we live, but rather help to conserve and protect the environment, the Earth, and her wealth of natural resources.

The Vision: Live and Learn Centres — Empowering Communities Worldwide Through Education and Skills Development

1. Free Coaching and Training for Underprivileged Children

At Live and Learn Centres, we aim to collaborate closely with governments, and government schools, to provide essential coaching and educational support to children who lack such resources at home. We believe in helping these children fully harness the opportunities of the free education offered by the Indian Government, and the governments of other countries.

It is only natural for young people to dream of exploring the world and creating a better future for themselves. The Live and Learn Foundation® is dedicated to equipping children from low-income families with the education and skills necessary to thrive in life. Our centres across India, and in other countries, will aim to ensure that, when these children grow into young adults, they can step confidently into the world, secure meaningful employment, support themselves, and make lasting contributions to society in their chosen fields.

We are also deeply committed to the **inclusion of children with learning and other disabilities.** The Live and Learn Foundation® aims to offer free, specialized education to low-income children with special educational needs, ensuring that no child is left behind.

Paid tuition will also be offered for children whose parents can afford to pay. This will create a sustainable stream of income for every Live and Learn Centre.

2. Free Arts, Crafts, and Skills Training for Adults

Our centres also aim to offer free arts, crafts, and skills training to men and women in villages and cities across India; and in other countries around the world. By empowering them with these valuable skills, we will enable them to achieve financial independence and better support themselves and their families.

Our Vision for the Live and Learn Centres Around the World

Our vision for the Live and Learn Centres extends far beyond India. We aspire to create these centres in other parts of India and, eventually, around the world, wherever they are needed. We envision the Live and Learn Centres as safe, welcoming, and enriching spaces where underprivileged children and adults can not only access free education and skills training but also enjoy healthy, nutritious meals and non-alcoholic beverages—all provided on an 'honour system.' This means that while people who can afford it can pay for their food, those who cannot afford it have the option to eat for free, or to exchange skills or work in return for meals if they wish. Children will always eat for free.

We aim for these centres to be vibrant community hubs, hosting a variety of events including arts, music, dance, and literary gatherings, along with lectures and workshops on topics ranging from yoga and meditation to spirituality, self-development, and the latest advancements in science, technology, and organic, sustainable farming. We dream of places where people from all castes, classes, and walks of life can come together to meet, eat, drink, and be merry; to take classes, learn new things, exchange ideas, and truly 'live and learn.'

A Scalable Model for Global Impact

The model for our Live and Learn Centres is designed to be scalable. Each centre is managed by residents of the community it serves, as they are best equipped to understand and address the specific needs and values of their societies.

We have already received requests to open more centres in villages around Khajuraho, Madhya Pradesh, and we hope to do so in due course.

Our vision does not stop at India's borders. We aspire to create Live and Learn Centres in other countries across the globe. We recognize that educational and community hubs like these can provide critical resources and foster a deep sense of belonging among underprivileged and isolated members of communities, not only in the developing world but also in developed nations.

The Live and Learn Foundation® is committed to making a world without poverty, and with true social equality, a reality. Through our scalable model, we believe this vision can spread across borders and cultures, creating a global network of empowered, self-sufficient communities.

Review of the Year March 2024 – April 2025: Exponential Growth While Navigating Bureaucracy and Rocks in the Road

1. Introduction

The Bhiyantal Live and Learn Centre, under the guidance of *The Live and Learn Foundation*®, has continued to evolve into a thriving educational and community hub. Following the completion of a large new schoolroom in Spring 2025, the Centre has expanded its capacity to feed and educate more children. As a result, the number of enrolled students stabilized at **50** (as of September 2025), with **45** children from Below Poverty Line (BPL) families and **5** fee-paying students.

This expansion has allowed the Centre to further its mission of providing equitable, holistic education and nourishment to children in Bhiyantal Village, while creating employment and skill development opportunities for local residents. The ethos of the Foundation—*the right of every human being to live with dignity, equal opportunities, and respect*—continues to drive every initiative, from teaching and staffing to welfare and infrastructure planning.

2. Successes

2.1 Growth and Staffing

The completion of the new schoolroom marked a pivotal milestone, enabling a larger intake of children and improved comfort for both students and staff. The recruitment of a Deputy Centre Manager (Mr. Ayush Sen) and an Intern Primary Teacher (Miss Anamika Sen) in May 2025 strengthened daily operations, enhanced social media engagement, and early childhood education. Existing teachers—Mr. Laxman Ahirwar (Hindi, English, Mathematics) and Mr. Chhotelal Sen (I.T., Computer Skills, and General Knowledge)—continued to deliver high-quality instruction with dedication and professionalism.

The Centre's staff are currently hired on a permanent part-time basis. They are remunerated well relative to peers in Khajuraho and nearby areas, ensuring high retention. We aim to increase salaries to full-time salaries and extend benefits such as medical insurance and pensions, as funding permits.

2.2 Educational Quality and Achievements

The Centre achieved a 100% Board Exam pass rate among students eligible to sit for these crucial examinations between April 2024 and September 2025. This success reflects effective teaching practices, accountability through monthly staff meetings, and the introduction of Teachers' Reports after every exam cycle to track and support individual student progress.

The Centre upholds the principle that there are no bad students, only bad teaching, fostering a culture of empathy, encouragement, and continuous improvement.

2.3 Holistic Development

Education at Bhiyantal goes beyond academics. Hygiene education is taught and reinforced by daily practice of hand-washing, supervised by our Deputy Centre Manager. The introduction of "Cultural Fridays" allows children to explore art, painting, dance, storytelling. These sessions cultivate creativity, discipline, cultural pride, and social awareness. Group games and outdoor activities enhance physical health and teamwork.

The Centre's inclusive approach extends to children with disabilities. Efforts are underway to secure a Special Needs Teacher through government collaboration, with interim support provided by Centre staff.

2.4 Community Impact and Sustainability

Operational measures such as attendance tracking, admission forms, and exam reporting ensure accountability and data-driven progress monitoring.

The Bhiyantal Centre has become a focal point of village life. It is steadily becoming a vibrant community hub. Attendance has grown steadily, and our young alumni continue to engage in events and celebrations, forming the development of a strong alumni network when they grow up; one built on shared experiences, happy memories, and deep friendships. Parents increasingly seek admission for their children, affirming the Centre's credibility and trust within the community.

In addition, the director and staff of the Bhiyantal Centre will work on creating a Self-Help Group or Small/Medium Sized Business to take full ownership of the project and make it a real community enterprise that is run by and for members of the community it serves.

2.5 Working Conditions and Staff Welfare

Our staff and teachers are paid very well compared to their peers in other schools and companies in Khajuraho and the surrounding areas. That is what enables us to hire and retain talented professional people. In due course, when we have the resources, we will give all our staff medical insurance and pensions. At The Live and Learn Foundation®, we firmly believe that the passionate, dedicated people who help us to bring our dreams of a fairer world to life, deserve to be compensated well for the good work that they do.

The Centre maintains structured working hours—7:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m., Monday to Friday—allowing teachers time for professional development in I.T. and English. Staff receive 30 days of paid annual leave, including exam leave; plus national holidays, making this one of the most generous leave structures in the region, and in this field of operation.

The Foundation also promotes staff development by supporting further education and offering flexible scheduling for exams if staff wish to pursue higher degrees.

We would like to hire more teachers, especially a primary school teacher (this needs to be done urgently); and science, yoga and arts teachers, and will do so when we have the funds. We would also like to pay a full-time CEO a fair salary commensurate with the high-quality and value of the full-time work expected of, and delivered by, the CEO.

When we have the funds to do all this, we will radically change the way we compensate our staff. Instead of considering them to be part-time employees, who are paid good part-time salaries, we will employ them as full-time staff and pay them fair full-time salaries. We envisage semi-flexible/remote working conditions. This means that staff will still be expected to attend the Bhiyantal Centre from 7 am to 11am from Monday to Friday, but they will be able to work from home the rest of the time (7 hours per day Monday to Friday) or do the tasks they need to do outside of the Centre hours. We might also look at providing coaching in the evenings as well for older children, and of course skills training in the evenings for adults, in the Centre, during those extra hours.

2.6 Safety and Child Protection

The safety and wellbeing of the children remain paramount. All students' photos and participation in media require parental consent. Plans to install CCTV cameras are in place, and strict disciplinary policies prohibit any form of abuse.

2.7 Future Outlook

We have already sourced several sources of funding, including CSR funding from Indian corporations and organizations. Although it may take time to secure this funding, it will be sizeable, and it will enable us to develop the Bhiyantal Centre and scale the operations of The Live and Learn Foundation according to our vision. The outlook is bright.

3. Challenges

3.1 Funding Limitations

Despite remarkable progress, the Centre faces significant funding constraints. With 50 children now attending the Bhiyantal Centre on a daily basis, the current infrastructure is once again operating at full capacity. Expanding requires additional classrooms, computers, and qualified teachers—particularly in primary education, science, arts, and yoga.

Plans to hire a full-time CEO and transition part-time staff to full-time salaried roles remain on hold pending financial growth. The Centre's long-term vision includes fair, full-time pay, and flexible work models that allow staff to balance Centre duties with remote work.

3.2 Special Needs Provision

While the government has agreed in principle to assign a Special Needs Teacher, a shortage of qualified personnel in the Rajnagar district has delayed deployment. Five children with learning disabilities and one with physical disabilities currently require more structured support.

3.3 Seasonal Attendance Variations

Extreme heat during summer months affects attendance. The purchase of air coolers has alleviated the issue somewhat, but more units are needed to ensure consistent attendance and comfort.

3.4 Infrastructure and Expansion Needs

The growing demand for admission has outpaced available space. A larger building with multiple classrooms, additional learning equipment such as 10 laptops, Powerbanks, and an inverter to cope with fluctuating electricity supplies to the village; and adult skills training facilities; would enable the Centre to serve the entire village and neighboring areas.

3.5 Funding Diversification and Certification

To sustain and expand, the Centre must secure CSR partnerships, government support, and foreign aid funding.

We got the CSR-1 Certificate, and are actively seeking CSR funding, however, in order to secure CSR and Government Funding we need 12A and 80G Certificates. We applied for 12A and 80G certificates at the beginning of 2025. These are taking longer than anticipated because our CA's team applied under the wrong law initially so we had to withdraw that application and re-apply. This lengthy bureaucratic procedure wasted six months.

Obtaining the FCRA certificate is a crucial next step to access international funding streams. Getting the FCRA (Foreign Contribution Regulation Act) certificate and applying for donations from foreign international development agencies and foundations is a long process. We have started the process of opening an FCRA account with the State Bank of India, which is a legal requirement for the FCRA certificate. This will take several months to open. Once this is open, we can apply for the certificate, which will take also take several months.

4. Conclusion

The Bhiyantal Live and Learn Centre stands as a beacon of hope, education, and community transformation. Within a short span, it has achieved academic excellence, holistic child development, and strong community trust. With a dedicated team, ethical leadership, and a compassionate philosophy, the Centre continues to uplift underprivileged children and their families through quality education, nutritious meals, creative engagement, and shared celebrations.

The road ahead calls for sustained funding, infrastructural expansion, and deeper investment in teacher hiring and development. With adequate support—through donor partnerships, CSR involvement, and government collaboration—The Live and Learn Foundation: Bhiyantal Centre can evolve into a comprehensive learning, skills training, and community hub, nurturing not only well-educated, accomplished, and well-rounded students but empowered citizens.

The year April 2024 to March 2025 end on a truly horrible note, with the death of my beloved mother on the 19th of March 2025. Her passing was devastating, and I am still trying to come to terms with the loss of her loving presence in my life. I know it will take time, as it took time for me to come to terms with my beloved father's passing in the year 2000. And yet, after my mother's demise, the outpouring of love and practical help that came from those who also loved her was truly miraculous, and it gave me the heart and means to carry on. Since then, our vision has attracted dedicated new friends and supporters who are keen to be actively involved in helping us, and I would like to thank them; and my family; and our old friends and supporters; with all my heart. Your kindness and practical support; your goodwill and encouragement, your belief in The Live and Learn Foundation and the work we do and aim to do; and your emotional as well as material support, mean the world to me. Note No. 1 Background and Significant Accounting Policies

A: Background

LIVE AND LEARN FOUNDATION ("Company") is a company incorporated under the Companies Act, 2013 on 24TH November 2021, bearing registration no. U80900MP2021NPL058547, and having its registered office at Chandrashekhar Ward No. 12, Arvindra Colony, Khajuraho NA, Chhatarpur, Madhya Pradesh — 471606 IN. The Live and Learn Foundation® is a Section 8 Company licensed by the Government of India, Ministry of Corporate Affairs, by vide License No. 130703. The main focus area of the company is to mobilize public resources and empower communities to solve India's deep-rooted problems in areas such as education, skills training, rural development, religious, relief of poor, medical relief, arts and literature, yoga, meditation, personal development, spiritual development, preservation of the environment, preservation of monuments/places/objects of artistic or historic interest, and advancement of any other objectives of general public utility.

B: SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

a) Basis of Preparation of Standalone Financial Statements:

The financial statements are prepared in accordance with Indian Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP) under the historical cost convention on accrual basis. GAAP comprises mandatory Accounting Standards as specified under Section 133 of the Companies Act, 2013 read with Rule 7 of the Companies (Accounts) Rules, 2014 as amended from time to time and the Companies Act, 2013. The accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial statements are consistent with those of the previous years.

The Company is a Small and Medium Sized Company (SMC) as defined in the General Instruction in respect of Accounting Standards notified under the Companies Act, 2013. Accordingly, the Company has complied with the Accounting Standards as applicable to a Small and Medium Sized Company.

b) Presentation and disclosure of Standalone Financial Statement:

All assets and liabilities have been classified as current and non-current as per Company's normal operating cycle and other criteria set out in the Schedule III of the Companies Act, 2013. Based on the nature of services and time between acquisition of assets for rendering of services and their realization in cash and cash equivalents, the Company has ascertained its operating cycle as 12 months for the purpose of current / non- current classification of assets and liabilities.

c) Use of Estimates:

The preparation of standalone financial statements is in conformity with Indian GAAP requires the management to make judgments, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of revenues, expenses, assets and liabilities and the disclosure of contingent liabilities, at the end of the reporting period. d) Income Taxes:

Tax expense comprises of current and deferred tax. Current tax is measured at the amount expected to be paid to the tax authorities in accordance with the Indian Income Tax Act, 1961 enacted in India.

The Company uses the asset and liability method of accounting for deferred income taxes. Under this method, deferred tax assets and liabilities are determined based on the difference between the financial statement and tax bases of assets and liabilities, as measured by the enacted/substantially enacted tax rates which will be in effect when those temporary differences are expected to be recovered or settled. Deferred tax expense/income is the result of changes in the net deferred tax assets and liabilities. In situations where the Company has unabsorbed depreciation or carry forward tax losses, all deferred tax assets are recognized only if there is virtual certainty supported by convincing evidence that they can be realized against future taxable profits. Deferred tax assets are reviewed for the appropriateness of their respective carrying amounts at each balance sheet date.

e) Provisions, Contingent liabilities and Contingent assets:

A provision is recognized when an enterprise has a present obligation as a result of a past event; it is probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation, in respect of which a

reliable estimate can be made. Provisions are not discounted to its present value and are determined based on best estimate required to settle the obligation at the balance sheet date. These are reviewed at each balance sheet date and adjusted to reflect the current best estimates.

A contingent liability is a possible obligation that arises from past events whose existence will be confirmed by the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events beyond the control of the company or a present obligation that is not recognized because it is not probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation.

Contingent assets are neither recognized nor disclosed in the financial statements.

f) Current/Non-Current Classification:

An asset is classified as current when it satisfies any of the following criteria:

- I. It is expected to be realized in, or is intended for sale or consumption in the company's normal operating cycle;
- II II. It is held primarily for the purpose of being traded;
- III. It is expected to be realized within 12 months after the reporting date; or
- IV. It is cash or cash equivalent unless it is restricted from being exchanged or used to settle a liability for at least 12 months after the reporting date.

Current assets include the current portion of non-current financial assets. All other assets are classified as non-current.

g) Cash and Cash Equivalents:

Cash and cash equivalents comprise each of the following: cash balance in hand, cash balance with a bank, and highly liquid investments with original maturities, at the date of purchase/ investment, of three months or less.

Annexure 1.1: Introduction to the Impact Report for April 2024 – September 2025. The Live and Learn Centre: Bhiyantal.

The Live and Learn Foundation® Bhiyantal Centre is the first project by The Live and Learn Foundation. It represents a powerful investment in human potential — transforming lives in one of rural Madhya Pradesh's most underserved regions. Established in April 2022, the Centre provides free, high-quality coaching for underprivileged children and aims to eventually provide vocational training for adults, breaking the cycle of poverty through education, skills, and opportunity. By complementing the work of local government and fee-paying schools, the Bhiyantal Centre currently enables children from below-poverty-line and marginalized communities to build strong academic foundations and develop vital English and computer literacy skills — essential for India's rapidly evolving job market. With a strong focus on inclusion, nutrition, and women's empowerment, and with support from dedicated local staff and teachers, the Centre is steadily evolving into a thriving community hub — a model of sustainable, grassroots development.

Annexure 1.2: Staff at the Bhiyantal Live and Learn Centre, Timings, and Staff Holidays.

This impact report extends for 18 months as there was substantial growth at the Bhiyantal Live and Learn Centre from April 2025 onwards, and we wanted to highlight that.

There have been changes in the number of staff as the Centre has grown. This was due to the completion of a large new schoolroom, in the Spring of 2025. This meant that we were able to feed and teach more children on our premises. We hired a new Deputy Centre Manager in May 2025, to carry out day-to-day activities and assist with promoting the centre on social media. Many of the new children are very young, so we hired an Intern Teacher to assist with teaching the youngest children at the primary level. When we get more funds, we will hire a fully qualified Primary Teacher, as many of the students are aged from 4 to 6 years old.

We encourage teachers to improve their skills during their working hours, which are between 7am – 11am. Classes finish at 10 am so the children can have their breakfast and go to their respective schools on time. This means teachers are encouraged to improve their I.T., Computing, and English Language skills from 10.30 am to 11 am.

Our staff and teachers are paid very well compared to their peers in other schools and companies in Khajuraho and the surrounding areas. That is what enables us to hire and retain talented professional people. In due course, when we have the resources, we will give all our staff medical insurance and pensions. At The Live and Learn Foundation®, we firmly believe that the passionate, dedicated people who help us to bring our dreams of a fairer world to life, deserve to be compensated well for the good work that they do.

We would like to hire more teachers, especially a primary school teacher; and science, yoga, and arts teachers, and will do so when we have the funds. We would also like to pay a full-time CEO a fair salary commensurate with the high-quality and value of the full-time work expected of, and delivered by, the CEO.

When we have the funds to do all this, we will radically change the way we compensate our staff. Instead of considering them to be part-time employees, who are paid good part-time salaries, we will employ them as full-time staff and pay them fair full-time salaries. We envisage semi-flexible/remote working conditions. This means that staff will still be expected to attend the Bhiyantal Centre from 7 am to 11am from Monday to Friday, but they will be able to work from home the rest of the time (7 hours per day Monday to Friday) or do the tasks they need to do outside of the Centre hours. We might also look at providing coaching in the evenings as well for older children, and of course skills training in the evenings for adults, in the Centre, during those extra hours.

SALARIED STAFF

Centre Manager

Our Managing Director for Madhya Pradesh, Mr. Manoj Sen, also provides Centre Management Consultancy Services to The Live and Learn Foundation. He oversees the administration and running of the Bhiyantal Live and Learn Centre and leads the team there, navigating challenges with steadfast, patient, emotional intelligence. He is devoted to making the Centre — and our students — successful.

Deputy Centre Manager and Social Media Executive

Our Deputy Centre Manager at the Bhiyantal Centre is Mr. Ayush Sen. He is a Bachelor of Commerce Graduate with a Post-Graduate Diploma in I.T. He is dedicated to ensuring that the Centre runs smoothly, while teaching the children good hygiene practices, and correct behaviour, while motivating them and teaching them life lessons through inspirational stories. He creates videos and posts for social media to engage and inspire our supporters. He is also able to teach I.T. and Computer Skills when our resident I.T. and Computer Skills teacher — Mr. C.L. Sen, is on holiday.

Cook

Mrs. Kusum Sen makes fresh, home-cooked breakfasts for the children every day from Monday to Friday.

Hindi, English, and Mathematics Teacher

Mr. Laxman Ahirwar is our B. Ed. qualified teacher who teaches Hindi, English, and Mathematics. He also teaches Hindi literacy and numeracy to the youngest children. He is a talented, dedicated, fully qualified teacher who is passionately committed to ensuring that our students excel in their studies and succeed in life.

I.T. & Computer Skills, and General Knowledge Teacher

Mr. Chhotelal Sen is our B. Ed. qualified teacher who teaches I.T. and Computer Skills; Hindi and English Typing. He is fully qualified in I.T. and Computing. He also teaches General Knowledge. In addition, he teaches the younger children so that they can move ahead educationally. He prepares and types all the exam schedules, exam papers, exam results, and post-exam teachers' reports for all the teachers. He is paid extra for this work, at exam times, which are in January, May, and September every year. He is a talented and hard-working teacher who wants the best for our students.

Intern Primary Teacher

Miss Anamika Sen is our intern teacher. She is currently studying for her B.A. She teaches literacy and numeracy to the little children, who are from 4 to 6 years old. She also teaches traditional Indian dancing to the children.

TIMINGS

We aim to work congenially with Private Schools and with Government schools, as we provide coaching that will enable children to make the most of the free education provided by the Indian Government, and excel in their fee-paying schools. The children start their classes at the local Government school at 10.30 a.m. Therefore:

- Classes at the Bhiyantal Live and Learn Centre start at 7 a.m. and continue until 10.00 a.m., from Monday to Friday every week. Breakfast is served from 10 a.m. to 10.15 a.m. This is so that all the children can get to school on time. The teachers and staff are contracted to work from 7 a.m. until 11 a.m. The teachers are encouraged to improve their skills in I.T., Computing, and English from 10.30am to 11 am.
- Classes are held from Monday to Friday every week, so that children, teachers, and staff can enjoy free time at weekends. We believe in quality of life.
- Children who pay for coaching are taught and fed along with the children who get free coaching. We do not discriminate on any grounds — whether they be of caste, creed, religion, race, social status, or financial status.
- All children are provided with free breakfasts, consisting of nourishing food, and milk, every day that they are taught.

STAFF HOLIDAYS

Live and Learn Foundation Staff Holiday Entitlement

Live and Learn Centres are open from Monday to Friday every week. Weekends are holidays for all staff.

As time progresses, we will hold workshops at weekends, in interesting subjects. These will be taught by visiting teachers.

The Live and Learn Centres will observe National Holidays according to the discretion of the Centre Manager and will also be closed:

- 1. For 1 week (7 days) at Diwali (5 working days + 1 weekend) = 5 days paid leave.
- 2. For 2 weeks (14 days) at the beginning of June every year (10 working days + 2 weekends) = 10 days paid leave.

Staff receive 15 days paid annual leave during these times.

Annual leave entitlement from 1 April – 31 March every year

Permanent Part-Time and Full-Time Staff = 10 days paid annual leave.

Paid exam days entitlement from 1 April – 31 March every year

Permanent and Part-Time Staff = 5 Paid Exam Days

Total Paid Leave for Permanent Part-Time Staff and Full-Time Staff =

30 days paid annual leave.

And, permanent staff get national holidays as paid leave, which usually brings paid leave entitlement up to about 35–40 days.

All staff are entitled to take days off for exams, as we want our staff to develop and increase their skills, training, professional qualifications, and careers. These exam days will count as paid leave but they will be deemed separate from annual paid leave, and if exam days are taken the leave request letters must mention the name and nature of the exam, the location, the date, and the time of the exam. Staff (whether full-time or part-time), cannot take more than 5 exam days per year. If more days are needed for exams, they can be taken as paid annual leave days. If the number of exam days plus paid leave days exceeds 15, in any given year, then these additional days will count as unpaid leave.

This means that staff salary will be cut by a proportional daily amount for every unpaid leave day/exam day taken.

If annual leave days and paid exam days are not taken in any given year, they will NOT be carried over to the next year. They will be lost. At the end of every year, NO money will be paid in lieu of paid leave that has not be taken.

Summary

When counting Diwali and June Holidays, this means that Permanent Part-Time and Full-Time Staff will get 25 days paid annual leave plus 5 paid exam days = 30 days paid leave in total. And, permanent staff get national holidays as paid leave, which usually brings paid leave entitlement up to about 35–40 days. The national holidays are given according to the discretion of the Centre Manager.

This is extremely generous leave entitlement. The Live and Learn Foundation seeks to employ highly motivated, passionate, dedicated people who believe in us and our cause. And we believe that our staff should be happy and enjoy their lives to the full. However, we do expect 100% effort from our staff, and a commitment to doing their best work and helping the Live and Learn Foundation to succeed, in return for our generous holiday and salary packages.

Note: Teachers and Staff are requested to take their paid leave (not including paid leave given during those times when the Centre is officially closed) separately from each other, so there are always enough teachers and staff in the Live and Learn Centres to cover an absent teacher's lessons, or an absent staff member's duties.

Annexure 1.3: Measurability

We have implemented the following measures to ascertain whether the Bhiyantal Live and Learn Centre is functioning effectively.

1. Attendance

- The figures in the bar chart, and in the registers, are from April 2024 to March September 2025. Please see the attendance registers for a more detailed view.
- Attendance at the Bhiyantal Live and Learn Centre is measured on a regular basis.
 Attendance registers are kept for every month. From April 2024 to September 2025 the number of students studying at the Bhiyantal Live and Learn Centre stabilized at 50. Of these, 45 children are BPL (Below Poverty Line) and 5 children are feepaying students, who pay Rs. 300 per month each.
- However, not all the children attended every day, especially in the hot summer months. To try and counter this, we bought 2 coolers for the school, and will buy more coolers when we have the resources. This worked in addition to the comfort the children and staff feel in the new schoolroom. We had our annual 2-week holiday in June at the beginning of June, which is the hottest part of the year, although this year the staff said it was not that hot (because of the coolers and new schoolroom), so we might look at not having that and adding those 10 days to the staff annual paid leave instead, so they can take that leave anytime.
- The number of children who now attend the Bhiyantal Live and Learn Centre on a daily basis has risen to 50. They number around 75 if we count ex-pupils who now only attend sporadically, or only come to take part in the programmes held on special events such as the Bhiyantal Live and Learn Centre's anniversary functions and The Live and Learn Foundation's anniversary outings & events; or the Independence and Republic Day celebrations. We are happy that they do this, as they are building up a strong alumni network based upon shared experiences and happy memories.

2. Efficacy of Teaching

- All the children who attended the centre from April 2024 March 2025, who were of the age to take Board exams, passed their Board exams.
- The children are regularly tested on what they have learned. Centre examinations in all the subjects taught are held 3 times a year; in January, May, and September.
- Some of the children are very young (ages 4 to 6) so those children are given learning tests rather than formal examinations.
- The teachers are held accountable for their teaching methods. We have staff meetings every month so that staff and management can express their views on whether the children are being taught effectively.

• Teachers cannot physically hit or verbally abuse children in The Bhiyantal Live and Learn Centre. The teachers are aware that if they do so they will be dismissed. They must teach the children in firm but kind ways.

3. Admission Forms

We found that some children were taking far too much time off and not coming to the centre regularly. All the parents/guardians are now required to fill out admission forms on an annual basis, for every child who attends the Bhiyantal Live and Learn Centre, whether they pay fees or whether they attend free of charge. We started this practice so that:

- We have formal records of all the children who attend the centre.
- Children and their parents/guardians understand that children must attend every day from Monday to Friday during the times when the centre is open. This helps us to maintain a high standard of learning; and to plan rehearsals for plays and performances on special days such as The Bhiyantal Live and Learn Centre's Anniversary; The Live and Learn Foundation's Anniversary; Independence Day; and Republic Day.
- Regular attendance also teaches children discipline, which is a very valuable life-skill.

4. Teachers' Reports

In May 2025, we instituted the system of Teachers' Reports after every round of Centre Exams (which are held 3 times in every year, in January, May and September). This is so we can assess how we need to help the children who come to the Centre, and it is necessary now that the admissions are increasing. All teachers, even the primary teacher, must write reports for all the children after every set of Centre exams). This helps us to know which children need extra help, and in which subjects. And this helps us to provide excellent tuition that is tailored to the needs of individual children.

Annexure 1.4: Safety and Security of the Children


We take the safety and security of our children very seriously. Children at the Bhiyantal Live and Learn Centre are watched over and protected by the Managing Director for Madhya Pradesh, the teachers, and concerned adults (who are the parents of some of the children who study with us).

All the children at the centre must have photo consent forms signed by their parents or guardians. We post photographs of the children on our social media channels and website; we also show them in our reports and in our Annual Company Report. We always ensure that these photographs portray the children in safe and age-appropriate ways; and that our social media channels are safe for uploading photos of children.

We will put in CCTV cameras when we have the funds.

We do not tolerate abuse of any kind.

Admissions increased exponentially when our new schoolroom was finished and we were able to accommodate more children. As of September 2025, our admissions stabilised at 50 children, as we are currently unable to accommodate or teach any more. 45 of these are BPL and therefore receive free coaching; 5 of these are fee-paying students who pay Rs.300 per month each. All the children receive free food. There is clearly a demand for the services we provide, and we get more and more requests from parents in the village who want their children to study with us. However, we have reached our maximum capacity again. If we had a larger building with more schoolrooms; if we had more computers; and if we had the funding to hire more teachers, we could accommodate all the children in the village and the surrounding area. We could also offer skills training to the underprivileged adults in the village. All this is something we want to do as it aligns with demand from parents in the village who want their children to attend the Centre; a clear demand for sustainable employment for adults in the village who could create their own businesses by learning the skills they need to do so; and our own vision of creating a vital and vibrant community hub in Bhiyantal Village.




Figure 2: May 2024




Figure 4: July 2024




Figure 5: August 2024




Figure 6: September 2024




Figure 7: October 2024




Figure 8: November 2024




Figure 9:December 2024




Figure 10:January 2025




Figure 11:February 2025




Figure 12:March 2025




Figure 13 April 2025




Figure 14 May 2025




Figure 15 June 2025




Figure 16 July 2025




Figure 17 August 2025




Figure 18 September 2025

We plan to teach e-commerce when the centre grows.

In addition, we have instituted a tradition called 'Cultural Fridays.' Every Friday, the children are encouraged to express themselves creatively by drawing and painting. They are also taught traditional Indian dancing by our Intern Teacher. Our Deputy Centre Manager teaches them hygienic practices (such as washing their hands after going to the toilet, and before meals) and tells them stories for 30 minutes before breakfast. These

can be motivational stories or they can be stories containing wisdom and valuable life lessons to help the children navigate their daily lives.

We do this so that our children are provided with a good all-round education that enables them to develop their artistic talents and appreciation of culture, thus enhancing their ability to enjoy life to the full.

The children spontaneously play group games during their breaks, which gives them healthy physical exercise and helps them to bond with each other.

As the Bhiyantal Live and Learn Centre evolves, we plan to employ a fully qualified primary school teacher; and science, yoga, and arts teachers to teach the following subjects:

- Hindi, Mathematics and English to the primary school children.
- Biology and Botany
- Physics and Chemistry
- Logic and Reasoning
- Social Sciences
- Yoga, Art, Music, Singing, Theatre, and Dance

Children with Learning Disabilities

The Live and Learn Foundation® is dedicated to inclusivity, and committed to providing free education for low-income children with special educational needs.

The State Government has offered to supply a Special Needs teacher for children in the village with learning disabilities. The teacher's salary is paid by the Government but we will pay travel fees for such a teacher to come to the centre once a week. We have wanted to help one such child, called Chotu, since we began the Bhiyantal Live and Learn Centre. At the time of writing this, the Government still has not supplied such a teacher as there is only one such teacher to serve the whole district of Rajnagar.

There are 5 children with learning disabilities in the village. When we get funding, we will look at hiring a Special Needs teacher for them.

In the meantime, a child with physical disabilities comes to the centre regularly to learn with the other children. The child with learning disabilities called Chotu is brought to the centre once a week by our Deputy Centre Manager, to participate in cultural Fridays. He does not always come if he is not in the mood, but we are doing what we can to enrich his life.

Annexure 1.8: Latest Examinations and Results at the Time of Writing This Report

Board Examinations April 2024 – End of September 2025

All the children studying at the Bhiyantal Live and Learn Centre, who took Board Examinations, passed. These examinations are very important because passing them enables students to move up into the next class in their respective schools.

Latest Bhiyantal Live and Learn Centre Tests and Results: September 2025

The centre conducts examinations three times a year, in January, May, and September.

All the teachers create exam papers in their subjects according to the national curriculum the students are studying in their respective schools. As we provide tuition, this means that the students are prepared for their lessons in their schools and also for their school exams and Board Exams.

Mr. C.L Sen prepares and types all the exam schedules, exam papers, exam results, and post-exam teachers' reports. He is paid extra for this work, at exam times.

All the children must take these exams. The older children are split into A and B groups according to their ages and, consequently, levels of ability. The very young children — Group C, are also given little tests.

The most recent Exam Results, Teachers' Reports and Exam Papers are included in this report: at the time that this report was written, this means that these are for September 2025.

Annexure 1.8B: Impact of Teachers' Reports

The post-exam Teacher's reports were instituted in May 2025. This is our way of measuring the progress of our students in academic subjects.

We understand this and offer many such activities in our Centre to help every single student find out what they are good at, and to develop their talent in that area (or areas). In time, we hope to provide all of these activities and more.

However, as a Centre, one of our core activities is to provide tuition in academic subjects to help the students who come to us to progress in their respective schools, and we take that very seriously. Or teachers do their best to make sure that the students pass their school exams and Board Exams.

To date, all of the students who have studied with us have passed their Board Exams. This includes Government School children and Private School children.

That has given us a 100% success rate so far.

The Bhiyantal Live and Learn Centre is evolving into a vibrant hub of knowledge, creativity, and community. The completion of our new schoolroom in Spring 2025 opened doors to an extraordinary opportunity: we can now teach and nurture more children than ever before. Admissions have surged as families in the village recognize the Centre as a place where young minds flourish.

To support this growth, we welcomed a new Deputy Centre Manager in May 2025 to oversee daily activities and promote the Centre's mission. We also brought on an Intern Teacher to guide our youngest learners, with plans to hire a fully qualified Primary Teacher as future funding allows. Every child, from ages 4 to 6, is given attentive guidance, ensuring they are supported academically, socially, and emotionally.

At Bhiyantal, education is holistic. Our *Cultural Fridays* spark joy and creativity, allowing children to explore art, painting, and traditional Indian dance, while developing essential life skills and healthy habits. Storytelling sessions provide wisdom, inspiration, and moral guidance, helping children navigate their daily lives with confidence and curiosity. During breaks, group games foster physical health, teamwork, and friendship.

Academic excellence remains central to our mission. Post-exam teacher reports help us identify each student's strengths and areas for growth. We firmly believe there are no "bad students," only opportunities for inspired teaching. Our dedicated teachers support every learner with firm yet compassionate methods. So far, all students—both from government and private schools—have passed their Board Exams, achieving a remarkable 100% success rate.

Yet, Bhiyantal is more than academics. We recognize and nurture each child's unique talents—whether in sports, agriculture, cooking, arts, dance, music, theatre, or literature. Our vision is to expand further, employing specialized teachers in subjects such as Science, Logic, Yoga, Art, Music, and Performing Arts, so every child can explore their passions and reach their full potential.

The Centre's impact is evident in the community. Parents clearly value the services we provide, and the demand continues to grow.

However, we are at maximum capacity yet again. With additional classrooms, more computers and resources, and more teachers, we could offer admission to every child in Bhiyantal and surrounding villages—and offer skills training to adults, empowering them to create sustainable livelihoods and contribute to a thriving community.

With the support of individual donors, Government funding, CSR funding, and in due course funding from foreign aid agencies when we have received our FCRA certificate,

we can build a brighter future for the children and families of Bhiyantal Village, creating a hub where learning, culture, and community flourish together.

Annexure 2.1: 10-Year Plan Overview

We had to revise our original 5-year plan to a 10-year plan. We want to provide skills training for adults in the Bhiyantal Live and Learn Centre, as the centre evolves into a stable community hub (as it is beginning to do). This is in line with our overall aims and objectives.

Our original 5-year plan was based on the idea that we would establish a large Live and Learn Centre in Khajuraho, which would eventually be self-supporting as it would offer paid courses, classes, cultural programmes, and retreats for high-income Indians and foreign tourists, as well as free tuition and skills training for underprivileged children and adults. If we get funding for this, it could still be a possibility.

At this point we still plan to establish a large Live and Learn Centre in Delhi in due course, which will support itself financially, and financially support our other projects, including the Bhiyantal Live and Learn Centre.

This will take 6 years to accomplish, from where we are now.

The Delhi Live and Learn Centre will provide coaching in Hindi, English, I.T and Computer Skills, and various other academic and non-academic subjects for street children from Delhi. These children will be taught for free.

The Delhi Live and Learn Centre will provide a range of arts, crafts, vocational skills training, and professional skills training, for impoverished adults. These low-income adults will be taught for free.

Paid coaching will be available for children from high-income families.

Workshops and courses on a wide range of interesting subjects such as yoga, meditation, life-skills, self-development, creative writing, dance, music, arts, and crafts, will also be held in this centre for higher-income people. Higher-income people will be charged for these workshops and courses. This, along with other financial sustainability initiatives, will enable the Delhi Live and Learn Centre to eventually become a financially self-sustaining community hub, that will also be able to fund other projects by The Live and Learn Foundation.

Food will be provided free of cost for everyone. All children will always eat for free. If people cannot pay for food, they will eat for free and they can exchange work or skills for food. People who can pay for food will also be able to eat for free but they will have the option to donate money for the food they eat, if they wish.

- Completing 3 years of audited annual accounts; professionally audited by an independent and impartial firm of Chartered Accountants.

Year 4: Completed on the 24th of November 2025

- Running the Bhiyantal Live and Learn Centre and continuing to develop it into a model Live and Learn Centre and a community hub. The Bhiyantal Centre experienced a surge of growth after the completion of our new schoolroom.
- Promoting the website/social media/online marketing to raise brand awareness. We hired a new Deputy Centre Manager and Social Media Executive to continue to raise our profile on our existing social media sites on Facebook, LinkedIn, and Instagram.
- Applying for Government Funding (State and National Level). This will have to continue next year, when we get the required certificates.
- Getting the 12A and 80G certificates and the CSR Certificate, and applying for CSR funding from Indian companies. We got the CSR-1 Certificate.
- We are applying for the 12A and 80G certificates. These are taking longer than anticipated because our CA's team applied under the wrong law initially so we had to withdraw that application and re-apply. This wasted six months.
- Getting the FCRA (Foreign Contribution Regulation Act) certificate and applying for donations from foreign international development agencies and foundations. We started the process of opening an FCRA account with the State Bank of India, which is a legal requirement for the FCRA certificate. Once this is open, we can apply for the certificate, which will take several months.

Year 5: To Be Completed on the 24th of November 2026

- Running the Bhiyantal Live and Learn Centre and continuing to make it into a model Live and Learn Centre and a community hub. Implementing skills training courses for adults. Sourcing computers and other resources to equip the Centre as it grows.
- Promoting the website/social media/online marketing to raise brand awareness.
- Applying for Government Funding (State and National Level).
- Getting the 12A and 80G certificates. We already have the CSR certificate. Applying for CSR funding from Indian companies.
- Getting the FCRA (Foreign Contribution Regulation Act) certificate and applying for donations from foreign agencies such as the UN, UNICEF etc.
- Networking with the Delhi Government and the National Government.
- Continuing domestic (Indian) and foreign fundraising activities.
- Conducting a feasibility study to see where and how to establish a large Live and Learn Centre in Delhi.

Year 6: To Be Completed on the 24th of November 2027

- Running the Bhiyantal Live and Learn Centre and continuing to make it into a model Live and Learn Centre and a community hub. Streamlining skills training courses for adults.

- Starting commercial activities such as paid training courses, coaching classes and arts, crafts, yoga, meditation, and other creative workshops at the Delhi Centre, and opening the Centre shop which will ultimately also sell arts and crafts made by adults who have taken free courses at the centre. This will be an outlet and a source of income for them. The Live and Learn Foundation will take a small commission on each sale.
- Creating an ecommerce function for our website and linking it to the Delhi Centre.
- Networking with the Delhi Government and the National Government.
- Fundraising, including sourcing funds from foreign donors and CSR. We will also hold fundraising events in the Delhi Centre, such as parties, plays, concerts and dinner dances etc.

Year 7: To Be Completed on the 24th of November 2028

- Running the Delhi Live and Learn Centre and providing free tuition and food for street children and free skills training for adults who have no source of income.
- Implementing and running paid courses, lectures, and workshops at the Delhi Centre.
- Promoting the website/social media/online marketing to create and maintain brand awareness and to generate sales for the Delhi Centre and the Bhiyantal Centre.
- Running the Bhiyantal Live and Learn Centre and continuing to make it into a model Live and Learn Centre and a community hub. Streamlining skills training courses for adults.
- Marketing the Centres, and the products, courses, and workshops at the Delhi Centre.
- Fundraising, including events, and sourcing funds from foreign donors, and CSR.

Year 8: To Be Completed on the 24th of November 2029

- Fundraising, including events, sourcing funds from foreign donors, and CSR.
- Running the Delhi Live and Learn Centre and providing free tuition and food for street children and free skills training for adults who have no source of income.
- Implementing and running paid courses, lectures, and workshops at the Delhi Centre.
- Promoting the website/social media/online marketing to create and maintain brand awareness and to generate sales for the Delhi Centre and awareness of the Bhiyantal Centre. Marketing the products, courses, and workshops at the Delhi Centre.
- Heading towards financial sustainability at the Delhi Centre.
- Running the Bhiyantal Live and Learn Centre and continuing to make it into a model Live and Learn Centre and a community hub. Streamlining skills training courses for adults.
- Promoting the ecommerce website/social media, and conducting offline marketing.

Year 9: To Be Completed on the 24th of November 2030

- Fundraising, including events, sourcing funds from foreign donors, and CSR.
- Running the Delhi Live and Learn Centre and providing free tuition and food for street children and free skills training for adults who have no source of income.
- Implementing and running paid courses, lectures, and workshops at the Delhi Centre.
- Promoting the website/social media/online marketing to create and maintain brand awareness and to generate sales for the Delhi Centre and awareness of the Bhiyantal Centre. Marketing the products, courses, and workshops at the Delhi Centre.
- Heading towards complete financial sustainability at the Delhi Centre.
- Promoting the ecommerce website/social media, and conducting offline marketing.
- Running the Bhiyantal Live and Learn Centre and continuing to make it into a model Live and Learn Centre and a community hub. Managing skills training courses for adults here as well.
- Funding the Bhiyantal Centre from the Delhi Centre.

Year 10: To Be Completed on the 24th of November 2031

- Running the Delhi Live and Learn Centre and providing free tuition and food for street children and free skills training for adults who have no source of income.
- Implementing and running paid courses, lectures, and workshops at the Delhi Centre.

- Promoting the website/social media/online marketing to create and maintain brand awareness and to generate sales for the Delhi Centre and awareness of the Bhiyantal Centre. Marketing the products, courses, and workshops at the Delhi Centre.
- Promoting the ecommerce website/social media, and conducting offline marketing
- Running the Bhiyantal Live and Learn Centre and continuing to make it into a model Live and Learn Centre and a community hub. Managing skills training courses for adults here as well.
- Funding the Bhiyantal Centre from the Delhi Centre.
- The Delhi Centre should be financially self-sustaining by the end of this year and in a position to fund smaller Live and Learn Centres in Delhi and rural areas.

Annexure 2.3: Future Vision for the Delhi Live and Learn Centre

The Delhi Live and Learn Centre: Free Tuition for Street Children in Hindi, English, Mathematics, I.T. and Computer Skills Training, Sciences, Arts, Academic and Non-Academic Subjects.

I.T. and Computer skills will be taught to children in the Live and Learn Centre in Delhi.

Street children and children from low-income families will be taught free of cost. Tuition in English will be provided in the Delhi Live and Learn Centre, to give such children an entry into the international arena. Tuition in other academic subjects, and other languages, can be provided. Vocational skills training can also be provided for older children.

High-quality teachers will be sourced and employed to teach these subjects. Specially trained teachers will be sourced and hired to teach children with special educational needs.

Low-income children will always be taught free of cost by The Live and Learn Foundation®.

However, children from higher income families will be charged fees for coaching, at a reasonable rate. This will help the Delhi Live and Learn Centre to become financially self-sustaining as a coaching centre.

Free Arts and Crafts and Skills Training for Low-Income Adults

The Live and Learn Centre in Delhi will provide low-income adults from Delhi and the surrounding villages with the training they need to make arts and crafts. They will be given the opportunity to sell their handiwork through the Centre shop and ecommerce portal.

Free Vocational and Professional Skills Training for Low-Income Adults

Vocational skills training can also be provided at the Delhi Live and Learn Centre; such as I.T., sewing, beauty training, training for electricians and plumbers, and more.

Training in Advanced I.T. Skills, Marketing, and Design, can also be provided for adults as well as for older children.

Venue: Delhi Centre

We can source and buy land and construct the Delhi Live and Learn Centre on the site. If this is financially unviable, we will look for a suitable place to rent.

Measurability

- Attendance at the Delhi Live and Learn Centre will be measured on a regular basis.
- Systems will be put into place to measure whether adults have learned the skills they wanted to learn.

- Systems will be put into place to measure children's and adults' progress in the subjects taught to them.
- We will talk to the relevant Government departments, and look at making the free Live and Learn classes and courses for low-income adults and children, into certified diploma courses.

Financial Sustainability

1. The Delhi Live and Learn Centre could offer classes, courses, and workshops in a wide range of subjects to adults from higher-income families, for which they will be charged. Teachers and facilitators for these classes, courses and workshops will be sourced nationally and internationally.

These subjects could include (but will not be limited to) making arts and crafts; teaching yoga, meditation, dance, singing; self-development courses, and workshops on life-enhancing and mind-broadening topics.

Low-income alumni of Live and Learn Centre courses in arts and crafts and vocational skills, can also apply to teach such courses and workshops in their subjects, for which they will be paid as teachers.

2. The Live and Learn Centre in Delhi will also function as a coaching centre for children from high-income families. They would be able to access tuition on a wide range of academic and non-academic subjects.

Note: Low-income children will always be taught free of charge by The Live and Learn Foundation®.

- 3. Adults who have succeeded in learning crafts of their choice, will be able to sell their goods to:
 - Independent Retail Outlets in India and Abroad.
 - Through a shop in the Delhi Live and Learn Centre. The centre will take a reasonable commission on each sale.
 - To people in India and abroad through the Live and Learn Ecommerce portal.

Annexure 2.4 Timeline of the Delhi Live and Learn Centre: Self-Sustaining in Four Years from the Time it Opens

We aim to make the Delhi Live and Learn Centre financially self-sustaining in four years from the time it opens.

At this point it will engage with the Live and Learn Coaching Centre in Bhiyantal Village as its semi-autonomous SDG/NGO franchisee.

It will be able to fund other projects by The Live and Learn Foundation®, especially more small projects to help street children in Delhi, and other Indian cities. These projects will also become semi-autonomous SDG/NGO franchisees of The Live and Learn Foundation®.

Our current plan is to look at making other Live and Learn Centres across India, including the Bhiyantal Live and Learn Centre, into semi-autonomous franchisee branches of The Live and Learn Foundation® within 5 years of their initial implementation. This means that while they will be run by and for members of the communities they serve (which could include hiring and paying staff, resourcing their own centre budget, and sourcing funding), they will be audited as part of The Live and Learn Foundation®, have access to our legal, marketing, and social marketing expertise and resources, and be part of the brand of The Live and Learn Foundation®. The details of how these social enterprise franchises will work as branches of The Live and Learn Foundation® will be fine-tuned in due course.

This also means that all our franchisee branches will follow the ethics and values of The Live and Learn Foundation; provide free food and education to low-income children, and free skills and arts and crafts and business training to low income adults. They will become valuable, vibrant, community hubs.
