FREEDOM IN CHRIST — GALATIANS 1:6-24

SESSION

INTRODUCTION

In this study, we will explore the theme salvation by grace through faith alone. Paul wrote this letter to address the issue of legalism and to defend the true Gospel from distortion. Let's dive into the text and discover the timeless truths that still apply to our lives today.

Key Takeaway: Any attempt to add works to the Gospel undermines the sufficiency of Christ's sacrifice and robs believers of the freedom found in God's grace.

Opening Prayer: Begin the session with a prayer, asking God to open our hearts and minds to His Word and grant us understanding and wisdom as we study Galatians.

Read Passage: Galatians 1:6-24

- 5. In verses 13-14, Paul shares his past life as a persecutor of the church. How does his testimony of transformation highlight the power of God's grace in a person's life?

Application

- 2. Take a moment to share your personal testimony with the group. How has encountering Jesus transformed your life and led you to serve Him?
