## MANSFIELD GROWS INFORMATION

**Mansfield Grows** – The Mansfield Library is launching a community project called "Mansfield Grows". Julie Crisafulli, Youth Services Librarian, joined our January meeting to tell us about this exciting project.

At the heart of Mansfield Grows lies an innovative indoor greenhouse cabinet that nurtures a diverse array of plants, including herbs, ornamental houseplants, and native Texas plants. The program will provide 50 growth kits that allow participants to take home a plant propagation, learn about its care, measure its growth, and report on knowledge gained through a survey.

# PLANTS OF THE MONTH: FEBRUARY HERBS

Herbs To Plant In February In Texas

February is an ideal time to plant a variety of herbs in Texas. Herbs are perfect for adding flavor to meals, as well as having many medicinal benefits. Growing your own herbs is easy and rewarding, and there are plenty of options for planting in the mild winter weather of Texas. Herbs like cilantro, parsley, dill, oregano, rosemary, thyme, and sage are all perfect for planting in February.

If starting from seed, it is important to start the seeds indoors at least 6-8 weeks before the last frost date. This will give them enough time to germinate and establish before being transplanted outdoors. Planting herbs from seed can be tricky but with enough patience and care they will reward you with lush foliage and flavorful leaves all season long.

For those looking for a more instant gratification approach, herbs can also be planted in pots or containers from nursery stock or small plants from the local garden center. These plants can often be found already established with roots intact and ready to plant directly into a pot or the garden bed. This method is great for those looking for fast results without having to wait weeks for germination or growth of their herb plants.

When planning an herb garden in Texas during February it is important to look up the last frost date for your area so that you can plan accordingly. With proper planning you can have a thriving herb garden full of flavorful additions to your cooking all year long!


#### **GAZEBO**
